

The meeting was called to order at the hour appointed by the President, R:W: Brother Murray S. Speight, Deputy Grand Master.

R:W: Brother Albert G. Hoar, Grand Treasurer, presented and read a statement of the Corporation's accounts for the past year, copies of which had been previously distributed to the Brethren present. This statement set forth the receipts and expenditures of General Account, Fund of Benevolence, Regalia Account and Liability Insurance Account. "LOOK TO THE EAST"

We meet in this beautiful and historic Temple, not just to transact the business of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, but to look together to the East, so that we may receive that which we most need and most desire --- more light.

Hebrew and Masonic tradition alike make much of the glories of the Temple of Solomon. Long after that Temple had been destroyed by an invading army, the Jews in exile in faraway Babylon looked back on it through a golden haze, and saw it, perhaps, not just as it had really been, but as they dreamed it might have been. But in the days of the Exile there was one young Jew there in Babylon whose eyes were turned not to the past but to the future, who was looking, not back to Solomon's Temple, now a heap of ruins, but forward to a greater, fairer Temple which he hoped might one day stand upon the Temple Mount in old Jerusalem. The prophet Ezekiel, hundreds of miles from his homeland, had a vision one day of a far more glorious Temple than the Temple of Solomon had ever been. In his vision he saw himself at the Eastern gate of this Temple of his dreams, and, as he looked to the East, the sun

rose and the Temple was flooded with light. "The glory of the Lord came into the house by way of the gate whose prospect is toward the

As Masons, we must never be content with the light we have. As we look to the East we must never forget our need, our constant need of more light.

1. We need more MORAL light. Some years ago I submitted some snapshots in an amateur photograph contest. But my prints were all returned ,with this terse comment: "Not enough contrast". Are we as Masons living up to the light that is available to us? Is there the contrast there should be between our lives and the lives of those who do not have that light?

I do not speak of "moral light", of course, in purely negative terms, as if it consisted solely in leaving certain things undone, but rather in terms of daily commitment to a positive pattern of living —"This DO and thou shalt live". Unless we are constantly seeking and receiving more moral light we are not really living.

The old moral standards that were once taken for granted have been badly shaken in our day. Some people even deny that there are such things as moral standards. "It's all a matter of custom", they say, 'just as Christian men take off their hats when they enter a church, and Jewish men put theirs on when they enter a synagogue".

So there is a strong tendency today just to go with the crowd. This is the age of "yes-men". Rather than think a moral problem through, rather than risk the loss of popularity and incur the suspicion of being queer, too many people today will say "Yes" just because the crowd says "Yes", even when conscience clearly says "No".

But moral standards ARE real, a part of the eternal reality of the universe. We need more moral light. We must square our actions, not by the crooked square of popularity and compromise, but by the true square of virtue...

2. We need, too, more social light, more light by which to live together.

Among the papers of Scott Fitzgerald, the novelist, there was found after his death a note he had made of a story he had intended to write, but never got around to doing so. The gist of it was to have been the adventures of the members of a large family to whom a huge estate had been willed. It included a spacious mansion, with the requirement that the heirs, in order to receive their inheritance, must all live in it together. It would have made quite a story, wouldn't it? In fact, it's the story of human life, the story of the world. We are all members of one great family. All men are brothers, and we have to learn to live together in this world, or we'll all perish together.

Personal morality is not enough. People may live moral lives as individuals, yet be members of an immoral society — a society that ignores the universal brotherhood of man - and do nothing about it, make no effort to change society, to make it more brotherly on the local, the national and the world level.

In recent years more social light has been thought of largely in terms of increased social benefits, a higher standard of living for everybody. This, of course, is important. There are many underprivileged people in the world today whose living standards must be raised if there is to be any worldwide human brotherhood. But there is another side to the problem. A generation ago Dean Inge, the keen minded English writer, declared that the future belongs to the nations with a lower standard of living and a higher standard of work than ours. Those words demand our attention today. Have we put too much stress on higher standards of living for ourselves and too little on higher standards of work, on the contribution that each of us must make if there is to be real brotherhood, real equality?

