DISTRICT No. 5.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master:

Having been called upon to fill the vacancy caused by the lamented death of R.W. Brother George M. Johnson, your Deputy for District No. 5, I have the honor to submit the following report:

August 3, accompanied by Past Master Sullivan, of Sussex Lodge, No. 7, I visited St. George Lodge, No. 12, St. George. The E.A. Degree was conferred in a most impressive manner. This Lodge is strong in membership, and is doing good work. Its records are very full and complete, and its financial condition satisfactory.

August 5, I visited St. Mark's Lodge, No. 5, St. Andrews, examined the records, and found them, as usual in this Lodge, very careful and explicit, and full of matter which must be of value to a future historian of the Lodge. Two F. C. from Grand Manan were expected to have come up for the M. M. Degree; but they failed to appear. The Island members of St. Marks, especially those living on Grand Manan, must make long journeys by water in order to reach their Lodge room; and are therefore seldom seen at the meetings of the Lodge, and are practically debarred of its privileges. As many of our brethren in Grand Manan, Campobello, and West Isles are sea-faring men, it might be very

difficult for them to meet regularly and carry on the routine work of the Lodge room at places within easy reach of their respective homes; but if an effort were made to establish a Lodge in one or more of the Island parishes, it would, I am sure, in the general interest of the Craft, meet with the hearty approval of the officers and members of St. Mark's Lodge. I am aware that Grand Lodge would move cautiously in the creation of a new Lodge in a scattered community, for weak Lodges are an injury to the Fraternity. Nevertheless, the difficulty of reaching the mainland at stated times, places our Island brethren in such a peculiar situation that any evidence of their being able to maintain a working Lodge must have full weight; and I venture to recommend to my successor that he encourage the wish from time to time expressed for the organization of an Island Lodge.

August 12, I visited Victoria Lodge, No. 26, at its regular communication. Its records are neatly and correctly kept, and the Lodge is prospering. The entrance to the Lodge Room has lately been improved, a banquet room added, and the interior of the Lodge room tastefully decorated at the expense of the Lodge.

Owing to pressing engagements on the days of their regular communications, I have not officially visited Sussex Lodge, No. 7, and Alley Lodge, No. 14; but the former is my Masonic home, and having been present at several of its meetings since my appointment, I can report its offices in good hands and its membership increasing.



#### GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

The M.W. the Grand Master then delivered the following address:

BRETHREN OF GRAND LODGE:

Allow me first to extend to you a very hearty welcome to the Thirty-First Annual Communication of Grand Lodge, and secondly to express the hope that the present Communication may be to you both pleasant and masonically profitable. Pardon me if I dwell here on our responsibilities. Let us bring to these meetings our best powers and see to it that our words and actions result beneficially to the Craft.

With but one exception nothing has occurred during the year to mar the concord of our provincial Masonic family; and I think I may be justified in stating that peace, unity and harmony prevail throughout the jurisdiction.

The condition of the various Lodges is stated in the reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters, which are hereto appended.

Death, the ever busy reaper, has again reminded us that no eminence of station can "save us from the inevitable journey on the level of time to that undiscovered country from whose bourne no traveller returns," and it now becomes my duty, briefly, to refer to our fraternal dead.

George F. Harding, a Past Master of Carleton Union Lodge, died in the City of Montreal, September 18th, 1897, after an illness of many months. During his life Brother Harding had filled many positions of trust in the community, and in all was most faithful and efficient. Nor as a citizen alone was he known and valued. Those who were admitted to the closer bonds of friendship found him to possess not only a genial nature and fine intelligence, but those sterling qualities which go to make up character.

On the 14th day of last October, William C. Anslow, Worshipful Master of Northumberland Lodge, disappeared mysteriously while on a shooting expedition, and since then not the slightest trace of him has ever been discovered. He was editor and proprietor of the Union Advocate, a newspaper published at Newcastle, and was a man well known not only in his own community, but throughout the Province. A good and active citizen, faithful in the discharge of every duty, consistent in his public course, he was highly esteemed and respected wherever known.

The Hon. James Mitchell, Premier of New Brunswick and a Past Master of Sussex Lodge, No. 7, died at his residence St. Stephen, December 16th, and was buried with the full ceremonial of the Craft December 19th, 1897. For more than two years he had been the victim of a painful and incurable malady, which he bore with unflinching fortitude. Almost to the last he continued to take an undiminished interest in public affairs. Courteous and fair in his treatment of others, considerate of the feelings of all, whether opposed to him or not, he won and retained the confidence of the people of this Province, who could with safety rely upon his integrity and fairness of judgment.

H. G. Hunt, a Past Master of St. John's Lodge, died at his residence in this city on the 25th of December last. Initiated in St. John's Lodge 7th of May, 1867, he occupied the Master's chair in 1871, and again in 1872, preserving an active interest in his mother Lodge almost until the time of his death. While Brother Hunt is best known in his faithful performance of the duties belonging to his office, let us not undervalue such a record, but rather remember how large a debt Masonry owes to those who have done their work just so quietly and faithfully.

H. V. Cooper, Past Grand Director of Ceremonies, and a Past Master of New Brunswick Lodge, was called from his earthly labours April 12th, 1898. His best masonic work was given to his own Lodge, where he was ever a very prominent figure, filling for several terms the office of Worshipful Master, and later acting most efficiently as Secretary. In his rendition of our ritual he was particularly effective and painstaking. He died highly esteemed and regretted by all who knew him.

We all miss to-day the bright and genial presence of one who was rarely if ever absent from our meetings. I allude to Past Deputy Grand Master J. Henry Leonard, a Past Master of Carleton Union Lodge, in which he had filled for many years the office of Treasurer. He loved the Craft, and was ever an active and efficient worker. A good citizen, genial, kind-hearted, active in all civic and religious duties, he is deeply regretted by all who knew him.

On the 12th day of June, George Todd, Past Junior Grand Warden, died in the City of Fredericton at the ripe age of eighty-six. Regretfully we chronicle the removal of this old and respected Mason, whose association with the past history of Freemasonry in this Province added to the regard won for him by many deserving qualities.

We are also called to sympathise with sister jurisdictions in the loss of many eminent Craftsmen.

William B. Taliaferro, a Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Virginia, died February 27th, 1898, full of years and honors.

Daniel Striker, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Michigan, died April 11th, 1898.

John R. Boyce, a Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Montana, died April 23rd, 1898.

William H. Best, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of North Dakota, died May 3rd, 1898.

Henry C. Cook, Past Grand Master of Masons of Kansas, died June 12th, 1898.

John P. Fitzgerald, a Past Grand Master of Virginia, died June 10th, 1898.

William Francis Drinkard, Past Grand Master of Masons of Virginia, died July 11th, 1898.

John W. Wedderfield, Past Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Colorado, died July 4th, 1898.

To me the most pleasing duty connected with the office of Grand Master is that associated with official visitations. To renew acquaintance with the active members of the different Lodges, to instruct them in the ritual, to point out to them the aims and aspirations of our fraternity is to me a pleasure and a privilege.

November, 12th, 1897, I visited Corinthian Lodge. I was accompanied by V.W. Brother Hartt, Grand Secretary; W. Brother E. McLeod, Grand Director of Ceremonies, and Brother F. F. Ketchum. We were warmly received and hospitably entertained by the brethern at Hampton. Despite the condition of the weather, which was most disagreeable, the attendance at the communication was good. We witnessed the conferring of the F. C. Degree, and the work was exceedingly well done. The condition of this Lodge is most satisfactory, and its members are united and enthusiastic.

