The M:W: The Grand Master announced that this Especial Communication had been called as per the Proclamation for the purpose of dedicating and consecrating Centennial Lodge, to present their warrant and install the Worshipful Master and Officers. Centennial Lodge (U.D.) had submitted proof of their efficiency and the Grand Lodge in session adopted the recommendation that

a warrant be granted to the brethren to be known as Centennial Lodge No. 53 on the register of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick.

The Right Worshipful District Deputy Grand Master, I. Dale Steeves, presented the appeal on behalf of Centennial Lodge and forthwith the M:W: The Grand Master and officers entered the lodge and conducted the ceremonies of dedication and consecration. The Charter or warrant was duly committed to the care of the Worshipful Master. This Charter was the expert craftsmanship of Right Worshipful C. A. MacVey of Hiram Lodge No. 6, now in his 89th year, and a gift by him to Centennial Lodge. It is worthy of note and perhaps unique that the charter members as listed in the warrant are representative of practically every Grand Jurisdiction in Canada, as well as some overseas Grand Jurisdictions.

Subsequent to the dedication and delivery of the warrant, The Most Worshipful The Grand Master retired and Grand Lodge was closed in form.

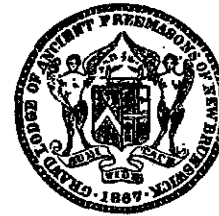

The Most Worshipful The Grand Master announced that Grand Lodge would adjourn to proceed to Fernhill Cemetery for the purpose of unveiling and dedicating a Memorial to Most Worshipful Benjamin Lester Peters, First Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick Free and Accepted Masons, whereupon the Worshipful Director of Ceremonies was directed to form Grand Lodge in procession and transportation being provided, approximately 100 members, in due course, arrived at the place of dedication. Subsequent to prayer by the Grand Chaplain, Most Worshipful Past Grand Master Henry Duston Hopkins, outlined a biography of Benjamin Lester Peter's life as an outstanding citizen and civic official in the community. The Most Worshipful The Grand Master eulogized the contribution of the Most Worshipful Brother Peters in the organization and his continued interest in the success of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick and in the presence of the assembled gathering forthwith unveiled the Memorial, placing an appropriate wreath thereon and assisted by the V:W: Grand Chaplain solemnly dedicated the Memorial to the Glory of God and the memory of the First Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick Free and Accepted Masons. The bronze plaque reads as follows:—

1827-1894

Erected by M: W: Grand Lodge

and on the stone under the facsimile of the Grand Master's Jewel as follows:—

First Most Worshipful
Grand Master
Oct. 1867 — Sept. 1870

Expressions of appreciation were extended to the President and Directors of Fernhill Cemetery Company for their courtesies in providing the locale and erection of the Memorial and to the committee of the Grand Lodge in the completion of their efforts. Following the Benediction by the V: W: Grand Chaplain, the brethren returned to resume Grand Lodge. Despite inclement weather, the ceremonies were despatched with dignity and solemnity.

The meeting was called to order at 5:30 P.M., George A. Blakney, President of the Board and R: W: Deputy Grand Master presiding.

The Grand Treasurer, M. W. Dalton presented and read a statement of the Corporation's accounts for the past year, copies of which were distributed to the members present. This statement set forth the receipts and expenditures of General Account, Fund of Benevolence, Regalia and Liability Insurance accounts which had been previously considered and adopted by the Board of Directors of the Grand Lodge Corporation.

Moved by Jas. S. Hoyt, seconded by R. T. Pearson and adopted that the report of the Grand Treasurer be received and laid on the table.

The audit committee submitted a detailed report as to the accounts and on motion of H. E. Sullivan, seconded by Wm. J. Bambury and resolved:—

"That the accounts of the Grand Treasurer be taken from the table and together with the report of the Auditors as printed and in the hands of the Brethren, be received and be presented to Grand Lodge for approval and entered in the Annual Proceedings". The Benediction.

"Our Father's Business"

The text of my address today is the words of Christ "wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business".

