

ANNUAL MEETING

May 23rd, 1963, Saint John, N. B.

The Annual Communication of the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation was held this morning in the Masonic Temple, in the City of Saint John at 9:30 o'clock, pursuant to notice given in the Proclamation summoning the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge.

R:W: Maurice W. Dalton, Deputy Grand Master, President, was in the chair.

Those present are listed as being in attendance at Grand Lodge.

The meeting was called to order at the hour appointed by the President, R:W: Brother Maurice W. Dalton, Deputy Grand Master.

R:W: Brother Albert G. Hoar, Grand Treasurer, presented and read a statement of the Corporation's accounts for the past year, copies of which had been previously distributed to the Brethren present. This statement set forth the receipts and expenditures of General Account, Fund of Benevolence, Regalia Account and Liability Insurance Account. The Grand Treasurer's Statement had previously been considered and adopted by the Board of Directors of the Grand Lodge Corporation.

On motion of R:W: Brother D. A. Somerville, seconded by Wor. Bro. Carl H. Jarvis, the statement of the Grand Treasurer was received and laid on the table.

The Audit Committee submitted a detailed report as to the Accounts and on motion of R:W: Bro. James S. Hoyt, seconded by R:W: Bro. R. D. Baird, and adopted:

"That the accounts of the R:W: Grand Treasurer be taken from the table; that they and the report of the Auditors as printed and in the hands of the Brethren be received and that they both be presented to Grand Lodge with a view of being printed in the Annual Proceedings."

AFTERNOON SESSION OF GRAND LODGE

Deputy Grand Master, R:W: M. W. Dalton, assumed the Grand East and the M:W: Grand Master delivered the following address:—

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE
OF NEW BRUNSWICK:

BRETHREN:

Once again it is my pleasure and honor to welcome you to this our Ninety-sixth Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, Free and Accepted Masons, and to submit my report as your Grand Master.

In a few short hours I will pass the gavel of authority to another. I stand before you grateful and humble: Grateful for the high honor this Grand Lodge conferred in elevating me to the highest station within the power of Masons to confer, offering me an opportunity to be of service to the Craft. I feel most humble when I realize that so little has been accomplished when there is so much to be done. I have tried my best, the judgment you will pass on my services I leave to your charity. For me it has been a wonderful two years.

I also welcome to this meeting with extreme pleasure and happiness our distinguished guests from other jurisdictions. They, by their presence here, give considerable proof of the spirit of that fraternalism and brotherhood which exists between our jurisdictions. Particularly we do welcome M. W. C. Mac L. Pitts, one of our native New Brunswickers who has contributed so much for the advancement of Freemasonry. We will again be favored with another of his inspiring addresses at the refreshment hour.

May you carry back to your jurisdictions our expression of sincere affection and esteem. We offer you, and all Freemasons who on this day, share our proud traditions, this memorable celebration as an occasion for the highest dedication of ourselves to the fundamental principles of our Fraternity. We ask you to share with us in seeking for new ways to enjoy the common privilege we have of working zealously for this freedom without which Freemasonry could not exist.

As we meet here today, in the atmosphere of freedom, in this land of plenty, we should not forget that many millions of people in other parts of the world are living in a state of fear — *fear* of nuclear warfare, *fear* of hunger, *fear* of oppression. Our life to-day is an endless round of alter-

nating strain and diversion. We live in an age of crowds, with mass movements and mass thinking where the individual appears to be lost or at least reduced to a number; — There are times when it might appear that our great objective, *The Brotherhood of Man*, is but an airy idealism, but I end my term of office with increased faith in the beauty of Freemasonry and its power to bring happiness and peace of mind to all mankind.

To me, the purpose of Freemasonry is not only concerned with improving standards of living or multiplying the accomplishments of human ingenuity, but primarily to teach mankind universal charity, and that all men are Brothers.

I believe the teachings of Freemasonry are needed today, as perhaps never before. I plead for an enlarged vision of Freemasonry, and what it should mean to each of us to be a Mason.

