

OUR MASONIC COMMISSION

In Quietness and confidence shall be your strength. Isaiah 30 v 15.

My dear brethren, I stand before you again in these opening ceremonies of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick to bring you a message for the coming year. Last year we reached what I considered the high point of an Hundred Years of Masonry in this province. All of us can look back upon some moment in Masonry that stands out above all others as far as the individual is concerned. Freemasonry however is not individual but collective, it is a brotherhood, and I feel that our One Hundredth Year celebrations of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick was the high point of our Masonic lives. I feel greatly honoured that as your Grand Chaplain I was able to take an active part in those ceremonies. To be a grand officer in such a year is an honour that is enjoyed by very few.

If we look back into the realm of human history we find that inevitably the great periods of human endeavour are followed by periods of disillusion and degeneracy. We are all reminded at times of those famous words of Churchill, "This was their finest hour." The reasons for this degeneration are very complex. Not a small reason is because it is the forces of evil that are calling the tune and choosing the weapons, and man becomes contaminated by his close association with evil. We therefore have a great advantage in our situation. Our finest hour was one permeated with brotherly love, benevolence and goodwill, and there is no reason why we should not go on from strength to strength in the light and the example of the great year we enjoyed together. We saw that portion of Scripture beautifully exemplified, "Behold how good it is for brethren to dwell together in unity."

There is anxiety however in the ranks of Masonry brought on by the decrease in numbers, and what is more alarming and sad, the seemingly indifference of the members toward Masonry in their absenteeism from the Lodge. Various ideas are being born in the brethren's minds as to the best means to combat this indifference; to improve the image of Masonry in the eyes of the world; and to increase the interest of the already existing brethren. These are good things, great ideals, and an aim toward which all brethren must strive. The question is how are we to do this. The famous Sir Thomas Lipton who made such a success of the tea business had a slogan, "The man who on his trade relies, Must either bust or advertize." That brethren is our solution, we must advertize. That is why I chose the portion of Scripture to be read a few minutes ago, Christ's great Sermon on the Mount, Here is typified the greatest form of advertising ever demonstrated.

Our eyes and our ears are bombarded every day and sometimes all day by the media of advertising. We have in a large measure become accustomed to it and have lost our sense of values. Really brethren when we get at the meat of the matter, modern advertising has become in a large measure an effort on the part of the manufacturer to make a man or a woman into something different, or to seem something different in the eyes of their fellow men and women than they really are. This is false, even if self satisfying. This self satisfaction is the face of selfishness, and it should find no home in the brotherhood. However, the advertising advocated by Christ is quite a different matter. It comes in two short phrases, "Ye are the salt of the earth," and, "Let your light so shine before men that they might see your good works and glorify your Father which is in Heaven."

Does it matter then that we are few? Salt is a very small part of our diet, and yet what a world of difference it makes when placed upon our food. It can make the flattest meal into something worth eating, and yet cannot be discerned because it has become a very part of that which it improves. We must be the same. As masons we are in the world and of the world, and in mixing in the world must make it a more palatable place in which to live. Salt has another property. It is a preservative. Not as important now in these days of refrigeration as it was in the days of our Lord, it still has the same property of preserving that which is good and beneficial to man. This is another way in which we can see ourselves in the true role of a mason, in the preserving of the things that are of benefit to man. There is however a warning here. If the salt has lost its savour, it is fit for nothing but to be cast out and trodden under the foot of man. We must remember this in all our Masonic enterprises. If we are not fulfilling our destiny as contained in the solemn declarations, promises and obligations of the craft, if we fail to observe and to do those things and become a disparagement to the craft, then we are fit for nothing but to be cast out and trodden under the foot of man.

The lesson read today, known and referred to as the Beatitudes, contain what Christ himself regarded as the utmost in human behaviour. Not only in what man must do in the role of peacemaker, or a searcher after righteousness, but also what man must be in order to be the true salt of the earth. Then when he is all these things, what then is the command? "Let your life so shine before men that they may see your good works." I like to place the interpretation a little differently, placing the emphasis a little differently, "Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good work." This is the important thing, that the world may see your good work in the world. When the world sees this it will be the greatest form of advertising you could have, because it would be pure and undefiled by any selfish

motives. This of course will prove unattractive to many people who are looking for the spectacular. Perhaps this attitude will have no appeal for many. Some who have joined Masonry and who will join Masonry will be disappointed in what they find, and will drift away. It will be unfortunate, not for us but for them, because they will be attaching too much faith in the unimportant things of life, and they will be the losers not Masonry. The majority of men in the time of our Lord found His values too hard and unattractive, and turned away. They have faded from the face of history and of influence in the world. But the faith He taught still survives, Masonry also still survives, true to the prophecy of the prophet Isaiah, "In quietness and in confidence shall be your strength."

