

The M. W. Grand Master then delivered his Annual
Address:

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.*Brethren of Grand Lodge :*

With cordial greetings I welcome you to the Fortieth
Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of New Brun-
swick, and in rendering an account of my official duties dur-
ing the third year in which I have had the honor of pre-
siding over this Grand Lodge, I bring you the pleasing
tidings that the condition of the Craft throughout this
Grand Jurisdiction is in a healthy and prosperous state;
that Peace, Harmony and Brotherly Love continue to pre-
vail in all the Lodges and that at no time has this Grand
Lodge been in a better condition than it is to-day.

The report of the Very Worshipful Grand Secretary will
show the largest membership in our history; and from in-
telligence received from the Private Lodges I learn that

since the returns were made nearly all the Lodges in the
jurisdiction are having healthy increase in their membership,
while at the same time great care is being taken not to re-
ceive undesirable candidates.

The report of the Very Worshipful Grand Treasurer will
show the finances of Grand Lodge to be in a most satisfac-
tory state.

Considering the number of members on the roll of Grand
Lodge, we cannot expect a year to pass without death enter-
ing our ranks and snatching some beloved brother from
our midst.

It is with sorrow that I have to announce that during the
past year we have lost by death an unusually large number
of the members of Grand Lodge, some of them old, active
members and past officers, who were regular and punctual
in their attendance at our communications. We deeply
mourn their loss, but console ourselves in faith that they have
passed through the gates of death to a place of eternal
happiness.

OBITUARIES.

Worshipful Brother A. A. Stockton, Past Master of
Albion, was initiated in Leinster Lodge and subsequently
served as its Master. He represented Leinster Lodge at
the formation of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.
The profession of the law to which he was earnestly
devoted did not prevent our late brother from taking
an active part in public affairs. His active mind and
yet gentle nature gave him a combination of qualities which
made him effective in the political arena, where he was an
eloquent speaker and a strong upholder of the principles
in which he believed. He was honored by the confidence of
the public, and sat both in the Legislature of the Province
and in the Parliament of Canada. In the latter he held a

seat at the time of his death. Admired by his colleagues for his moderation, his judgment, and his powers of reasoning, he occupied a parliamentary position which commanded much respect. A man with a classical education and literary tastes he was a clear and forcible writer, and a portion of his time was given to historical work connected with the Province, which will find a permanent place in Canadian literature. In the local affairs of this city he was deeply interested, particularly in organizations of several kinds, having for their object the benefit of his fellow-citizens. A notable instance is his legal labor given for many years, and without any pecuniary reward before the courts or otherwise, to help the work done by the S. P. C. A. And in the interests of education, too, he was a generous and untiring worker. In all his undertakings and labors he aimed at the public good, and the record of his life is one of which his family and friends may be justly proud, and one to which we can well pay the tribute of fraternal respect.

Hiram Lodge, No. 6, and the Craft throughout this jurisdiction have met with a great loss through the death of the oldest Past Master of that Lodge, Right Worshipful Alexander Burchill, on 28th October last, at the age of 73 years. Brother Burchill was born in the County of Cork, Ireland, in the year 1833. Coming to this country when a young man he engaged in trade in the City of Fredericton, where he spent the rest of his life. About thirty years ago, giving up the business in which he had spent many years, he was appointed Commissioner of the City Works, a position which he filled to the satisfaction of all down to the time of his last illness. He was always diligent and painstaking in the discharge of duty, and these characteristics distinguished him as a Mason. Brother Burchill was initiated in the year 1858 in St. Andrews Lodge, Fredericton,

then under the Grand Lodge of Scotland. In 1872 and the two following years he occupied the Oriental Chair; even then he was recognized among the Craft as an authority on questions of ritual and law. Soon after the union of the two Lodges in Fredericton into one, under the name and style of Hiram Lodge, No. 6, Brother Burchill was again placed in the chair of Worshipful Master. During the last seventeen years of his life he ably filled the office of Secretary of his Lodge. Always dignified, yet always agreeable, he enjoyed the esteem and confidence of his brethren. His attainments in Masonic knowledge, and his well known zeal for the Craft were rewarded by merited advancement in Grand Lodge, when he was finally elected to the dignity of Deputy Grand Master in 1897. He also served as Grand High Priest of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of New Brunswick. Brother Burchill was interred on October 30th with the Masonic honors due to his rank. I officially represented Grand Lodge at his funeral, being accompanied by several officers of Grand Lodge.

Hibernia Lodge, No. 3, mourns the loss of two of its Past Masters.

After a very short illness Worshipful Brother Joseph A. Magilton passed away at his home in this city at the age of 56 years. Brother Magilton was initiated in Hibernia Lodge, No. 3, in the year 1887 and very soon became an active and prominent member of his Lodge. He was elected Worshipful Master of Hibernia Lodge in 1893 and filled the chair during that and the following year with honor to himself and to the satisfaction of the members of his Lodge. He also served as Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies of this Grand Lodge during the year 1900. He was an active Royal Arch Mason and Knight Templar, and was for

several years Secretary of New Brunswick Chapter of Royal Arch Masons and at the time of his death filled the office of Secretary of The Encampment of St. John Knight Templars and also of Hibernia Lodge. Brother Magilton was of a cheerful, good nature, generous and ever willing to go out of his way to serve a friend or those in need of assistance. His sudden death was a surprise and shock to his many friends throughout the Province, all of whom deeply sympathize with his widow and daughter in their sorrow and affliction. Worshipful Brother Magilton was buried with full Masonic honors on 27th December last.

Worshipful Brother John Mullin, P. G. S. B., one of the oldest Past Masters of Hibernia Lodge, No. 3, died at his home in this city on the 16th October, 1906, at the advanced age of 87 years. Brother Mullin was a member of Hibernia Lodge when it was under the Grand Lodge of Ireland, and being Worshipful Master of that Lodge during the year 1867, represented it in the formation of this Grand Lodge, and was appointed its first Grand Standard Bearer and held that office during the two following years. He was an active, zealous Mason, punctual in attendance at his Lodge, and until the past two years, when the infirmity of old age prevented him from doing so, was in attendance at all the regular communications of Grand Lodge.

Past Master Thomas Lawson, P. G. D., died at his home in Andover, N. B., on 21st December, 1906. Brother Lawson was initiated in Benjamin Lodge, No. 31, in the year 1889 and soon became one of the most prominent and best informed Masons in Victoria County, and served as Worshipful Master of Benjamin Lodge. He took great pride and pleasure in assisting the younger brethren in the

work of the Order. The members of Benjamin and Colebrooke Lodges especially will long remember the valuable assistance he rendered the officers of both those Lodges in their work. Brother Lawson was a very energetic and clever lawyer, and filled many important positions of trust, and for a time was a member of the Provincial Legislature. He served as Senior Grand Deacon of this Grand Lodge during the year 1898.

Howard Lodge, No. 15, deeply mourns the loss of one of her charter members and oldest Past Master of the Lodge, Worshipful Brother William O'Shaughnessy, who passed quietly to his reward in June last. Born in Hillsborough, N. B., in the year 1825, he spent almost his entire life in his native place, and was regarded as one who wore worthily "the white flower of a blameless life." He became a Master Mason on 3rd October, 1855, and was elected Worshipful Master of Howard Lodge in the year 1859, a position which he occupied with honor to himself and to the satisfaction of his brethren. As a Mason he was consistent, enthusiastic and studious. In his attendance at the regular Communications of his Lodge he was most punctilious, and almost his last effort on earth was to attend the June meeting of his Lodge, where his presence was always an inspiration to his brethren. Full of years and honors he passed peacefully away, leaving behind him the fragrance of a well spent life, the life of "a workman that needeth not to be ashamed." The presence at his funeral of almost every member of Howard Lodge was in itself a splendid tribute to his work and to his worth.