Brethren, during my term as Grand Master which started in May 1961, I have received fraternal consideration and affection everywhere. For this great honor I personally thank every Mason in New Brunswick. It has been a great experience — I shall forever cherish the many kindnesses and honors you have made possible for me to receive. A wonderful co-operation has been given me by all the Grand Lodge Officers, Past Grand Masters, appointed officers and committees. I especially thank the District Deputy Grand Masters for real Masonic devotion, and to my Wor. Grand Director of Ceremonies, Carl H. Jarvis, who has accompanied me on practically all of my visitations in the Jurisdiction and performed his duties with enthusiasm and circumspection.

We mourn the passing from our midst of many Master Workmen who have been leaders in our Craft and faithful to the Fraternity. Their names are inscribed as well in our hearts as also in the memorial pages of this communication.

To their families and loved ones we extend our condolences and sympathy. They have been called to the celestial Lodge to witness the completion of the designs upon the trestle board and where the noon day sun shines eternally.

There is an overpowering impressiveness in this solemn thought that provides an incentive for us to labor more earnestly while our strength endures that we too may enjoy the reward of a well-spent life and die in the hope of a glorious immortality.

To our Sister Grand Jurisdictions whose ranks have been diminished by the Scythe of Time we offer our sincere sympathy and understanding.

CANADIAN AND NORTH AMERICAN CONFERENCE OF GRAND MASTERS

On February 14, 15 and 16th, 1963. It was my privilege to attend the Eighth Biennial Conference of Grand and District Grand Lodges F. & A. M. of Canada held at the Marlborough Hotel, Winnipeg, Manitoba.

The Meeting was called to order by the President, M.W. Bro. Sherman H. Dayton, Grand Master of Masons in Manitoba.

The following papers were presented.

Paper No. 1 — How can we improve the training of Lodge Officers and make them more conscious of their duties and responsibilities? Presented by R.W. Bro. J. A. Irvine, D.G.M. Ontario. Discussion led by R.W. Bro. L. J. Harnum, Dist. G. M. Newfoundland, S. C.

Paper No. 2 — What influence does membership in the so-called higher orders of Freemasonry have on one's membership in and duties to our craft lodge (b) The effect on Freemasonry of tolerating so many Quasi-Masonic bodies. Presented by R.W. Bro. Stuart L. Hodge, D.G.M., Quebec. Discussion led by M.W. Bro. W. Lloyd McPhee, G.M., Alberta.

Paper No. 3 — Loss of Membership by demit and suspension. Presented by R.W. Bro. T. M. Spencer, D.G.M., Sask., Discussion led by M.W. Bro. G. S. Walker, G. M., Nova Scotia.

Paper No. 4 — Should Symbolic Freemasonry extend its charity outside the Craft? Presented by: M.W. Bro. Full, P.G.M., Prince Edward Island. Discussion led by: M. W. Bro. C. D. Dickison, G.M., New Brunswick.

Paper No. 5 — A short history of the Craft based on provable facts. Presented by M.W. Bro. H. B. Donnelly, P.G.M., Manitoba. Discussion led by: V.W. Bro. Phillips, Newfoundland, (E.C.).

Open Forum: Suggested C.B.C. Televised Broadcast on Freemasonry. A Committee was appointed to deal with this broadcast, should occasion arise.

This was my first time to be present at this Canadian Conference. I was very much impressed, probably due to the fact that it is all Canadian. Each Province was represented, with the exception of British Columbia.

It also was my privilege to again attend the Conference of Grand Masters of Masons in North America held at Hotel Statler, Washington, D.C., February 20th and 21st.

The following papers were presented:

Paper No. 1 — Should Masonry attempt a discreet program to inform the profane how to achieve Masonic Membership? Introduction of subject: Lamonie Langstone G. M. of New Mexico.

Another viewpoint on the subject: Raymond M. Rideout, G. M. of Maine.

Paper No. 2 — What can we do as Masons to develop leadership within and without our Lodges? Introduction of Subject: W. LeRoy McKinley G. M. of Pennsylvania. Another viewpoint of the subject: Ira H. Coburn, G. M. of California.

Paper No. 3 — What public relations programmes should be adopted for Grand Lodges and Masonry in General? Introduction of Subject: Clarence L. Bartholic G. M. of Colorado. Another viewpoint on the subject: William S. Christian G. M. of Florida.

This Conference has always been held in Washington. This year by a majority vote, it will be moved about to different places. Next year it will be held in Kansas City.

It was nice to meet with our Brethren at both these Conferences and enjoy the privilege of consulting together, to plan and prepare ourselves for an active programme for the good of Masonry everywhere.