In our concern for the welfare of our beloved institution, let us beware that we do not confuse the substance for the shadow and cheapen our Masonic edifice by what is spectacular and merely a facade, a false front to bolster up our image. If Masonry needs a false front to commend itself to the world then it is fit only to be cast out and trodden under foot of man. If we have to resort to gimmicks to survive, then it is time for us to die. But we believe that we still have a role to play in the great scheme of things laid down by the Great Architect of the Universe, and this role will be played by the rules that He laid down, and under no other rules. "In quitness and in confidence shall be your strength." It is in the hearts of masons that the strength of Masonry lies, and in the practice of the tenents of our profession in the world that will recommend us to the world.

The principles of human behaviour laid down by Christ in the chap. 5, 6, 7, of Matt, are not some spur of the moment thing, but came into being after one of the greatest experiences of our Lord. After His baptism, His annointing for His great work. He went into the desert to commune with Himself and with God, as to how God's purpose was to be worked out in this world. This is what our task should be in our more humble role. What was His decision? Did He turn the stones into bread to make a feast to attract men to His cause? Did He decide to go into politics to legislate a kingdom on earth? Did He decide to jump off the highest pinnacle of the Temple to make a spectacular of Himself to recommend His way of life? No, there is no other way but by example and service, working quietly and sincerely among ourselves and in the world that the work of God will be accomplished. The Lodge work, the degree work should not be regarded as monotonous, but as a time of refreshment. In the words of Isaiah again, "In returning and rest shall ye be saved." In the returning to the Lodge to hear repeated again and again the great tenents of masonry, should be a time of renewal and strengthening for the work ahead.

When we can show the world that because we are Masons we are better workmen of the human race; when the world sees that the honest values are more important to the mason in business than the non-mason; when a man can see that of all his friends and associates, the mason is the one he most admires, the one on which he feels that he can most assuredly rely, then we need have no fear of the decline in Masonry. In the meantime let us remember that we are the salt of the earth, and being the salt, must let our light so shine before man that they may see our good works and see our good work.

The M:W: The Grand Master expressed the appreciation of the Brethren to V:W: The Grand Chaplain for his Service of Dedication and his inspiring address.

It was moved by R:W: M. W. Dalton, seconded by R:W: C. H. Jarvis that the sum of \$500.00 be taken from the Benevolent Fund as a contribution for the New Brunswick Protestant Orphan's Home. Motion carried.

Motion adopted that Grand Lodge take recess until 10:00 A.M. Saturday morning, May 11th. The first order of business to be the nominations of Grand Lodge Officers.

VISITATIONS

In rendering to you an account of my stewardship as your Grand Master for the past term I would have to report as the outstanding event of the past twelve months, my attendance accompanied by the Right Worshipful Grand Secretary and Grand Representative Very Worshipful R. F. Wright at the two hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the Mother Grand Lodge of England. Time and space will not permit a detailed account of this historic gathering. Suffice to say that to have been your representative on this occasion; to have had the honor and privilege of being present, along with some seven thousand other officers and members of Grand Lodges from the four corners of the earth at the installation of his Royal Highness, The Duke of Kent; and later that evening at an assembly of Grand Masters representing most of the Sovereign Grand Lodges of the known world, to present on your behalf a token of our esteem and respect; to have his Royal Highness, The Grand Master of England, accept our token gift and charge me on my return to convey to you the Masons of New Brunswick their thanks and appreciation — these and numerous other heart-warming and emotional Masonic experiences certainly engender in one a personal feeling of Masonic Maturity of Masonic Proportions (and I trust, justifiable Masonic Pride).

During the term just ending I have been able to make twenty-eight (so-called) official visits, that is visits accompanied by Officers and members of Grand Lodge in full regalia. On nine of these visits I installed the Worshipful Master and assisted by members of Grand Lodge presided over the installation of their slate of Officers.

I shall not attempt to give a detailed account of these very pleasant visits, but I am pleased to report that in every case I was respectfully and properly received, due in no small measure to the recent directions of your Ritual Committee; the instructions of our District Deputies and the efficient performance of the Grand Director of Ceremonies, Worshipful Brother Gilbert Irvine.

I have made a number of drop-in visits to various Lodges throughout the jurisdiction, arriving unannounced without a retinue of Grand Lodge personnel. On these visits one does not find the regular officers supplemented with Past Masters, or do you find a specially prepared agenda. But rather, you arrive and visit in the climate and conditions under which the Lodge is operating and fuller and franker discussions are always apparent.

On October 14th and 15th I presided over an Especial Communication of Grand Lodge and a full report has appeared in the Proceedings of 1967.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

On June 24th due to my departure for the Grand Lodge of England, Most Worshipful Past Grand Master Frank C. Thomas, accompanied by Right Worshipful Brother William J. Bambury, acted on my behalf and installed the Grand Master and Officers of the Grand Lodge of Prince Edward Island.

On July 7th due to my absence overseas, Most Worshipful Past Grand Master Ralph T. Pearson represented us at the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia.