These words have an implication for each of us in our situation, and particularly so as we are all masons with the added responsibility which that brings. To any thinking person it must be evident that in relation to all our activities, to everything which we allow to consume our time (our God given time) we should apply this yard-stick, "Is this doing our Father's business".

Let us examine the situation of Christ at the time he uttered these words.

From reading the books of the Law, we understand that all Jews were obliged to go to Jerusalem and participate in the three festivals, "the feast of unleavened bread — the feast of weeks — and the feast of tabernacles". And in Exodus 34, v. 23, it specifically states, "Thrice in the year shall all your men children appear before the Lord God, The God of Israel". And Jesus being now twelve years old accompanies his parents to the feast.

The age of twelve appears to have been the very age that men children were obliged to appear before the Lord God in these three public festivals. Also, according to the Jewish Canons, it was the age at which they were obliged to begin to learn a trade, generally their fathers trade.

So Jesus was in effect at a crossroads in his earthly life, and he was acutely aware of it. He was aware that as a member of a Jewish household he had certain responsibilities, to which he became obedient, and was subject to Mary and Joseph. But at the same time he was aware that he was the Son of God, and that he had become incarnate in order to fulfill the will of the Father in heaven. And he seems to imply that Mary and Joseph should have been equally aware of the facts. When they accost him with these words, "Why hast thou thus dealt with us" his answer, "Wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business" is at the same time a reminder of what they should have been daily aware of every day of his life with them, and a declaration that at least he is aware of who he is, and that he has a mission to complete. When I say that his answer is a reminder of something they should have been daily aware of, think of the evidence that supports this. Mary was approached by the Angel Gabriel, the messenger of God, and addressed, "Hail thou that art highly favoured, the Lord is with thee, blessed art thou among women", and he declared unto her that "she should conceive of the Holy Ghost and bring forth a son, and he shall be called the Son of God".

Joseph was told in a dream not to be afraid to take Mary for his wife for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Ghost. "And she shall bring forth a Son, and thou shalt call his name Jesus: for He shall save his people from their sins".

The night Jesus was born, Angels were in attendance, Shepherds came from the hillside outside Bethlehem and told of the angels declaring unto them the birth of the Christ Child. Shortly afterward they were warned in a dream that Herod sought the young child's life, and they fled into Egypt, and suffered all the harassments of travel in constant fear for the safety of the child. They were visited by the three wise men bearing expensive gifts. These and many other instances throughout the years should not have been forgotten or ignored. Joseph and Mary should have realized that the very customs which obliged Jesus to be with them at the feast, and the attainment of the age of responsibility would also necessitate an adherence to the will of the Heavenly Father from whom he came.

It could also have been a slight reprimand for searching in and about the city for three days before looking in the Temple, for where else would you expect to find "the son of God" but in God's House.

Certainly the words of Jesus, "Wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business," are not idle words, they are fraught with meaning, and the implication of them in the lives of every person down through the ages cannot be lightly put aside. For each of us has to be about our father's business.

As masons we should be leaders in getting on with the Father's business, when we first entered the lodge room we correctly answered the question, "In whom do you put your trust"? and were then given assurance that we could follow our conductor and fear no evil.

The drama of our entry into Masonry, indeed the drama of all the degree work intermingled with the poignant prayers and the illuminating explanations of what one has observed on his way to becoming a M.M. cannot leave anyone who experiences it without a better understanding of the role he is to play in the great drama of God's creation. Every M.M. should be in possession of the word, not just the pass word of a M.M. but the word of LIFE itself.

He like Christ has reached a crossroad, he has been nurtured through childhood, his E.A. & F.C. degrees, and must now having passed into a higher degree of learning and responsibility decide to get on with the real business of life for which he has been prepared. He must in the words of Christ, "get on with the Father's particular business for him."

In our role as masons there are two ways in which we can accomplish something of the Father's business, they are example and instruction.

In the way of example, we should ever bear in mind that we have volunteered the information, that we trust God, and should live a life that bears witness to the truth of this declaration, and not live as though it was merely that most acceptable answer we could think of. And the most likely answer that was expected of us.

And in the way of instruction we must ever bear in mind that what is worth having is worth sharing, and that what is good for us to know, is also good for others to know, so we should always be diligent in our duty to our brother mason, and assist him in his education.

