GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

The M.W. Grand Master then delivered the following Address:

BRETHREN OF GRAND LODGE:

With feelings of gratitude and pleasure I greet you, and extend to you a cordial and fraternal welcome to our Thirty-Fifth Annual Communication.

Just one year ago, by your good will, I was elected to preside over this Grand Lodge, which, although young in the annals of our time-honored Institution, has already won a place of respect and distinction among Sister Grand Lodges. This position is largely due to the quality of the men who year by year have met around our sacred altar—men whose minds were imbued with the pre-eminence of our principles and aspirations, and who, in their lives and conduct, have shown forth their belief and faith in the Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man. May the blessing of God continue to rest upon and abide with us, and may our lives, words and actions ever reveal to those not of us the virtues and golden tenets of our Institution.

I received your trust cheerfully and gratefully, fully recognizing the important duties and responsibilities incident to the office of Grand Master. Whether I have performed those duties, and borne those responsibilities for the benefit and advancement of the Craft, is for you to determine.

Harmony and fraternity prevail throughout our jurisdiction, and the fraternal relations with other Grand Lodges have not been disturbed. Nothing whatever has occurred to impair in the slightest degree that perfect accord which should ever exist among Masons; on the contrary, I am pleased to report that our statistics will show a steady and marked growth in Freemasonry in this Province. This peace and prosperity is not entirely due to the efforts and labors of any one year. The seed was sown in the past, and the harvest is now being reaped. As a flower grows, ripens into blossom and scatters its fragrance around, so our Order, founded to promote the morality and happiness of mankind, grows and ripens in the hearts of its members till the lustre and beauty of their lives are beheld by the world, and it is taught to search for the hidden truths that lie concealed from all who have not passed within our portals. Let our bodies be chaste, our thoughts pure, our words gentle, and our lives useful, to the honor and commendation of Free Masonry.

In the midst of our peace and prosperity the hand of the reaper has been busy. Several of our well-beloved Brethren, who in times past have dispensed charity to the needy, sympathy to the afflicted, and counsel to the anxious, have been called from labor to their eternal rest in the Supreme Lodge, over which the Grand Master of the Universe presides. As we miss the fraternal hand-clasps, and half listen in waiting expectancy for the familiar greetings which in the past we have been wont to receive from those of our members who during the year have joined the ever-increasing band of "the immortals," the joy of our re-union in annual session is tempered with sorrow.

Brother Silas C. Charters, Past Master of Sussex Lodge, No. 4, entered into rest on the 10th of March, 1901, the oldest member and Past Master of that Lodge, a Brother greatly beloved by the members and by all who had the honor of his Masonic acquaintance. He was pre-deceased only eight days by his Brother and successor in the Master's chair, Past Master John F. Teed. "They were lovely in their lives, and in death they were not divided."

W. Brother Dr. Joseph H. Morrison, a Past Master of St. John's Lodge, No. 2, died suddenly on the 13th September, 1901, at his residence in the city of St. John. By his energy and ability, although still a young man, he had secured an extensive and lucrative practice. While Worshipful Master he devoted himself most enthusiastically to his Lodge, and, being firm and tenacious in his personal convictions, would suffer nothing that seemed to him to interfere with its interests.

We have also to mourn the loss of W. Brother H. Lawrance Sturdee, a Past Master of The Union Lodge of Portland, No. 10, who died September 24th, 1901. His life was a busy one. In the midst of his duties as a prominent barrister he held many public positions of honor and trust. He was a man of sterling integrity and high moral character. At the time of his death he was High Sheriff of the city and county of St. John, a position he had filled for several years, enjoying the confidence of his fellow citizens. During the period that he filled the various offices in his Lodge he was a regular attendant at its meetings, and always took an active interest in its welfare.

Albert Lodge, No. 34, mourns the death of Past Master Elisha H. Robinson, a bright and enthusiastic Mason, and one who ungrudgingly gave his time and talents to advance the interests of his Lodge. Twice he filled the Master's chair with dignity and great profit to the Craft. "Truly the memory of the just shall be held in everlasting remembrance."

Albion Lodge, No. 1, by the death of W. Brother Past Master William G. Robertson, which occurred on the 21st July, 1902, lost a valued and active member. Brother Robertson was a Past Grand Pursuivant, and, as successor to his father and Brother, he was repre-

sentative of the Grand Lodge of Scotland near this Grand Lodge since the year 1900. His life was spent in the service of the European & North American Railway, and later the Intercolonial Railway. By his conscientious and painstaking attention to the duties committed to his care he enjoyed the respect and confidence of everyone who had business relations with him. In disposition he was kind and genial. Faithful in life, he has entered upon his eternal reward.

Sussex Lodge, No. 7, mourns the loss of Past Master Moses McGowan, for fifty years a member of the Craft and the honored Senior Past Master of the Lodge. Every good work had the earnest support of Brother McGowan. His warm Irish heart was ever ready to respond to the call of the needy. He was indeed a true representative of the golden tenets of our Order — "Brotherly Love, Relief, and Truth." The welfare of the Craft of Sussex Lodge was ever dear to his heart, and his Brethren carried him to his burial with touching reverence and deep regret. A rich sheaf of corn garnered into the Grand Lodge above. Whilst we stand in awe, we bow to Thy wise dispensations.

Scarcely had the Brethren of Sussex Lodge laid to rest the mortal remains of the Senior Past Master before they were called upon to carry to the grave the old man eloquent, Past Master Samuel Welock, Past District Deputy Grand Master. His was the genius to truly interpret the meaning of our beautiful Ritual; a master workman, whose continued interest in his Lodge up to the last commends itself to every true Mason. It was not our privilege to become intimately acquainted with these Brethren of Sussex Lodge, but it speaks volumes that their memory and their record are so full that I feel I can speak of them only in the highest terms. "Not lost, but gone before."

Other Grand jurisdictions have also suffered the loss of eminent and distinguished Craftsmen, and we extend to them in their loss our warmest sympathy.

R. W. Brother James Wassen Moore, Grand Treasurer of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, died August 2nd, 1901.