Masonic week in Washington has become a by-word for the greatest blue-print of our Craft ever attempted. It is the time and place where Masonic leaders meet and lay the foundation for greater and more comprehensive activity

and progress. Here are to be found the men who take the lead in Masonic endeavor, who carry back with them the formulated plans for comprehensive and intelligent action.

Panel discussion followed presentation of the subjects on the agenda at each conference. It has been found, in the past that the discussions which has been such an important part of the programme, has been stimulating and instructive, as Masonic leaders of the world at both these conferences meet together in solemn conclave, they talk and plan, discuss and formulate programmes which will make the average Mason better able to understand and appreciate what Masonry can do in a troubled world.

To sit at the feet of these leaders can be a great inspiration and help.

The vital force of Masonry is the determination of Masons to work in Masonry and therefore, to make Masonry work in their lives. We want Masonry to be a force for good in every community. The pattern by which Masons build is the ritual of Masonry. But the hands and the hearts with which to build must be those of the Mason who understands well that a pattern, however wonderful is a guide for the benefit of the earnest worker.

We want Masonry to be a strong factor in the goal of Universal Brotherhood. A troubled world may hide the hopes and dreams of millions who are impressed intellectually and spiritually by the iron of tyranny. Yet it remains for Masonry and Masons to keep alive the spirit of brotherly love by working as though tomorrow may bring about release of those who dream and cannot voice their hopes and aspirations.

We want Masonry to stand for all that it has stood for in the past. Lets work for the things we so earnestly seek.

DISTRICT DEPUTIES

In former years, it was the custom to have a Conference of District Deputy Grand Masters the day or evening preceding Grand Lodge Annual Communication.

I did not quite agree with this meeting as there was very little time to go over all the work which District Deputies are required to do in their visits to Lodges, and some of the incoming District Deputies for the coming year were not appointed until after the annual meeting — which meant that they had little or no knowledge of their duties.

On July 28th, 1962 at the request of the District Deputies a meeting was held in Alexandria Lodge at Fredericton, with the District Deputies from all districts present. The purpose of this meeting was to promote the advancement of the fraternity and what could be accomplished by a co-operative effort of the District Deputy Grand Masters. A number of details relative to procedure and particular experience, etc., were freely discussed and opinions suggested for the furthering of the efforts of the D.D.G.M.'s in the duties of office. The meeting lasted 7½ hours. The meeting was so beneficial and successful, that they asked another be called.

On February 9th, 1963 another meeting was called and held at Fredericton, Alexandria Lodge. All District Deputies were present with the exception of one. A lengthy discussion took place (5 hours) relative to the benefit of the Craft. I can truthfully say that not a minute was lost, with time out only for lunch, and even then the discussions carried on.

They requested that these meetings continue as they feel that more can be accomplished when they are together and can discuss problems of particular interest to their office. I would certainly recommend this request to my successor. The Grand Secretary and myself were present at these meetings.

The meetings among all the Deputies has made the work in each District universal. They are able to take to each Lodge, information which effect Grand Lodge — e.g. explaining the reason for the raise in per capita tax, mode of balloting, placing of lights, examination and obligations in the third degree and examining of records in the Lodge etc.

These meetings are of particular importance for the development of the Craft and especially for the co-ordination of effort in the discharge of the duties and responsibilities of office.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion and as I am about to pass over to my worthy successor the responsibilities of the office of Grand Master of Masons of New Brunswick, I wish to express my sincere thanks to the Grand Secretary, R.W. Bro. A. C. Lemmon for his ready, able and generous co-operation and helpfulness to me in the performance of my duties. His advice and counsel I have frequently sought and it has been graciously and patiently given. I also take this opportunity to express my appreciation of the valuable service and complete co-operation of Mrs. E. S. Henderson, Bro. Lemmon's office assistant. Mrs. Henderson performs her work with promptness and efficiency. She is always courteous and attentive to any duty which may be assigned to her and she takes a personal interest in her work, which involves accounting and the voluminous details and records of the Grand Secretary's Office. I humbly acknowledge that in every particular wherein I have failed in the performance of the duties of Grand Master, the fault has been all my own, for I have had the enthusiastic willing and faithful co-operation of all.