Keith Lodge, No. 23, has lost a worthy and esteemed member by the death of Past Master F. W. Givan, who died on the 16th January, aged 40 years. Worshipful Master

Givan was initiated in Keith Lodge in the year 1888 and immediately entered into the active duties of a Mason. He was elected Worshipful Master of Keith Lodge in 1894 and served as a Grand Steward that year. At the time of his death he was the Excellent King of Botsford Chapter of Royal Arch Masons and Marshal of Ivanhoe Preceptory of Knight Templars. Brother Givan was a prominent and good citizen, a very enthusiastic Mason and served for a time as Mayor of Moncton, and is very much missed in Masonic, business and social circles.

Worshipful Brother James Webster, one of the oldest members of Zetland Lodge, No. 24, died on the 26th July, 1906, and was buried on 28th July with Masonic honors. Brother Webster was initiated in Zetland Lodge in the year 1862 and was its Worshipful Master in the year 1874. He was a most zealous Mason, a regular attendant at the meetings and had filled all of the offices of the Lodge of which he was a member. Brother Webster was a prominent citizen of Shediac, N. B., and for many years took an active part in many of the enterprises of that place.

Worshipful Brother Hugh McKay, Past Master of Sussex Lodge, No. 7, St. Stephen, died on 19th April last and was buried on 21st April with Masonic honors. He was born in Pennfield, N. B., in the year 1829, and received the degrees of Masonry in 1867 in Sussex Lodge, St. Stephen, N. B., then No. 327, under the Grand Lodge of Ireland, the last year of its working under its Irish Warrant. He ruled the Lodge in the year 1873 as its sixth Worshipful Master under the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, and the nineteenth who had held that office since the Lodge was established. Brother McKay was elected Mayor of St. Stephen in the year 1890, but was defeated in the

following year, and since that time, owing to failing health, had gradually ceased to take an active interest in public matters, or in the affairs of the Lodge. His departure, therefore, was to most of the members a name stricken from the roll, rather than a Brother taken from among them; yet there are some who still remember his genial presence with regret.

Northumberland Lodge, No. 17, Newcastle, has also lost an old and zealous Mason by the death of Past Master John S. Benson, M. D., who died on June 22nd last and was buried with Masonic honors on the 25th of that month, aged 66 years. Worshipful Brother Benson was initiated in Northumberland Lodge, from which he withdrew and affiliated with Miramichi Lodge, No. 18, in the year 1862. He continued his membership in that Lodge until the year 1902. During that forty years he frequently filled the office of Worshipful Master, and when not in the East was ever ready to fill the minor offices. Brother Benson served as Grand Director of Ceremonies of this Grand Lodge in the year 1877. He took a very active part in Masonry, was a good ritualist, and for many years was regarded as the Father of Miramichi Lodge, being their principal instructor. Soon after his withdrawal from Miramichi Lodge he affiliated with Northumberland, his Mother Lodge, of which he was a member at the time of his death, and under whose auspices his remains received a Masonic funeral. He was exalted in Mount Lebanon Chapter of Royal Arch Masons in the year 1871 and was its Principal Z. in the year 1875, an office which he subsequently held several years. Dr. Benson was a prominent citizen of Chatham, took an active part in the affairs of the city and county, and was a skilful physician, having a large practice and holding a foremost place in his profession.

On the afternoon of April 3rd last, while on duty at the Quarantine Station, John Edgar March, M. D., Past Master of The Union Lodge of Portland, was suddenly stricken ill and passed away ere nightfall. To his numerous friends his death was as saddening as sudden, for he was widely known and as widely esteemed. To few men is it given to possess such qualities of heart and mind as were those of our departed brother. He early took up the practice of medicine at Hampton and there became a member of The Corinthian Lodge. Subsequently, on removing to St. John he affiliated with The Union Lodge of Portland, and was elected to the East in 1904. The members of his Lodge will recall what an admirable Master he was. His activities, however, were many. He served the Militia of the Province long and well, having for years been Surgeon of the 8th Hussars, and at the time of his death was Principal Medical Officer of the District. By reason of this latter position Lieut. Colonel March was interred with military honors.

In 1894 Dr. March was appointed Quarantine Officer at the port of St. John, and, perhaps, it is as the occupant of this position that he himself would most prefer to be remembered. The station at the time was one but in name. In the intervening years it has become one of the best equipped stations in Canada, and, throughout, the work of construction and equipment had the constant and wise supervision of the Quarantine Officer. The discharge of his daily duties, in weather fair or foul, earned him the full approbation of the shipping and mercantile interests of the port. He was but in his 48th year.

George S. Hallmark, Past Grand Master of Florida, died July 12th, 1906.

Frank H. Robinson, Past Grand Master of New York, died October 11th, 1906.

Frederick S. Stevens, Past Grand Master of Connecticut, died October 17th, 1906.

George Davis, Past Grand Master of West Virginia, died November 19th, 1906.

William Henry Upton, Past Grand Master of Washington, died November 3rd, 1906.

Norvelle Robertson Carter, Past Grand Master of Florida, died December 1st, 1906.

Miles Wells Graves, Grand Treasurer of the Grand Lodge of Connecticut, died December 13th, 1906.

Charles Griswold, Past Grand Master of Minnesota, died December 25th, 1906.

Charles E. Stevens, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Michigan, and representative of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, died January 30th, 1907.

Since the last Communication of Grand Lodge I have made the following official visitations:

October 9th, 1906, accompanied by R. W. Brother George Coggon, Deputy Grand Master, W. Brother G. Hugh Harrison, District Deputy Grand Master of District No. 4, W. Brother R. J. McAdoo as Senior Grand Warden, R. W. Brother John McKenzie, Junior Grand Warden, W. Brother Thomas Lawson as Grand Chaplain, W. Brother B. Kilburn as Grand Treasurer, V. W. Brother J. Twining Hartt, Grand Secretary, W. Brother M. Stanley Sutton as Senior Grand Deacon, W. Brother Frank L. Tufts, Grand Director of Ceremonies, and Brother D. Arnold Fox as Grand Organist, and a number of other brethren, I visited Grand Falls, N. B., for the purpose of Consecrating Colebrooke Lodge, No. 39, the Grand Lodge having directed a Warrant to issue. On the evening of that day, in the presence of a large number of the members of the Craft of Victoria and neighboring counties, I proceeded with the assistance of the Grand Lodge officers to constitute, consecrate and dedicate to the service of God, and for the advancement of the great and good principles of Freemasonry, Colebrooke Lodge, No. 39, in due and ample form according to Masonic laws and the ancient usages of the Craft. Sub-

sequently, I installed Brother A. R. Hallett as the first Worshipful Master of Colebrooke Lodge, No. 39, and at the request of Worshipful Master Hallett, I installed Brother George A. Hallett as Senior Warden, Brother J. L. White as Junior Warden, and the other officers of the Lodge. After these ceremonies were completed the Worshipful Master and officers of Colebrooke Lodge conferred the Entered Apprentice Degree in a manner to reflect credit on themselves.

By invitation of Worshipful Master Hallett and the officers of his Lodge we repaired to Kerston's Hall, where a bounteous and well served banquet prepared by the lady friends of the Lodge was partaken of and much enjoyed by all, and a couple of hours passed pleasantly with speeches and songs. I expect good results to accrue from the formation of Colebrooke Lodge.