M. W. Brother R. B. Hungerford, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Canada, died September 9th, 1901.

R. W. Brother William L. Webber, Past Master of the Grand Lodge of Michigan, died October 15th, 1901.

R. W. Brother Bellamey S. Sutton, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Indiana, died November 12th, 1901.

R. W. Brother John Logan Power, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Mississippi, died September 24th, 1901.

R. W. Brother Joseph Hayes Thompson, Grand Treasurer of the Grand Lodge of Minnesota, died June 14th, 1901.

R. W. Brother Archdeacon James Dallas O'Meara, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba, died at Winnipeg, December 6th, 1901.

R. W. Brother Jefferson C. Cawood, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Tennessee, died November 28th, 1901.

R. W. Brother Joseph H. Bullock, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Tennessee, died January 1st, 1902.

M. W. Brother Lieutenant-Colonel John Holder Isaacson, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Quebec, died January 14th, 1902. He was elected Grand Secretary in 1871, a position he continued to fill up to the time of his death with devotion and faithfulness. In 1894 the Grand Lodge made him an Honorary Past Grand Master in recognition of his long service.

R. W. Brother Cato Maximilian Guldberg, Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Norway, died January 14th, 1902.

R. W. Brother Colonel Hugh Sterling, Grand Treasurer of the Grand Lodge of West Virginia, died February 24th, 1902.

M. W. Brother Beaufort Watts Ball, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of South Carolina, died March 27th, 1902.

R. W. Brother John Day Caldwell, Emeritus Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Ohio, died April 4th, 1902.

R. W. Brother Timothy W. Bliss, Grand Tyler of the Grand Lodge of West Virginia, died April 6th, 1902.

R. W. Brother John T. Palmer, our representative near the Grand Lodge of New York, died April 22nd, 1902.

This brief summary of a few of the eminent Brethren who have passed away during the year would be incomplete without a reference to the death of our distinguished and illustrious Brother, William McKinley, President of the United States, who died September 14th, 1901. He was a member of Eagle Lodge, Canton, Ohio, and his death was officially announced to us not only by the Grand Lodge of Ohio, but by a number of other Grand Lodges of our sister nation.

The citizens of that nation mourned, and the world mourned with them. We extend to our American Brethren our heartfelt sympathy in their sorrow, and desire to record our utter abhorrence of that brutal crime which so suddenly cut off a beloved friend, husband, ruler and Mason, whose name will ever be revered in the memory of the world. It was truthfully said of him: "He was a typical representative of Masonic manhood. His charity was as boundless as his thoughtfulness was tender; his sympathy was touching in the extreme, and his suavity of manner and courtesy were the outcome of the gentleness of his life. His domestic life and devotion to the home circle was as beautiful as the clear sunshine, as pure as the atmosphere of a perfect day; his cheerful-

ness was contagious; its wealth of sympathy appealed to the hearts of all with whom he came in contact, and his perfect resignation when the dark shadow hovered over and surrounded him at the crucial moment was a beautiful exemplification of 'death being swallowed up in victory.'"

In accordance with the resolution of this Grand Lodge at its last Annual Communication, that fraternal relations be entered into with the Grand Lodges of Western Australia and Costa Rica, and that those Grand Lodges be invited to exchange representatives,—

I recommended W. Brother Daniel Jordan, K.C., of Lebanon Lodge, Sackville, to the Grand Master of Western Australia as the representative of that Grand Lodge near this Grand Lodge, and his commission as such representative has been received.

I recommended to the Grand Master of Costa Rica W. Brother W. Alder Trueman, of Albert Lodge, Albert, as the representative of the Grand Lodge of Costa Rica near this Grand Lodge, and he has received his commission to act as such representative.

Having received notification from the Grand Lodge of Oklahoma that that Grand Lodge had again adopted the representative system, with a request to the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick to nominate a Brother to act as its representative near this Grand Lodge, I recommended W. Brother Henry S. Bridges, of St. John's Lodge, City of St. John, to the Grand Master of Oklahoma.

On the death of W. Brother William G. Robertson, the representative of the Grand Lodge of Scotland near this Grand Lodge, I recommended R. W. Brother the Honorable James Gordon Forbes, P. G. M., as his successor.

Since our last Communication commissions have been received, in addition to those mentioned above, by the following Brethren to represent the respective Grand Lodges designated :

W. Brother Fred. St. John Bliss, of Hiram Lodge, Fredericton, to represent the Grand Lodge of Norway near the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, in the stead of W. Brother John Black, who has removed from this Province.

W. Brother Edward G. Evans, of Corinthian Lodge, Hampton, to represent the Grand Lodge of Sweden near the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.

February 5th, 1902, upon the recommendation of the Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Mississippi, I appointed Brother Henry C. Yawn as the representative of this Grand Lodge near the Grand Lodge of Mississippi.

March 25th, 1902, I issued a commission to Brother James Gunn, Glasgow, Scotland, upon the recommendation of the Most Worshipful

Grand Master Mason of Scotland, as our representative near that Grand Lodge.

April 25th, 1902, I appointed Brother Dr. Francisco I. Rucavado, upon the recommendation of the Most Worshipful Grand Master of Costa Rica, as our representative near that Grand Lodge.

May 15th, 1902, upon the recommendation of the Most Worshipful Grand Master of Illinois, I issued a commission to Brother Robert F. Thorogood, of Chicago, as the representative of this Grand Lodge near the Grand Lodge of Illinois.

July 30th, 1902, upon the recommendation of the Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New York, I appointed Brother Mathias Gooderson, of Brooklyn, as the representative of this Grand Lodge near the Grand Lodge of New York, as successor to R. W. Brother John T. Palmer, deceased.

I have during my term of office exercised the dispensing power of the Grand Master on a number of occasions. The requests for dispensations were accompanied by good and sufficient reasons, and, as they were for matters not involving any questions of importance, it is not necessary that I should give a list of them at this time.