I have travelled many miles by car, in addition many journeys were made by plane and train. It has been a pleasure to attend Lodges in other jurisdictions where I have been received with every kindness and consideration. I regret that some visits necessarily had to be declined due to former engagements.

It is my earnest wish that this Grand Lodge Communication shall serve as an inspiration to each one of us to carry the torch of Freemasonry to greater heights and greater achievement to benefit mankind for the Glory of the Almighty Builder.

For a flower to bloom, the root must be sound — no fruits will grow on a dried up tree — so with good will and clean thoughts — with unselfish love and devotion, we are assured of LIGHT where it is needed. So let us pray for strength to spread the light of knowledge to the best of our ability. So be it.

I have no recommendations, no apologies. Your New Grand Master will be a Man — a Man who will be chosen because he is a man and a Leader. A man who is able to size up the situation, who knows what should be done and who will see it done. I know that we will all give him our most devoted and loyal support.

REPORT OF THE GRAND HISTORIAN

May 23, 1963

*To the Most Worshipful Grand Master,
Officers and Members of Grand Lodge:*

The Masonic Year now rapidly drawing to a close has been one of interest activity and interest. To emphasize this statement I would direct your attention to some of the events and matters of interest coming to my attention during the year. However, I am sure others perhaps of equal interest or importance may have escaped me. Any which are omitted which you feel should have been included are not given because they have not been brought to my attention, for which, as to my lack, I am sorry.

Our Grand Master is to be congratulated on a most successful year. This is due in large measure to his untiring effort as well as to the appeal of his own gracious personality and ability. His addresses have been inspiring toward the highest ideals of Masonic conduct and morality.

This year has been one in which The District Deputy Grand Masters have gone well ahead in learning and fulfilling their duties as true assistants to the Grand Master and the Grand Lodge. The visitations they have promoted and the definite programs they have prepared and carried out to arouse interest have been outstanding. In some cases definite programmes for several months ahead have been supplied to the lodges in their districts thus giving the lodges a definite share well in advance for which to prepare — visitations between lodges, degree work, plays, demonstrations, and so forth.

Another thing which has occupied the attention of these officers has been the proper form of entry of the District Grand Master and his staff when visiting officially. Gone are the days when the District Deputy Grand Master memorized a little speech and delivered it when called upon by the Master "for a few words". One of these men, some years ago, was appointed, it was said, because "he could make a speech." And that speech was made on each visit. All he had to do was to climb into a car and be driven to a certain lodge in his district and, in answer to the request for a few words, deliver the same group of platitudes and the same general observations on what a fine thing Freemasonry is. Then came the lunch and the drive home.

The next change came when some wise old boy who felt he knew far more than any Grand Master at the most embarrassing moment usually at the lunch, when the Grand Master was present, would rise and announce he had a question to ask the Grand Master. Then in his most impressive manner, he would spring the problem on which he had been ruminating the better part of his Masonic life and of which he was sure his own answer was the only absolutely correct one, and which he was prepared to defend to the last ditch. Thus he made his bid for fame until an occasion arose when he was quietly told his question would be referred to The District Grand Master for a decision. This treatment did not need to be repeated many times and a progressive step was made in the work of The District Deputy Grand Masters.

At the present time the powers that be seem to be concerned as to just how much the entry of the District Deputy shall resemble that of the Grand Master on his visits. While all freely admit it was high time for a more impressive entry than in the past when at times he made no more entry than anybody else and often appear in a business suit and was delighted that all that was required of him was a few words, and they were few indeed.

It can now be seen that in these changed conditions the District Deputy Grand Masters themselves are receiving valuable education from their experiences which they are bound to have in the new way and as true ambassadors of The Most Worshipful Grand Master and in facing up to the more important duties which are imposed upon them today. It is an ancient proverb that nothing teaches like experience.

The great advance in transportation and communication in recent years has had a marked effect on the lodges in many ways. The automobile had made it possible to accomplish a visitation in a few hours which formerly occupied a couple of days.

