The Annual Communication of the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation was held this morning in the Masonic Temple, in the City of Saint John at 9:30 o'clock, pursuant to notice given in the Proclamation summoning the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge.

THE BENEDICTION.

THE ADDRESS

It has sometimes been said that Masonry is not really a religious organization. This is only partly true. It is not a religion in the narrow sectarian sense. And I suppose it is not actually an arm of either the Christian or Jewish faiths. Here in this Lodge we do not ask a man whether he be Protestant or Roman Catholic, Christian or Jew, or even a Mohammedan. And yet we hold to those basic principles which have been adopted, accepted and practiced by all the great religions of civilized societies and nations.

The letter "G" in our Order represents not only the science of geometry, it also stands for God the Designer, Architect and Creator of the universe Who has also created man. For throughout our Order we talk often about the Great Architect and that Order and Beauty which are forever around the throne of God.

In the New Testament — one portion of the Holy Volume — there is a story concerning Jesus of Nazareth and His healing of a blind man. There appears to have been common acceptance of the fact that a man had been cured of blindness. The man himself seems to have acknowledged that fact. But it seems that when a question was put to him he said: "I see men but they are like trees walking." In that ancient story is a parable of present-day life and a summons to recapture the basic principle of Masonry. For in this day of technical skills and specialized equipment and machinery we are apt to see people as objects, as machinery and as implements in carrying out our scheme and programs.

It always bothers me when I read what people in the Board of Trade, and Toursts Bureaus have to say about tourists. You see, they are doing their best to induce more people to come to our Provinces, and they are doing it not because they really like them or are interested in their welfare and their happiness, but because these visitors have money and some of it will be left in our service stations, liquor stores, restaurants and clothing stores. We see only their purses and the money they have. For money is a factor in our economy. We appear to have little if any interest in them as ordinary human beings, with feelings, emotions, fears, anxieties, joys and sorrows. We want them not because we can do something for them, but because they can do something for us. We see them not as people, but as objects and as pieces of equipment.

The great task of Masonry is to let its members know that they are not alone in the world. We must tell them they not only have friends, they also have brothers. We must find that "lost word" of human concern, and share with others their grief, their loneliness and their sorrows and their needs. One of the strongest rebukes I have ever got was not from an angry woman who didn't like church organization, or a member of the Session who disagreed with my theology, but from a drunk. It was soon after the war. That man was finding it hard to settle down into civilian life. And he was drinking. One day he came to my study when I was very busy and almost in panic because of unfinished sermons and a number of other things demanding my immediate attention. Finally I turned to him and said: "Bill, I am very busy. Will you come back and see me later?"

He said: "That is the trouble. You are always too damn busy." He was too drunk then to remember he said it. But I remember. I remember every time I am more concerned with completing my weekly visiting schedule than in tarrying with someone I can really help. I remember it every Sunday morning when I am concerned with the statistics of Church attendance. And every year at our annual meetings when I listen to figures of people and money and groups and organizations. No institution can become an efficient machine without losing the human touch, and it is the human touch which is lacking today.

Not long ago I was visiting a very sick woman. She was not only sick but also afraid. I remarked to her that she had a very good doctor. And she agreed. But she said: "If only he had time to sit at my bedside and talk to me." You see even a doctor can become so concerned with organic disorders, viruses, malignant cells, glandular disturbances that he no longer sees his patient as a human being with psychological fears and a troubled mind.

"Canst thou not minister to mind diseased;
Pluck from the memory a rooted sorrow,
Raze out the written troubles of the brain,
And with some sweet oblivious antidote
Cleanse the stuffed bosom of that perilous stuff
Which weighs upon the heart?"

The M:W: Grand Master expressed the appreciation of the Brethren to V:W: Grand Chaplain for his Service of Dedication and his inspiring address.

It was moved by R:W: Ralph T. Pearson, seconded by V:W: Maurice W. Dalton, that the sum of \$500.00 be taken from the Benevolent Fund as a contribution for the New Brunswick Protestant Orphans Home. Motion carried.

Grand Lodge then took recess until 2:30 p.m.