If I may, I should like to point out that in most instances a person received into our Masonic Fraternity receives a blitz of information over a few short months, and after he is raised a M.M. he is very much on his own. His instruction is over, and except he maintain an interest in observing the exemplification of the degrees on succeeding candidates, masonry will be both boring and irrelevant to him.

I feel that masonry has a great opportunity, and that each of us has a share in that opportunity, which is to add to the knowledge and understanding of God and His Holy Word of every person belonging to the fraternity and overflowing out into the whole of mankind. We must meet them at the crossroad the door of the anteroom, the entrance to the Temple and like Christ say to them, "I must be about the Father's business". If we examine our situation, as we did Christ's we must come to the conclusion that all that has so far been done for us and through us, both by Christ and those who have had the responsibility of bringing us up, that it was not without purpose. Every corrective and instructive effort was designed to prepare us to take our proper part in the Father's business.

This can best be done by following the example of Christ Himself and repairing to the Temple, and there being employed in prayer, praise and thanksgiving, and when those who seek us, find us, we declare unto them. "Knowing me as you do, you should have looked here first, you should have known that I would be about my Father's business".

The Most Worshipful The Grand Master expressed the appreciation of the brethren to the V: W: Grand Chaplain for the service.

Motion adopted that Grand Lodge take recess until 10:00 A.M. Saturday, May 10, and the first order of business to be nomination of Grand Lodge Officers.

Saturday, May 10, 1969, the Most Worshipful The Grand Master assumed the Grand East and ordered the reading of nominations for the elective officers of Grand Lodge which had been deposited with the Grand Secretary. On completion of the announcements, a motion was regularly adopted the election of officers take place at 2:00 P.M., following the noon recess.

Oct. 28th—This date unquestionably was the high-light of the present Masonic term. Supported by a large number of Grand Lodge Officers and members, we presented a Charter, and with appropriate and solemn ceremony dedicated and consecrated Centennial Lodge No. 53, in the town of Oromocto.

Nov. 2nd—Visited Lodge St. Andrew No. 16 in Rexton and witnessed the burning of the Mortgage on their new Temple, and the dedication of new gold regalia by the V: W: Grand Chaplain. Although not mentioned at the meeting, I was informed the mortgage was held by one of their members interest free and without the scratch of a pen—a fine demonstration of charitable Masonic trust and brotherly love.

Feb. 16th—Accompanied by M: W: P: G: M: Pearson and the R: W: Grand Secretary we journeyed to Winnipeg as accredited delegates to attend the three day Eleventh Biennial Conference of Grand and District Grand Lodges of Canada, when I was privileged to present one of several Papers allotted to the several jurisdictions.

On Feb. 20th we moved to Washington, D. C. there to attend a four day Conference of Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries of North America.

At both Conferences we were graciously received, recognized and royally entertained. We all took part in the various discussions. If one single fact emerged, it was that we all face the same problems and we must resolve our own difficulties each in our own way.

May 5th-6th-7th—The Grand Lodge of Maine. There I enjoyed the fellowship and hospitality which we always receive from our brethren in the neighboring States.

Five of our seven districts have held District Meetings and for the first time in our jurisdiction some of these meetings have taken the form of a Work-shop. This type of District Meeting was pioneered in District No. 6, by R:W:D:D:G:M: Dale Steeves and proved very interesting and successful.

It has been my pleasure on several occasions to present 50-year Gold Pins and Certificates to a number of our brethren.

An outstanding event took place Feb. 12th in Albion Lodge No. 1 for two such presentations. On that occasion 15

Fifty-year Veterans were present, by invitation, and filled all the offices of Grand Lodge and several seats in the East, representing a total of almost 1,000 years of Masonic membership.

I never fail to be impressed and oftentimes deeply moved when I have visited Chapters of DeMolay in both Moncton and Saint John. The work these boys are doing is amazing, their ritualistic presentations leave little if anything to be desired, and we are greatly indebted to those members of our fraternity who have given of their material resources to the promotion and support of this worthwhile movement. I strongly recommend that any of our brethren who find it at all convenient, attend one or more of these meetings that they may witness for themselves the devotion and dedication of these men of tomorrow.