On August 26th a meeting of the District Deputy Grand Masters was held in Fredericton, at which time plans and guide lines were laid down for our Especial Communication in October.

October 2nd assisted by members of Grand Lodge, I installed The Master Counsellor and officers of Marco Polo Chapter DeMolay.

October 20th, I was pleased and considered myself privileged to have attended a Testimonial for our dearly beloved and much revered Most Worshipful Past Grand Master Arthur S. Robinson. It was conducted by his Mother Lodge (Keith #23) in which they expressed their respect, gratitude and affection.

October 27th Head Table Guest of Luxor Temple A.A.O.N.M.S. on the occasion of a reception for the Imperial Potentate, Thomas F. Seay.

November 16th. I was present at Sussex Lodge #4 in Dorchester, when they burned the Mortgage, clearing their Temple of all debt. This Lodge is to be highly commended. What they lack in numbers (only 89) they make up in fortitude and determination.

November 18th. On this date accompanied by Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master, J. Stewart Brooks, and a number of the brethren from the Saint John River Valley and the northern part of the Province, we journeyed to Caribou, Maine, and represented the Masons of New Brunswick in a day of brotherhood, sponsored jointly by the Knights of Columbus and Masons of Northern Maine.

November 27th — I was the guest of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite and members of Supreme Council in Fredericton on the occasion of a Testimonial Dinner honoring Worshipful Bro. Judge R. V. Limerick.

December 9th. At the request of Alexandria Lodge #33 in the presence of four other members of Grand Lodge, in Fredericton Victoria Public Hospital, I installed Brother Robert Burns Gillespie as Worshipful Master of Alexandria Lodge #33.

Wor. Bro. Gillespie was in precarious state of health and was confined to his hospital bed. I regret to report that less than a month later on January 3rd, Wor. Bro. Gillespie was called to the Celestial Lodge above.

December 27th. Due to installation committments, I was unable to accept the kind invitation of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts to their Annual Communication. However, on my suggestion, Most Worshipful Past Grand Master, James S. Hoyt, graciously consented to represent us at this important gathering of Masons, and aided and assisted by the good offices of Most Worshipful Past Grand Master Dr. Thomas Roy, presented on behalf of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, a Seventy-Five year Bar to Bro. Rev. York Adam King, a member of Restigouche Lodge #25, he being one of our oldest living members.

April 27th-28th. I was pleased to meet with the brethren of District #3 at Dalhousie, this being the 100th Anniversary of Restigouche Lodge #25, they being the first Lodge to join the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick without previous affiliation with any other Grand Lodge. The Grand Lodge Ritual Committee was present and witnessed the exemplification of two degrees. The evening was given over to banqueting and social entertainment with our Ladies present. On Sunday a well attended parade with Grand Lodge in attendance was formed and proceeded to Saint Johns United Church where a most inspiring address was delivered by Very Worshipful Rev. Bro. Drillon, a Past Grand Chaplain.

May 1st. Grand Lodge joined the brethren of Sussex Lodge #4, at Dorchester in celebrating and commemorating the 100th Anniversary of their joining the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.

May 2nd. Accompanied by officers and members of Grand Lodge, we attended a like ceremony in St. Andrews, it being the exact date of St. Marks Lodge #5 entry into the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick 100 years ago. On this occasion, the Right Worshipful Grand Secretary presented a detailed and interesting account of the history of this Lodge.

May 7th. On this recent date I was delighted not only to perform one of my most pleasant Masonic duties, but in addition, it was a source of great personal satisfaction and joy to present to two of my much respected personal friends and brethren 50-year Pins in the person of R:W: William J. Bambury, P.D.G.M., and Bro. Stan Rankin.

On invitation and accompanied by the R.W. Grand Secretary on seven occasions we have given short talks and shown slides of our trip to the Mother Grand Lodge of England.

I have been pleased on behalf of Grand Lodge to have presented a number of 50-year Pins, a list of which along with other statistics will be found in another portion of this report.

STATE OF THE ORDER.

This past year as I have visited the various lodges throughout the jurisdiction, the impression I have gathered is favorable.

The quality of the work being performed is indicative of the capabilities of the different Masters and officers. Following the pattern of the past number of years and after a few years of decline, there is now apparent slight improvement. More of the brethren are becoming involved in the affairs of their lodges and an increase in visitations is quite apparent.

A number of our brethren are devoting a portion of their time and talents to the promotion and encouragement of the Order of DeMolay and these brethren are to be highly commended. I strongly recommend that whenever or wherever possible we lend every possible assistance to this worthwhile movement.

Seldom, if ever, has a Grand Master been so ably and loyally supported and encouraged as I have been by the Past Grand Masters, the Officers and members of Grand Lodge.

If perchance we have attained any degree of success in the term now ending, it is in no small measure due to the assistance I have received, coupled with the appreciation of the District Deputy Grand Masters for their positions and the splendid performance of their several duties.