I have received a number of communications from subordinate Lodges asking for decisions which are answered by the Constitution and General Regulations of this Grand Lodge, and it was only necessary for me to refer the applicant to the section relating to the matter in doubt. Three of my decisions, however, I will mention :

(1) An inquiry came from St. George Lodge, No. 12, as to the legality of changing the by-law of the Lodge so as to admit of payment of initiation fees by instalments as the several degrees were received. I replied that such a change would, in my opinion, be inconsistent with Section 17 relating to Private Lodges.

(2) Woodstock Lodge, No. 11, desired to know my views as Grand Master as to the wisdom and advisability of having the Lodge incorporated. I called the attention of the Lodge to the resolution of the Grand Lodge, passed at its last Annual Communication, adopting Section 6 of the report of the Committee on the Grand Master's Address, which recommended that the matter of vesting in trustees the property held by different Lodges be referred to the Board of General Purposes, and I suggested that until the Board reported it would be wise to allow the further discussion of the matter to stand in abeyance. I also suggested that the incorporation of a Lodge might be considered Masonically improper, as tending to subject the Lodge to the jurisdiction of courts of law.

(3) In reply to an inquiry from Howard Lodge, No. 15, as to the Degree on which the business of the Lodge should be transacted,

accompanied with a copy of a ruling received in October, A. D. 1883, from the then Grand Master, Bunting, that it should be transacted on the First Degree, I answered that I concurred in the ruling of Past Grand Master Walker, as stated in his address to Grand Lodge in the year 1891, that, as a member of a Lodge must be a Master Mason under the Constitution as amended in the year 1884, it would be better that all business should be transacted on the Third Degree, but that it is not imperative.

With a view of carrying out the spirit of the resolution of this Lodge relating to the naming of the new Lodge at Petitcodiac, I visited the Brethren there, who had been working under dispensation from the Grand Master since December 11th, 1900, and pointed out to them the views that had been expressed by members of Grand Lodge as to the desirability of not giving to the Lodge the name of a brother who was living, and counselled them to choose some other name. After some discussion in open Lodge, followed up by correspondence with a few of the most interested Brethren, I deemed it in the best interests of harmony in the Lodge to continue the name of "Steven," and a warrant issued accordingly on the 13th of May, 1902. Assisted by W. Brother Dr. E. A. Preston, as D.G.M.; R. W. Brother George Coggon, as S.G.W.; R. W. Brother John W. Carter, J.G.W.; V. W. Brother the Reverend Seovil Neales, G.C.; V. W. Brother J. Twining Hartt, G.S.; W. Brother Mathew B. Edwards, as S.G.D.; W. Brother Ora P. King, G.D.of C., and Brother Frederick Hartt, I constituted and consecrated the Lodge with due form and ceremony as Steven Lodge, No. 37, and installed the officers. After the consecration ceremony the Third Degree was ably worked upon three Brethren by the Grand Officers accompanying me. In this connection R. W. Brother George Coggon, for his attention and devotion to the interests of this Lodge since the granting of the dispensation for its formation, is deserving of the commendation of Grand Lodge. He has been in constant attendance at the meetings of the Lodge, and has given the Brethren in Petitcodiac, at the sacrifice of his time and labor, much valuable assistance in the way of organizing the Lodge and instructing the Brethren in the Mystic art. I have watched the growth of this body with much interest, and the prospects are that Grand Lodge will have at Petitcodiac a strong and healthy subordinate. There has already been a large increase in its membership. Worshipful Master F. Percy Webster and his associate officers are fully impressed with the necessity of knowing the Ritual, and have determined that Steven Lodge shall be second to none in the jurisdiction in respect to accuracy of work. Brother Reverend Joseph Pascoe, a tried and faithful worker, and a true exponent of the principles of Freemasonry, declined to accept the office of Worshipful Master, and was appointed

Chaplain of the new Lodge. May this Lodge humbly reflect that order and beauty which reign forever before the throne of the Great Architect of the Universe.

The most pleasant duty or privilege of the Grand Master is the visitation of Lodges. I will ever bear in sweet remembrance the warm and kindly greetings and the unbounded hospitality which have been extended to myself and the Grand Officers who accompanied me on my official visits. Although I have been unable to meet with all of the Lodges, I have endeavored to do what I could in that direction. In the midst of professional duties the visitation of all the Lodges in this jurisdiction cannot be undertaken in one year. But every Lodge in this Province can easily be visited by the Grand Master within two years. Apart from the great pleasure to the Grand Officers, these visitations are fully appreciated by and unmeasurably profitable to those Lodges.

On the evening of the 31st of October, 1901, I made my first official visitation as Grand Master to The Union Lodge of Portland, No. 10, accompanied by Past Grand Masters John V. Ellis, Thomas Walker and J. Gordon Forbes, and by a full staff of Grand Officers. There was a very large attendance of the members of the Lodge and of visiting Brethren. Worshipful Master Mathew B. Edwards, one of our youngest and most enthusiastic Masters, occupied the chair, and, assisted by an efficient body of officers, conferred the Third Degree in a highly creditable manner. It has never been my privilege to see the work of this Degree more impressively and more ably done. The Ritual was almost perfect. After the close of the Lodge two hours were pleasantly spent in the banquet hall, where we enjoyed the bountiful hospitality of the Lodge and the excellent speeches and songs of its members and visiting Brethren.

Accompanied by a large number of Grand and Past Grand Officers, I visited Albion Lodge, No. 1, on Friday evening, November 22nd, 1901, and found Worshipful Master Alfred A. Dodge in the chair, with an enthusiastic corps of officers about him. The members of this Lodge had turned out in full force. The Grand Officers were received with a hearty greeting. During the evening the Third Degree was conferred upon two Brothers in a manner eliciting much praise. Albion Lodge is too old and too tried a centre of Masonic light to require commendation from me, but it has seldom, if ever, exemplified the Ritual of the Third Degree more beautifully than was done that evening. When called to refreshment we repaired to the banquet hall, and there enjoyed a most delightful repast, brightened with excellent speeches and songs. This Lodge is in good hands.