December 27th I visited Albion Lodge, No. 1, and at the request of Worshipful Master Thomas D. Walker, M. D., installed Brother Piercy R. Hunter as Worshipful Master and at request of Worshipful Master Hunter installed the other officers of the Lodge.

After the Lodge was closed a pleasant reunion took place in the banquet hall, at which a large number of the members of Albion and sister lodges were present.

January 2nd, 1907, accompanied by a full corps of Grand Lodge officers, I visited The Union Lodge of Portland and at request of Worshipful Master F. H. Hartt installed Brother G. H. V. Belyea as Worshipful Master and at request of Worshipful Master Belyea installed the other officers of the Lodge. After completion of the ceremonies a very pleasant evening was spent.

Accompanied by fifteen officers and past officers of Grand Lodge I visited St. John's Lodge, No. 2, and at request of

Worshipful Master Brown installed Brother Charles D. Jones as Worshipful Master and at request of Worshipful Master Jones installed the other officers, after which a couple of hours were spent in a pleasant and fraternal gathering around the festal board.

January 10th I visited New Brunswick Lodge, No. 22, escorted by twenty officers and past officers of the Grand Lodge, when at the request of Worshipful Master Frank E. Smith I installed Brother John A. Miller as Worshipful Master, and afterward by request installed the Wardens and other officers.

After the installations were completed, on invitation of the Worshipful Master and officers of the lodge, we repaired to the banquet hall, where around bounteously supplied tables several hours were happily and, I trust, profitably spent.

On each of these visits I was accompanied by Past Grand Master Walker, and on every occasion was received with all due honors and with most cordial and fraternal greetings.

It was very satisfactory to find all of these Lodges to be in a flourishing and prosperous state.

Hiram Lodge still mourns their recent great loss, sustained through the death of R. W. Brother Alexander Burchill, who filled so large a place in all the doings of their Lodge.

The degree of Master Mason was conferred in such a solemn and beautiful manner that it could not fail to make a lasting impression on the mind of the candidate.

The rest of the evening was quietly but agreeably spent in the lodge with speeches from the visiting brethren and members of Hiram Lodge.

December 15th—This morning Past Grand Masters Ellis and Walker returned to their homes, and in the evening I visited Alexandria Lodge, No. 33, at St. Marys, accompanied by the other brethren from St. John and a number of the members of Hiram Lodge, where a hearty welcome was given us by Worshipful Master Whitman Brewer and the members of his Lodge.

With the Worshipful Master in the East the work of the Master Mason degree was exemplified in a satisfactory manner. As the membership of Alexandria Lodge is not large, and the residences of a number of them some distance away, there was a small attendance, but the Lodge seems to be in a healthy condition.

After the Lodge was closed refreshments were served in the Lodge room, where in social intercourse the evening passed pleasantly and the time came too quickly when we had to return to Fredericton.

January 17th—Accompanied by Past Grand Master Walker, Worshipful Brothers Frank L. Tufts, Grand Director of Ceremonies, Robert Clerke, Grand Tyler, and Brothers George Blake and D. Arnold Fox, I visited Ashlar Lodge, No. 36, at McAdam, and received most cordial and fraternal greetings from Worshipful Master Melvin L. Young, M. D., and the members of his Lodge. I found Ashlar Lodge to be in an active and prosperous condition, and with pleasure installed Worshipful Brother Melvin L. Young as Worshipful Master for a second term, and also installed the Wardens and other officers.

After the labors of the evening were completed, we, by invitation of the officers of Ashlar Lodge, returned to the hotel and enjoyed one of those excellent and tempting to the palate banquets for which Miss Grant is so justly celebrated. The evening until a late hour was agreeably passed with addresses, music and readings.

On the evening of 1st August, I unofficially visited Carleton Union Lodge. Their lodge room was filled to overflowing with the members of their own lodge and a very large attendance of visiting brethren from lodges on the East side of the City, including many of the officers and past officers of Grand Lodge, who came to witness the conferring of the Master Masons' degree by Past Masters of Carleton Union Lodge.

It was to me an evening filled with enjoyment, carrying back memories of many years ago, when these brethren, some of whom had spent over half a century in the service of the lodge, were filling the offices and carrying on the active duties of the Lodge.

The following Past Masters filled the several offices, with Past Grand Master John V. Ellis in the East: Rev. George F. Scovil, S. W.; W. J. Watson, J. W.; Uriah Drake, Treasurer; W. J. Cornfield, Secretary; William L. Ellis, M. D., S. D.; H. Colby Smith, J. D.; C. B. Lockhart, S. S.; E. C. Woodward, J. S.; J. B. M. Baxter, D. of C., and W. C. R. Allan, I. G.

It is needless for me to state that the degree was conferred in a solemn, impressive and pleasing manner, for with such old, trusty and skilful workmen it could not be otherwise.

After the labors of the evening were completed, refreshments were served, and with the elder brethren communing over the events of the olden times, and the younger ones offering congratulations on the beauty and efficiency of the

evening's work, and with fraternal greetings the hour arrived too soon when we had to hasten our departure to catch the last trip of the ferry boat. The pleasant memories of that evening will long linger in the memory of all who were present.

October 30th—With V. W. Brother J. Twining Hartt, Grand Secretary; W. Brother Frank L. Tufts, Grand Director of Ceremonies, and W. Brother Charles Robinson, Past Grand Sword Bearer, I visited Fredericton and officially represented this Grand Lodge at the funeral of the late R. W. Brother Alexander Burchill, Past Master of Hiram Lodge, and Past Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.

At my request, W. Brother P. G. McFarlane, Past Grand Deacon, visited Grand Manan and installed the Worshipful Master, Wardens and other officers of Mananook Lodge on December 27th.

He reports that the best of feeling exists in the Lodge, and the brethren are active and hopeful.

Commissions have been issued making appointment of representatives near sister Grand Lodges of Brother James Divisich, of Nassau Lodge, No. 563, Brooklyn, N. Y., as our representative near the Grand Lodge of New York, in place of Brother Mathias Gooderson.

Brother James A. Thompson, Grand Marshal, as our representative near the Grand Lodge of Michigan, in place of their late Grand Master, M. W. Brother Charles L. Stevens.

Brother H. Sumner Martin, as our representative near the Grand Lodge of Victoria, in place of Brother Canon Watson resigned on account of the infirmity of age.

Brother Harry E. Peach, of Emporia, Kansas, as our representative near the Grand Lodge of Kansas.

R. W. Brother John W. Jameson, of Carman, as our representative near the Grand Lodge of Manitoba, in place of R. W. Brother John McGuirl, now in the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Saskatchewan.

Brother W. J. W. Lent, as our representative near the Grand Lodge of Alberta.

I have made the following nominations to fill vacancies of the representatives of sister Grand Lodges near this Grand Lodge:

The Hon. George T. Baird, P. G. D., as representative for the Grand Lodge of Alberta.

Brother Henry S. Bridges, P. G. D. of C., for the Grand Lodge of Greece, in place of the late Dean Partridge.

R. W. Brother James Vroom, P. G. W., for the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, in place of Brother John S. Benson, deceased.

Brother Herbert C. Creed for the Grand Lodge of Ohio, in place of R. W. Brother Alexander Burchill, deceased.

R. W. Brother George Coggon, Deputy Grand Master, for the Grand Lodge of Mississippi, in place of Brother Harry Beckwith, who has removed from the jurisdiction.

P. W. Brother Alexander Campbell, P. G. W., as representative for the Grand Lodge of Virginia, in place of Brother Joseph A. Magilton, deceased.

Our relations with all our sister Grand Lodges continue friendly and fraternal.

After careful examination I have approved the new By-Laws of Lebanon Lodge, No. 28, and also those of Mananook Lodge, No. 38.