On December 20th, I visited The Union Lodge of Portland, accompanied by a full staff of Grand Lodge officers, and from W. Master Coster the officers and members received a very hearty welcome. The M. M. Degree was conferred upon two candidates, and the work as exemplified left little to be desired. After labor came a call to refreshment, and the bountiful repast to which we sat down showed that the stewards of this Lodge understood how to do their duty.

January 3rd, 1898, I visited Zion Lodge accompanied by several of the Grand Lodge officers. I installed as W. Master that well tried and and true Craftsman, W. Brother George Coggon. A very pleasing duty was intrusted to me; viz., that of presenting to W. Brother McLean a handsome P. M. Jewel as an evidence of the regard of his brethren and their appreciation of his services during the two years he had occupied the chair. The condition of Zion Lodge I found to be prosperous—the hall is free from debt, the Lodge owes nothing, and they have a cash balance to the good. I predict for Zion Lodge a prosperous year.

On January 4th, I paid an official visit to St. John's Lodge, No. 2, and installed as W. Master Brother J. H. Morrison. Under the efficient and energetic leadership of Brother Morrison, I feel that this Lodge will sustain its well established reputation. After the Lodge meeting had closed we were sumptuously and hospitably entertained by the brethren.

January 11th, at the regular communication of Hibernia Lodge, I had the pleasure of installing the Worshipful Master, Brother George K. Cochran. It is hardly necessary to say that the condition of this Lodge is good, and with the efficient and interested corps of officers, I predict for it a prosperous year.

Corinthian Lodge was again visited on the 14th of January. Assisted by a full corps of Grand Lodge officers, I installed the Worshipful Master, (Brother J. E. Whittaker) and officers, and then conferred the M. M. Degree on two candidates.

June 9th, I visited Sussex Lodge, No. 4, Dorchester. The work of the evening was the E. A. Degree, which was conferred upon three candidates. The work was fairly well done; and considering the disadvantages under which this lodge labours, the brethren deserve great credit for its good condition. The hall in which they meet is most unsuited for the requirements of the Craft, and with commendable energy the brethren in Dorchester propose to build a hall of their own. On the first of July a fair was held, which netted quite a handsome sum to which any additions made by the generous Craftsmen of this Province would be most welcome. While in Dorchester, I was most courteously and hospitably entertained by the Worshipful Master of the Lodge, R.W. Brother A. W. Chapman.

Carleton Union Lodge observed the festival of St. John the Baptist by holding a special communication, on which occasion I made an official visit. There was a large attendance of Grand Lodge officers as well as members of other Lodges. We witnessed the conferring of the M. M. Degree in a manner which reflected credit upon the officers of this Lodge. The welcome we received from Worshipful Master Baxter, the officers and members was most hearty and fraternal, and the well-known hospitality of the Carleton brethren was displayed as of old.

Carleton Lodge starts with a membership of twenty-one, and all the accessories for properly conducting the work and ritual, and I feel that the future of this Lodge is bright.

I have approved, with certain alterations, the by-laws of Carleton Lodge, No. 35.

I have nominated V.W. Brother Charles Masters for reappointment as Representative of the Grand Lodge of Delaware, the term of his commission having expired.

I have nominated W. Brother Joseph A. Magilton for appointment as Representative of the Grand Lodge of Virginia near the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.

I have nominated W. Brother W. H. B. Sadleir for appointment as Representative of the Grand Lodge of Montana near this Grand Lodge.

I have nominated W. Brother J. T. Allan Dibblee for appointment as Representative of the Grand Lodge of Nevada near the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.

I have nominated W. Brother W. A. Ewing for appointment as Representative of the Grand Lodge of Indiana near this Grand Lodge.

I have nominated W. Brother William A. Maclauchlan as Representative of the Grand Lodge of West Virginia near the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.

I have nominated W. Brother Isaac O. Beatteay as representative of the Grand Lodge of Illinois near this Grand Lodge in place of R.W. Brother J. Henry Leonard, deceased.

I have nominated W. Brother John P. Burchill as Representative of the Grand Lodge of Connecticut near this Grand Lodge.

On the recommendation of the Grand Master of Virginia, I have appointed R.W. Brother George Potts of Petersburg, Va., as Representative of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick near the Grand Lodge of Virginia.

On the nomination of M.W. Brother Edward C. Day, Grand Master of Montana, I have appointed W. Brother A. D. Macdonald, M.D., of Kalispell, Montana, as our Representative near that Grand Lodge. W. Brother Macdonald is a native of this Province and a brother of Mont. Macdonald, Esq., of this city.

W. Brother Christopher Diehl having resigned, I have commissioned W. Brother Walter Scott of Park City to represent this Grand Lodge near the Grand Lodge of Utah.

I have appointed R.W. Brother John T. McCormack of Reno, as our Representative near the Grand Lodge of Nevada.

I have appointed W. Brother David G. Baird of Beverly, as Representative of this Grand Lodge near that of New Jersey.

W. Brother William R. Higby of Bridgeport has been appointed to represent the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick near the Grand Lodge of Connecticut.

His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales has been pleased to nominate R.W. Brother Lieut. General John Wimburn Laurie, M. P., for appointment as Representative of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick near the United Grand Lodge of England. I therefore had much pleasure in commissioning this distinguished brother, so well known to many of us, and who for many years so ably filled the position of Grand Master of Nova Scotia.

We have received official notice that the Grand Lodge of Tennessee has discontinued the system of Grand Lodge Representatives.

I have received a communication from the Grand Orient of Belgium, signed by Henry Berge, 33°, National Grand Master, asking for closer fraternal relations and for an exchange of representatives. It would appear from the communication that the Grand Orient of Belgium is a regularly constituted Masonic authority holding jurisdiction over the Symbolic Lodges of the first three degrees only, and as such may fairly claim recognition at our hands. By my direction the Grand Secretary has handed this circular to the Committee on Relations with Foreign Grand Lodges, who will doubtless report to you at this session.

Early in the year a profound sensation was caused throughout the Masonic world by the astounding intelligence that the Grand Master of a body designated as the Grand Lodge of Peru, Christian Dam by name, had issued a decree ordering "that on all Masonic Altars the Bible shall be removed and replaced by the Constitution of the Order of Freemasonry, and that in our rituals the word Bible shall be struck out and the words "The Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Peru" put in its place." This assault upon the ancient landmarks brought from nearly every Grand Lodge or Grand Master on this continent an indignant protest in the shape of an edict of non-intercourse with Masons holding of this Grand Lodge of Peru.

But few cases have been referred to me during the year for official ruling; and most of these might have been solved had reference been made to the Constitution. I desire, however, to refer to one decision. The query was as to the meaning of the words in section 3, page 46 of the Constitution: "The jurisdiction of each Lodge extends in every direction half way to the nearest Lodge." I replied that the distance should be measured in a direct or air line from Lodge room to Lodge room, and had no connection with territorial boundaries.

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

I have directed the Grand Secretary to lay before Grand Lodge a communication from Campbellton Lodge containing a formal report of the trial of a former Secretary of that Lodge and asking that he be expelled.

I have appointed R.W. Brother John D. Short to fill the vacancy caused in the Board of General Purposes by the death of R.W. Brother J. Henry Leonard.

By resolution of the Board of General Purposes the work of the Third Degree will be exemplified at this meeting of Grand Lodge. To-morrow evening at eight o'clock at an emergency communication of The Union Lodge of Portland the M.M. Degree will be conferred.