By request, on the evening of the 14th January, 1902, accompanied by a large number of Grand and Past Grand Officers, I visited Hibernia

Lodge, No. 3, and installed W. Brother William E. Raymond as Worshipful Master, and the other officers. There were over one hundred and fifty of the Brethren present. But one Lodge in the Province—that at Woodstock—has a larger membership, and in other respects the Lodge is in a satisfactory condition.

An interesting event of the evening was the presentation to W. Brother John Johnston, Treasurer of the Lodge, of a very handsome Past Master's apron of a special design. This apron belonged to the late R. W. Brother William J. Logan, and was given to Brother Johnston by members of the family to express their appreciation of many acts of kindness shown to Brother Logan in his last illness. Brother Johnston's investiture was greeted with hearty applause.

Business over, the Brethren accepted Brother Raymond's invitation to the banquet hall, where, after a generous supper had been disposed of, there was a lively round of speeches and songs, and many toasts, civic and Masonic, were heartily proposed and answered.

On the 6th of March, 1902, I officially visited Carleton Union Lodge, No. 8, and found a full attendance, although the evening was very stormy. W. Brother Alban F. Emery presided, and, with the assistance of his skilled officers, conferred the First Degree very efficiently and very acceptably to myself and to the Grand and Past Grand Officers who accompanied me. Brother Emery performed his duties with ease and with exceedingly good grace, and I have no doubt, from the enthusiasm shown by him and his officers, that this Lodge will make an excellent record for itself in the way of growth and good Ritual during the present year. A most enjoyable hour, after the close of the Lodge, was spent with the members in the refreshment room adjoining their attractive hall. In respect to the hall, it has not been my good fortune to visit a room devoted to the purposes of the Order more commodiously planned, more tastefully painted or better equipped.

On the 1st day of April, 1902, accompanied by the R. W. Past Grand Masters John V. Ellis and Thomas Walker and a large staff of Grand and other Past Grand Officers, I officially visited St. John's Lodge, No. 2, to assist at the first function given by that Lodge in connection with the ceremonies commemorating the centennial of its founding. There was a large attendance of officers, members and visiting Brethren. The Worshipful Master, Dr. Edward A. Preston, presided, and most warmly and courteously welcomed Grand Lodge—an honor I fully appreciated, coming as it did from my mother Lodge. The work of the evening was the conferring of the Master Mason Degree, which was exemplified in an able and instructive manner. The Ritual was closely followed, and the work very impressive. The officers seemed to feel that they were, Masonically, the "heirs of all the ages," and with

marked success they aimed at "perfection's sacred height." This Lodge is in a very active and prosperous condition. On the following evening a splendid reception was given by the Lodge, five hundred ladies and gentlemen being present. The rooms of the Masonic Temple were beautifully and richly decorated, music and song delighted the ear, a bountiful supper was served, pleasure and enjoyment were on every face, the ball-room was densely thronged, and on every hand were heard expressions of commendation and appreciation. On Friday evening, April 4th, the celebration was brought to a successful termination by a Masonic banquet. Many toasts were proposed and responded to, "the feast of reason and the flow of soul" lasting long after low twelve. A pleasing feature of the evening was the unveiling of a fine portrait of the late Past Grand Master William F. Bunting, who was for years an active member of the Lodge. W. Brother Preston and his associate officers and the members of the Lodge are to be highly congratulated on the excellent manner in which they planned and carried out to completion their centennial celebration.

On June 2nd, 1902, accompanied by the Grand Secretary, V. W. Brother J. Twining Hartt, I left St. John to spend a few days among the Lodges in the Northeastern part of the Province. We were joined at Richibucto by the R. W. Deputy Grand Master, Dugald C. Firth. In the evening we visited Lodge St. Andrew, No. 16, Worshipful Master Robert A. Irving presiding. The inclemency of the weather prevented members living outside of the town from being present, and the attendance was small. The First Degree was conferred, which was performed in an excellent manner. The interest taken by Brother Irving and his officers, and the energy and enthusiasm of R. W. Brother Doherty, P.D.G.M., and Past Masters W. D. Carter and William H. McLeod, assure life and progress to this Lodge. At the close of the evening we were entertained at the LeBlanc Hotel, and when we parted we felt that the evening had been well spent.

On Tuesday evening, June 3rd, 1902, we visited Miramichi Lodge, No. 18, at Chatham. The weather was still very unpropitious. W. Brother Sydney D. Heckbert presided. This Lodge is in a very flourishing condition, and doing good work. With the assistance of the Grand Secretary, the Lodge conferred the Third Degree in an able and instructive manner. The Worshipful Master did the first section of the Degree very admirably, while Past Master Wilfrid R. Gould, as S.D., and the other officers ably assisted. Our worthy Brother, Past Master Robert Murray, ever forgetful of himself, missed no opportunity of making the visit pleasant to us, and, I doubt not, profitable to the Lodge. Nothing could be more cordial than the reception in the Lodge and the subsequent entertainment in an adjoining room.

Wednesday, June 4th, we reached Newcastle. In the evening we visited Northumberland Lodge, No. 17, presided over with dignity and ability by W. Brother Richard L. Maltby. This Lodge presented many evidences of growth and prosperity. The hall was newly painted, beautiful new regalia was worn, and a staff of young men filled the offices; the Senior Warden, Brother Stanley W. Müller, especially impressed me with his capital work. I had pleasure in meeting, among others, Past Masters Dr. Pedolin, William A. Park, Charles E. Fish, and George F. Ward, all still taking an active interest in the Lodge. The Third Degree was impressively conferred. The officers of the Lodge seem to be well posted in the Ritual. We were most hospitably entertained at a banquet at the Waverly Hotel after the close of the Lodge.