The Grand Secretary and his efficient and charming assistant, Miss Florence Roberts, have performed far beyond the call of their regular duties, and as usual, have been a source of help and inspiration.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GENERAL PURPOSES

TO THE GRAND LODGE OF FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONS OF NEW BRUNSWICK:

Five meetings of the Board were held during the year.

On June 9th, 1967, Right Worshipful Brother Thomas G. Ballantyne, Senior Grand Warden, was elected Vice President of the Board.

Six University Scholarships amounting to \$3000.00 were authorized and alloted to students by the Scholarship Committee.

Centennial Medallions to a total of 460 were provided during the year. Of this number 314 were presented at the Grand Lodge in 1967; 137 purchased by brethren and 9 remain on hand.

Favorable consideration was adopted for the institution of Centennial Lodge (U. D.) at Oromocto, Sunbury County, and the Committee on Warrants will present their report to Grand Lodge on May 11th, 1968.

It is anticipated that the John Beardsley Medal will be available for this Convocation. The committee will report with recommendations.

The proposed Memorial out of respect to the memory of Most Worshipful Benjamin Lester Peters, our first Grand Master, to be erected in Fernhill Cemetery, has been the consideration of a special committee of the Board, who will submit their recommendation.



TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER, OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE MASONIC GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK:

The Office of Grand Historian was established in 1934 and while little was entered in the Proceedings concerning its origin, I am of the opinion that the Grand Lodge in its wisdom was motivated in part by the fact that our Province was then observing its One Hundred and Fiftieth Anniversary. It was also the same Anniversary for the establishment of the Fraternity on a permanent basis in New Brunswick. My predecessors, R. W. Bro. Albert E. Pearson (1934-1937), V. W. Bro. Herbert I. Knowles (1938-1946), and M. W. P. G. M. Arthur S. Robinson (1947-1967) have all added lustre to this Office and I am happy to report that, through their efforts over the years, our records and archives are in good order. It is an honour and a deep responsibility to follow in their footsteps. I shall do my best at all times.

The year 1967 will long be remembered by young and old alike. As Canadians, we observed the Centennial of Confederation and participated in events ranging from local to national importance including visits by members of the Royal Family. Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother, was most warmly welcomed on her brief tour of the Atlantic Provinces, this visit recalling one made by King George VI and herself in 1939.

1967 was also the Centennial of our own Grand Lodge. The Annual Communication in May was largely attended, including Grand Masters from every Province except Manitoba, as well as several from the United States. Among the features was the unveiling of a commemorating plaque in the Lodge Room, and the presentation of Centennial Medallions, Souvenir plates and a short history of the Grand Lodge in booklet form to all those in attendance. The Grand Lodge of Alberta, through its Grand Master, presented a set of three hand wrought gavels to our Grand Lodge, while Northumberland Lodge #17, Newcastle, presented the Grand Lodge with a "Friendship Cup" of sterling silver. Northumberland is the Mother Lodge of M. W. P. G. M. Perley E. Roy.

In order to mark the actual dates, October 9-10, 1867 our Grand Master summoned an Especial Communication of Grand Lodge to be held in Saint John on Saturday, October 14th and in Moncton on Sunday. Well over 200 Masons, including 7 Past Grand Masters and R. W. Bro. John M. H. McKie of Schiehallion Lodge # 1369, Perthshire, Scotland, attended the Saturday Communication, which featured the presentation of Grand Lodge Certificates, suitably inscribed, to approximately forty brethren

who had received the Master Mason Degree in 1967. The entire assembly reaffirmed its Masonic Obligation and then heard five papers dealing with very timely topics. The brethren were then joined by their ladies for a delicious buffet which was followed by a social evening. Good weather prevailed for a Church Service in Moncton which saw over 600 on parade, including the Order of DeMolay, while the congregation in St. John's United Church numbered close to 900. Our Grand Chaplain delivered the Sermon, which dealt with the spiritual and historical aspects of King Solomon's Temple. This sermon has been printed in full in the 1967 Proceedings of Grand Lodge and is recommended to all Masons who were unable to attend the Service. The attendance and programme for this Especial Communication indicated the interest as well as the concern of the brethren, as many of the topics given pertained to the present and the future of the Fraternity. The M. W. the Grand Master and his Centennial Committee are to be warmly commended for making this Communication a great

GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

Freemasons throughout the world observed yet another anniversary in 1967. In June the 250th Anniversary of the founding of the first or "Mother" Grand Lodge in Freemasonry, (now known as the United Grand Lodge of England) was observed in such a manner, that to those who were privileged to be present, it was an occasion never to be forgotten. The magnitude of this occasion may be realized by the fact that 66 Grand Lodges throughout the world were represented by their Grand Masters, with an attendance of 6,600 representing over 5,000,000 Masons from almost every part of the world. The highlight of this Anniversary took place on June 27, in the Royal Albert Hall in London, with the installation of the new Grand Master, H. R. H. Prince Edward, the Duke of Kent. His father served as Grand Master from 1939 until his death in 1942, whilst on Active Service. It is indeed a pleasure to see another link forged in the long chain of Royal Princes who have served the Craft by holding high office. Our Grand Master, together with our Grand Secretary and Grand Representative to the United Grand Lodge of England were the deputation from New Brunswick, and other details may be found in the Address of the Most Worshipful The Grand Master.