In closing, I cannot omit mention of the uniform courtesy that has lightened all my official labors for the year.

The M.W. Grand Master appointed as such Committee:

R. W. Brother Julius T. Whitlock, P. G. M., R. W. Brother Alexander Burchill, D.G.M., and W. Brother Mr. Justice McLeod.

The V.W. Grand Secretary submitted his annual report and account as follows:

I deemed it better to lay this matter before Grand Lodge for action. if action is needed, rather than issue an edict on the subject, there being no close relationship between our Grand Lodge and the body known as the Grand Lodge of Peru. As far back as 1884, application was made to us to recognize the Grand Lodge of Peru then recently formed, but our Committee upon Relations with Foreign Grand Lodges advised against immediate action, for reasons set out in their report of that year. The matter came up on other occasions, and as late as 1892, when the Committee still advised against recognition. The conservative course which we have pursued is now amply justified. Whether the Grand Lodge of Peru is or is not a legitimate body of Ancient Craft Masonry is not at this moment so important to us as the knowledge—which we have

through a communication from the Grand Lodge of New York—that the fraternity in Peru associated under the banners of the so-designated Grand Lodge have asserted themselves and elected a new Grand Master. F. L. Crosby, a Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Peru, in a letter to the Grand Master of New York (M.W. Brother W. A. Sutherland), says: "I am most happy to advise you that at the quarterly session of the Grand Lodge of Peru held three days ago (May 6th) the Dam party was defeated and Brother J. A. Ego Aguirre, a true Mason, was elected and installed as Grand Master. With this change, which your prompt and energetic action, together with that of other American Grand Masters evidently aided very much to produce, the Bible will again occupy its honored place on our altars and true Masonry will be practiced."

As far back as 1893 the Grand Lodge of Colorado invited the various Grand Lodges of the United States to consider the advisability of a Masonic observance of the centennial of the death of Worshipful Brother George Washington. Acting on this suggestion, the Grand Lodge of Virginia at its communication in December last appointed a special committee to make arrangements for a due observance of this interesting anniversary. In pursuance of this object a communication has been received from the Grand Lodge of Virginia inviting this Grand Lodge, either in the person of the Grand Master, or such alternate as he may appoint, to be present at and participate in the memorial ceremonies to be held at Mount Vernon, on December 14th, 1899. I feel sure that the occasion will be one of deep interest to every Mason, and doubtless this Grand Lodge will enthusiastically join to do honor to the memory of this distinguished brother.

A courteous invitation was received from the Grand Master of Prince Edward Island inviting this Grand Lodge and its subordinate

Lodges to participate in the celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of St. John Lodge, No. 1, P. E. I., at Charlottetown. I much regretted that it was impossible to have the Craft in this Province represented on

that occasion.

#### REPORT OF BOARD OF GENERAL PURPOSES.

R.W. Brother Alexander Burchill, Deputy Grand Master, submitted and read the report of the Board of General Purposes, as follows:

To the M. W. the Grand Lodge of the Antient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

The Board of General Purposes submits the following report of its proceedings during the past year:

- 1. At its first meeting, held on the 24th of September, 1897, R.W. the Deputy Grand Master, President, in the chair, the Board elected W. Brother Mr. Justice McLeod Vice-President.
- 2. The Proceedings of Grand Lodge for 1897 were printed in the usual form, and by direction of the Board a list of all Grand Officers-1867 to 1897, inclusive—was prepared and inserted; a useful record has thus been supplied.
- 3. A new edition of the Constitution of Grand Lodge, as revised and amended at the last annual communication, has also been published during the year to the number of one thousand copies. These are now obtainable from the Grand Secretary's office at a charge of fifteen cents per copy.
- 4. The address voted by Grand Lodge to Her Majesty the Queen was duly engrossed on parchment, suitably bound, and transmitted to the Office of the Secretary of State, Ottawa.

The following communication in reference thereto was received at the Grand Secretary's Office, on the 5th of February last:

Ottawa, 3rd February, 1898.

SIR: Referring to your communication of the 13th December last, I have the honour to inform you that the Address to the Queen from the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick having been duly laid at the foot of the Throne, Her Majesty was much touched by this warm expression of the attachment of the members of the Grand Lodge to Her Throne and Person, and was pleased to command the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies to convey to them Her thanks for their dutiful congratulations and loyal prayer.

- 5. - 6. The Committee appointed by the Board to audit the books and accounts of the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary has submitted the following report, which receives the approval of the Board:

From the facts set out in the letter of M.W. Brother Berge and from information already in the possession of your Committee there can be no doubt whatever that the Grand Orient exercises lawful authority over the Lodges of Craft Masonry in the Kingdom of Belgium, that it has been in existence sixty-six years and that it possesses the confidence and respect of all the legitimate governed bodies of Craft Masonry in Europe. It exercises no control over any other degrees than those of Entered Apprentice, Fellow Craft and Master Mason, and men of character and eminence in the national life of Belgium have been long connected with it.

Your Committee, therefore, respectfully recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Grand Lodge of the Antient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick hereby accedes to the wish of the Grand Orient of Belgium, and has much pleasure in entering into fraternal relationship with that Grand Orient.

The commission, which bore date the 23rd day of February, 1898, at Helena, was signed by M.W. Brother Edward C. Day, Grand Master, and R.W. Brother Cornelius Hedges, Grand Secretary.

These two brethren were thereupon received with grand honors, and welcomed by the Grand Master as the representatives of the two sister jurisdictions.

Both brethren addressed Grand Lodge, W. Brother Sadleir submitting some very interesting statements regarding Free Masonry in Montana.

#### WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON,

24TH AUGUST, 1898.

Grand Lodge resumed labor at half-past four o'clock this afternoon.

The Committee on the Grand Master's address submitted the following report:

The Committee to whom was referred the address of the M.W. Grand Master beg to report:

- 1. That it is gratifying to learn that Masonic unity and harmony have during the past year continued unbroken in this jurisdiction, and that indications are not wanting of a prosperous condition in many of the Lodges.
- 2. Grievously indeed has Grand Lodge suffered through the removal from this earthly life of those true and eminent brethren whom the Grand Master recalls to loving recollection; and most earnestly do the Committee join with the Grand Master in his tributes to the character and virtues of those whose loss within the past year has made the Craft so much the
- 3. The roll of illustrious dead mourned in other jurisdictions is, too, a long one, and to our sister Lodges so bereaved Grand Lodge can feelingly extend its sympathy.
- 4. The valuable work done by the Grand Master in visiting Subordinate Lodges merits the appreciation of Grand Lodge. It is well understood that the ability of any Grand Master to officially visit throughout the Provinces is necessarily limited by considerations of the time occupied, but when time is so given to this work the benefit to the Craft is direct and valuable.
- 5. The Committee note with pleasure that one of the visitations made by the Grand Master was for the purpose of erecting a new Lodge at East Florenceville, Carleton County. We have no doubt that Carleton Lodge, No. 35, will be a valuable addition to the Roll of Subordinate Lodges.
- 6. The Committee approve of the action of the Grand Master in reference to the Grand Lodge of Peru, and hope that the sacred volume will again occupy its former position on her altars, and true Masonry be practised.
- 7. At the interesting ceremony which the Grand Lodge of Virginia purposes holding on the hundredth anniversary of the death of W. Brother George Washington, the Grand Master will, we trust, be present, or, if unable, will delegate some member of Grand Lodge to be present as his representative.
- 8. The ruling of the Grand Master as to the meaning of the words in the Constitution, "The jurisdiction of each Lodge extends in every direction half-way to the nearest Lodge," is one with which the Com-

mittee are not able wholly to concur. They incline to the opinion that the distance between Lodges should be measured by the usual means of communication, and not by a direct or air line.