I have received a number of enquiries in regard to Masonic laws and usage, all of which have been promptly answered and decisions given.

There have been two applications made to me during the year for instruction as to Candidates who had lost their left hand, and also as to one who lost a foot. I made reply that under present ruling of Grand Lodge their petitions could not be received.

By authority from the Board of General Purposes, I procured three additional sets of Apron, Collar and Jewel for District Deputy Grand Masters, and have forwarded them to the several brethren appointed to that office.

I have received a letter signed by H. H. Campkin, Grand Master, and J. W. Shaw, Grand Secretary, announcing the formation on the 9th of August, 1906, of the Grand Lodge of Saskatchewan at Regina, and requesting fraternal recognition.

Accompanying the letter was a copy of their proceedings, previous to and at the formation of their Grand Lodge, all of which appears to be in order and according to Masonic usage. As their officers were installed by the Most Worshipful Grand Master of Manitoba, assisted by two Past Grand Masters, I have no doubt that the Committee on Foreign Relations, to whom the papers have been referred, will recommend their request to the favorable consideration of this Grand Lodge.

Having heard that the Rev. R. W. Colston, of Welsford, N. B., had in his possession two ancient Masonic documents which he was desirous should be placed in the hands of the proper authorities, I communicated with him through the

Rev. George F. Scovil, our Grand Chaplain, informing him that I would be pleased to receive them on behalf of Grand Lodge. To this request Rev. Mr. Colston promptly responded by sending the two documents.

On examination, I found one of them to be a Warrant granted by the Provincial Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia to Samuel Ryerse, W. M., Abraham De Peyster, S. W., and Caleb Mallery, J. W., for St. George's Lodge, No. 19, to be held in the town of Maugerville, N. B., dated at Halifax, N. S., August 7th, 1789. The other paper is a roll of the members of St. George's Lodge for the year 1828, which was evidently prepared to be forwarded to the Provincial Grand Lodge at Halifax.

St. George's Lodge was the third Masonic lodge erected in New Brunswick. After it ceased to hold its meetings most of its record books passed into the hands of the late R. W. Brother Robert Gowan, who subsequently placed them in the Grand Secretary's office in this city, where they were burned in the great fire of 1877.

Although R. W. Brothers Gowan, Bunting and others interested made diligent search for this old Warrant without avail, it is remarkable that it should have laid with other old papers for about seventy-five years within one hundred feet of the room in which St. George's Lodge held its meetings.

Rev. Mr. Colston willingly agreed to surrender these documents to this Grand Lodge, and at the following meeting of the Board of General Purposes I placed them before that Board, which was pleased to accept them in behalf of Grand Lodge, and directed the Grand Secretary to return thanks to Rev. Mr. Colston.

At our last communication I congratulated Grand Lodge on its being free of debt, and consequently would be in a

position to increase the amount in the Fund of Benevolence in future by at least one thousand dollars annually.

You will find on examination of the Grand Treasurer's account that I was correct in my estimate, and I would therefore recommend that Grand Lodge should transfer from the General Fund the sum of one thousand dollars to the Fund of Benevolence, which now amounts to a little over four thousand three hundred dollars. This can be safely done without in the least impairing the credit of Grand Lodge.

I would also recommend Grand Lodge to place the sum of two hundred dollars at the disposal of the Grand Master to provide instructions to the Private Lodges.

When, three years ago, I was elected to the honorable and responsible office of Grand Master, I entered upon the discharge of the duties devolving upon me with many misgivings and some doubts as to my ability to perform those duties in a manner satisfactory to the Grand Lodge.

Years pass quickly by with those whose time is fully occupied, and I can scarcely realize that three years have passed away, in which I have endeavored faithfully to perform my duty to the Grand Lodge and the fraternity, and now at the termination of my Grand Mastership I desire to thank the Past Grand Masters, present and past grand officers and members of Grand Lodge for the valuable aid and hearty assistance with which they have supported and assisted me in the discharge of the duties of the chair.

I also desire to tender my warmest thanks to the fraternity throughout the province for the kind and brotherly reception which has on all occasions been extended to me, and for the cordial hospitality with which I and the members of the Grand Lodge have been received on all our official visitations.

I close with a heartfelt desire, and an earnest prayer, for the continued prosperity of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, and of that fraternity which has so warm a place in all our hearts.

After the applause which greeted the reading of the accounts, a motion was passed:

“That the report be received and lie on the table.”

In the absence, because of illness, of the Deputy Grand Master, R. W. Brother George Coggon, V. W. Brother Fred. J. G. Knowlton, Vice-President, presented the report of the Board of General Purposes, and the same was duly received and laid on the table.

The following is the report:

REPORT OF BOARD OF GENERAL PURPOSES.

*To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, F. and A. M., of
New Brunswick:*

The Board of General Purposes presents the following report of such matters as have come before it during the year now closing:

The first meeting was held at the Masonic Temple on the evening of 21st September, 1906, and V. W. Brother F. J. G. Knowlton was duly elected Vice-President.

The printing of 600 copies of the proceedings of 1906 was ordered and the Grand Secretary was also instructed to issue a new edition of the Constitution as amended to date, limited to 500 copies.

The Grand Treasurer reported that as directed by Grand Lodge he had transferred from the General Fund to the Fund of Benevolence the sum of five hundred dollars and he also reported the purchase of a bond of \$1,000 of the Village of Bath, N. B., bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent.

The M. W. the Grand Master was empowered to procure three additional sets of Regalia similar to the one obtained last year for the use of the District Deputy Grand Masters.

The M. W. the Grand Master reported that he had received from the Reverend R. W. Colston, of Welsford, through V. W. the Reverend G. F. Scovil, Grand Chaplain, the warrant of old St. George's Lodge, No. 19, of Mauger-ville, and that it and the letter from the Reverend R. W. Colston had been deposited in the office of the Grand Secretary.

The Board again considered the question of physical qualifications of candidates for initiation, but are unable to make any further deliverance in regard thereto. The following circular referred to in last year's report, issued by the Grand Lodge of England, has been received and is printed for the information of Grand Lodge:

Freemasons' Hall, London, W. C.,
Feb. 24th, 1875.

Dear Sir and Brother,—

According to the promise made in my note of the 2nd inst., I submitted your letter of the 1st inst. to the Board of General Purposes at their meeting on Tuesday in the last week. The Board feel that it is impossible to lay down a hard and fast rule as to the Initiation of a Candidate not perfect in his body as required in Article 4 Antient Charges, page six, Constitutions. I am directed to say that the general rule in this country is to consider a candidate eligible for election who, although not perfect in his limbs, is sufficiently so to comply with and go through the various ceremonies required in the different degrees.

Each case of this description must be decided on its own merits by the members of the Lodge to whom the Candidate

is personally known, subject to the investigation and approval of the Master of the Lodge, who is, of course, *officially responsible that the candidate was in a condition to comply with the above named requirements.*

Consideration was given to proposed changes in the Funeral Service, and it was ordered that the service be printed as revised and submitted for the consideration of Grand Lodge.

FUNERAL SERVICE.

IN LODGE.

Master. What man is he that liveth and shall not see death? Shall he deliver his life from the grave?

Response. Man dieth and wasteth away. Yea, man giveth up the ghost, and where is he?

Master. Man walketh in a vain shadow; he heapeth up riches, and cannot tell who shall gather them.

Response. When he dieth he shall carry nothing away; his glory shall not descend after him.

The Master, taking the Roll upon which has been written the name, age and date of death of the deceased brother, says:

The Lord gave and the Lord hath taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord.

Response. God is our God forever and ever; He will be our guide even unto death.