Zion Lodge #21, Sussex observed its 175th Anniversary by attending Divine Service on Sunday, June 11, in Trinity Anglican Church in Kingston, where the Lodge was originally constituted in 1792. Upwards of 75 Masons paraded to the Church passing en route the Hill House, the second place of meeting for "Zion" Lodge. The Grand Chaplain delivered the Sermon, and said, in part, "a man who lives in the past is a fool, while a man who uses

the lessons of the past as a guide for the future is indeed wise." A most unusual coincidence was the presence of M. W. P. G. M. James S. Hoyt, a great-great-great grandson of R. W. Bro. Israel Hoyt, first Junior Warden of Zion Lodge in 1792.

September 11, 1967 saw approximately 100 Masons gather in Oromocto, to witness the Institution of Centennial Lodge, under the direction of D. D. G. M. I. Dale Steeves. Every presiding Master in District #6 was present and participated in the installation of officers, which saw Wor. Bro. Stanley Winslow Brown become the first Worshipful Master of Centennial Lodge, U. D.

I am very grateful to all those who have or are helping to bring our Lodge Histories up-to-date. Many have done so and others are doing their part by forwarding momentoes of earlier days. I have acknowledged all such items forwarded to me during the year and deeply appreciate this cooperation. Zetland Lodge # 24, Shediac invited me to speak at their October Communication, and later, to examine a chest which was filled with many valuable curios, some of which were transferred to our Archives by gracious permission.

On November 16, 1967 in the presence of the Grand Master, Sussex Lodge #4, Dorchester, the oldest Lodge in our jurisdiction outside the City of Saint John, burned the mortgage on its first permanent home. This unique temple is well worth a visit and the brethern have been craftsmen in the full sense of the word, and deserve warm commendation in clearing their new Temple of debt.

Our Grand Master was tireless in his undertakings during this year, and conducted a very large number of Installations. On January 27, 1968, at Lebanon Lodge #28, Sackville, he was assisted by a Grand Lodge consisting of no less than 52 Past Masters, certainly a day to remember.

If you were in Bathurst on March 11, 1968, it was not "Scots, wha hae" but rather "Scotts a-plenty" as no less than 10 brethren bearing this surname (one was absent due to ill-health), composed the Degree team. A large number of visitors joined the brethren of Lodge St. John #27 for a wonderful evening.

Restigouche Lodge #25. Dalhousie, is preparing to observe its Centennial on April 27-28. Restigouche Lodge has the distinction of being the first Lodge instituted under a Dispensation issued by our own New Brunswick Grand Lodge.

Many of our brethren have been honoured during the past year for services rendered in the field of public, professional and fraternal life, V. W. Bro. John B. McNair became one of the first Companions of the Order of Canada in July, 1967. It is regretted that ill-health forced him to vacate the Office of Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Brunswick in January, 1968. In the municipal elections held last June, two of our Past Grand Masters became Mayors of their respective communities. P. G. M. Hoyt became the first Mayor of the Village of Westfield, while P. G. M. Pearson became Mayor of the Town of Sussex, entering upon his thirty-third year of consecutive service to this Town. A record of which he can surely be proud. The senior Past Master of Keith Lodge, #23, Moncton, Dr. Harry S. Thomson was honoured by receiving, in November, 1967, the William J. Gies Award from the United States Public Health Service for his long and distinguished record in the field of Dentistry. Another well known Past Master of Keith Lodge, W. R. Rodd, is still practising his profession as a pharmacist, having 67 years service. His daughter has been associated with him for the past 34 years, giving this family a truly amazing total of 101 years in the pharmaceutical profession. Both of these beloved Masons will reach their 90th birthday in 1968.

An official visitation was made to Keith Lodge on October 20, 1967, by Grand Lodge in order to participate in honouring M. W. P. G. M. Arthur Sagar Robinson, who served his Mother Lodge as Chaplain and Secretary for many years. An outline of his youth in Port Elgin was given, as were tributes to his service in many fields, including the Church, Education, Freemasonry and the Independent Order of Odd Fellows. Dr. Robinson has the distinction of having served each Order as Grand Master and holds the highest honours from each Fraternity. Many former students were in the crowded Lodge room, one of which was the presiding Master of Keith Lodge, Wor. Bro. John H. Wadman, The Grand Master stated that the large attendance was indicative of the esteem in which Dr. "Arthur" was held by his brethren. Dr. Robinson replied to the many tributes and presentations in a manner which belied his 86 years. It may be of interest to say that he has served this Grand Lodge as Grand Representative for Rhode Island since May, 1938, a total of 30 years; and in this same month observes his 60th Anniversary as a graduate of Mount Allison University. He is, as you know, our Honorary Grand Historian.