As I come to the end of my two year term as your Grand Master, I wish to sincerely thank all those who have supported and encouraged me.

I especially want to thank our R:W: Grand Secretary and his assistant, Miss Florence Roberts.

Our Grand Treasurer — the unsung hero of our economic stability.

Our Grand Director of Ceremonies who performed far beyond the call of his regular duties.

Like many others, I had plans that were never finalized and ambitions that were never realized. A vital organ contained within my breast which had served me faithfully for 67 years, decided last August to start complaining. This necessitated medical attention and a temporary restriction of my activities and this in turn prevented the holding of an anticipated meeting with our District Deputies wherein we planned to discuss and lay guide lines for the ensuing term. However, the District Deputies proceeded on their own initiative and I am sure we all agree their efforts have been most successful.

And finally brethren, as our association has been carried on with so much unanimity and concord, in which I greatly rejoice, so may it continue for the years to come.

May the Grand Artificer of the Universe grant to us all many years of health and vigour, that together we may serve our beloved Fraternity.

REPORT OF THE RITUAL COMMITTEE

The Ritual Committee begs leave to present their report for the 1968-69 years as follows:

Many of their members attended all of the District meetings and the work-shops held in the jurisdiction this year, and we believe much worthwhile information was brought forward for the good of the Craft.

The committee confirms 'as amended' the directive issued by our Grand Master on Jan. 28, 1968, regarding the adoption of the "Sign of Fidelity" exemplified by placing the Right Hand on the left breast in the region of the heart. This sign to be used as follows:—

1. When obligations are being administered.
2. When The Scriptures are being recited.
3. When Prayers are being offered (except in one portion of the 3°).
4. Acknowledgement of instructions from a presiding officer.
5. Given when upstanding only.

Discussion took place regarding the position of the lesser lights in the Entered Apprentice degree. These lights should be placed in a Triangular position in front of the altar where the candidate can see same.

The Senior Deacons must be instructed to show dignity and reverence in their method of opening and closing the Holy Bible and in the placing of the Great Lights when the lodge is being opened and closed. Upon completion of this work a slight bow of acknowledgement from the hip is made before returning to their place in the lodge.

This committee has had referred to it for consideration, the proposal of an installation ceremony for the Immediate Past Master of a lodge. We would welcome any suggestions from any member of the Craft on this subject.

This committee has had many favorable comments on the Workshops which have been held by the District Deputy Grand Masters and we recommend to lodges who may not have any work on a meeting night to discuss with their District Deputy, the thought of having a workshop with him on these nights, as it certainly is means of increasing attendance and interest with the proper subjects for discussion.

We recommend strongly to Grand Lodge that the application form for proposing members as shown on page 69 of the 1966 Statutes section 20, be changed from just the signatures of the two proposing members' names to the following:—

"We members of the above lodge are personally acquainted with the above named petitioner, and from our confidence in his integrity, do cheerfully recommend him as a proper candidate for the mysteries of Freemasonry."

During the recess, the brethren assembled in the Banquet Hall to the number of 300 and enjoyed the privilege of the following address by Brother Dr; W. T. Ross Flemington of Lebanon Lodge No. 28, Sackville. The speaker was introduced by his friend of long standing, R:W: Bro. W. J. Maxwell, and the Most Worshipful The Grand Master extended the thanks of the gathering who responded with prolonged applause. The address included a number of amusing incidents which are not included, but were enthusiastically noted.

GRAND LODGE — MAY 10, 1969

We have been living for the past two days in an atmosphere of symbolism and liturgy, of philosophical theory and idealism and even in the realm of the mythical and the mystical under the skillful direction of a Grand Master who is a big man in every way as the Prime Minister said of Donald Gordon. What has the Freemason to say to men today in an era that has been described as the most catastrophically revolutionary age that the world has ever known? Have five million men belonging to one of the oldest fraternal organizations in the world any message for 1969?

Whilst our origin is lost in antiquity, most of our ideas and rituals in masonry stem from the period of cathedral building, a period beginning with the Middle Ages—and even before—and lasting through to today—for we still build cathedrals.