The Master reads the Roll, and says:

Master. Our brother has been called from labor in the terrestrial lodge, and has gone, we trust, to partake of the Divine refreshment.

The brethren answer three times, giving the public grand honors each time.

Brethren. The will of God is accomplished. So mote it be.

The Roll is either deposited in the archives or placed in the coffin, as the Master may direct.

SERVICE AT THE GRAVE.

Master and Wardens at the head of the grave; mourners at the foot of the grave; the brethren in a circle around it.

Master. Man that is born of a woman is of few days and full of trouble.

Response. He cometh forth like a flower and is cut down; he fleeth also as a shadow, and continueth not.

This address may be shortened as the Master may determine.

Master. Brethren, another spirit has been summoned to the land where our fathers have gone before us, and we assemble among the habitations of the dead, to behold the narrow house appointed for all living. Here around us, in that peace which the world cannot give, sleep the unnumbered dead; the sunshine and the storm pass over them and they are not disturbed. The eternal country for which they have set out returns us no intelligence of their arrival. Speechless is the gentle breeze that fans their silent covering. There is an overpowering impressiveness in this solemn silence, and we are forcibly reminded that we, too, must die.

We are again called upon by a most solemn admonition to consider the uncertainty of human life, the immutable certainty of death, and the vanity of all earthly pursuits. Decrepitude and decay are written on every living thing. We are born to die. What then are all the externals of human dignity? The power of wealth—the dreams of ambition—the pride of intellect—the charm of beauty—when Nature has paid her just debt. In the grave all fallacies are detected, all ranks are levelled, all distinctions done away.

The last offices we pay to the dead are useful only as lessons to the living. The cold, lifeless form enclosed in the "narrow house" before you is alike insensible to our sorrows and our ceremonies. He has gone to accomplish the destiny of our race, and his body, in the profound slumber of the grave, must be resolved into its original elements. But, my brethren, could his voice again be heard by us, with a knowledge of all the fearful secrets of his mysterious journey, in what startling emphasis would he not plead with us to prepare to meet our God. Let us, then, resolve to maintain with greater assiduity the dignified character of our profession, faithfully discharging the great duties which we owe to God, our neighbor and ourselves. Let our faith be evinced in a correct moral walk and deportment, our hope be bright as the glorious mysteries to be revealed hereafter, and our charity boundless as the wants of the human family.

May we be faithful and true to each other, and may we live and die in love. Amen.

Response. So mote it be.

May we profess that which is good, and always act agreeably to our profession. Amen.

Response. So mote it be.

May the Lord bless and prosper us, and may all our good intentions be crowned with success. Amen.

Response. So mote it be.

Friend and brother, we bid thee a last, a long farewell. Thou art at rest from thy labors. May it be in peace!

The Master, holding the apron, says:

The lambskin or white leather apron is an emblem of innocence and the badge of a Mason—more ancient than

the Golden Fleece or Roman eagle—more honorable than the Star and Garter. This emblem I now deposit in the grave of our departed brother.

Here deposits it in the grave.

By this we are reminded of the universal dominion of Death—the arm of friendship cannot interpose to prevent his coming—the wealth of the world cannot purchase our release. The spade, the coffin, the melancholy grave admonish us of our mortality, and that soon these frail, weak bodies must moulder in their parent dust.

The Master, holding the evergreen, says:

The evergreen, or sprig of Acacia, is an emblem of our faith in the immortality of the soul. By this we are reminded of our high and glorious destiny beyond the world of shadows, and that there dwells in this tabernacle of clay an imperishable, immortal spirit over which the grave has no dominion and death no power.

Here the Master deposits the evergreen in the grave. The brethren move slowly round the grave, and each in turn drops in the evergreen.

The public grand honors are then given.

The Master may omit this if he desires to do so.

From time immemorial it hath been the custom among the Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons, at the request of a brother, to accompany his corpse to the place of interment, and there deposit his remains with the usual formalities. In conformity with this ancient usage, and at the request of our deceased brother, whose memory we revere and whose loss we all deplore, we have assembled at this time in the character of Masons to offer up before the world the last sad tribute of our affection, and thereby to demonstrate in the strongest manner the sincerity of our esteem for him and our steady attachment to the principles of our Fraternity.

Unto the grave we commit the body of our deceased brother. [Earth to earth.

Here throws earth on the coffin.

Ashes to ashes—

Here again.

Dust to dust—

Here again.]

The words and ceremony in brackets to be omitted if in any preceding religious service the same ceremony has been observed.

There to remain until the trumpet shall summon him on the resurrection morn. We leave him with submission, in the hands of the Great Creator, Who hath done all things well; Who is glorious in holiness, fearful in praises, doing wonders.

With those relatives and friends who are most heart-stricken at the loss we have all sustained, we deeply and most affectionately sympathize in their bereavement, assured that the same Almighty Creator Who knoweth our frame and remembereth that we are but dust, looks with infinite compassion upon the afflicted in the hour of their desolation, will fold the arms of His love and protection around those who put their trust and confidence in Him.

Let us in our respective spheres so improve the solemn warning of our God, that, at the last, when the "great White Throne" is set, and the volume of the record of our lives opened, we may receive from the Omniscient Judge the gracious invitation, "Come ye blessed, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world."

Appropriate hymns may be introduced in service, at Lodge or at grave, in the discretion of the Master. The service is closed with prayer.

PRAYERS.

MOST glorious and merciful Lord God, Author of all good, Giver of every perfect gift, pour down, we implore Thee, thy blessing upon us; and under the deep solemnities of this occasion bind us yet closer together in the ties of brotherly love and affection. May the present instance of mortality sensibly remind us of our approaching end, and may it have an influence to wean our affections from the things of this transitory world, and to fix them more devotedly upon Thee, the only sure refuge in every time of need. And at last, great Parent of the universe, when our journey of life shall be near its close,—when the mallet of death shall call us from our labors,—when the silver cord shall be loosed and the golden bowl broken for us,—in that moment of mortal extremity may the lamp of Thy love dispel the gloom of the dark valley, and may we be enabled to obtain an entrance in the Celestial Lodge above, and in Thy glorious presence amidst its ineffable mysteries, enjoy a union with the souls of our departed friends, perfect as is the happiness of heaven and durable as the eternity of God. *Amen.*

Or this:

ALMIGHTY and most merciful God, in whom we live and move and have our being, and before whom all men must appear to render an account for the deeds done in the body, we most earnestly beseech Thee, as we now surround the grave of our departed brother, to impress deeply upon our minds the solemnities of this day. May we ever remember that in the midst of life we are in death, and so live and act our several parts as we will

desire to have done when the hour of our departure is at hand. And, gracious Father, vouchsafe us, we pray Thee, Thy divine assistance to redeem our time; and in the discharge of the duties Thou hast assigned us in the erection of our moral edifice, may we have wisdom from on high to direct us, strength commensurate with our task to support us, and the beauty of holiness to adorn and render all our efforts acceptable in Thy sight. And at last, when our work on earth is done,—when the mallet of death shall call us from our labors,—when the silver cord shall be loosed and the golden bowl broken,—may we be raised by the Grand Master's word to join the ceaseless song in the Celestial Lodge, and go no more out from that glorious Temple not made with hands, eternal in the heavens. Grant this, we beseech Thee, most merciful Father, through JESUS CHRIST, our mediator and redeemer. *Amen.*

The Lord's Prayer may be used instead of the foregoing as the Master may determine.

PUBLIC GRAND HONORS AT FUNERALS.

Extend both hands downwards, the palms open, toward the grave.

Master says: His body we leave in the earth.

Then both hands are crossed on the breast, the left outermost.