"All men", says the American Declaration of Independence, "are created equal". If we think in terms of talents and opportunities that statement is of course not true. People differ widely in a multitude of ways. The real equality of all men is the equality of brotherhood. So I would present to your thought the level, which teaches equality, and impress upon you our need of more social light, and our responsibility as men and Masons for the promotion of brotherhood in every sphere of life.

3. Above all, we need more spiritual light. We need to know more clearly, and act more consistently on the knowledge that all men are brothers because all men are the children of one Father. We need to know God as He really is, and not as we sometimes let ourselves imagine Him to be. A popular modern religious book bears the title "our God is too Small". That statement is too true of most of us. If we think of God as less than the Father of all, who loves and seeks every child of His, our God is too small. And people who are content with a little God live petty lives.

We who are Christians believe that we can only know God as He is when we look to Christ. I don't hesitate to make that statement within the walls of the Temple. I knew a Christian minister who refused to become a Mason after someone had told him that he wouldn't be allowed to name the name of Christ within the Lodge Room. After forty years as a Mason, I am sure that that statement was not true. To believe in God as Great Architect of the Universe and nothing more is not enough. We all need more spiritual light, and as Masons we have every right to witness to ways in which that light has come into our own experience.

"The temple that I build is great", said King Solomon long ago, "because our God is a great God". In all our buildings, in all our daily living as men and Masons, we are hopelessly handicapped if we are satisfied with a little God. "The temple that I build is great"... may it be true of Freemasonry and of each individual Mason, for we are all builders.

> "We are building every day in the good or evil way, And the structure as it grows must our inmost soul disclose; Build it well, whate'er you do, build it straight and strong and true Build it high and deep and broad, build it for the eye of God".

So I present to you the plumb, which teaches uprightness before God and man, as we look together to the East, praying that, like Ezekiel of old, we may experience the glory and the grace and the goodness of God flooding our hearts and lives.

Neill Osgood as Grand Master and his other officers. Six hundred brethren were present and the ceremony was conducted in a most dignified and admirable manner. I attended the Feast of Saint John that evening and had the honor of extending the thanks of the visiting guests for hospitality extended to us. The ladies accompanying the distinguished visitors were suitably entertained throughout their visit.

On May 3 accompanied by the Grand Director of Ceremonies Donald G. Belyea and our wives, I travelled to Portland, Maine to witness the Installation of M.W. Brother Wallace H. Campbell as Grand Master together with his officers.

The business sessions and the installation ceremonies were conducted in a most interesting and instructive manner.

Wor. Brother Belyea and I were warmly welcomed and I was given the opportunity of conveying the fraternal greetings of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick to the Grand Lodge of Maine. The visiting Ladies were also royally entertained by Mrs. Campbell at several functions.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

During the first year of my term with the approval and support of the Board of General Purposes a start was made toward the setting up of a programme for awarding Scholarships to the children of Masons. A Committee was appointed composed of Wor. Bro. John B. McNair, P. G. M. Arthur S. Robinson and R. W. Bro. Perley E. Roy. This Committee met and after consideration of a

large number of applications awarded four Scholarships and it is expected four more will be awarded next Fall.

The Order of DeMolay also received the support and approval of the Board of General Purposes and two new Chapters have been instituted in Saint John, Ulster Chapter, under the sponsorship of Hibernia Lodge No. 3 and Marco Polo Chapter, under the sponsorship of Carleton Union Lodge No. 8. Both of these Chapters are flourishing and the boys have raised considerable funds to assist in the support of their endeavors and they have also been assisted by grants from their supporting Lodges, Luxor Temple A.A.O.N.M.S. and a number of individual brethren. I am very proud of the success of both these Chapters and I strongly recommend their support by my successor in office and his Board of General Purposes.