Let me describe, oh so briefly, a few of them.

1. *Monte Cassino in Italy*. Built by Benedict in the sixth century. Through the Dark Ages that swept across Europe it was a beacon light. Through the centuries it had become one of the storehouses of learning and culture. I watched with a Canadian Unit as it was destroyed during the World War II—and a few years ago I flew over it in all its restored glory. Built and rebuilt by those skilled in craftsmanship.
2. *Canterbury, Ave Mater Anglia*, built about the same time, after Augustine had invaded England with christianity. Canterbury Pilgrims of all ages have worshipped at its shrines and have fought within its walls which were lovingly built through the succeeding centuries by masters of the building craft.
3. *Westminster Abbey* that so recently celebrated its nine hundred years of history, where one is reminded of great statesmen and poets, missionaries and humanitarians known explorers and The Unknown Soldier. A monument of masonry.
4. *Salisbury Cathedral*—one of the most graceful, looking out over Salisbury Plain, possessing the highest spire in England, 404', which guided many an aviator like myself learning to fly those World War I planes.
5. *Dunblane Cathedral* rebuilt about the same time in Scotland. Michael O'Neill, the Principal Roman Catholic Chaplain in World War II, and now Archbishop of Regina, and I visited it when visiting the Canadian Forestry Corps and were shown around the beautiful old cathedral by the then incumbent, the Moderator of the Church of Scotland (Presbyterian). I must tell you that story

These great cathedrals were built to the glory of the Supreme Architect of the Universe by men skilled in their craft who had a strong sense of beauty, of accuracy, of integrity, and of humor. If you don't believe the last, humor, look at some of the devastating gargoyles that ogle down from roofs and walls and from towers! These skilled craftsmen formed guilds or lodges to perpetuate their skills "to promote brotherhood, and to foster morality amongst their members".

Then, over 250 years ago, on June 24, 1717, representatives of four old London Lodges met at the "Goose and Gridiron Alehouse" (isn't that a descriptive name?) to constitute a Grand Lodge! Those were the days when men were on the move, new worlds were opening up, and Masons became speculative.

In Canada before 1749 a lodge was instituted at Annapolis Royal under a Boston Warrant. In Quebec in 1759 there were lodges in the British Forces. In 1792 the Provincial Grand Lodge of Upper Canada was formed. Now there is a Grand Lodge in each Province. There is no one central authority in Canada, or in U.S.A. or in the U.K.

William Franklyn Bunting has written "Freemasonry in New Brunswick", which traces the history of the early days from 1784. He says they were actuated no doubt by a desire to unite together into an organization for social, friendly, and fraternal intercourse such as a guarded door of a lodge of free and accepted masons offers to all entitled to enter therein" (page 19). Many of those who joined probably belonged to other Lodges before they came to St. John.

There were some interesting happenings in the Old St. John Lodge. Let me mention three briefly:

1. There are instances recorded where the three degrees were conferred upon a candidate on the same evening (page 23). I like this illustration of initiative and freedom of action!
2. On page 23 it is recorded that "From Labour to Refreshment" was a regular entry, "but it was not a mere perfunctory practice or observance"!
3. Again and again the statement is made "after prayer proceeded to business". The two were evidently never confused! It recalls one of the charming statements of Archbishop Temple when he reminded people that God was interested in other things besides religion! Reminds us of Chaplain Gray's fine talks last night "About my Father's Business—And That was Life".

Are cathedrals out of fashion today? They stand for truth and beauty and goodness and are so tremendously needed in our world today. When they are destroyed they are rebuilt; St. Pauls was twice destroyed; Ypres, Cologne, so many beautiful things were destroyed and rebuilt. In Coventry today the ruins of the Old Cathedral still stand and one passes through it to the new Cathedral built for this age with all the inspiration that Sir Basil Spence and Graham Sutherland and Epstein could conjure. There it stands with its ten huge windows, each seventy feet high depicting man's progress through life and God's revelation through history. In St. Ann's in Fredericton you pass through the old church and into the increased light of the new. Trinity here in St. John has its beautiful restored spire.