Master says: His memory we cherish in our hearts.

Then the hands are raised above head toward heaven.

Master says: His spirit hath returned to God, Who gave it.

All exclaim: The will of God is accomplished. So mote it be.

The Board has also given consideration to the matter of the relationship of Grand Lodge to the New Brunswick Masonic Hall Co., but it has not yet passed beyond the limits of discussion. The members are well satisfied that as yet the Company has no revenue whatever to distribute among its shareholders, and, therefore, they have not felt that the interests of Grand Lodge will suffer by permitting the condition that now exists to remain. The matter will, however, be constantly kept in view.

I have the honor to transmit to you for submission to the M. W. Grand Lodge of F. & A. M. of New Brunswick the enclosed copy of a Resolution adopted at the fiftieth (1907) Annual Communication of the M. W. Grand Lodge of F. & A. M. of Washington.

By its adoption and transmission it is not intended that the Masonic Fraternity, through its Grand Bodies, shall, in promoting the object of the Resolution, attempt to interfere with the functions of government or suggest a surrender of any of the prerogatives of rulers, within whose domain they severally reside.

But it is intended that the spirit of the Resolution may be brought to the attention of the Brethren through the several Grand Lodges; and it is hoped that the Fraternity will, with other moral forces directed to the same end, so actively exert its influence in support of the principle involved that the conscience and reason of men will be awakened to a realization of the error of war and be inspired with a controlling desire for universal peace.

If the Resolution, even in an infinitesimal degree, assist in that awakening, it will have fully accomplished its purpose.

Whereas, By the exercise of brotherly love, we are taught to regard the whole human species as one family, who, as created by our Almighty Parent, are to aid and support each other:

And Whereas, The application of that principle in the relation of nations to each other is but the extension of the field of its operation from individuals to groups of individuals;

And Whereas, The representatives of the several groups of individuals comprising the principal nations of the world are about to assemble a second time in a Peace Conference at The Hague, for the avowed purpose of promoting the welfare of society;

And Whereas, Some of the governments there to be represented are earnestly seeking to relieve the peoples of the world of the horrors of war and of the burden of maintaining armies and navies, by the disarmament of nations, and are advocating the discussion and consideration, at this and future Peace Conferences, of a plan for eventual disarmament; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Washington, in Annual Communication assembled, that the Masonic Fraternity throughout the world, individually and through its several Grand Bodies, are urged to support the general plan of eventual disarmament of nations by assisting other moral forces in crystallizing in the minds of our fellowmen the principle of universal peace which is but a corollary of the principle of the brotherhood of man, to the end that our children's children may realize the blessings of that divine message, "On earth peace, good will toward men."

And, be it Further Resolved, That a copy of this Resolution be transmitted by special communication from the Grand Secretary's office to each Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons throughout the world.

Resolved, on motion of R. W. Brother Thomas Walker, M. D., P. G. M., and duly seconded: "That the resolution be referred to the Board of General Purposes for consideration and for report at the next Annual Communication."

A letter from R. W. Brother Divisich, recently appointed Grand Representative near the Grand Lodge of New York, was read, conveying to the Grand Master and Brethren of Grand Lodge his hearty good wishes for the continuance of health and prosperity.

The Grand Master here stated to Grand Lodge that he had received word from the Deputy Grand Master, R. W. Brother George Coggon, that, through illness, he would be unable to be present in his station.

The Committee on Foreign Relations, through its chairman, R. W. Brother The Hon. J. V. Ellis, presented the following report:

The Committee on Relations with Sister Grand Lodges respectfully report.

That the Lodges in the newly created Province of Saskatchewan formerly held their authority from the Grand Lodge of Manitoba.

Soon after the Territory became a Province, viz., on May 25, 1906, the Lodges met in convention by regular delegates at Prince Albert, and resolved to form a Grand Lodge. The proceedings followed the custom which generally prevails on this continent in matters of this kind, and were in every respect regular. The Grand Lodge was duly formed at a sub-

sequent meeting of the delegates, August 9, at Regina, and the officers elected to preside over it were installed by the M. W. Brother John McKechnie, Grand Master of Manitoba. There were twenty-nine Lodges in the jurisdiction at the time of the formation. A magnificent territory is opened to the new Grand Lodge, and the development of our Society in that part of the country cannot fail to have a most excellent influence upon some of the conditions of life which are often severe in a new country. Grand Lodge is advised by the committee to heartily welcome the Grand Lodge of Saskatchewan to the sisterhood of Grand Lodges and to exchange representatives with it. The Grand Master of the new Grand Lodge is M. W. Brother H. H. Campkin, of Indian Head, and the Grand Secretary V. W. Brother John M. Shaw, M. D., of Regina.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, F. and A. M., of New Brunswick:

The Library Committee of Grand Lodge has to report that, as authorized by resolution, it has acted in conjunction

with the Committee of Grand Chapter. The combined committees met in the Library and agreed that additional shelving should be provided, and the proceedings of the different Grand Bodies rearranged with spaces to accommodate the volumes which may be received in the next few years. This much needed work has been done and copies of all reports to date have been placed in their proper sequence. Some expense has been incurred, which, however, will be fully met by the grants made to the two committees in August last. The grant made by Grand Lodge in 1905, it may be stated, was not drawn, and so lapsed; but the committee recommend that the usual allowance be made for the ensuing year.

And on like motion, also resolved:

"That the election of the elective grand officers be the order of business at 8.30 o'clock"

R. W. Brother James E. Masters, P. G. W., at this point gave notice, under the provisions of section 1 of meetings, that the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge for the year 1908 be held in the City of Moncton.

Moved by W. Brother A. M. Rowan, P. G. Std. B., and seconded by W. Brother W. L. Ellis, M. D., P. G. D.:

"That it is the opinion of this Grand Lodge that no one should be a member of a Chapter or Encampment who is not a member in good standing in a blue Lodge, and that this Grand Lodge memorialize the Grand Chapter of New Brunswick and the Great Priory of Canada to have such a regulation carried into effect in their respective bodies."

The motion was very generally debated, and on being put to Grand Lodge was declared lost.

On motion of the Grand Secretary, it was resolved:

"That consideration of the notice given by R. W. Brother James E. Masters, P. G. W., as to the place of holding the next Annual Communication be now taken up."

Moved by R. W. Brother James E. Masters, P. G. W.:

"That the Forty-first Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick be held on the fourth Tuesday in August next at the City of Moncton."

The motion was duly seconded and was strongly supported by the mover and discussed by R. W. Brothers Arthur I. Trueman and Donald Munro, and on a vote being taken was declared lost.

Grand Lodge then took recess.

TUESDAY EVENING.

August 27th, 1907.

Grand Lodge resumed labour at eight o'clock.

W. Brother W. Leonard Ellis, M. D., P. G. D., presented his commission as the Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Vermont. The commission was dated at Burlington on the second day of February, A. D. 1906, and signed by Walter E. Ranger, Grand Master, and Henry H. Ross, Grand Secretary. On the Commission being read, W. Brother Ellis was conducted to the East and welcomed by the Grand Master.

Moved by V. W. Brother Fred. J. G. Knowlton, Vice-President, seconded by R. W. Brother Thomas Walker, M. D., P. G. M.:

"That the report of the Board of General Purposes be taken from the table and considered section by section."

Carried.

The sections of the report 1 to 6 inclusive were then read, and on motion severally adopted.

As to Section 7, it was resolved, on motion of Past Grand Master Walker:

"That the funeral service contained in the Board's report be adopted, and that it be printed under the direction of the incoming Board of General Purposes."

The final section was approved of, and the report, as a whole, formally adopted.