On Thursday evening, June 5th, we visited Lodge Saint John, No. 27, at Bathurst, where W. Brother John Montgomery, of Campbellton Lodge, joined us, also Past Master Charles Masters, of Albion Lodge. W. Brother Albert J. H. Stewart, as Worshipful Master, assisted by Past Masters Hickson, Pepper and Boss, conferred the Third Degree. I was delighted with what I saw. This Lodge has been reported as in a waning condition. I found its members—small in numbers—active and hopeful for the future. The visitation and efforts of Past Grand Master Forbes a few months before had not only been beneficial in quickening into life the old embers, but had created a new spirit among the members. The excellent examination of the candidate on the Second Degree especially pleased me. With little prompting and few questions he repeated the entire Ritual of his previous Degree. We subsequently spent a half hour fraternally with the Brothers.

Next evening we visited Campbellton Lodge, No. 32. W. Brother John Montgomery most ably filled the chair. We had around us R. W. Deputy Grand Master Dugald C. Firth (than whom no truer Mason exists in the jurisdiction), Past Masters John White, John McAllister and James P. Jardine, and Past Master James E. Stewart, of Restigouche Lodge, active and enthusiastic Craftsmen. The First Degree was conferred upon two candidates, and from the manner in which the work was done I have no fear that the Ritual or the Order will suffer at this post. I installed the Deputy Grand Master and conferred the Past Master's Degree on the Worshipful Master and W. Brother Jardine. The Lodge fully appreciated the honor conferred by Grand Lodge on their popular Brother Firth in electing him to the office of Deputy Grand Master. The condition and prospects of Campbellton Lodge are most gratifying. We were entertained sumptuously at the close of the ceremonies. Two hours sped away only too quickly while we enjoyed an excellent menu and spicy speeches. The Chaplain, Reverend Brother Kierstead, added much to our entertainment.

On Saturday, June 7th, after a delightful drive from Campbellton, we visited Restigouche Lodge, No. 25. On the arrival at Dalhousie of the Grand Secretary and myself, accompanied by Brother John Montgomery, we were met by W. Brother James E. Stewart, who but a few hours before had left us at Campbellton. Worshipful Master Dr. A. G. Ferguson presided at the Lodge, and afterwards at a very pleasant and enjoyable banquet tendered us at the Clifton Hotel. W. Brother Ferguson had around him a number of bright and intelligent young Masons, every one of whom should look forward to the highest offices that the Lodge can confer. The Third Degree was conferred in a manner that reflected great credit on the officers. Past Master Scott, as Senior Deacon, did the floor work admirably.

On July 10th, 1902, I officially visited New Brunswick Lodge, No. 22, accompanied by a large number of Grand and Past Grand officers. We received a very hearty greeting from Past Master Robert J. McAdoo, who occupied the chair in the absence of Worshipful Master George H. Waring, who had removed from the city for a time. The other offices, with the exception of two, were also filled by Past Masters of the Lodge. In fact it was a Past Master's meeting. The Third Degree was conferred by skilled workmen, and the admirable and impressive manner in which they did their work evoked praise from all present and proved conclusively that there is a latent power in the Past Officers of this Lodge that only requires to be called forth to insure to the Lodge success and prosperity for many years even without the new blood which is constantly being added. The young men of the Lodge must look well to their laurels.

On July 22nd, 1902, accompanied by R. W. Brother John W. Carter, the Grand Secretary, and W. Brother Henry S. Bridges, I visited Albert Lodge, No. 34, at Albert. W. Brother Isaac C. Prescott occupied the chair. There was a small attendance and no work. The evening was, I hope, very profitably spent in the exemplification of portions of the Third Degree by the Grand Secretary. The Brethren of this Lodge are most strongly urged to throw themselves into the task of reviving interest in Freemasonry. The principles of our Order are of too high a character to be forgotten or neglected. There is good material in this part of the jurisdiction, and we cannot admit for a moment that the Brethren of Albert Lodge will allow smallness of numbers, or want of interest in a few, to interfere with the promotion and advancement of those glorious principles.

The following evening we visited Howard Lodge, No. 15, at Hillsboro, W. Brother C. Allison Peck presiding. This Lodge is in good condition, and is deserving of more recognition by the officers of Grand Lodge than it has apparently received in the past. If I am correctly informed, our

visitation was the first that it has received from a Grand Master since the warrant was delivered to its members by the late Past Grand Master Peters in 1869. The Brethren, however, have kept the fire burning, and it was very gratifying to visit a Lodge with the vigor and life shown by those present. A sincere welcome and a pleasant repast were enthusiastically accorded us. The Third Degree was conferred, W. Brothers Carter, Hartt and Bridges gladly assisting.

On the 24th July we reached Dorchester, and were there joined by Past Grand Master John V. Ellis, who had kindly come from St. John to assist us. In the evening we visited Sussex Lodge, No. 4. W. Brother Past Master Thomas Colwell (the Worshipful Master) occupied the chair. The revival of this Lodge to its wonted activity is a matter of great satisfaction, and we trust that harmony and prosperity will continue. The work of the evening was the conferring of the E. A. Degree upon one candidate, and the Second Degree upon three candidates, which was performed in a very excellent manner. The officers of the Lodge were assisted by Past Grand Master John V. Ellis, the Grand Secretary, and W. Brother Henry S. Bridges. After the exercises of the evening a banquet at the Windsor Hotel, served up in fine style, with beautiful decorations, was greatly enjoyed by all. Interesting speeches were made by several of the Brethren. Past Master S. Edgar Wilson and others added much to our enjoyment on this visitation.

On the 8th August, 1902, accompanied by the D. D. Grand Master, Frank A. Godsoe, W. Brothers Joseph A. Magilton, Henry S. Bridges, Dr. Alban F. Emery and Brother Dr. Lemuel A. McAlpine, I officially visited St. Martins Lodge, No. 30. There was a fair attendance. The work of the evening was the E. A. Degree. It was mainly conferred by the Grand Officers accompanying me, and I have no doubt that the instructive and impressive manner in which the work was done will greatly strengthen the officers of the Lodge in the discharge of their duties. We met our old and worthy father in Freemasonry, Past Master Andrew Skillen, who for over sixty years has regularly attended to his Masonic duties and in his life exemplified the principles of our Order, and who can proudly point to his five sons, all of whom are active members of this Lodge. Past Master William E. Skillen and his brothers, aided by the other Brethren, entertained us with a bountiful banquet.