Do you know O'Reilly's little poem, *The Lost Words*?

*What is the real good?
I asked in musing mood.
Order, said the law court;
Knowledge, said the school;
Truth, said the wise man;
Pleasure, said the fool;
Love, said the maiden;
Beauty, said the page;*

*Freedom, said the dreamer;
Home, said the sage;
Fame, said the soldier;
Equity, the seer.
Spake my heart full sadly;
The answer is not here.
Then within my bosom
Softly this I heard:
"Each heart holds the secret;
Kindness is the word."*

Some of the cathedrals you and I build, as speculative masons, have an ugliness that resembles parts of those built by the operative masons of the past.

Let me show you a touch of ugliness. I quote from the 1966 Edition of Collier's Encyclopaedia: "Negro masons in the U. S. A. have their own organizations paralleling but not associating with the white groups" and again "There are regular lodges with negro representatives in some of the British possessions and one in New Jersey". (Collier's Encyclo.) I'll never forget the shock I had a few years ago when travelling in South Africa to find that negroes were not allowed to join Rotary Clubs!

A touch of beauty? The Halifax Chronicle-Herald for March 26, 1969 headlined "Knights of Columbus, Masons Joint Hosts". Over one hundred members from both orders were in attendance at the Amherst Masonic Temple "for a get acquainted party". Again I quote: "A social hour preceded the buffet.

Grace was offered by Rev. Father J. E. Grant, Chaplain of the Knights of Columbus, who said: "With the following in mind, this meeting will be a first for the Masons and the Knights of Columbus, in Amherst. Despite the fact the Masons belong to various Protestant denominations, and the Knights of Columbus are Catholics, we are one in Christ and express a common belief in God.

Because of the turmoil and restlessness in the world, it is good for us to remember these things."

You must have seen in the newspapers less than a week ago that the Christian Churches and the Jewish Synagogues in the U. S. A. are being pressured for 500 million dollars in part payment for all the agony they have caused the negro people.

Might we be sued for failing to keep our oath?

I close with a quotation from one of Canada's truly great souls, Lorne Pierce, a great Christian, the gifted Editor of the Ryerson Press, and a great Mason. He died a few years ago.

Amongst the many books he has written is one entitled Master Builders. In the last chapter, entitled Altars of Earth, and in the last paragraph, he points out the similarities between religion and masonry.

I quote the last part of the paragraph:

"Like religion it dramatizes its faith in such a manner as to make it unforgettable. Like religion it erects an altar and for the same purpose. The lights, the Sacred Law, speak of truth that is revealed and tried, truth that does not fail one in life, nor forsake one in death. The service in the temple is the same, consummated in an atmosphere of brotherhood, a priesthood of craftsmen. But whereas religion asks subscription to a confession of doctrinal belief, Masonry strips the whole matter to two fundamental duties, I believe in God the Father; I believe in the Brotherhood of Man. Masonry is, therefore, fundamentally religious. Any institution without the vital spark of spiritual life is doomed. Without religion there is nothing to warm it, to give light to it, make it grow. At the same time, any institution that attempts the world's work to-day, and does not cut horizontally through all society, trusting its case to the brotherhood of all talents, cannot last."

An Altar and an Apron. We need them both in this world community of 1969.

Grand Lodge resumed labor at 2:00 P.M., Most Worshipful The Grand Master presiding, and the final report of the Credential Committee was received, whereupon the Grand Lodge proceeded to the election of Grand Lodge Officers, with the following results:-

ORDER OF DeMOLAY FOR BOYS

"50 Years of Young Men on the go."

That slogan will become a byword throughout the U.S., Canada and nine other countries during 1969 as a result of the Order of DeMolay celebrating its 50th Anniversary. The theme tells the story of DeMolay—its members are on the go, doing things to improve themselves and their community.

DeMolay had a humble beginning in early 1919, when the organization was founded by only nine high school boys and a young adult. The adult was Frank S. Land who had the vision and foresight to realize that young men had the need to "belong" to an organization of their contemporaries that afforded them the opportunity to take part in activities that they enjoyed. From the original group of nine young men grew an organization that now reaches around the world.