This past year our membership shows a decrease of 18. I am not alarmed at this as a decrease is prevalent in all jurisdictions. This matter of membership, as I have before stated in our meeting of Grand Masters in Washington was thoroughly discussed and I hope something can be done to increase more interest in our Lodges.

The growth, efficiency and progress of Freemasonry depends not so much in numbers as in a membership in whose character, and life, the strength and beauty of Masonic principles are exemplified.

The ritual work in all Lodges has shown a distinct improvement, due to our Ritual Committee, our District Deputies and District meetings.

Your Board of General Purposes has reviewed the financial status of the Grand Lodge General Account and the anticipated requirements for sound stability in the future. A resolution endorsed by the Board toward this end will be submitted for your consideration.

CONCLUSION

The chief work of a Grand Master, as I see it, is not connected with routine and administration. The Board of General Purposes will always take care of these matters, leaving the Grand Master free to encourage and inspire his Brethren to higher standards of life, rather than higher standards of living — to exemplify the Masonic virtues. If our sole purpose in assembling here today is for business session of Grand Lodge and Proclamation and investiture of Officers, then indeed, we are pursuing only the shadow of Freemasonry, not the substance, and are content with darkness, rather than light. Surely we should go forth from a meeting such as this, rededicated to Freemasonry and its ideals. If we cannot do this today, then it is I who have failed you.

I hope that here in this assembly you have been able to drink from the springs of good fellowship and inspiration and thus being fortified you feel a stronger determination to live your Masonry and all take back to your respective Lodges, a reminder to every Brother that though he be regarded as a speculative Freemason, he is also an operative Freemason — Operative because it is expected that he miss no opportunity of service to his fellow man.

The Lodge does not have to find these opportunities for him; he does not have to search for them, they are all around him every minute of the day. We are each individually responsible for our own opportunities. That is the great glory of Freemasonry. It works through each individual Brother for the uplift of mankind. Where do we find these opportunities? They are all around us.

*The trivial round, the common task,
Will furnish all we need to ask,
Room to deny ourselves, a road
That brings us daily nearer God.*

Brethren, my special message to you is this:

Let us go forth from this meeting determined to live our Freemasonry, to do good wherever we can. May the characteristic of our Freemasonry be service to one's fellow man in the best and widest sense without any thought of material gain. Wherever there is an opportunity to perform a kind-

ness, to help someone along life's road, may every Freemason be prepared to accept this challenge in the support of the words of Isaiah: "I heard the voice of the Lord saying, whom shall I send, and who will go for us, then said I, here am I, send me."

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GENERAL PURPOSES

TO THE GRAND LODGE OF FREE AND ACCEPTED
MASONS OF NEW BRUNSWICK:

Five meetings of the Board of General Purposes have been held throughout the year, all of which have been exceptionally well attended.

Routine matters pertaining to the Craft were presented, all of which were discussed and debated and in most cases

resolved and disposed of. However, there are a few items requiring additional information which have been left for the consideration of the future Board.

At the regular meeting of the Board held June 21st, 1961, R:W: Brother Chesley Raymond Bateman, Senior Grand Warden, was duly elected Vice President of the Board.

The following members were appointed by the M:W: Grand Master to administer the Fund of Benevolence.

The recommendations contained in the 1961 Address of Past Grand Master Thomas received due consideration and many of these recommendations were implemented.

Other matters which received the attention of your Board will be referred to in later reports of the Committee, such as Ritual, Jurisprudence, etc.

An item of great importance and of no little concern to the Board is the finances of this Grand Body.

After a thorough and exhaustive examination of all the vital aspects of this important question, an increase in the per capita of 50 cents was recommended and will be presented later (in) this agenda, at which time, your serious, practical, and intelligent consideration is respectfully solicited.