I did not, as empowered by Grand Lodge, appoint a Grand Lecturer to visit the Subordinate Lodges for the purpose of imparting instruction in the Ritual of the Three Degrees, and consequently only a portion of the grant of two hundred dollars voted for that purpose has been expended. The reason for my omission to appoint a Brother to such office was that I did not at the time of my election have the knowledge of the needs of the Craft throughout the jurisdiction to enable me to

select a proper person to discharge the duties. However, I availed myself of the services of R. W. Past Grand Master Walker, the Grand Secretary, R. W. Brother Coggon, and others who generously visited the Lodges which seemed to require immediate attention, without further charge to Grand Lodge than the payment of their travelling expenses.

My experience during the year convinces me that until District Lodges of instruction can be provided for, or a much larger grant given, more practical results in the way of perfecting the officers of the several Lodges in the knowledge of the Ritual would be attained by making use of a number of willing, faithful and efficient Brothers chosen by the Grand Master from time to time, than by the mere appointment of one officer with an income of two hundred dollars to meet his expenses. Many such Brothers are to be found who would gladly spend a few days visiting the Lodges outside the city of St. John upon the payment of their actual outlay. I strongly recommend the Grand Lodge to revoke the unexpended balance of this year's grant, and that a similar grant be made for the same purpose for the ensuing year, leaving it optional with the Grand Master to appoint one or more instructors. If the Grand Master was enabled by these grants to send, at the request of Subordinate Lodges, one or more well posted Brethren to assist in conferring the Degrees, there would not exist the temptation to the officers to attempt to qualify themselves to do the work of the Degrees, by secretly using what are termed "Cipher" Rituals—a practice which, I fear, does prevail in some sections, and which cannot be too strongly condemned.

I submit herewith the reports of the several District Deputy Grand Masters. It was my aim, in appointing Brethren to this office, to select those who would be sufficiently interested in their duties to visit the several Lodges in their respective Districts at least once a year. The reports show some of my appointees have done most excellent work. The visits of the Deputies are fully appreciated, as I learned in my visitations. I repeatedly heard their visits highly commended.

Assembled as we are, it is, I think, most fitting that we should refer to the two greatest occurrences during the past year affecting the Empire to which we belong.

As British subjects, we rejoice in the termination of the war in South Africa in an honorable peace, vindicating our arms, establishing the unity of our Empire, sustaining its world-wide policy, and settling for all time the question of the controlling power from Zambesi to the Cape. The war has brought under our flag a great and wealthy territory and joined to us as fellow-subjects a race of devoted men who will not be losers in their defeat. Their liberties will be increased, and their property and civil and religious rights forever guarded under the protecting ægis of British institutions.

The 9th of August witnessed at Westminster Abbey the greatest coronation in the history of our nation. The ceremonies were shorn of much of their intended grandeur by the postponement caused by the illness of our King and Emperor. But that very delay gave opportunity for such an expression of sympathy and affection for our Monarch as must go far to convince all nations that Edward VII. rules the hearts of his subjects as his revered mother did before him. To us as Masons the crowning of Britain's King was noted with special feelings of gratitude. On ascending the Throne he resigned the office of Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of England, which for many years he had filled with such eminent distinction, and accepted the position of Patron of the Order. He was succeeded in his high office by His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, who has rendered distinguished services to the Craft.

As will be noticed by the report of my visitations, I have had the company of V. W. Brother J. Twining Hartt, the Grand Secretary, on almost all occasions. Whenever requested to perform the work of conferring a Degree or perform any other duty he has most promptly and generously responded. His kindly criticisms and his perfect exemplification of the Ritual have been of much service to the Grand Lodge. I wish to extend to him my sincere thanks for his cheerful aid and assistance.

I am also greatly indebted to R. W. Past Grand Masters John V. Ellis, Thomas Walker and J. Gordon Forbes for their courtesy and fraternal kindness in aiding and counselling me whenever I sought their advice.

To the Officers and Brethren of Grand Lodge I desire to express my gratitude for their loyal support. I have fallen short of what I would have liked to accomplish, but my every desire has been to do the best I could for the welfare and dignity of the Craft.

Since the accounts were closed for auditing, returns have been received from Lodges Nos. 28 and 37. No return has been received from Lodge 31.

A synopsis of the returns now on file presents the following figures for the year 1901:

The strength of the Craft has therefore received an addition of one hundred and eight members, the total being 1992, as against 1884 at the end of the year 1900. (For final returns see Synopsis, post.)

The dispensations issued during the year, 20 in number, have been for the usual purposes of conferring Degrees at short intervals, of forming public processions, of attending Divine Service in regalia, and in one instance a dispensation issued to install officers on St. John's Day instead of on the night of the regular meeting. In a number of cases deceased Brethren were interred with Masonic honors, the proceedings being duly reported as required by the Constitution.

By authority of the M. W. Grand Master six commissions under the Seal of Grand Lodge have been issued, constituting representatives near foreign Grand bodies and four commissions have been received and transmitted to representatives in this jurisdiction.

The correspondence of the office has included communications from the Grand Lodges of Western Australia and Costa Rica, acknowledging the recognition accorded them by this Grand Lodge at its last session; also a letter from the Grand Lodge of Oklahoma intimating its desire to resume the system of Grand Representatives.

Under instructions of the Board of General Purposes an order for 250 certificates was placed with the British American Bank Note Company of Ottawa, and the last instalment has lately been received.

R. W. Brother Dugald C. Firth, D. G. M., presented the report of the Board of General Purposes, and the same, on being read, was laid on the table.

To the M. W. GRAND LODGE F. & A. M. of New Brunswick:

The Board of General Purposes presents the following report for the year now closing:

The first meeting of the Board was held at Masonic Temple on Friday, November the 8th, 1901. R. W. Brother George B. Hegan was duly elected Vice-President.

The number of the Proceedings of Grand Lodge was increased from 500 to 600 copies, and distributed in the usual manner.