DeMolay started in New Brunswick at Moncton in 1954 when Coronation Chapter was formed, it is sponsored by Moncton Lodge of Perfection (Scottish Rite) and they meet on the third Tuesday at the Masonic Temple, Moncton. A few years later a group of boys were taken to Moncton from Fredericton and Miltia Chapter was formed it is now inactive.

In 1964 — 33 boys were taken to Truro, N. S. by a group of Masons from the five city lodges, where McLeod Chapter DeMolay conferred both the initiatory and DeMolay degrees on these 33 boys during the A. P. C. and Ulster Chapter was born. It is sponsored by Hibernia Lodge number 3 and they meet in the Scottish Rite Apartments on the second Wednesday and Fourth Monday.

Shortly after Ulster Chapter came into being Marco Polo Chapter was formed, it is sponsored by Carleton Union Lodge number 8 and they meet in the Carleton Union Lodge Room on the first and third Tuesdays.

All Master Masons are welcome at DeMolay meetings.

While the boys basically govern their own affairs through a system of officers similar to craft masonry; they are under the supervision of an advisory council which is responsible to the ex-

ecutive officer. One of the members of the advisory council is designated the "Chapter Dad" and is the main counselor and advisor to the chapter members. This Chapter Dad is a friend whom each member of a chapter can look upon as a person to whom problems can be taken with understanding.

The international supreme council for the order of DeMolay is located in Kansas City, Mo. It is represented in each jurisdiction by an executive officer. The advisory council of each chapter is directly responsible to the executive officer. The executive officer may appoint a deputy and personal representatives. Bro. Stan Cassidy of Fredericton is N. B. Executive officer with Wors. Bro. Louis L. Holman of Saint John as his deputy.

Each DeMolay chapter must be sponsored by a recognized group of Masons. It may be a Blue Lodge, a Scottish Rite or York Rite Body, a Shrine Temple or club or some other similar Masonic group. It may even be a group of Master Masons forming a Square and Compass Club for the primary purpose of sponsoring a DeMolay chapter. Masonic sponsorship enables DeMolay chapters to have dependable, consecrated leadership and the use of Masonic buildings to house DeMolay activities.

Listen to These Facts:

Nearly 3,000,000 young men have knelt at DeMolay altars all over the world, and there are 166,000 active DeMolays today in over 2,500 chapters in 11 countries and territories.

Over 100 DeMolays have become Grand Masons of Grand Lodges, and more than 200 DeMolays have obtained the 33° in Freemasonry.

The seven cardinal virtues of DeMolay are: filial love, reverence, courtesy, comradeship, fidelity, cleanness, and patriotism; and these serve as the basic principles for the activities and operations of every chapter.

The Order of DeMolay has taken the virtues and other best values of ancient chivalry and translated them into modern concepts and uses to build better citizens out of teenage young men.

Masons should particularly be interested in this outstanding youth movement. With the influence and inspiration the young men receive from the Masons serving as their adult advisors and

from Masonic buildings housing their activities, they cannot help but become familiar generally with Freemasonry, and thus be in a better position to seek Masonic light upon reaching their years of adulthood.

Through the efforts of past Grand Master Hopkins, this Grand Lodge gave its blessings to DeMolay. By his visitations to DeMolay functions our present Grand Master has shown tremendous interest in the order. May the interest of this Grand Lodge and its member lodges continue to grow in DeMolay. For these young men are our strength of the future.

REPORT OF THE GRAND HISTORIAN (1969)

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER,
OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND LODGE
OF NEW BRUNSWICK, FREE & ACCEPTED MASONS:

I have the honour to submit my second report as your Grand Historian. The privilege of having the Annual Report printed for distribution at Grand Lodge necessitates that some events occurring just prior to our Communication must be omitted until the following year. Two such events took place in April, 1968 which are recorded in this Report as they are of considerable interest to the Fraternity.

Wor. Bro. Alonzo R. Stiles of Albert Lodge No. 34 received the 1968 Centennial Award of the New Brunswick Teachers Association in recognition of his achievements as a teacher and also the first full time Secretary-Treasurer of the provincial Teachers' organization. Bro. Stiles is a faithful member of Albert Lodge, having served as Organist for many years.