HOLDEN AT ST. JOHN, JUNE 25TH, A. D. 1899.



The M.W. Grand Master directed the Grand Pursuivant to admit Master Masons properly clothed and in good standing.

M.W. Brother Lieutenant-Colonel T. Page Butler, Past Grand Master of Quebec, and Grand Representative of this Grand Lodge near that of Quebec, having been announced, R.W. Brothers J. V. Ellis and Robert Marshall, at the request of the Grand Master, withdrew and introduced the distinguished Brother, and conducted him to the East, where he was welcomed by the Grand Master and accorded the Grand Honors.

#### GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

The M.W. the Grand Master then delivered his annual address:

#### BRETHREN:

Permit me to extend to you cordial greetings and a warm welcome to the Thirty-Second Annual Communication of Grand Lodge, and may the occasion prove of equal pleasure and profit to all concerned. May this Communication be marked by a spirit of thoughtful earnestness and good feeling which lends strength to all councils.

While the year, which has just passed, has not been marked with any striking event in our history; peace and harmony have prevailed within our border and much good Masonic work has been quietly done.

The reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters, which are hereto appended, will show more fully the condition of the Craft, and with one exception, are hopeful of the future.

Our relations with Sister Grand Lodges continue to be most friendly and harmonious.

As in the renewal of intercourse our hearts are stirred with gladness, the very sense of satisfaction produced recalls to us the sorrowful fact that there are gaps in the circle. Some voices are silent that once spoke to us words of wisdom. Some eyes that smiled in friendly welcome are closed in the long sleep of death. Let us pause to pay a loving tribute to their memory, and give a fraternal recognition to their Masonic services.

David S. Stewart, a Past Master of Hibernia Lodge, died at his residence in this city, September 10th, 1898, after a lingering illness. He filled the chair of his Lodge during the year 1880, and for some years prior to that time had most faithfully and efficiently filled the office of Secretary. Brother Stewart was a kind hearted and faithful friend and will long be remembered by his Brethren.

R. L. Smith, a Past Master of The Union Lodge of Portland, died October 28th, 1898. Words cannot express our deep sense of the loss sustained by the Craft, and by the community at large, in the early death of this most worthy citizen and Brother. Of more than ordinary business capacity, and possessed of admirable tact and engaging manners and address, Brother Smith had won the confidence and most kindly regard of all with whom he was brought in contact. The same qualities which distinguished Brother Smith in his family and business relations, made him a popular worker in all pertaining to the welfare of his Lodge, and the promotion of good fellowship among his Brethren.

Charles A. Stockton, a Past Master of Albion Lodge, died December 24th, 1898. His Masonic work was principally done as an officer of Leinster Lodge, which was his mother Lodge. When that Lodge surrendered its warrant he affiliated with Albion Lodge. Brother Stockton was a man of more than ordinary ability; of a nature impulsive and generous. In his profession he had already distinguished himself, while as a citizen, he was willing always to do his part. We cannot but deplore his early death.

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK. [August

William H. Patton, a Past Master of New Brunswick Lodge, died at his residence on Princess Street, on January 4th, 1899. He served his Lodge efficiently in various subordinate offices, and in 1885 occupied the Oriental Chair. Of an old and much respected family, and possessed of many amiable qualities, he won and retained the sincere good will of all who knew him.

Dr. Joseph C. Hatheway, a Past Master of St. John's Lodge and Past Junior Grand Warden of this Grand Lodge, died April 22nd, after a lingering illness. R. W. Brother Hatheway was made a Mason in December, 1863. He served his Lodge as Worshipful Master during 1868 and 1869. During the years of his activity there was no more enthusiastic or capable Craftsman in the jurisdiction, and in his knowledge of the ritual he was excelled by none. Under the authority of the Board of General Purposes, he compiled and published a Masonic Manual, and the subsequent editions of this work are almost word for word as originally compiled by him. Modest and unassuming in his manners, invariably courteous and considerate of others, Brother Hatheway won and retained the sincere regard and respect of all with whom he was associated.

David F. Merritt, a Past Master of Woodstock Lodge and Past Deputy Grand Master, died July 19th and was buried July 21st, with the full ceremonial of the Craft. The subject of a painful accident, some years ago, Brother Merritt's health gradually failed, and for some years prior to his decease he was a helpless invalid. So long as his health permitted he took an active interest in the affairs of the Craft. and at our Annual Communication there was no more familiar figure than his. Esteemed by his Brethren for his many sterling qualities, of good repute in the community where he had resided for so many years, he died deeply mourned, not only by his Masonic Brethren, but by all to whom he was known.

Jared Boone, Senior Past Master of Alexandria Lodge, died on August 10th, and was buried with Masonic honors on the 13th inst. An old and highly respected member of the Craft, he is deeply and deservedly mourned by his Brethren.

Sister jurisdictions mourn the deaths of many eminent Craftsmen. We extend to them our heart-felt sympathy.

Henry C. Tomkins, a Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Alabama, died September 12th, 1898.

Palmer J. Pillaws, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Alabama, died June 22nd, 1898.

John M. Price, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Kansas, died October 19th, 1898.

John R. Purdee, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Virginia, died November 10th, 1898, at the ripe age of 90 years.

Thomas F. Wilder, Past Senior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge of Dakota, has also passed away.

The Grand Lodge of Colorado mourns the loss of Past Grand Master Orin H. Henry, and of Past Deputy Grand Master Francis L. Childs.

R. W. Brother John R. Frizzell, Past Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Tennessee, died October 6th, 1898; the same Grand Lodge also mourns the death of Past Grand Master Archelaus M. Hughes, who died October 27th, 1898.

Robert C. Jordan, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, died January 9th, 1899, aged 74 years. He was the first Grand Master and father of Nebraska Masonry.

James A. Hawley, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Illinois, died December 30th, 1898.

The Grand Lodge of Colon and the Island of Cuba, mourns the loss of Joaquin Lancis, of Havana. He was our representative near that Grand Lodge.

George E. Wyman, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Colorado, died March 6th, 1899.

R. W. Brother Lewis Johnston, M. D., Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia, died February 1st, 1899.

William R. Bowen, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, died May 6th, 1899.

The Grand Lodge of Arkansas mourns the death of W. Brother J. H. Van Hoose, our representative near that Grand Lodge.

Byron L. Carr, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Colorado, died April 22nd, 1899.

John J. Sumpter, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Arkansas, died June 22nd, 1899.

R. W. Brother Edward C. Mahon, Past Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia, died June 22nd.

English Masonry mourns the death of the Earl of Lathom, Pro Grand Master of the United Grand Lodge of England. For years he had taken the deepest interest in the well-being of the Order, and among the distinguished Masons, by whom he was surrounded, he held a most conspicuous position.

The number of official visits, that I have been able to make during the year, has fallen far short of what I had intended. In some cases visits, for which I had arranged, were prevented by professional calls, which it was impossible to neglect. Everywhere I went I received the warmest Masonic welcome, and the visits so made were a source of great pleasure to myself and I trust of profit to the Brethren visited.