Hibernia Lodge #3, Saint John, in its Installation brochure paid a fine tribute to its Senior Past Master, whom we know better as our revered Grand Secretary, R. W. Bro. A. C. "Bert" Lemmon. Our beloved brother will mark a half century of service in the Craft on July 2nd, 1968. I wonder if any of us fully realize and appreciate the scope of his faithful service through the years to our Fraternity? He is indeed a Mason in the full sense of the word.

Our brethren in the Fredericton area suffered two blows in January, 1968, when on New Year's Day, the Worshipful Masterelect of Alexandria Lodge #33, Bro. Robert B. Gillespie was summoned to the Celestial Lodge Above, and on the evening of the 23rd, Hiram Lodge #6, lost all of its equipment as well as its Lodge Room, when fire destroyed the Zeller's Building. Alexandria Lodge was not slow in offering its facilities which were promptly accepted.

Many of our brethren have been called from us, including a member of the Craft for 66 years, Bro. Weldon F. Boyer, on October 2nd, at the age of 88. Bro. Boyer was initiated in Benjamin Lodge, Andover in 1901 and was a honorary life member of Smither's Lodge in British Columbia. The Immediate Past Senior Grand Warden, A. Douglas Foster, Keith Lodge, died on July 30. Wor. Bro. Alfred J. Brooks, The Corinthian Lodge, died in December 7th. He was in public life for over forty years, including the Federal Cabinet and Senate, and was a veteran of both World Wars. The March Notice of Carleton Lodge #8 contained a sombre coincidence, in that it announced the deaths of the oldest member, Dr. S. A. Worrell, aged 93, and the newest member, Bro. C. P. Chamberlain, who had received his Master Mason Degree only four days before his death. This list is very incomplete and to all who mourn, I extend sincere sympathy.

The 1967 Report closed with a tribute to our late Governor-General, Right Honourable Georges Philias Vanier. The 1968 Report records with sorrow the passing of his predecessor, Right Honourable Charles Vincent Massey in London on December 30. He was the first native born Governor-General, serving from 1952 until 1959. A State Funeral was held in Ottawa on January 4th, with burial at Port Hope the following day. Mrs. Massey, who predeceased her husband in 1950, was the former Alice Parkin, daughter of Sir George Parkin, a native of Salisbury, New Brunswick.

The Order of DeMolay is, at last, receiving increased support from the Fraternity. Coronation Chapter in Moncton held its Installation on November 9th, 1967 with each officer being installed by his father, all members of the Craft. Its Advisory Council suffered the loss of two stalwart supporters of DeMolay in the deaths of Wor. Bro. J. M. Crandall and R. W. Bro. A. D. Foster during 1967. This Chapter conferred the DeMolay Degree in Shediac and Salisbury and attended Church at the opening of DeMolay week. In Saint John, DeMolay Week was observed by a joint meeting of Ulster and Marco Polo Chapters on March 22nd, with a public Installation of Officers for April. The DeMolay Degree is well worth seeing.

In 1967 six Scholarships totalling \$3,000. were awarded to four sons and two daughters of New Brunswick Masons, who are attending university.

The Moncton Masonic Library Board has installed two display cases containing many objects of interest to Masons. The display is located in the lounge of the Temple in Moncton.

A special word of appreciation must be extended to all the Lodge Secretaries for their Notices and notes containing useful information, a word also to the District Deputy Grand Masters for their many acts of kindness, in this, my first year as Grand Historian. I wish to express my gratitude to the Most Worshipful the Grand Master for his many activities which have reflected great credit upon the Fraternity. To Dr. and Mrs. Arthur S. Robinson for the courtesies extended during and after the actual transfer of the records; and finally to our Grand Secretary, who has been most helpful in assisting me in the duties of my office.

It has been an education for me to act as your Grand Historian, although my professional duties have prevented me from making many visitations. Last September the Notice of Bethel Lodge #40, Edmundston, contained a poem entitled "BROTHER-HOOD". I am indebted to R. W. Bro. Ronald D. Baird, Secretary of Bethel Lodge for its inclusion. I should like to quote the last verse.

Brotherhood

Just to work a little harder For other people's good, And to show a bit more friendship My friend, that's BROTHERHOOD.

This report was completed before the tragic death of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. The theme of Brotherhood was uppermost in the work of this great Christian leader and Nobel Peace Prize winner; therefore it is most fitting to conclude on this theme. Our old world needs brotherhood as never before and my prayer is that the Great Architect may so move the hearts of men that brotherhood may become a reality. This is the Masonic message to the world of today.

SPECIAL COMMITTEES PROPOSED MEMORIAL

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge F. & A. M. of New Brunswick:

At a recent meeting of the Board of General Purposes, it was suggested that a suitable memorial be considered to recognize our First Grand Master.