Early in my term I tried to sell the idea of having Masonic Blood Donor Clinics set up throughout the Province. This did not meet with the favor of several of the District Deputy Grand Masters with whom I discussed this project. However, one was held in Saint John and members of the Lodges in District No. 1 were strongly solicited to participate. However, while extending our thanks to those who came and donated their blood, their number was not sufficient to warrant continuance of this project. I still believe this would be a good public relations project for the Masonic Order in New Brunswick to adopt.

Your Grand Lodge has acquired this year a Grand Master's Banner and Grand Master's Sword. These add color to our processions and will make the offices of Grand Standard Bearer and Grand Sword Bearer really worthwhile. The Sword has been donated by R. W. Brother G. B. Ingraham as a tribute to the memory of his father R.W. Brother E.R. Ingraham. Your Grand Master has taken the privilege of presenting the Banner to Grand Lodge.

One of the most outstanding events of my term as your Grand Master was the participation of your representatives at the meeting of the Canadian Grand Masters at Montreal on February 18, 19 and 20. Past Grand Master Pearson and Grand Secretary Lemmon having attended these meetings were well aware of their value and importance and your Grand Master soon realized the great opportunity afforded those attending to exchange views on Masonry in Canada. Several outstanding papers were read by Grand Masters and I had been asked to prepare one also.

Our party then flew to Washington, D.C. to attend the Conference of Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries of North America. I was privileged to reply to the address of welcome to the visitors and Grand Master Hodge of Quebec

[May

and Grand Master Collette of Alberta paid a striking tribute to Sir Winston Churchill. This conference was notable for the instructive and informative papers delivered on Masonry in North America by Grand Masters of the highest calibre and with great intellectual attainment.

Your Grand Lodge Ritual Committee have under consideration means of varying or adding to the Degree Work in the E.A. Degree in order that there may be active participation in the ceremony by the brethren in addition to the officers. The purpose is to brighten the ceremony and relieve some of the repetition which at times may seem monotonous. It is my fond hope that the efforts of the Ritual Committee will materialize.

Your Ritual Committee has also recommended to the Board of General Purposes a change in the wording of the penalty clauses in the obligations of the three Degrees in order to remove their archaic wording and make them realistic and effective. The Board has approved these changes and I trust that Grand Lodge will do likewise.

The brethren will read in the proclamation a notice of motion respecting the payment of fees when waivers of jurisdiction are requested. In my opinion the adoption of the change in constitution as set forth in this notice will serve to avoid contentions which have arisen from time to time between lodges in this connection. I strongly urge the adoption of this amendment to the Constitution.

STATE OF THE ORDER

In my travels throughout the Province and visitations to the many Lodges, I found, generally speaking, a good response from the Officers and a desire on their part to conduct the affairs of their respective Lodges in a truly Masonic manner. It is true there has been a continual loss in membership during the past number of years but this is not peculiar to New Brunswick. To feel that this indicates a decline in Masonry is not a correct viewpoint - This to me is a counsel of despair and I refuse to accept it. There is nothing wrong with Masonry and the answer is not "more Men in Masonry" but "more Masonry in Men." A determined effort should be made by all the brethren to understand and appreciate the underlying teachings of Freemasonry and so live their lives that they will be an example to their fellow citizens and so be not only a pillar of strength to the Craft but a bright and shining example to all.

I strongly recommend to my successor in office and his Board of General Purposes the continued support of DeMolay and the continuing of the programme for Scholarships. I urge that more District Meetings be held as before noted and that individual Lodges, when degree work is not avail-

able, take care to provide some items of interest for their meetings such as talks on Masonry, Good Citizenship and not forget the social hour where the brethren can mingle together.