Tweedie Lodge No. 4 exemplified the Master Mason Degree on a candidate in Lodge St. John on the 11th of the current month and a return visit from Bathurst will take place on June 15th. The installation ceremony this year in Tweedie was directed by D.D.G.M. Lloyd Vincent. Nor have the visits been confined to lodges in New Brunswick but have been extended to Nova Scotia and the United

States. Lodges in No. 7 have made several trips to the neighboring town of Amherst, N. S. The most noteworthy one was the trip made by The New Brunswick Lodge No. 22, to Providence Rhode Island to return a visit by Rodger Williams Lodge of that Place. A very comfortable bus was chartered and left Saint John at 8:00 p.m., Thursday April 25th and travelled all night arriving in Providence at 10:00 a.m. Friday April 26th. Invitations to join the party were sent to the other lodges and a very special one to your Historian who happens to be The Grand Representative of Rhode Island near the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick. A sad feature of the otherwise delightful occasion was the death of Wor. Brother Banks' mother preventing him from accompanying us. In his absence Wor. Bro. Harold Stephenson took the chair in the degree. Our boys put on an excellent piece of work. The Grand Master of Rhode Island was present. Rt. Wor. Brother Albert Hoar was made an honorary member of Rodger Williams Lodge in recognition of his work in promoting the trip. Our Grand Master made the trip as did P.G.M. James Stanley Hoyt. The hospitality of the Host Lodge was overwhelming. On our arrival at the Grand Lodge Building we were met by the Grand Treasurer John Nelson and later we were welcomed by the mayor. Our actual visit to the Lodge was on Saturday evening, April 27th, and at 8:00 a.m. Sunday we left for home. Brother Bishop was our driver and landed us all safely at The Port City by 10:00 p.m. I want to pay a tribute of thanks for the great kindness shown me by the Americans and also by our own boys who made it their business to look after the old man of the group the Grand Historian with thoughtfulness beyond words to express.

On Saturday, April 20th, Coverdale Lodge sponsored a degree team of Fellowship Lodge, Truro, N. S., who enacted in costume The Drame of The Master Mason Degree. The work was done by a cast of 29 Master Masons.

A considerable number of 50-year buttons and certificate and honorary long service memberships were awarded during the year.

On January 22nd, 1963, Wor. Brother, John H. Bateman celebrated his 90th birthday and the Wor. Master, Albert Hyslop, accompanied by several of the officers and brethren of Zetland Lodge gathered at his home to present him with a birthday cake suitably decorated with Masonic

emblems and to extend best wishes to this Wor. Brother who has done so much for Freemasonry and the building of Zetland's Temple. He is still active and we hope will be spared many more years. The party was accompanied by Rt. Wor. Bro. Chesley Bateman, Past Senior Grand Warden.

It was my privilege to instal Wor. Bro. E. S. Sherrard as Wor. Master of Keith Lodge, My Mother Lodge; also to assist V. Wor. F. H. Forbes in the installation of Wor. Br. Winston Steeves as the Master of Acacia Lodge. His father, Wor. Joseph Steeves, had a part too in that ceremony.

It has indeed been a great pleasure to accompany our Grand Master on a number of his visits. I was proud to be with him when he laid the Corner Stone of the new Masonic Temple of Lodge Saint Andrew, No. 16, in Rexton, on November 3, 1962.

On May 4th he conducted the dedication ceremony of the same fine building. This proved to be a beautiful and impressive event. It was attended by representatives of 25 lodges. The Grand Master presented the lodge with miniature corn, wine and oil in a suitable case. A brief history of the lodge was sent to me.

Many more items of interest have occurred, not even mentioned, but I trust these will bring home to you the statement that Masonry is really flourishing in New Brunswick and also the importance of each lodge having its own historian to keep a record of passing events bearing on its history.

Always keep in mind that the lapse of time, the ruthless hand of ignorance and the lazy hand of indifference, have allowed many valuable documents to be hopelessly lost or utterly destroyed.

R:W: Arthur S. Robinson presented a verbal report in respect to Foreign Relations with Other Grand Jurisdictions that no further recommendations be made for recognition at the present time.

REPORT OF JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE

R:W: Bro. Henry D. Hopkins reported on behalf of the Jurisprudence Committee that no contentious questions had been submitted to the committee.

These reports were regularly received and adopted to be entered in full in the Proceedings.

Money Grants: It was moved by R:W: Bro. R. D. Baird, seconded by R:W: Bro. M. W. Dalton, and carried,

that the following grants of money be approved by Grand Lodge: For the Grand Master, \$500.00; for the Grand Historian, \$100.00 (if required); for Committee on Masonic Education \$500.00 (if required).