On the fiftieth anniversary of Tweedie Lodge No. 41, permission had been obtained by the Lodge to hold the banquet on Friday evening, October 13th, 1961, not the night of meeting, but it corresponded to the exact anniversary of fifty years. The Lodge opened in due form with the Master Mason Degree at 7:30 p.m. The M:W: Master, Charles D. Dickison, and Officers of Grand Lodge entered and were welcomed by the Master of the Lodge, Wor. Bro. C. Alex. Pincombe. The Officers of Grand Lodge vacated their stations which were assumed by the Officers of Grand Lodge. After the usual exchange of courtesies the Officers of Grand Lodge vacated the offices of Grand Lodge and Wor. Bro. Pincombe assumed the East and West. Wor. Bro. W. R. Rodd to read the Minutes of the meeting of the Lodge fifty years ago. The Lodge conferred the Fellow Craft Degree on Jacob William Pincombe and George William Foster, Brother Jacob Pincombe being the father of the Master of the Lodge. At the next meeting of the Lodge the Master had the out-privilege of Raising his own father to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason. The Grand Lodge now withdrew, the banquet was closed and all proceeded to the banquet room where supper was served; greetings read from outside Lodges and the Grand Master was heard in an address. Brother Gregory Bridges, son of Grand Master Bridges who was present; also three Past Grand Masters, Past Grand Brethren Hoyt, Thomas and Robinson. The Master's Degree was conferred during the Lodge session by a staff of officers, the oldest living, Bro. A. R. Bennett, occupying the East.

The annual roll call of Acacia Lodge No. 49 was held on Friday evening, October 23, 1961. On this occasion the roll call which is a feature of the year in Acacia Lodge, was conducted differently. Instead of reading the long list of names during the session three tables were placed in the hall and as each member of the Lodge entered he was directed to one of the tables and his attendance duly noted. There was an excellent response to the call. The Grand Master paid an Official Visit. Four Past Grand Masters were in attendance:—R:W: Brethren Hoyt, Pearson,

Master Fred Forbes assumed the East and a demonstration was conducted by Wor. Bro. Ted Horton, assisted by Bro. Murray and three new members. Bro. Horton read the connecting parts and the object of the demonstration was to show the development of the salient features of Freemasonry down to the present time. The demonstration was followed by an excellent address by the Grand Master. Grand Lodge withdrew and, after closing, all proceeded to the banquet room where a feature of the meal was a lobster stew prepared by Wor. Bro. Oulton, Master of Westmorland Lodge of Port Elgin, and four of his members. These men are expert in this preparation. During the banquet Bro. Forbes was presented with a double stroller, as on Friday his wife had born him twins—a boy and a girl. Needless to say, when Bro. Forbes saw the stroller being passed in over the heads of those assembled, he was so surprised his face was a study. However, he rose to the occasion manfully and made a graceful thank you speech. Attendance reported: Present 108, by letter 107, by proxy 7, total 222.

On the night of December 28th, 1961, I had the honor of conducting the Installation of the Master and Officers of Keith—my mother Lodge. Wor. David J. Arsenault is the Master this year. Also I was granted the courtesy of assisting Rt. Wor. Bro. Hoyt in the installation ceremonies of Acacia Lodge No. 49 on January 13th, 1962. Also V:W: L. W. Vincent, D. D. G. M. of District No. 7, in the installation of the Officers of Tweedie Lodge for 1962. And V:W: E. E. Lewis granted me the same courtesy when on December 27th, he installed Wor. Bro. Kenneth W. Forbes in Coverdale Lodge.

On February 28th I visited Botsford Chapter, R. A. M., on invitation as Grand Historian. That was their 800th regular Convocation. The evening closed with moving pictures of a very highly moral character.

In the regular monthly communication of Salisbury Lodge of March 2nd I dedicated a beautiful copy of the Bible and

also a set of Bible markers—a gift of Very Worshipful Brother George C. Robinson.

On the evening of Maundy Thursday, April 19th, 1962, your Grand Historian accepted an invitation to address the members of Harington Chapter Rose Croix. The welcome was most cordial at this impressive ceremony.

It has been a sheer delight to accompany our Grand Master on a number of his official visits. I commend the issuing of the schedule card announcing his visits in advance. He is laboring tirelessly, incessantly and efficiently and has already won an abiding place in the affections of the entire membership.

The Ritual committee are continuing their efforts toward a uniform ritual rendering throughout the Jurisdiction. Much of their work is accomplished in the District meetings. The method is for a Lodge to demonstrate a Degree and at its close to be commented upon by the committee and questions by the Brethren answered by them. R:W: Past Grand Masters Hoyt and Pearson have been most faithful in this effort. I attended that of District No. 2, Saturday, April 14th, afternoon and evening. The District Deputy Grand Master, Lloyd W. Vincent, presided and the meetings were held in the Moncton Masonic Temple under the auspices of Keith and Tweedie Lodges. A complete record of the proceedings was provided for our files by Wor. Bro. H. A. Nichol, who acted as secretary throughout the sessions.