Our First Grand Master, Benjamin Lester Peters, was buried in the family lot at Fernhill Cemetery, Saint John, New Brunswick, and your Board of General Purposes agreed that a suitable Monument be erected in Fernhill Cemetery for him.

The family plot is not in a conspicuous place and furthermore the President of Fernhill Cemetery Company tells us that it would be impossible to get authority to erect a Monument in a family plot as there would be no living person to give us authority.

However, the Fernhill Cemetery Company would give us a suitable location to erect a Monument which is in the center of the Cemetery and would be in the same location as the large bed of roses is located. We would be given the lot, and we would be required to pay \$100 for perpetual care, and the Monument to cost approximately \$400. Your Committee that was appointed by the Grand Master to bring in a report in connection with this, are asking Grand Lodge to confirm this proposal at a cost of approximately \$500.

It was regularly moved and adopted that the customary grant of \$500.00 be allotted to the M:W: The Grand Master for the current year; that the number and amount of Scholarship Awards for 1968 be referred to the Board of General Purposes for their consideration; that pursuant to the request of Coronation Chapter of the Order of DeMolay, Moncton, N. B. for assistance as the host Chapter for the Atlantic Provinces Conclave to be held in Moncton on the week-end of August 24-25, 1968., it was regularly moved and adopted that the sum of \$200.00 of the income from the Fund of Benevolence be provided for this purpose.

NOTICES OF MOTION

The following Notices of Motion to amend the Constitution were separately and duly presented and opened for discussion, and on the votes being called for the M:W: The Grand Master declared the amendments adopted by the Grand Lodge.

Motion to recess until 2:00 P.M. was entertained and adopted; the first degree of business to be the election of Grand Lodge Officers. The brethren repaired to the Banquet Hall where luncheon was served to approximately 250 members. The special speaker for the occasion was Most Worshipful Frederick C. Morrison, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia A. F. & A. M., whose address on the subject "What Have We As Masons To Declare" was accorded rapt attention. The Most Worshipful Brother was introduced by Most Worshipful Brother R. T. Pearson, Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia and the Most Worshipful The Grand Master extended the appreciation of the gathering and on behalf of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick presented Most Worshipful Brother Morrison with the John Beardsley Medallion as a token of esteem.

NOTICES OF MOTION

To amend section page 76 (1966 edition) "Of Regalia" to read as follows: "Every brother who was a member of the Craft in this jurisdiction in the year 1967 is entitled to wear the Centennial Medal in bronze, which was struck in commemoration of the founding of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick in 1867."

The present section reads as follows:-

"Every brother who was a member of the Craft in this province in the year 1884 is entitled to wear the Centennial Medal in bronze, which was struck in commemoration of the introduction of freemasonry into New Brunswick."

To amend section page 76 (1966 edition) "Of Jewels" by adding the following words -

"And/or any other Grand Lodge with which this Grand Lodge is in fraternal accord."

The present section reads as follows:-

"No honorary or other jewel or emblem shall be worn in the grand lodge or any subordinate lodge, which shall not appertain to, or be consistent with, those degrees which are recognized and acknowledged by the grand lodge."

M:W:P:G:M: Charles Daniel Dickison gives notice he will move or cause to be moved that amendments to the Constitution and General Regulations (1966 edition) be adopted to provide that the rank and title of Right Worshipful be designated for the following officers of Grand Lodge, viz: Very Worshipful Grand Treasurer; Very Worshipful Grand Secretary and Very Worshipful District Deputy Grand Masters.

(In detail)

To amend section 2, page 36 substituting Right Worshipful for Very Worshipful in the titles of Grand Treasurer; Grand Secretary and District Deputy Grand Masters.

To amend section 5, page 36 substituting Right Worshipful for Very Worshipful in the title of Grand Treasurer.

To amend section 16, page 38 substituting Right Worshipful for Very Worshipful in the title of Grand Secretary and District Deputy Grand Masters.

To amend section 17, page 38 substituting Right Worshipful for Very Worshipful in the titles of Grand Treasurer; Past Grand Treasurer; Grand Secretary; Past Grand Secretaries; District Deputy Grand Masters and Past District Deputy Grand Masters.

To amend section 3, page 49 as follows:-

"He shall have the rank of Right Worshipful."

The present section reads:-

"He shall have the rank of Very Worshipful."

Note: The rank of Right Worshipful shall have precedence of the rank of Very Worshipful.

M:W:P:G:M: Henry Duston Hopkins gives notice that at the meeting of Grand Lodge on May 10th-11th he will move or cause to be moved the following resolution:-

That the following sections of the 1966 edition of the Constitutions of Grand Lodge be repealed, namely:-

Secion 23, P. 56, which reads as follows:

56

Where two or more lodges hold concurrent jurisdiction the initiation fee for each shall be the same; nor can any reduction be made by any one of such lodges without the written consent and approval of all other lodges in that particular jurisdiction.'