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

At the last Regular Communication of Grand Lodge in 1962 the following Notice of Motion appeared in the Proclamation for same:

"To move or cause to be moved that the Constitution and General Regulations be amended by striking out the words "one dollar" in the last line on Page 76 of the 1960 edition under the heading of Fees, and substituting therefore, the words "one dollar fifty cents." The said Section will then read as follows:—

"For every member, each Lodge shall pay towards the fund for Grand Lodge Purposes, one dollar fifty cents per annum."

It was regularly moved and seconded that this resolution be adopted and by amendment regularly moved and seconded the resolution was laid on the table for a discussion at the 1963 Communication of Grand Lodge. It is now presented for discussion on its adoption or rejection.

This resolution moved by R:W: M. W. Dalton, seconded by R:W: R. D. Baird was adopted by a recorded standing vote of the members of Grand Lodge.

NEW BUSINESS NOTICE OF MOTION

R:W: Bro. Henry D. Hopkins gives notice that he will move or cause to be moved that Section 17 on Page 38 of the Constitution of Grand Lodge (1960 Edition) be amended by inserting the word "The "after the letters "M:W:" in the third line thereof and by substituting the letter "M" for the letter "R" in the fourth line thereof. The intent of this amendment is to entitle the Grand Master to be known as Most Worshipful The Grand Master and to entitle Past Grand Masters to be known as Most Worshipful Past Grand Masters.

This resolution moved by R:W: H. D. Hopkins, seconded by R:W: P. C. Austin was discussed at some length and on a recorded standing vote of the members the resolution was declared "lost".

A motion to take recess was then adopted to resume at 8:00 p.m., the first order of business to be the election of Grand Lodge Officers.

The annual banquet at 6:30 p.m., in the banquet hall of the Masonic Temple under the auspices of the Entertainment Committee of Grand Lodge was greatly enjoyed by a capacity number.

The special speaker for this occasion was the M:W: Mach. Pitts, P:G:M:, Grand Lodge of Canada, in Ontario, whose inspiring address was received with enthusiasm and greatly appreciated by all the Brethren present.

GRAND LODGE RESUMES (Evening Session)

Grand Lodge resumed labour at 8:00 p.m. The first order of business was the election of Officers and the Credentials Committee having submitted their final report, the Grand Secretary was instructed to read that portion of the Constitution referring to the election of Grand Lodge Officers.

The Grand Master appointed the D. D. G. M.'s as scrutineers and the Grand Secretary presented the nominations for the various Grand Lodge officers.



REPORTS OF DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTERS

DISTRICT No. 1

Saint John, N. B.
May 20th, 1963.

*To the Most Worshipful, The Grand Master,
Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:*

It is with pleasure that I submit this my first report as D.D. Gr. M. of District No. 1, for the year 1962-1963.

Having submitted my reports on the individual lodges, I will just give a brief review of the highlights for the year in District No. 1.

Saturday May 5th, 1962, W:M: Hubert McFee with the Officers and Members of Hibernia Lodge No. 3, were host to the Good Samaritan Lodge, A.F. & A.M. from Reading Mass. U.S.A. who were paying an official visit for the purpose of exemplifying the Master Mason Degree, according to the Mass. ritual, on one of their own candidates. The degree work was most inspiring and refreshing, also greatly appreciated by all who had the pleasure of being present. There were about two hundred and fifty members on hand to welcome the visitors.

On October 5th, 1962 the W:M: Officers and Members of Hibernia Lodge No. 3, journeyed to Reading, Mass. to pay a return visit to Good Samaritan Lodge at which time, they conferred the Master Mason Degree upon two of their own candidates according to the ritual of the Grand Lodge of N. B., in a most impressive manner. The hospitality of our American Brothers left W:M: McFee and his Officers with the highest regard for them.

Hibernia Lodge No. 3 is to be commended for the splendid manner in which they have done so much to cement the ties of Brotherly Love, not only this year but in the years gone by.

All lodges in District No. 1, held their annual church parade, with the exception of one lodge, the attendance in most cases was just fair. It has been a tradition with three of the lodges to hold their church parade on the Sunday nearest to the Festival of Saint John the Baptist; St. Martins Lodge No. 30, being one of them, advanced their parade

one week ahead, resulting in the best and largest church parade they have had in years, with over seventy-five members and visitors present including twelve Grand Lodge Officers. W:M: Stewart McCue and Members of St. Martins Lodge are to be Congratulated for this move.