On laying down my gavel, I wish to express my grateful thanks and appreciation to all who supported me so earnestly during my term. The Past Grand Masters and Grand Secretary have been pillars of strength and the members of Grand Lodge who consistently attended with me during my many visitations have also earned my warmest gratitude. May the Supreme Architect of the Universe be with all my Brethren in Freemasonry in the years to come.

The reports of the Grand Treasurer, the Auditors and Grand Secretary were submitted to the Board at the May 1965 meeting and approved for presentation to Grand Lodge at the Annual Communication to be held in Saint John on May 27th., 1965.

Report of the Grand Historian

Most Worshipful, The Grand Master, Distinguished Guests and Brethren all:

The Masonic Year 1964-65 has glided on its inexorable course bringing with it its daily quota of the sad and the happy items. Indeed it has been a year of crowded events appertaining to the Masonic Fraternity in our Jurisdiction. I most heartly thank those who have taken the pains to report to me as the Grand Historian many matters of interest to all who bear allegiance to the ancient craft in New Brunswick.

Our Grand Master Henry Duston Hopkins has been very active and has established for himself an enviable record. On the occasion of his installation of the officers of Keith Lodge, December 30th, 1964 his address at the banquet took the form of an outline of the history of Masonry from earliest times and was most informative and interesting

Tuesday, October 27th, 1964 at an emergent communication of Westmorland Lodge No. 44 two former residents of Port Elgin were made honorary life members of the lodge and were presented with certificates. They were Worshipful Brother Wendell T. Scott, Master of the Lodge in 1930 and M:W: Past Grand Master Arthur S. Robinson who was born in the village. Wor. Bro. Scott's certificate was presented by M.W. P. G. M. of Prince Edward Island. Bro. Stetson of O'Leary, P. E. I. and that to Bro. Robinson Grand Historian of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, by our own Grand Master Hopkins who journeyed from Saint John that day just to be present at this ceremonial. Before the presentation of certificates took place a History of Westmorland Lodge was read by the writer of it. Wor. Bro. Robt. Goodwin. Both Brothers Robinson and Scott expressed their thankfulness for the great honor conferred on them on the occasion. Wor. Bro. Goodwin presented a copy of the history to Bro. Robinson for his collection of Historical Items of New Brunswick Lodges. Many visitors from N. B. and P. E. I. were present and filled the hall to capacity among whom was the Master of Keith Lodge, Moncton, Wor. Bro. E. L. V. Scott, nephew of one of the honored guests. A lobster stew for which the Westmorland Brethren are justly famous highlighted the menu of the of the banquet at the close of the meeting.

Your Grand Historian has been Secretary of Keith Lodge for the past ten years and resigned at the end of December due to advancing years and increased defective hearing. He is succeeded by Bro. Charles Ralph Smith, a teacher in one of the Technical Schools in the City of Moncton. I was asked by our Wor. Master Bro. McLeod to

install Bro. Smith which I did January 15, 1965. We think we have found an excellent man for the position. Rt. Wor. Bro. Algie was Secretary of Keith No. 23 for eleven years. He died Friday April 2nd., 1965 in Acton, Ontario.

News of the sudden death of M. W. Clarence MacLeod Pitts Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Canada in Ontario was received here with deep sorrow. He was a favorite visitor in this his native province.

Wor. Bro. Gregory Bridges was sworn in as Chief Justice of New Brunswick Dec. 10, 1964 at Government House, South Nelson by Legislative Counsel, M. M. Hoyt. Chief Justice Bridges succeds recently retired Chief Justice J. B. McNair. Both are members of the Masonic Fraternity.

Grand Organist Harry Dunlop died June 17, 1964. He is suceeded by Wor. Bro. Kenneth Robb of the Corinthian Lodge who was installed in his mother lodge in January 1965.

Wor. Bro. Jas S. Humphrey is doing an excellent thing by getting out his Corinthian Newsletters for the members of his Lodge. He has forwarded several of them to me for which I thank him very much. Wor. Bro. Humphrey is to be commended for promoting interest in this way. From the very first he has been an outstanding secretary.