November 10th, 1898, I visited New Brunswick Lodge, accompanied by a full corps of Grand Lodge officers. Our welcome was most hearty. The work (M. M. Degree) was excellent, and reflected much credit on Worshipful Master George S. Dodge and his officers.

November 28th, I paid an official visit to St. John's Lodge, No. 2 and was most courteously welcomed. The degree work was excellent and the condition of the Lodge satisfactory. The Secretary is particularly deserving of praise for the excellent state of his minute and other books. The visiting Brethren were afterwards most hospitably and sumptuously entertained at the residence of the Worshipful Master, Dr. J. H. Morrison.

December 27th, St. John the Evangelist's Day, I visited Albion Lodge, and installed the Worshipful Master and other officers.

January 10th, I made an official visit to Hibernia Lodge and installed the Worshipful Master (elect), Brother Henry B. Peck. After labor came a call to refreshment and we fully enjoyed both the substantial hospitality of the Brethren of Hibernia Lodge and the feast of reason which followed. This Lodge is working well and its condition is good.

January 12th, I installed the Worshipful Master (elect), Brother James A. Wilson, of New Brunswick Lodge.

January 13th, I paid an official visit to Corinthian Lodge and installed the Worshipful Master (elect), Brother P. H. Warneford, and other officers. Assisted by the officers of Grand Lodge, I exemplified the F. C. Degree. The condition of the Lodge is most satisfactory and the officers and members are painstaking and enthusiastic.

January 19th, I paid an official visit to The Union Lodge of Portland and placed in the Oriental Chair, for a second term, W. Brother R. T. Leavitt. This Lodge possesses splendid material, their members are enthusiastic and their work excellent.

June 2nd, I visited, officially, Albion Lodge and witnessed the work of the M. M. Degree, which, was not, in my opinion, up to the standard which Lodge No. 1 should strive to attain. The condition of this Lodge is satisfactory.

June 8th, accompanied by S. G.W., R.W. Brother Josiah Murphy and G. D. of C., W. Brother E. McLeod, I visited Hiram Lodge. Our reception by W. Brother Bliss and the officers and members of this Lodge was most hearty. We witnessed the work of the M. M. Degree, and while the general effect of the work was exceedingly good, I had to point out where their rendition differed from our standard work. Any instruction I was able to give was, I feel sure, most gratefully received; as every officer was striving, with praiseworthy determination, to excel. Hiram Lodge is now in a very satisfactory condition and is adding good material to its membership. A most enjoyable call to refreshment followed and an hour or two was profitably and pleasantly spent in interchange of sentiment and of Masonic reminiscences.

August 10th, I visited New Brunswick Lodge, officially, and witnessed the conferring of the E. A. Degree, which was very creditable to Worshipful Master J. A. Wilson and the officers. This meeting was the occasion of a most interesting event. There had been placed in my hands for presentation to the Lodge, a fine painting of R. W. Brother James McNichol, Past Grand Master and first Worshipful Master of New Brunswick Lodge. I esteemed it a great privilege that I was selected by the donors to transmit to New Brunswick Lodge this valuable addition to its possessions and that I was enabled to say a word or two in memory of our lamented Brother. It must have been a peculiar pleasure to the members of New Brunswick Lodge, to receive at once a lasting memorial of its first Master, and a tribute of affection from two Brothers, who by their kindly and generous gift, have perpetuated the memory of such a distinguished member of the Craft. Brother F. H. C. Miles painted and donated the portrait; the handsome frame is the gift of Brother F. E. Holman.

Attended by R. W. Brothers Robert Marshall and W. B. Wallace, I attended the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia, held this year in the historic town of Annapolis, June 14th and 15th.

Nothing could exceed the warmth of the reception accorded to us, or the truly Masonic courtesy with which we were treated, both by the Grand Master, M.W. Brother T. B. Flint, and the officers and members of our sister Grand Lodge. I was deeply interested in their proceedings, and I can assure you that the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia is a very live body. All questions relating to the Craft are threshed out on the floors of the Grand Lodge, and not as with us, too often referred to the Board of General Purposes. They have no Board of General Purposes. In the course of their proceedings the question of union of the Grand Lodges of the Maritime Provinces came up for discussion, and the following resolution was carried unanimously:

"That the matter of amalgamation of the Grand Lodges of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia having been incidently referred to at the present session of the Grand Lodge; Therefore resolved that a committee be appointed to confer with the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, or a committee thereof, should one be appointed, relative to the amalgamation of the said Grand Lodges."

While I am not prepared at present to support the scheme of a union of the Grand Lodges, I think much good would accrue by the appointment of a permanent committee of members of each Grand Body, whose power would only be advisory. To such a committee could be referred the adoption of a uniform ritual, the further consideration of a Masonic Home, and any questions that might arise affecting the Craft generally. It would tend to cement still more closely the strong ties which now bind us to our Brethren of Nova Scotia, and which these reciprocal visits have done so much to strengthen.

Brethren I recommend this subject to your best consideration.

I have appointed W. Brother John McGuirl, of Moosomin, to represent this Grand Lodge near the Grand Lodge of Manitoba, in the place of W. Brother George F. Newcomb.

I have appointed W. Brother Louis A. Jacobson to represent this Grand Lodge near the Grand Lodge of North Dakota.

Pursuant to the resolution of the Grand Lodge, at our last Annual Communication, I have arranged for an exchange of representatives with the Grand Orient of Belgium, and have appointed W. Brother Albert Kruger, of Antwerp, to represent us near that grand body.

I have appointed W. Brother John W. Corbett, of Camden, as our representative near the Grand Lodge of South Carolina.

A communication has been received from M.W. Brother Joseph H. Bullock, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Tennessee, dated March 22nd, informing me that Tennessee has restored the System of Representatives and nominating a member of that Grand Lodge for appointment as our representative. I have had much pleasure in appointing, as such representative, W. Brother A. P. Trogden; fully sharing in the belief of the Grand Master of Tennessee, that these exchange of courtesies tend to strengthen and cement the harmonious feeling existing between our respective jurisdictions.

I have been pleased to appoint Dr. Fernando a Loredo to be our representative near Grand Lodge of the Island of Cuba, in place of W. Brother Joaquin Lancis, deceased.

W. Brother William Kent has been commissioned as our representative near the Grand Lodge of Arkansas, in place of W. Brother James H. Van Hoose, deceased.

I have nominated W. Brother Benjamin S. Black, for appointment as representative of the Grand Lodge of South Carolina near this Grand Lodge.

I have nominated W. Brother William A. Dougherty for appointment as representative of the Grand Lodge of Illinois near the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, in place of W. Brother I. O. Beatteay, who has declined to accept his commission.

W. Brother J. A. Hoyt has been nominated to represent the Grand Orient of Belgium near this Grand Lodge.

I have nominated W. Brother D. C. Firth for appointment as representative of the Grand Lodge of Louisiana near this Grand Lodge.

His text was: "And sounded and found twenty fathoms; and when they had gone a little further, they sounded again and found it fifteen fathoms; then fearing lest they should have fallen upon rocks they cast four anchors out of the stern and wished for the day." In forcible terms the preacher described the anchors which should hold us fast, both as Masons and as men; and pointed out those higher standards for which we should strive.

The Encampment of Saint John, Knights Templar, under N. & E. Commander George Blake, formed an escort to the Grand Lodge, and their services I here gratefully acknowledge.