Ordered on motion: That the reports of the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary be taken from the table and filed.

R. W. Brother Alex. R. Campbell, P. G. W., presented his Commission as Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Virginia. The same was dated at Richmond, on the twelfth day of August, A. D. 1907, and signed by S. J. Quinn, Grand Master, and George W. Carrington, Grand Secretary. The R. W. Brother was then welcomed to the East.

It being now 8.30 o'clock, Grand Lodge proceeded to the Order of the day, viz., the election of Grand Officers.

The M. W. Grand Master directed the regulations governing the elections to be read, and then appointed as Scrutineers R. W. Brothers Alex. R. Campbell, Walter W. Inches and George B. Hegan, Past Grand Wardens, and Brother J. Henry Scammell, M. D.

The Scrutineers took the customary obligation.

Upon nominations duly made in writing and on ballots taken, the Scrutineers reported that the following Brethren had, in each case, received a majority of the votes cast:

On the nomination of Past Grand Master Ellis, W. Brother Robert Clerke was re-elected Grand Tyler.

The above Grand Officers were declared, from the East, "duly elected to their respective offices."

The thanks of Grand Lodge were expressed to the Scrutineers for the careful performance of their duties, and on motion it was agreed:

"That when Grand Lodge takes recess, it take recess until three o'clock to-morrow (Wednesday) afternoon."

Grand Lodge then took recess.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

August 28th, 1907.

The M. W. Grand Master took the East at three o'clock this afternoon, and Grand Lodge resumed labour.

R. W. Brother James Vroom, P. D. G. M., presented his credentials as Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of British Columbia. The Commission bore date the sixteenth day of August, A. D. 1907, and was signed by F. Bowser, Grand Master, and Robert E. Brett, Grand Secretary.

R. W. Brother Vroom was thereupon conducted to the East and saluted with the Grand Honours. He briefly acknowledged the reception given him by the Grand Master and Grand Lodge.

To the members of the Credential Committee the Grand Master extended his warm thanks for so willingly and so well performing their duties during the Communication.

The Committee on Foreign Relations, through their Chairman, further reported as follows:

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, F. and A. M., of New Brunswick;

The Committee on Relations with Foreign Grand Lodges submit their second report as follows:

The question of the recognition of the Grand Lodge Valle de Mexico, stood over last year to enable the committee to get some further information than was then in its possession. As far as your committee can ascertain that Grand Lodge exercises jurisdiction in the Federal District of Mexico in which the capital of the Republic is located. Its Proceedings for the year 1907 indicate that it confines itself entirely to the three degrees of Craft Masonry, that it has under its authority about forty Lodges, with a membership of about one thousand two hundred, three-fourths of whom, the committee is informed, are American and English men. It is recognized by several Grand Lodges with whom we are on terms of friendship, including the Grand Lodges of New York, of Mississippi, of Michigan, of England. As the only Masonic authority in Mexico which we recognized has disappeared and is no longer in existence, as the Grand Lodge Valle de Mexico is exercising what seems to be a judicious and reasonable authority, it is in the interests of Freemasonry to recognize it and to enter into fraternal relations with it, and the committee so recommends.

M. W. Brother F. E. Young is Grand Master, and F. Iglesias is Grand Secretary of this Grand Lodge.

Letters have also been before your committee, asking recognition and relations of amity with the Grand Lodge of the Republic of Guatemala, and with the Grand Lodge of Chili. The committee respectfully ask for further time in regard to these letters.

The committee states for the information of Grand Lodge that harmonious relations have been established between the Grand Lodge of New York and that of Hamburg. The latter Grand Lodge some years ago established a subordinate Lodge in the State of New York, an invasion of the jurisdiction of the latter, which naturally led to the interruption of friendly relations. The Grand Lodge of Hamburg has withdrawn that warrant, and harmony is happily restored between these two important Masonic powers.

A letter has been received from the Grand Orient of Symbolical Masonry, in Paraguay, dated Ascension, 27th December, 1906, giving a list of officers of that body, and asking for an exchange of representatives with the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick. This grand body has eight Lodges under its control. The committee ask for further time in respect of it.

Moved by R. W. Brother the Hon. J. V. Ellis, P. G. M., and resolved:

That the report of the Committee on Relations with Foreign Grand Bodies be received; that the recommendation as to recognizing the Grand Lodge Valle de Mexico be adopted, and that fraternal relations with that Grand Body be entered into. Also resolved: That further time be granted the committee to report as to the Grand Lodges of Guatemala and Chili, and the Grand Orient of Paraguay.

The report of the Special Committee on the Grand Master's Address was then presented. It was as follows:

To the M. W. Grand Lodge of New Brunswick:

The committee to whom was referred for consideration the interesting address delivered by the Most Worshipful the Grand Master at the opening of this session is confident that Grand Lodge will heartily approve of its tone and sentiment and will appreciate the many observations which it contains. The fraternity in this Province is, as the Grand Master shows—as all the reports show—in excellent condition, and we may heartily unite in thanking Almighty God for all His goodness.

All of the official acts reported by the Grand Master this year are in harmony with his general course in preceding years, and must be satisfactory to Grand Lodge.

The old Masonic papers placed in the hands of the Grand Master through the courtesy of the Rev. R. W. Colston, of Welsford, are of much interest, and the time is fast approaching in this Province when papers of this character will be regarded as very valuable. The committee expresses the hope that the Board of General Purposes or the Library Committee will make proper provisions for the care of such documents.

An important recommendation is made by the Grand Master, viz., that the sum of one thousand dollars be transferred from the General Fund to the Fund of Benevolence, and the committee think this, in view of the present state of our finances, may be safely adopted. The growth of this fund in the past few years has been quite satisfactory, and the time is pretty close at hand when at least a portion of its income will be available for practical help to the needy.

The committee recommend that in accordance with the suggestion in the address, the sum of two hundred dollars be placed at the disposal of the Grand Master for the purpose of instructing the Lodges.

The committee is confident that Grand Lodge cannot fail to note with interest the number of deaths of members of Grand Lodge reported by the Grand Master. The record in that respect is an unusual one. The fact cannot be forgotten that several of these were brethren who had lived long, and had left behind them evidence of work faithfully done for the fraternity and the community. The outline, given by the Grand Master, of the career of each of these will preserve their memories, and will display to those who come after us, the appreciation of their contemporaries. In the case of Brother Burchill, the committee recommends that a page of the published Proceedings be devoted to his memory.

At the close of three years of service, the Grand Master may point with great pride to the record of his visitations. He has faithfully in this regard done valuable service to the Craft. He has carried to different and distant parts of the Province the opportunities for fraternal fellowship which our Society creates, with vigor and energy, without the slightest consideration for his personal welfare. He has aroused in others enthusiasm for work of that nature, with the result that brethren have become personally acquainted with each other to a greater extent than ever occurred in our history. Even in this last year, when he might have been excused if he had rested quietly upon his laurels, he has kept up the work with great spirit. In this respect Grand Lodge owes him a debt which can never be repaid. Although he retires from the active duties of the chair, the committee is confident that Grand Lodge will hail with delight his constant presence at its meetings and the continual advantage to be derived from his experience and his fraternal kindness to his brethren.

The installation of officers was then proceeded with. The Grand Master-elect Worshipful Lieut.-Colonel John Starr DeWolfe Chipman, was duly obligated, invested and installed by the retiring Grand Master; proclaimed "Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Antient and Honourable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick," and saluted with the customary honours.

The following officers, elected and appointed, were then severally invested and installed by the Grand Master:



REPORTS OF DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTERS.

DISTRICT No. 1.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick:

Most Worshipful Sir:

Herewith I have the honor to submit my report as Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.