Our Grand Master is accomplishing a fine thing on behalf of the youth of the Maritime area by his helpful interest in the Order of DeMolay. Your Grand Historian has the honor of being the first to bring the story of this movement for boys from the Grand Masters' Conference in Washington where he met M:W: Frank S. Land, the Founder and Secretary General of the Order in 1947 but did not succeed in creating much interest. However when Wor. Bro. E. O. Steeves, Rt. Wor. P. W. Drader, Bro. Arthur Williams and a few others took hold of the matter it was not long before Coronation Chapter was instituted about the time of the of the coronation of Oueen Elizabeth II. This was the first Chapter to be formed in New Brunswick. Before long M:W: Chas D. Dickison and a group of his more intimate associates took up the work in the Miramichi area. This order requires the sponsorship of a Masonic body but it is no part of Masonry. It is the altruistic effort to appeal to boys in the "Gang age" - 14 t o 21. In this period of relaxed morals young people have been all too ready to succumb to temptation and the allurements of crime. They must have the support and encouragement of older men. Otherwise they fall away. Brother Land's efforts were crowned with success. Many thousands have heard the call to a better way and some of the great men of our time were members in their youth. Brother Land died recently

leaving behind him a priceless record. Our Grand Master has assisted greatly in giving the Order a real impetus in our jurisdiction. DeMolay meets a need in the life of every boy and provides at the same time an excellent training. The influence of this Order is priceless for youth. The ghastly tales of murderous gangs of boys in the large cities of the United States and Canada should be enough to direct the attention of all right thinking Masons to its claim for interest and support. Organizations for boys must have the guidance and help of sincere men. Left to themselves they eventually give up and drift away. DeMolay is sponsored by Masonic groups but is no part of them, of Masonry itself. Without this sponsorship DeMolay cannot go on. A faulty idea is abroad that a Senior DeMolay can eventually progress into a Masonic Lodge. This is not so. A Senior DeMolay must make a regular application and his application must pass through the same process as that of any other men.

During the regime of Most Worshipful Brother Hopkins there has come into being another thing helpful for the young, that is, the introduction of The Masonic Scholarships for those entering upon, or presently pursuing education on the University level and upon these only. Others need not apply.

I have acquired for our History Department the first minute book of Keith Lodge of Moncton. It is a quaint little book — 8 inches long and 6 inches wide and about half an inch thick. It is ruled like a school register with a row of little squares opposite each name ,with dates above at the top of each column. Each time a brother was present his attendance was indicated by a little line in its proper square. This marking ran right across the page from left to right opposite the name to which it belonged.

The first entry begins thus: "Keith Lodge No. 927 — The first meeting of this Lodge on the 21st of January 1853 when the following parties subscribed to a petition for a warrant". This is ruled in, followed by a list of the petitioners. The pages are ruled in such a way, as I have already pointed out that the attendance of each member may be marked by a stroke of the pen much as an old time school register. These pages afford glimpses into the past that that are most interesting.

Wor. Bro. Ronald Baird, Secretary of Bethel Lodge of Edmundston continues to type in red his selection of a little poem at the lower half of each monthly notice. Each of these teaches some moral of Masonic value. I have been not been able to learn from what source Ronald gets these poems.

Our congratulations are offered to Wor. Bro. Joseph and Mrs. Stevens of Salisbury Road on the ocassion of their 57th. Wedding Anniversary. Their son is Wor. Bro. Winston Steeves, Immediate Past Master of Acacia Lodge Moncton.

We join with the Corinthian Lodge in felicitations to Haddon Hill for having attended 50 installations in the Lodge. This is a wonderful record.

I am grateful to Ver. Wor. Bro. A. M. McGowan and the Grand Secretary for the History of Midian Lodge.

I am grateful to get with the monthly notice from Hibernia Lodge a biographical sketch of the career of our present Grand Master. Thanks too for History of Masonry on the Miramichi prepared by Bro. J. D. Ullock.