June 4th, 1962. Zion Lodge No. 21, Sussex, held a Past Masters Night, at which I had the pleasure of being present. W: Bro. Lloyd Steeves occupied the East, the position he held in 1955. The Master Mason Degree was conferred upon one candidate. The Senior Deacon on this occasion was R:W:P:G:M: Ralph T. Pearson being the position he held thirty-seven years ago, 1925. P:G:M: Pearson performed the duties of his office in a splendid manner.

June 5th, 1962, being the regular communication of St. John's Lodge No. 2, I was warmly welcomed by the W:M: Bro. Carl Allwood, having no degree work scheduled for the evening, at the conclusion of the business, lodge was closed in due form, and a splendid informal question and answer period was presented by the Educational Comm. under the chairmanship of R:W: Bro. M:W: Dalton, D:G:M: assisted by R:W:B: Geo. B. Ingraham, P:D:G:M: Wor. Robert McKenzie and W:B:A:B: Pipes. Their program was much enjoyed by W:M: Allwood and Brethren.

June 7th, 1962. Regular Communication of Carleton Union Lodge No. 8, Past Master W. B. Robert Hutton in the East, W:M: Roy Merryweather out of town. After the usual business was concluded, R:W:B: William J. Summerville, P:D:G:M: with the able assistance of R:W::B: Geo. B. Ingraham, and the chaplain also G:S:D:, W: Bro. Sandy Buchanan conducted a very interesting Masonic Quiz. R:W: Bro. Summerville gave a very informative talk, pertaining to the laying of the cornerstone of Carleton Union Lodge on July 30th, 1869. At the close of this meeting, light refreshments were served, many favorable comments were heard on the talk.

On Saturday afternoon June 23rd, 1962, Carleton Union Lodge No. 8 held an emergent meeting, for the purpose of celebrating the Festival of Saint John The Baptist, by holding their traditional salmon supper. On this occasion they welcomed you, Most Worshipful Grand Master, and Members of Grand Lodge on your official visit. It was a pleasure to see so many members supporting you at this time, in-

cluding five presiding Masters from this area. W:M: Bro. Roy Merryweather and his Officers conferred the Master Mason Degree upon three candidates. Their work was above reproach and a credit to their Ritual Comm. The attendance as a whole was fair at this meeting.

On Wednesday evening, June 13th, 1962, W:M: Bro. Harold Stephenson accompanied by the Officers and Members of The New Brunswick Lodge No. 22, paid a Fraternal visit to The Corinthian Lodge No. 13, Hampton, N. B. for the purpose of conferring the Master Mason Degree upon Bro. A. V. Henderson a member of The N. B. Lodge. The work was performed in a very fine manner. There were over one hundred members and visitors present at this meeting.

The Corinthian Lodge does not recess for the summer months and visitors are always welcome.

July 11th, 1962. The Corinthian Lodge No. 13 held its regular communication with W:M: Bro. Eddy Crossman in the East, who with the assistance of his Officers conferred the Master Mason Degree upon Bro. Gorman, a member of Hibernia Lodge No. 3. After the closing of lodge, the Brethren proceeded to the banquet hall where the annual Strawberry Festival of The Corinthian Lodge was enjoyed by all and all the berries and cream one could eat.

About one hundred members attended the meeting and later partook of the sumptuous repast, as this is one event the Brethren look forward to each year. At the conclusion of the meeting held on Wednesday evening September 12th, 1962 the Brethren enjoyed a treat of blue berries and cream, the proceeds from this venture were donated to the Crippled Childrens' Fund. My congratulations to you W:M: Crossman, your Officers and Members for such a fine gesture.

August 8th, 1962. This was a very special evening for the Corinthian Lodge No. 13, The Most Worshipful The Grand Master, accompanied by thirty-one Officers and Members of Grand Lodge, visited the lodge in his official capacity.