Sections 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, P. 68, which read as follows:-

12. No lodge shall initiate a candidate whose residence is nearer the jurisdiction of another lodge without the consent of that lodge.

- 13. If the lodge, whose permission is asked, consents thereto, it must be by resolution, and in writing, the members thereof having been previously notified of the application. The fee to be collected from the applicant by the petitioning Lodge shall be the same amount as that required by the Lodge granting the waiver. If there is any difference in the fee required by the petitioning Lodge and the Lodge granting the waiver, the greater fee shall be collected from the applicant. If the fee required by the petitioning is the greater such Lodge shall retain the difference. If the fee required by the petitioning Lodge is the lesser, such Lodge shall pay over the difference to the Lodge granting the waiver.
- 14. Should such lodge refuse to give its consent, application may be made to the grand master, who may grant a dispensation.
- 15. The jurisdiction of each lodge extends in every direction, half way to the nearest lodge, except in a city or town where there are two or more lodges, in which case each lodge has concurrent jurisdiction.
- 16. This, however, does not apply to that portion of the City of Saint John situated on the West side of the harbor, the lodge at that place having no jurisdiction in that portion of the City of Saint John situated on the eastern side of the harbor or in the Parish of Simonds, and the lodges on the East side of the harbor having no jurisdiction in West Saint John, or in the Parish of Lancaster.'

Section 25, P. 70, which reads as follows:-

'When two or more lodges hold concurrent jurisdiction, the lodge rejecting a candidate shall be required to send a notice of such rejection to the other lodges within that jurisdiction.'

and to substitute in lieu thereof as Section 12, 13, 14, 15, 16 on said P. 68, the following:-

- 12. Jurisdictional lines of subordinate Lodges in the Province of New Brunswick are abolished.
- 13. A candidate may petition for admission to any Lodge in the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.
- 14. A candidate petitioning for admission to a Lodge holden beyond the residence of such candidate, must furnish to the Lodge to which he is petitioning a character reference from the Lodge or one of the Lodges holden nearest his place of residence before his petition is received.
- 15. If there is any difference in the fee required by the Lodge petitioned and the Lodge or Lodges nearest the residence of the petitioner, the greater fee shall be collected and retained by the Lodge petitioned.
- 16. Any Lodge rejecting a candidate shall send a notice of such rejection to the other Lodges within the Jurisdiction.

(Intent of Motion).

The intent of the foregoing motion by M:W:P:G:M: Hopkins is to provide for Concurrent Jurisdiction for all subordinate lodges in the jurisdiction.

Grand Lodge resumed labour at 2:00 P.M., Most Worshipful The Grand Master presiding and the final report of the Credential Committee was presented, whereupon the Grand Lodge proceeded to the election of Grand Lodge Officers with the following results:—

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick:

I wish first of all to express my deep appreciation of the honor you have conferred upon me in appointing me to this most interesting and challenging office and for the opportunity of sharing in the many notable activities of our Centennial year. This is my second and final report as District Deputy Grand Master of District No. 5.

It has been a most interesting term of office for me and I feel that I have benefitted greatly from having served in this capacity. Rather than list a succession of dates and visitations, I will merely state that I attended the District Deputy Grand Masters' Conference at Fredericton in August of 1967, and was privileged to accompany you, Most Worshipful Sir, on your several visitations in this District.

Also, I was honoured by being requested to give a paper, relative to the poor attendance at Lodge Meetings, etc., at the Special Meeting of Grand Lodge in October, commemorating our One hundredth Anniversary. I have made several visitations to Lodges in the District, and had the privilege of officiating at the joint installation of Officers of Sussex Lodge No. 7, and Victoria Lodge No. 26, on which occasion I was assisted by several able. When the time comes for the lectures to be given, we all have seen how rapidly the crowd thins out and I can assure you, from my conversations with members who have not attended Lodge for some time, that it was the lengthy meetings which "browned them off" and kept them from attending. Therefore I feel that business meetings should be conducted with a minimum of delay and that lectures should be given on an evening separate and apart from the degree work.

In addition to the above, I feel that Lodges are participating in far too few exchanges of Visits with other nearby Lodges, and also are not making their regular meetings interesting enough, that is, meetings when there is no degree work on.

In closing, Most Worshipful Sir, I thank you for the great privilege of having served as your Deputy Grand Master of District Ño. 5.

Bedford Eales at Ashlar Lodge; present Past Masters jewels to Wor. Bro. Essensa and Manzer at Cherry Mt. Lodge; to give a toast in honour of the craft in Hiram Lodge and to reply to a toast in honour of the craft at the Annual Banquet of Grand Lake Lodge. Few District Deputies have the honour to recommend to the Grand Master and Grand Lodge the granting of a charter to a new Lodge. This has been my recent privilege re Centennial Lodge U.D.