On November 13th last, I paid an official visit to Steven Lodge, No. 37, Petitcodiac, being accompanied by some eight or ten officers and members of Zion Lodge, No. 21, Sussex. We were heartily received by the officers and brethren and had a good attendance to meet us.

The work of the evening was the conferring of the Entered Apprentice Degree on one candidate, and also a Third Degree.

This work was done by the visiting officers from Zion Lodge, and was performed in a most satisfactory manner.

DISTRICT No. 5.

To the M. W. the Grand Master of the Antient and Honourable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

Most Worshipful Sir:

Having been honored by appointment as District Deputy Grand Master for District Number Five, I am glad to say that I have visited officially every Lodge in the District, and can report for all of them a happy and prosperous Masonic year. I have found all the Lodges strong and healthy; and where, on account of limited territory, the membership is necessarily small, the interest and zeal of the members is, if possible, greater than in the larger Lodges.

My first official visit was made to Alley Lodge, No. 14, Upper Mills, on the 25th of October last; when, with nearly

a hundred brethren from Sussex and Victoria Lodges, and from St. Croix and other Lodges in Eastern Maine, I attended the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the institution of Alley Lodge. I was cordially received in the Lodge room, after which the brethren proceeded across the street to the church, which was placed at their disposal for the time, where a very appropriate programme was carried out. Brother John Prescott, the only living charter member of Alley Lodge, was present; as were also the District Deputy Grand Master of the adjoining district in Maine, and a number of distinguished members of the Craft from both sides of the international boundary line. An ebony gavel, with silver mountings suitably inscribed, was presented to the Master of Alley Lodge by Worshipful Master A. A. Laffin, on behalf of Sussex Lodge, No. 7. Every feature of the evening was a success; but I must particularly mention the addresses given by Brother Gray, Worshipful Master of Alley Lodge, and by Reverend Brother George M. Young, of Sussex Lodge, both of which will be long and pleasantly remembered by all who were present. At the close of the meeting a banquet was served by the ladies of Upper Mills and Baring, who are famous for their hospitality to Masonic visitors; and it is sufficient to say that it was one of the most enjoyable ever given in the banquet room of Alley Lodge.

On the 6th of June, accompanied by W. Brother C. C. Whitlock, the present Master of Sussex Lodge, I again visited Alley Lodge, and was well received. On this occasion, Worshipful Master C. G. Chase, of Alley Lodge, and his officers worked the Entered Apprentice Degree in a very creditable manner. One of the two candidates was from Baring, Maine, in the Masonic jurisdiction of St. Croix Lodge, Calais, which furnishes another pleasing example of

the friendly relations between St. Croix Lodge and the Lodges on the Canadian side of the river.

On November 21st, accompanied by Brothers A. A. Laffin and J. Vroom (the Worshipful Master and Secretary of Sussex Lodge), I visited Mananook Lodge, No. 38, Grand Manan. We went in answer to a special call for assistance. Mananook Lodge, with no Past Master in its membership, and its Worshipful Master, Reverend Brother A. M. McNintch, recently removed from the Island, had candidates for each of the degrees, and needed the presence of an installed master to enable its officers to do the work. R. W. Brother Vroom was able, at my request, to give some information and advice to the officers and members of the Lodge. A feast in their banquet room, and a drive of five miles to the steamer, where comfortable beds were awaiting us, completed a very satisfactory visit to the Island; and one which, under the circumstances, was peculiarly acceptable and no doubt profitable to the brethren of this southern outpost of our jurisdiction. It is pleasing to learn that under its present Master, W. Brother Henry E. Fraser, Mananook Lodge is increasing in membership; and that it has recently been visited by about twenty of the brethren of the Lodges in St. John and of Zion Lodge, and has frequently had the efficient help of W. Brother Smith, of Hibernia Lodge.

On the evening of Saint John's Day in December, I had the great pleasure of visiting my mother Lodge, Sussex, No. 7, with Past Grand Master J. T. Whitlock as Grand Director of Ceremonies, and installing Brother Colin C. Whitlock as Worshipful Master. I am pleased to say that Sussex is in good condition, and retains a good membership. In my regular attendance during the year I have, of course, witnessed the work on the several degrees; and I can assure you that, under the criticism of Past Master James Vroom,

who is a member of the ritual committee, the work is carefully done.

Accompanied by the brother last mentioned, on June 13th, I visited Victoria Lodge, No. 26, and was kindly welcomed. Worshipful Master Sharpe and his officers conferred the Fellow Craft Degree upon two candidates. With such Past Masters as W. Brothers Hiltz, Laughlin, Mungall and Watters assisting in the work, I need not say that it was impressive, and that they did not lose sight of the ancient landmarks. The examination, I think, was one of the most complete I had ever heard. A collation in the banquet room followed the closing of the Lodge.

I visited Ashlar Lodge, No. 36, on Sunday, June 23rd, the eve of the Festival of St. John Baptist; and, with the brethren, attended a special service in the Union Church at McAdam, at which Reverend Brother Allan A. Rideout, of Fredericton, was the preacher. The musical selections and responsive readings were well chosen and well rendered; and the procession, which must have included about nine-tenths of their membership, and in which every member appeared in silk hat and dress apron, was particularly creditable. Ashlar is the only Lodge in the district in which I have not witnessed work on the degrees during the year; but from my own knowledge of former work, and the report of a recent visit by Past Masters Vroom and Hiltz, who saw the work of the Master Mason Degree, I am assured that the work is excellent. These brothers report that six new applications for the degrees of Masonry were received on the evening of their visit. This, with the assurance from Brother Young, the Worshipful Master, that his own aim and that of his officers is to do perfect work, is sufficient guarantee for the future of Ashlar Lodge.

On the first day of August, in company with Past Masters James and Edwin Vroom, and Reverend Brother Young, Senior Warden of Sussex Lodge, I drove to St. Andrews to visit St. Mark's Lodge, No. 5. We were hospitably received, and saw the working of both the Entered Apprentice and the Master Mason Degrees. It is not often that the latter is worked so impressively as at present in St. Mark's; and I was especially pleased with the lecture by Past Master A. A. Rigby. At the close, under the direction of Worshipful Master Rollins, the stewards rapidly spread a table in the Lodge room and loaded it with good things. Notwithstanding the lateness of the hour and our long return drive, we were obliged to remain and partake of refreshment with the good brothers of St. Mark's.

On the sixth of this month, I went to St. George, where I was met by W. Brother Clarke, of Sussex Lodge, P. D. D. G. M., and W. Brother Hartt, of St. Mark's Lodge, who accompanied me on a visit to St. George Lodge, No. 12. Here, again, I was received with a true Masonic welcome. In the absence of the Worshipful Master, Past Master Grant occupied the chair; and with the assistance of the Lodge officers conferred the Entered Apprentice and Master Mason Degrees. The work was well done, after which refreshments were served; and, although the evening was very rainy, here, as at all my other visits, the Lodge room was well filled.

At St. George, as well as at Grand Manan, I found the Lodge under the rule of the Senior Warden, because the Worshipful Master, in each case, was the pastor of a church who had been called to another field of labor and had left the district. Another coincidence seems worth mentioning. While the Worshipful Masters at present ruling Sussex Lodge (St. Stephen), Alley Lodge (Upper Mills), and

Ashlar Lodge (McAdam) are within easy reach of their Lodges, and preside at the regular meetings, their places of residence, at Calais, Baring and Vanceboro, respectively, are in the State of Maine.

In closing, Most Worshipful Sir, I beg leave to repeat that it has been a great satisfaction to me to find all the Lodges in such prosperous circumstances and in such good hands.