At its first meeting the Board referred to a sub-Committee the several matters which Grand Lodge had directed the Board to take into its consideration, viz.: (1) The proposed amendment to Section 27 of "Private Lodges"; (2) the report of the Special Committee on Suspensions, and (3) the section of the Grand Master's Address relating to Trustees of the Property of Private Lodges.

The reports made by these sub-Committees have received the best consideration of the Board, and it now recommends to Grand Lodge as to the first matter, that no change be made in the existing provisions of the Constitution contained in Section 27.

The report of the sub-Committee on Suspensions was unanimously adopted by the Board, and is therefore submitted in the form presented to the Board.

The sub-Committee to whom the Board referred consideration of a report of a Special Committee of Grand Lodge on the subject of Suspensions (see pages 37, 38 and 39 of the Proceedings 1900), which report recommended certain changes in the Constitution, beg to report that, after careful study and examination of the subject, the sub-Committee advises the Board adversely to the changes suggested.

The sub-Committee of the Board agrees with the Special Committee as to evils which result from non-payment of dues and the suspensions which follow, but members of this sub-Committee are not satisfied that the conditions will be improved by the changes suggested. They believe that the most effective way of counteracting the evil is by energetic and persistent effort on the part of Secretaries of Lodges, and by constant reminders in the Lodges to the members of their duty to promptly and willingly discharge their financial liability to the Craft.

The sub-Committee points out, with reference to the alternative system of raising funds suggested by the Special Committee, that while the Constitution of Grand Lodge supports a system of monthly dues and makes provision in regard to the treatment of members who do not pay, it nowhere absolutely imposes upon the private Lodges any particular plan of collecting dues, and there is really no enactment which makes collection of monthly dues obligatory upon all the Lodges as a system except in the By-Laws of the individual Lodges. If a Lodge should by by-law provide a system of life membership, it must remain with the Grand Master to decide whether the terms of such a by-law are equitable and just; but in the absence of a constitutional provision or vote of Grand Lodge against a system of life membership, it is unlikely that a Lodge would be absolutely refused authority to create such a system for members. While on this point your committee may say that such references as they have seen in regard to the contribution necessary to sustain life membership usually fix the sum at seventy-five dollars, and it is probable that if the estimate be correct it is beyond the power of the large majority of our members. So also with regard to the substitution of voluntary contributions in lieu of monthly dues the sub-Committee thinks that such a system might be substituted for the monthly system if a Lodge so desired; but the sub-Committee, in making this observation, does not desire to prejudice the views of a Grand Master who, in assenting to the by-laws enacted by a Lodge, must take the responsibility of deciding as to the power of a Lodge in matters of this kind. By common consent, and almost universal practice, however, the payment of monthly dues generally prevailing heretofore has been found to be the best, easiest and least burdensome plan of raising a revenue. The sub-Committee merely indicates a view which might prevail if a Lodge chose to enter upon the experiment. The observation may be further made that the sub-Committee is loth to recommend to the Board any changes in the existing system of Grand Lodge dues, and believes that no simpler mode could exist than the present one, which provides a per capita upon all of the members present returned as upon the roll upon a certain day. Although the amount per capita is somewhat heavy, the Lodges have had the benefit of a reduction within a few years, and the sub-Committee feels that, with the steady reduction of the debt, a further reduction will be possible within a comparatively short period of time. The Committee, however, sees no objection to the proposed amendment to Section 29, and it may be adopted as an amendment to the Constitution upon the regular notice to that effect being given.

No further action on the whole matter is advised.

As to the third matter, that of Trustees, the Board has come to the conclusion that it is inadvisable to present a report this year. It will be

necessary to obtain much fuller information as to properties belonging to the various subordinate Lodges, and also to secure from the Lodges a clear expression of their views on the subject before a well considered plan of action can be framed for the approval of Grand Lodge.

At its April meeting the Board had before it correspondence consisting of two letters from W. Brother A. J. H. Stewart, Worshipful Master of Lodge St. John, Bathurst, asking that Grand Lodge refund to the Lodge certain dues paid in respect of members who were afterwards suspended, and also of members in arrears to the Lodge who should have been suspended. The Board did not feel it had the power to deal with this matter, and therefore refers it to Grand Lodge for consideration.

The Committee appointed to audit the books of the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary has submitted the following report, and the Board having adopted the same, now presents it to Grand Lodge.

The sections down to the first section of the sub-Committee's report were severally read and adopted.

After discussion, and on motion of R. W. Brother His Honour Judge Forbes, P. G. M., the sections of the sub-Committee's report respecting Suspensions were adopted after striking out the words in the last line — "No further action on the whole matter is advised."

The section as to "Trustees" was adopted, and its subject matter referred to the incoming Board of General Purposes.

The section containing the report of the Audit Committee was in like manner adopted, and, on due motion, Grand Lodge adopted the report of the Board of General Purposes as amended.

Read correspondence from Lodge Saint John, No. 27, Bathurst, referred to in the Board's report. The request made to Grand Lodge in the correspondence was to the effect that dues hitherto paid by the Lodge for members who had afterwards been suspended, and also dues paid in respect of certain members whom it was the intention to suspend, be refunded by Grand Lodge. In this connection it was stated by the Grand Secretary that the returns of the Lodge for the years 1900 and 1901 had been received, but no dues had been paid in respect of them.

The following motion, moved by R. W. Brother William B. Wallace, P. D. G. M., seconded by R. W. Brother Edwin G. Vroom, P. G. W., was unanimously adopted :

That Grand Lodge remit all dues payable by Lodge Saint John for the years 1900 and 1901.

The reports of the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary were taken from the table and filed.

Grand Lodge then took recess.

TUESDAY EVENING.

Grand Lodge resumed labour at eight o'clock, the M. W. Grand Master in the East.

Worshipful Brother George K. Cochran presented his credentials as representative of the Grand Lodge of Louisiana. The commission was dated at the City of New Orleans, February 1st, 1900, and signed by A. C. Allen, Grand Master, and Richard Lambert, Grand Secretary. The commission having been read, Worshipful Brother Cochran was conducted to the East and received with Grand honors.