In a very impressive manner the officers of the lodge conferred the Master Mason Degree upon one candidate. At the conclusion of the meeting, two outstanding members of the Corinthian Lodge, Brothers Alfred J. Brooks and P:M: Alfred T. Leatherbarrow, were presented to the Most

Worshipful Grand Master who had the pleasant duty of presenting the Brothers with their fifty year pins and certificates. The eloquence with which these two fine Masters responded to the presentation was enjoyed by all, the one hundred members and visitors attending.

On October 10th, 1962. W:M: Murray Carson, Officers and Members of Albion Lodge No. 1, were host to the W:M: Stewart McCue and Officers of St. Martins Lodge No. 30, who were paying a fraternal visit, to confer the Fellow Craft Degree on Bro. E. H. Davis, a brother member of Albion Lodge. Fraternally and Ritualisticly it was a lovely evening.

On Saturday, October 20th, 1962 a district meeting was held for the benefit of the nine lodges in district No. 1.

Zion Lodge No. 21, Sussex was host lodge. Two lodges in the district were not represented. I was disappointed that the attendance was not larger, as there were only sixty-five members and visitors present. Nevertheless the meeting was most interesting, with much lively discussion as to the work and its presentation. It was a pleasure to have you, Most Worshipful Grand Master and other members of the ritual comm. present, including R:W: Bro. A. C. Lemmon R:W:E:W: Cameron and four Dist. D:D:G: Masters, V:W: B. Vincent No. 2, V:W:B: Anderson No. 3, V:W:B: Knowlton No. 6, V:W:B: Forbes No. 7, and R:W: B: Morris Dalton, D: Gr. M. In demonstrating the various degree work, the three lodges taking part, W:M: Carl Allwood of St. John's Lodge No. 2, with the Junior Deacon and two Stewards demonstrated the correct way in which candidates should be interrogated before being prepared for initiation, also when the lights should be lowered and returned to full illumination in the first degree.

W:M: Stewart McCue and Officers of St. Martins Lodge No. 30, demonstrated the first section of the Master Mason Degree, and W:M: Eddy Crossman and his Officers from the Corinthian Lodge No. 30, the second section.

W:M: Clifford O'Neil and Officers of Zion Lodge No. 21, opened and closed the meeting in a very competent manner. The Ritual Committee complimented the four lodges on the work as presented and their splendid performance.

To each and everyone who attended and assisted in any way, my sincere appreciation and thanks, also to the host lodge Zion No. 21, for your hospitality.

November 3rd, 1962. The M:W: and Officers of Roger Williams Lodge No. 32, A.F. & A.M. Centerdale, Rhode Island paid a fraternal visit to the New Brunswick Lodge No. 22, and exemplified the Master Mason Degree on their candidate according to the ritual of their jurisdiction. The Lodge room was filled to capacity to witness W:M: Sam Hesketh and his Officers confer the degree. The work was smartly performed. There is a noticeable difference in their ritualistic work and ours. W:M: Harold Stephenson and Officers of the N. B. Lodge present were lavish in their praise of our American Brothers.

December 5th, 1962. A meeting of Master Masons, Wardens and Senior Deacons of this district was held at Hampton, N. B. with the Corinthian Lodge No. 13, as host. One lodge was not represented. During the meeting the directives issued at your instructions Most Worshipful Sir, were read and discussed, and many other subjects concerning the duties of the officers, exchange of visits etc. R:W: Bro. A. C. Lemmon was very helpful on this occasion by his wise counseling and advise, for which I was truly thankful.

April 27th, 1962. The New Brunswick Lodge No. 22, journeyed to Rhode Island in a return visit to Roger Williams Lodge No. 32, there were eight Grand Lodge Officers present including THE MOST WOR. GRAND MASTER, P:G:-M: J. S. Hoyt, and P:G:M: A. S. Robinson who is also the Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of R. I. in N. B. W. Bro. Harold Stephenson I:M:P: took over in the absence of W:M: Leslie Banks who at the last moment was unable to attend, owing to the loss of his Mother. We extend our sincere sympathy to Brother Leslie, we missed him very much.

There were twenty-nine members and visitors with us on the trip.

R:W: Bro. Albert Hoar was made an Honorary Member of Roger Williams Lodge on this occasion. Two candidates from here received their Master Mason Degree. Our American Brothers were generous in their praise of the work performed by W:B: Harold Stephenson and his Officers.

The hospitality accorded us by our gracious host lodge members, will long be remembered by those who were fortunate enough to have been their guest.