Grand Lodge Certificates to the number of 98 have issued from the office since my last report, and, as far as I am aware, no arrears exist. The supply of blank Certificates is now very small, and with the advent of the year 1900, it will not only be necessary to renew the supply, but to have some alterations made in the plate from which the Certificates are engraved.

The correspondence with Sister Grand Lodges has been confined to the nomination and appointment of Grand Representatives, the notification of the death of eminent members of the Craft, and the receipt from some of the Grand Lodges in the United States of proclamations and reports dealing with the action of the Grand Lodge of the State of Washington in reference to Negro Masonry.

Copies of the Proceedings of other Grand Lodges have very generally been received, and copies of our own Proceedings of 1898 have been sent to all Grand Bodies with which the Grand Lodge is in fraternal relation, and in most cases receipt has been acknowledged.

That the accounts of the Grand Treasurer be received and lie on the table.

R.W. Brother William B. Wallace, Deputy Grand Master, next submitted the report of the Board of General Purposes, which on being read was received and laid on the table.

To the Grand Lodge, F. and A. M. of New Brunswick:

The Board of General Purposes submits the following report of its proceedings for the past year:

- 1. At the first meeting of the Board, held on the 28th September, 1898, Worshipful Brother Joseph A. Magilton was elected Vice-President.
- 2. The Proceedings of Grand Lodge were ordered to be printed in the usual form, together with the membership lists of subordinate Lodges and a list of past Grand Lodge officers.
- 3. The Board had under consideration the matter of the request of Campbellton Lodge for a decree of expulsion of a former Secretary, and the result of their deliberations will be embodied in a subsequent special report.
- 4. After carefully considering the last section of the Grand Master's address, submitted to them by Grand Lodge, which deals with the words in Section 3 of the Constitution, under the heading of "Proposing Members" as follows: "The jurisdiction of each Lodge extends in every direction half way to the nearest Lodge," the Board came to the unanimous conclusion that the Grand Master correctly expressed the law when he stated "that the distance should be measured in a direct or air line from Lodge room to Lodge room, and had no connection with territorial boundaries."
- 5. The matter of the report made to Grand Lodge by the special committee on membership of subordinate Lodges was also considered by the Board and the following report thereon is submitted:

After carefully examining the report we have to say that we differ very materially with that committee in many of the statements made by them (see Proceedings 1898, page 439).

While there may be isolated cases of members not being called upon to pass examinations, and of officers being advanced who do not make an effort to get up the work, we have no knowledge of such being the case, and we can safely say that these are not matters of general occurrence in this jurisdiction. The reports of District Deputies not only strengthen this view, but refute the general remark that there is lack of interest in the Craft, although it may be that some Lodges are not as active as others, yet this is naturally the case in any jurisdiction.

It is undoubtedly true that the suspension of members for non-payment of dues occasions a decreased membership, and is a matter that very seriously affects the welfare of the Craft, but the Board are convinced that a more regular and faithful performance of duties by Secretaries of Lodges would largely overcome the difficulty. Members are too often allowed to fall several years in arrears, and then their payment is a matter which they are constrained to avoid.

As to the question of demitting and demitted members, we know this branch of the subject has engaged the serious attention of other Grand Bodies, and is admitted to be an exceedingly difficult matter to successfully grapple with.

It has been the experience of the members of the Board that as a rule Past Masters do not lose their interest in their Mother Lodges. Whenever official visitations have been made to the various Lodges, Past Masters have been found to be some of the most active and energetic of their members. In addition to this the Board emphasize the fact that the average attendance of our Grand Lodge compares exceedingly favorably with that of other Grand Lodges, and our returns show that nearly eighty-five per cent. of the members in attendance were Past Masters.

With respect to the suggestions of the committee, the Board desire to say that the Most Worshipful Grand Master and the Deputy Grand Master attended at the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia, held at Annapolis in June last, at the instance of the Board, and the resolution passed at that meeting will be submitted for consideration. The Board upon consideration report as follows upon the suggestions:

(a). That it is the duty of Worshipful Masters of Lodges to see that no candidate be advanced who has not passed a satisfactory examination in open Lodge according to the provisions of the Constitution; that they should instruct not only the Lodge but its officers by the exemplification of the Ritual, and that they should personally interest themselves in seeing that the members attend, so that those seeking advancement will be posted in their work, but the Board have no reason to believe that Worshipful Masters in this jurisdiction are so derelict in their duty to their Lodges or the fraternity as not to see that these matters are enforced and performed.

(b). That they approve of a Grand Lecturer being appointed as a Grand Lodge officer, to rank after the Grand Secretary, at a salary to be

(c). The Board are of opinion that more time should be devoted to the discussion of matters arising in Grand Lodge before a reference of them is made to this Board or any committee, and we suggest that the naming of the hour of the assembling of Grand Lodge be left in the discretion of the Grand Master, and not fixed as at present.

(d). The Board is of opinion that the exemplifying of degrees is very beneficial to the Craft, and the time spent in doing so is most profitably spent, but in view of the large amount of business before Grand Lodge the Board have not deemed it advisable to recommend any exemplification at this session.

(e). The other suggestions in the report, viz., the collection and relief from dues, and the itinerancy of Grand Lodge, are fully covered by the Constitution and Bye-Laws.

(f). The Board also recommend that Lodges of Sorrow in remembrance of deceased brethren should be held at least once a year, and that the Craft should publicly attend divine service more frequently.

6. The Board on motion ordered that two bonds for \$500 each, payable in eleven and twelve years respectively, with interest at four per cent., be issued to take up bonds falling due.

7. It was decided to procure suitable frames for the portraits of Past Grand Masters B. Lester Peters and Robert T. Clinch, and a committee was appointed for that purpose, with authority to solicit subscriptions to meet the cost of the same, and the Board has requested the Grand Master to arrange for the reception and unveiling of these portraits at the present communication of Grand Lodge.

8. The Masonic brethren of the City of New York, through the Mayor of St. John, Brother Sears, have presented the Grand Lodge with a portrait of our late Worshipful Brother Augustus W. Peters, representative of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of New Brunswick near the Grand Chapter of New York. The Board on behalf of Grand Lodge, courteously acknowledging its receipt, accepted the gift, and, at the request of our Grand Secretary, granted him the privilege of providing a suitable frame for the portrait.

9. Letters have been received from the Grand Secretaries of the Grand Lodges of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island advising the Board of the appointment in each case of a committee of three members to meet with committees from the other two Grand Lodges to discuss the matter of the union of the Grand Lodges of the Maritime Provinces. The Board now submits these letters to Grand Lodge with the recommendation that a committee be appointed to confer with those of the Grand Lodges of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

E. McLEOD, JOHN A. WATSON, A. R. CAMPBELL, fixed by Grand Lodge. That it shall be his duty to visit and instruct the officers of subordinate Lodges, and that he be allowed to take with him as an assistant any Past Master, whose travelling expenses shall be paid by Grand Lodge; also that he take his instructions from the Ritual Committee, and in view of this the Board suggest that the Ritual Committee should be called together at as early a date as possible, and further it is the opinion of the Board that the Ritual Committee should hold quarterly or half-yearly meetings, so that any questions arising as to the Ritual may be discussed and settled.

(c). The Board are of opinion that more time should be devoted to the discussion of matters arising in Grand Lodge before a reference of them is made to this Board or any committee, and we suggest that the naming of the hour of the assembling of Grand Lodge be left in the discretion of the Grand Master, and not fixed as at present.