May 9th, 1962, the family of the late Past Grand Master Guy Henson Humphrey presented The Corinthian Lodge No. 13, of Hampton Station, with a Hammond organ in memory of their distinguished relative. The presentation was made on behalf of the family by R:W: the Deputy Grand Master

of Masons in New Brunswick, William J. Summerville. The gift was accepted on behalf of the Lodge by Worshipful Master E. C. Crossman. The motion of thanks to the family on behalf of the Lodge was made by the organist, Wor. Bro. G. Kenneth Robb, and seconded by V:W: Bro. George H. Coleman, D. D. G. M. Psalm 150 was read by the Chaplain of the Lodge, Wor. Bro. Alan N. MacGowan, and the Memorial Prayer was led by Wor. Bro. George H. MacLean. The hymn "Blest Be the Tie That Binds" was sung and the organist gave a seven-minute recital on the new organ. R:W: Bro. Guy Humphrey was raised in 1905, Worshipful Master 1912, Grand Master 1936-37, and passed to the Grand Lodge above on February 8th, 1961.

Your committee must again call attention to the use of the canvas instead of the bier and hopes for the dignity and good of our Fraternity this change will be attended to at once.

In a great number of Lodges it is seemingly a practice to substitute electric lights for burning tapers, which practice we believe should be stopped and burning tapers used, particularly in the Entered Apprentice Degree, when these tapers (or candles) should be placed at the altar in a triangular form.

The committee has completed the Funeral Service for a chapel or funeral home and this will be multigraphed and copies forwarded to all Lodges for comment and use and if approved will be finally passed for permanent printing at next year's meeting of Grand Lodge.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RELATIONS WITH FOREIGN LODGES

R:W: Arthur S. Robinson presented a verbal report in respect to Foreign Relations with Other Grand Jurisdictions that no further recommendations be made for recognition at the present time.

REPORT OF JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE

R:W: Bro. Henry D. Hopkins reported on behalf of the Jurisprudence Committee that no contentious questions had been submitted to the committee and that one question in respect to a petition for incorporation would be dealt with in the near future after some further research had been made.

These reports were regularly received and adopted to be entered in full in the Proceedings.

Money Grants: It was moved by R:W: Bro. D. A. Somerville, seconded by R:W: Bro. Carl H. Jarvis, and carried, that the following grants of money be approved by Grand Lodge: For the Grand Master, \$500.00; for the Grand Historian, \$100.00 (if required); for Committee on Masonic Education \$500.00 (if required).

NEW BUSINESS

Motion by Deputy Grand Master R:W: William J. Summerville was introduced as follows: "To move that the Constitution and General Regulations be amended by striking out the words "one dollar" in the last line on page 76 of the 1960 edition under the heading of Fees, and substitution therefor, the words "one dollar fifty cents." The said Section will then read as follows: "For every member, each Lodge shall pay towards the fund for Grand Lodge Purposes, one dollar fifty cents per annum."

This motion was seconded by Wor. Bro. H. W. Forbes.

Several members spoke to the question advocating that more time be permitted to study the question of an increase in the per capita assessment and it was finally moved in amendment by V:W: Bro. M. W. Dalton, and seconded by R:W: Bro. E. H. Cameron that the action re the advance in dues be set over for one year to enable the Past Masters present to take this up with their respective Lodges.

This amendment was carried by a majority vote.

A motion to take recess was then adopted to resume at 8:00 p.m., the first order of business to be the election of Grand Lodge Officers.

The annual banquet at 6:30 p.m., in the banquet hall of the Masonic Temple under the auspices of the Entertainment Committee of Grand Lodge was greatly enjoyed by a capacity number.

The special speaker for this occasion was the Hon. G. Percy Burchill, Past Grand Master of this Grand Jurisdiction whose inspiring address was received with enthusiasm and greatly appreciated by all the Brethren present.