To quote from an ancient author "Death knocks with impartial foot at the palace of the rich and the humble cottage of the poor". We extend our heartfelt sympathy to all those who have been called upon to mourn the passing of loved ones during the year. Lists of these will appear in the reports of the Grand Secretary. We note the death of Senator Austin C. Taylor who died January 17, 1965. He was a Past Master of Salisbury Lodge. Your Grand Historian was present when he was raised to The Sublime Degree of a Master Mason. This is also true of Wor. Murray E. Tower, Secretary for so many years of Lebanon Lodge of Sackville. The new Secretary of the Lodge in the the college town is Wor. Bro. R. B. Scott.

Though Sir Winston Churchill was not a Free Mason we should be remiss if we failed to note the death of so great a hero as Sir Winston. He passed away January 24th, 1965. He is the first civilian to be given a State funeral which took place January 30th and was fully televised.

The anniversary of the Order of DeMolay was observed the week March 14th to 21st.

Tobique Lodge No. 48 requires dues paid in advance. Wor. Bro. T. H. Dickison of Keith Lodge Moncton gave me a copy of the consecration of the Lodge No. 7688, May 9th., 1960 which he attended in Free Mason's Hall, Great Queen St. London, England — a most interesting document.

Received a membership report from Carleton Union Lodge published in booklet form with names of members grouped according to year of raising. Several of the other Lodges have done the same this year — all are of historic value.

Several have published in their monthly bulletins notice of the Masonic Scholarships offered this year.

More of our secretaries are now sending me their notices for which I thank them heartily.

I am well aware that many more than I have mentioned in this report are worthy of honorable distinction but I have to curtail words due to limited space.

On Sunday May 11, 1965 at 11 a.m. a service of special interest in Christ Church Cathedral, Fredericton, N. B., was held when the Lodges of District No. 6, under the direction of D.D.G.M. Stanley Dixon attended in a body. The Grand Lodge was invited to attend with the Lodges of No. 6 with the Deputy Grand Master, R.W: Murray S. Speight delegated to accompany them in the absence of the M:W: Grand Master who was out of the Province at that time. The sermon was delivered by Very Rev. Dean H. L. Nutter.

The Grand Master has requested this Committee to consider something additional in the Entered Apprentice Degree to help strengthen it by having possibly all members present, assisting in part. The Ritual Committee has been working on a method of presenting to you a list of the correct words which are so often misinterpreted in the ritual and thanks to Past Grand Master Pearson this list has been completed and will be

presented to you to-day with the hope that the various words will be printed in full in the new rituals which will be printed shortly or supplied to those interested in the present rituals.

We also have a list of procedures taken from notes of Grand Master Pearson which we think will be of interest to Masters and Officers etc. all of which has been approved by the Ritual Committee and will also be presented at this meeting.

The Ritual Committee is always ready to assist and help in any District or Lodge in the clarification and interpretation of our work, and any subject on which there is question of uncertainty will be carefully considered and and procedure laid down for.

We appreciate serving under our present Grand Master who has been a faithful member of this Committee for a long time.

M. of New Brunswick relating to waivers of jurisdiction as noted on page 68, section 13 (1960) edition be amended by adding the following words at the end of section 13 page 68.

"The fee to be collected from the applicant by the petitioning Lodge shall be the same amount as that required by the Lodge granting the waiver. If there is any difference in the fee required by the petitioning Lodge and the Lodge granting the waiver, the greater fee shall be collected from the applicant. If the fee required by the petitioning is the greater such Lodge shall retain the difference. If the fee required by the petitioning Lodge is the lesser, such Lodge shall pay over the difference to the Lodge granting the waiver."

Section 13 now reads as follows:

"If the Lodge, whose permission is asked, consents thereto it must be by resolution, and in writing, the members thereof having been previously notified of the application".