(d). The Board is of opinion that the exemplifying of degrees is very beneficial to the Craft, and the time spent in doing so is most profitably spent, but in view of the large amount of business before Grand Lodge the Board have not deemed it advisable to recommend any exemplification at this session.

(e). The other suggestions in the report, viz., the collection and relief from dues, and the itinerancy of Grand Lodge, are fully covered by the Constitution and Bye-Laws.

(f). The Board also recommend that Lodges of Sorrow in remembrance of deceased brethren should be held at least once a year, and that the Craft should publicly attend divine service more frequently.

6. The Board on motion ordered that two bonds for \$500 each, payable in eleven and twelve years respectively, with interest at four per cent., be issued to take up bonds falling due.

7. It was decided to procure suitable frames for the portraits of Past Grand Masters B. Lester Peters and Robert T. Clinch, and a committee was appointed for that purpose, with authority to solicit subscriptions to meet the cost of the same, and the Board has requested the Grand Master to arrange for the reception and unveiling of these portraits at the present communication of Grand Lodge.

8. The Masonic brethren of the City of New York, through the Mayor of St. John, Brother Sears, have presented the Grand Lodge with a portrait of our late Worshipful Brother Augustus W. Peters, representative of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of New Brunswick near the Grand Chapter of New York. ### UNVEILING OF PORTRAITS.

Having called Grand Lodge up, the M.W. Grand Master addressed Grand Lodge as follows:

R. W. Senior Grand Warden and Brethren of Grand Lodge:

The duty I am called upon to perform this evening is of a nature both sad and pleasing; sad, when I have to remind you of the great loss we sustained in the removal from earth of our late Grand Master Robert T. Clinch, and pleasing when I refer to the fact that we will henceforward have before us his pictured presence. Those of us who had the privilege of his acquaintance will remember how he embodied all that is best in Masonry and what a tower of strength and comfort he was to the Craft.

In many offices he had served the Craft well and faithfully, and at the formation of this Grand Lodge all eyes were turned to him as well fitted to be its first Grand Master, and he was so elected. He, however, deemed his duty to the Grand Lodge of England such, as to preclude his accepting the office, though he rendered valuable service in smoothing the difficulties attending the change of allegiance.

The liberality of individual Craftsmen, aided by Grand Lodge, has enabled us to place upon our walls this excellent likeness, which I now unveil, of our lamented brother. May his memory "be ever green"; and may we one and all strive to emulate his goodness, his generosity, and his devotion to the Craft.

The portrait of Past Grand Master Clinch was then unveiled amid applause.

R.W. Brother John V. Ellis, P. G. M., then proceeded to unveil the portrait of Past Grand Master Peters, and said:

Most Worshipful Grand Master and Brethren:

When Grand Lodge was formed and it became apparent to the Craft that Brother Clinch would not accept the office of Grand Master we all naturally turned to Brother Benjamin Lester Peters. He had presided over the Convention which declared for the principle of independent Masonic government in this province. His tact, and skill, and judgment were displayed in many ways in conducting that Convention through numerous difficulties which beset it. Its harmonious action in the end was largely due to the excellent influence which he exerted. He accepted the position which was tendered him as our first Grand Master and presided over this Grand Lodge for three years, guiding its early steps

with care and skill and steadily displaying qualities which endeared him to us all. Declining longer to occupy the highest place in Grand Lodge he nevertheless gave us steadily the benefit of his counsel and experience; his opinions had the weight of law with us in New Brunswick; and in other jurisdictions the influence of his power was felt in many ways. Not only in this department of the Masonic Fraternity but to every other which exists in this province did Brother Peters give valuable service. He occupied the chair in every body of which he was a member—subordinate and governing—and his continuance in the most prominent positions depended solely upon himself. His brethren were only too glad to elect him as long as he was willing to serve. Of the different boards and committees which do so much of our important work, he was a most valuable member. It was, however, not alone the services that he gave so cheerfully which endeared him to us. His honesty of design, his sincerity, his desire that the right should ever prevail, his ample knowledge of the laws, practices and Ritual of the Craft, his charitable nature, combined with a charm of manner in intercourse with the brethren that was most gracious, gave him an influence that was of the utmost benefit to the Craft. In the City of Saint John as a public official he discharged important public trust with a patriotic feeling which endeared him to the entire community. As a Judge in the Province of New Brunswick he reflected credit upon the judiciary, both by reason of his knowledge of the law and his capacity to fairly administer it. Recollection of all that he was will never fade from the memory of those who knew him, the influence which he exerted will be felt in these halls after we have passed away; and this portrait, which I now unveil, will convey to future generations some idea of the likeness of the man and the brother who, I believe, has to a considerable extent left the impression of all that was good in his own nature upon the Craft in New Brunswick, and thereby conferred lasting benefit upon it.

Grand Lodge then proceeded to the further consideration of paragraph 5 of the Report of the Board of General Purposes, sub-paragraph (b) relating to a Grand Lecturer.

Moved by R.W. the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by R.W. Brother Julius T. Whitlock, P.G.M.:

That the sub-paragraph be adopted.

Moved in amendment by W. Brother Alexander W. MacRae, seconded by R.W. the Senior Grand Warden:

That the sub-paragraph be adopted, omitting the words "and that he be allowed to take with him as an assistant any Past Master, whose travelling expenses shall be paid by Grand Lodge. Moved in amendment to the amendment by W. Brother J. B. M. Baxter:

That all the words in sub-paragraph (b), from "that" in the first line down to and including "and in view of this" in the seventh line, be struck out and the following substituted therefore: "That the sum of dollars be placed at the disposal of the Grand Master to pay the expenses of providing such instruction in Ritual to Lodges outside of the City of Saint John as may be deemed necessary."

On the question being put the amendment to the amendment was adopted.

It was then further resolved, "That the blank be filled in with the words "Two Hundred."

On motion the Report of the Board of General Purposes, as amended, was adopted as a whole.

The following is the Report as amended:

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GENERAL PURPOSES. (As Amended.)

To the Grand Lodge, F. and A. M. of New Brunswick:

The Board of General Purposes submits the following report of its proceedings for the past year:

- 1. At the first meeting of the Board, held on the 28th September, 1898, Worshipful Brother Joseph A. Magilton was elected Vice-President.
- 2. The Proceedings of Grand Lodge were ordered to be printed in the usual form, together with the membership lists of subordinate Lodges and a list of past Grand Lodge officers.
- 3. The Board had under consideration the matter of the request of Campbellton Lodge for a decree of expulsion of a former Secretary, and the result of their deliberations will be embodied in a subsequent special report.
- 4. After carefully considering the last section of the Grand Master's address, submitted to them by Grand Lodge, which deals with the words in Section 3 of the Constitution under the heading of "Proposing Members" as follows: "The jurisdiction of each Lodge extends in every direction half way to the nearest Lodge," the Board came to the

unanimous conclusion that the Grand Master correctly expressed the law when he stated "that the distance should be measured in a direct or air line from Lodge room to Lodge room, and had no connection with territorial boundaries."

- 5. The matter of the report made to Grand Lodge by the special committee on Membership of Subordinate Lodges was also considered by the Board and the following report thereon is submitted:
- (1). After carefully examining the report we have to say that we differ very materially with that committee in many of the statements made by them (see Proceedings 1898, page 439).
- (2). While there may be isolated cases of members not being called upon to pass examinations, and of officers being advanced who do not make an effort to get up the work, we have no knowledge of such being the case, and we can safely say that these are not matters of general occurrence in this jurisdiction. The reports of District Deputies not only strengthen this view, but refute the general remark that there is lack of interest in the Craft, although it may be that some Lodges are not as active as others, yet this is naturally the case in any jurisdiction.
- (3). It is undoubtedly true that the suspension of members for non-payment of dues occasions a decreased membership, and is a matter that very seriously affects the welfare of the Craft, but the Board are convinced that a more regular and faithful performance of duties by Secretaries of Lodges would largely overcome the difficulty. Members are too often allowed to fall several years in arrears, and then their payment is a matter which they are constrained to avoid.