Grand Lodge proceeded to the order of the day, the election of Grand Officers.

The sections of the Constitution referring to elections were read.

R. W. Brother Alexander R. Campbell, P. G. W., and Worshipful Brothers Alban F. Emery, M. D., and Thomas Dunning were appointed scrutineers, and took the customary obligation.

The following report was submitted by the Library Committee:

To the M. W. GRAND LODGE of New Brunswick:

The Library Committee would report that during the past year the Proceedings of many sister Grand Lodges have been received, and that copies of all so received have been placed on the shelves of the library. It is now a question of some difficulty how to accommodate future publications by reason of the limited shelving space in the present room.

The grant of twenty dollars made by Grand Lodge last year has not been drawn by the Committee, but as some expense has recently been incurred it is recommended that a grant of that amount be passed for the ensuing year.

The report was received, and it was

Ordered, That a grant of twenty dollars be placed at the disposal of the incoming Library Committee.

R. W. Brother Thomas Walker, M. D., P. G. M., gave notice that at the next Annual Communication of Grand Lodge he would move that Section 19 of "Private Lodges" be struck out.

NOTE.—The section provides that a Mason can be a member of but one Lodge.

Grand Lodge then took recess until 3 o'clock to-morrow (Wednesday) afternoon.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

August 27th, 1902.

Grand Lodge resumed labour at 3 o'clock, the Grand Master, M. W. Arthur I. Trueman, in the East.

The Committee on the Grand Master's Address, through its Chairman, presented its report, which was as follows:

REPORT ON THE GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

To the GRAND LODGE, F. & A. M., of New Brunswick.

The Committee on the Address of the M. W. the Grand Master congratulates Grand Lodge on the spirit of harmony which prevails throughout the jurisdiction, on the evidences of prosperity which exist, and on the energy and attention which the Grand Master has exhibited in the discharge of the duties of his important office.

The references which the Grand Master makes in his Address to our departed Brethren are in terms which will be heartily approved. All of the Brethren who were of our own jurisdiction were well known, and within the sphere of their influence aided materially the good work of the fraternity and faithfully discharged their duties as citizens. Their names well deserve prominent place upon our record and to be enshrined in our memories, while we extend to their families our sympathy, a feeling which we also give to the families of our deceased craftsmen in other jurisdictions.

Grand Lodge cannot fail to be in hearty accord with the eloquent expressions of the Grand Master in regard to the late President of the United States, William McKinley, whose death at the hand of an assassin was one of the most notable occurrences of our time, and whose name will occupy an imperishable place on the historic page of our sister nation.

The extension of our fraternal intercourse with other Grand Lodges is ever a matter of satisfaction, and Grand Lodge will hail with pleasure the presence, as representatives, of those Brethren selected to fill important places here for other Grand Lodges. Its members particularly congratulate Past Grand Master Forbes, who has been chosen to represent the Grand Lodge of a nationality to which he is endeared by many strong ties.

Decisions which have been given by the Grand Master upon points of law submitted to him appear to your Committee to be reasonable and wise and deserving of hearty approval. The determination to consent to name the new Lodge at Petitcodiac "Steven" Lodge, as desired by the petitioners, was, under all the circumstances, quite right. If it be not desirable to name a Lodge after a living person—and it certainly is a questionable thing—the responsibility of refusal ought not to rest upon the Grand Master. There ought to be a constitutional rule against it, and the Committee recommends that Grand Lodge direct the Grand Secretary to give notice of amendment to the Constitution to that effect. Thus the matter may be definitely settled on the adoption or rejection of such amendment.

Grand Lodge must be deeply interested in the pleasing descriptions which the Grand Master gives of his visitation to a large number of Lodges. The work of visitation is responsible and arduous, but the Grand Master and the Brethren who accompanied him, and the Lodges which entertained them, had, no doubt, in the pleasant fraternal intercourse, a delightful reward. The value of these visitations by the Grand Master and Grand Officers cannot be over-estimated, and Grand Lodge is under a deep debt of gratitude to the Grand Master for having done so much in a single year.

The Committee feels that the statement made by the Grand Master as to the non-appointment of a lecturer is quite satisfactory, inasmuch as the work was done probably as effectively in another way. The committee is sure that the suggestions of the Grand Master as to the work in the next year are such as may be very properly agreed to, and it is recommended that the grant of two hundred dollars for lecturing purposes be continued in the coming year, and that, in addition, there should be allowed, should the Grand Master deem it necessary, a further sum of one hundred dollars, this being a moiety of the unexpended grant of the year which has just expired. It is desirable that every opportunity should be given to instruct the Craft in the work, so that the improper proceedings referred to by the Grand Master may be stopped. The committee ventures the hope that the Grand Master will use all his power to suppress irregular proceedings of this kind.

Nothing need be added to the eloquent references of the Grand Master to two great events of the year—the termination of the war, and the coronation of the King in Westminster Abbey. It is in accordance with our Masonic profession to love peace, though stern duty may compel us to war; and we were deeply anxious, both as citizens and as Masons, over the illness of the King; so as citizens and as Masons we rejoice over his restoration to health, and trust that he may rule over us for many years with the enlightened wisdom which comes naturally to him through his illustrious predecessor.

Much interest is also attached to the Grand Master's account of the ceremonies and festivities consequent upon the celebration by St. John's Lodge, No. 2, of its centenary of existence. The whole craft, as well as the Lodge, is to be congratulated upon the long and honorable history of St. John's Lodge, and it is an interesting coincidence that the Grand Master in the year in which the centennial is celebrated is a member of that Lodge, filling a high station in such a manner as to readily earn for him the hearty affection of the fraternity.

Congratulating Grand Lodge on the effective manner in which the Grand Master has discharged his duties, on the efficient assistance given him by the Grand Secretary and by other officers and members of Grand Lodge, the Committee is easily able to say that the whole fraternity in this jurisdiction fully recognizes that the Grand Master has not only endeavored to do all that was in his power to promote the welfare of the ancient craft, but that his efforts have been crowned with satisfactory and abundant success.