As to the question of demitting and demitted members, we know this branch of the subject has engaged the serious attention of other Grand Bodies, and is admitted to be an exceedingly difficult matter to successfully grapple with.

- (4). It has been the experience of the members of the Board that as a rule Past Masters do not lose their interest in their Mother Lodges. Whenever official visitations have been made to the various Lodges, Past Masters have been found to be some of the most active and energetic of their members. In addition to this the Board emphasize the fact that the average attendance of our Grand Lodge compares exceedingly favorably with that of other Grand Lodges, and our returns show that nearly eighty-five per cent. of the members in attendance were Past Masters.
- (5). With respect to the suggestions of the committee, the Board desire to say that the Most Worshipful Grand Master and the Deputy Grand Master attended at the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia, held at Annapolis in June last, at the instance of the

Board, and the resolution passed at that meeting will be submitted for consideration. The Board upon consideration report as follows upon the suggestions:

The matter was quite generally debated, and on being put the motion was lost.

W. Brother F. St. John Bliss gave notice of motion "That the next Annual Communication of Grand Lodge be held at the City of Fredericton;" and it was resolved "That the motion be the order of business at three o'clock to-morrow."

- 2. A Committee of Three Members on Relations with Foreign Grand Lodges.
  - 3. A Library Committee of Three Members.
  - 4. A Committee of Three Members on Warrants to New Lodges.
- 5. A Committee of Six Members on Memorials to Deceased Brethren.

The motion was lost.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RELATIONS WITH FOREIGN GRAND BODIES.

R.W. Brother John V. Ellis, P.G.M., submitted and read the report of the Committee on Relations with Foreign Grand Bodies as follows, and on his motion the report was received and adopted:

The Committee on Relations with Sister Grand Lodges respectfully report:

That there have been sent to the committee by the Grand Secretary a number of printed documents dealing with the attitude of the Craft in various states of the United States of America towards the Grand Lodge of Washington, with which we are in amity.

There are in several states bodies of colored persons claiming to be Masons, with superior bodies denominated Grand Lodges, and one of these exists in the State of Washington. Some time ago the Grand Lodge of Washington recognized these organizations as legitimate Masonic bodies, by recognizing the body of colored men in Washington known as the Grand Lodge of that state.

There were various objections to this action, and without going into the consideration of these at any length, it is sufficient to state that under the system of organization of one fraternity which prevails on this continent, there can be but one regular Grand Lodge in each state or independent political division. Even if the colored organization was legitimate of itself, the recognition of two independent Grand Lodge organizations in a state would destroy the doctrine of Grand Lodge sovereignty and the system which prevails under it. Many of the Grand Lodges with which we are in amity withdrew at once their fellowship with the Grand Lodge of Washington, and to a considerable extent the whole Craft in that state was placed under the ban of non-intercourse.

Happily the matter is settled by the later action of the Grand Lodge of Washington, which quite recently receded from its position and withdrew its recognition of the irregular organization existing in the state.

It is not necessary, therefore, for the committee to recommend the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick to take any action in the matter; but in view of the importance of the subject and the great excitement to which it gave rise in the Masonic world a reference to it is deemed advisable, for it by no means follows that the difficult question which confronts the Craft on this continent owing to the existence of these Lodges of colored men claiming to be Free Masons is finally settled.

The final and satisfactory solution of the problem will clearly demand patience, forbearance, moderation and the exercise of calm judgment as well as of circumspection and prudence.

Grand Lodge resumed labor at three o'clock this afternoon.

### REPORT ON GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

The committee on the Grand Master's address submitted their report, and on motion of R.W. Brother John V. Ellis, P. G. M., seconded by R.W. Brother Robert Marshall, P. G. M., the same was adopted.

The following is the report:

The committee on the address of the M.W. Grand Master are satisfied that Grand Lodge will heartily reciprocate the kind and fraternal expressions with which the Grand Master greets the Craft at this session; and that Grand Lodge will learn with pleasure of the satisfactory reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters.

The touching allusions of the Grand Master to the brethren who have gone out from among us forever will awaken sympathetic echoes in the hearts of the members to whom these departed brethren were endeared by strong ties; and, in his friendly expressions of sympathy to the deceased of other jurisdictions, he expresses the general feeling of Grand Lodge.

Grand Lodge must ever treasure the handsome portrait of our late Brother Augustus W. Peters, of New York, presented by the Free Masons of that city, and the Craft here is under obligation to the Grand Secretary, a kinsman of our deceased brother, for the effective manner in which it has been placed upon the walls of this Lodge Room. It will ever remain a valuable addition to the memorials owned by Grand Lodge.

The record of the Grand Master's official visits is a good one, and amply proves that despite the labors of an arduous profession the Grand Master has made time to faithfully discharge important duty to the Craft. The sentiment of Grand Lodge unquestionably is that official visitation by the Grand Officers is of great benefit to the Craft, and in making the number of these which he has, assisted by brethren of eminence and skill, most valuable service has been rendered.

It is a great satisfaction to Grand Lodge that the Grand Master, the Deputy Grand Master, and Past Grand Master Marshall were able to visit the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia at its last annual session, and the knowledge that they had met a warm fraternal reception from the Grand Master and members of our Sister Grand Lodge is most gratifying to us all. As the important question of union of the Craft in the Maritime Provinces under one Grand Lodge has been referred to a special committee your committee need not enter upon consideration of that subject, but they are in harmony with the views expressed by the Grand Master as to the advantages to be derived from a closer knowledge of, and intimacy with our brethren of the other Provinces of Canada.

There is nothing in the official acts of the Grand Master calling for special resolution or action by Grand Lodge, but the committee are glad to believe that Grand Lodge will heartily concur in their expression of satisfaction at the effective manner in which, often at great sacrifice of time and much personal inconvenience, the Grand Master in public and private has discharged his duties and at the admirable way in which on all occasions he has upheld the honor and dignity of the position he has so long filled with acceptance to all of his brethren.

## REPORTS

OF

## DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTERS.

#### DISTRICT No. 1.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master:

The following is a statement of my official visitations in District No. 1, during the year ending 22nd August, A.D. 1899:

On the 20th October, last, in the absence but at the request of the Grand Master, and accompanied by the officers of Grand Lodge I visited The Union Lodge of Portland, No. 10, where we witnessed the conferring of the second degree by the Master and his officers. The Lodge appears to be in good order, the work was carefully and correctly rendered, and the members are harmonious.

My next visitation was to Carleton Union Lodge, No. 8, where I saw parts of the first and second degrees worked, after which light refreshments were served. This Lodge has established itself on a firm financial footing by paying \$500 this year on its indebtedness. It is doing good work, a fraternal spirit is cultivated at its meetings, and its affairs are prudently managed.

With the V.W. Grand Secretary I visited Albion Lodge, No. 1. The first degree was conferred by the Master and his officers. The Grand Secretary reported the records well kept and orderly, and I was assured by the Master of the good condition of the Lodge and the unity of its members.