Restigouche Lodge No. 25 of Dalhousie observed its Centennial April 27-28, having the distinction of being the first Lodge organized under Dispensation from the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick. A District Meeting, a banquet and social evening and a Church Parade were part of the Centennial festivities. The Secretary of Restigouche Lodge, Wor. Bro. W. F. Edwards, was kind enough to forward a full report of the occasion together with a history of the Lodge for our records.

Two matters of historical importance took place during the Grand Lodge session: Permission was granted to a Committee headed by R.W. Bro. W. J. Bambury, P.D.G.M., to purchase a plot of ground in Fernhill Cemetery and erect thereon a suitable memorial to our first Grand Master, M. W. Bro. Benjamin Peters. The first presentations of the John Beardsley Medal were made by M. W. Bro. J. S. Hoyt, P.G.M., to the M. W. the Grand Master, for New Brunswick, M. W. Bro. Frederick C. Morrison, Grand Master of Nova Scotia, for Canada; M. W. Bro. Thomas A. Booth, Grand Master of Massachusetts, for the United States of America. Other presentations have been made during the year to our Past Grand Masters. In making these presentations Bro. Hoyt made reference to the fact that R. W. Brother the Reverend John Beardsley was the pioneer Mason in the new province of New Brunswick, a devout "man of the cloth" and a fervent Loyalist. Grand Lodge was most fortunate in having among its distinguished visitors, M. W. Bro. Albert P. Reurat, P.G.M. of Rhode Island and Grand Master of the International Supreme Council, Order of DeMolay. He gave a resume of the world wide activities of this remarkable youth organization founded by Frank S. Land, in Kansas City, 1919.

Correspondence has been exchanged with the Grand Historian of the Grand Lodge, A.F. & A.M., State of Maine, with the view that matters of mutual historic interest might be shared by our two neighbouring jurisdictions.

Keith Lodge No. 23, Moncton, on May 17 honoured close to forty of her Past Masters, the senior being Dr. Harry S. Thomson, who occupied the East in 1915; while Wor. Bro. W. R. Rodd, a Past Master by affiliation from Lebanon Lodge No. 28, Sackville, received the 60 year bar to his long service jewel. These two beloved brethren are now past 90 years of age.

The first Mason of New Brunswick to receive a 75 year bar to his 50 year jewel, the Reverend York Adam King, passed to the Celestial Lodge Above on May 29, 1968, having reached the century mark January 30. A Memorial Service was held in the Steeves Settlement Baptist Church on Sunday, August 11, when Grand Lodge joined relatives and friends to pay tribute to this distinguished clergyman, a member of the Craft for 77 years. A Masonic Service was conducted at the nearby grave by the M. W. the Grand Master, assisted by the Grand Chaplain and Grand Secretary.

Friday, August 2nd, 1968 marked the close of a long and busy life which was without parallel in Canadian Freemasonry. M. W. Bro. Reginald Vanderbilt Harris, P. G. M., and for many years Grand Secretary of Nova Scotia, as well as being an honorary Past Grand Master of New Brunswick, was the foremost Masonic scholar in Canada, and possibly in the western hemisphere. His offices and honours in Freemasonry alone fill pages, while his services to his Church, legal profession, community and fellow men, remind us that "by their good work shall ye know them". His numerous books and papers are available to us and his outstanding example of Masonic service coupled with that of Christian stewardship is indeed an example, nay—inspiration—to all those who come after him.

Wor. Bro. Ralph B. Fullerton of Lebanon Lodge No. 28, Sackville, had the unique distinction in June of raising to the Master Mason Degree, his son, brother, son-in-law and brother-in-law. Sunbury Lodge No. 42, Fredericton Junction, at its October Communication witnessed the Worshipful Master, Lloyd M. Jones raise his father Frank R. Jones. This event has not occurred in our jurisdiction since November, 1961. R. W. Bro. Murray S. Speight, P.D.G.M. presented the Master Mason's Apron on behalf of the family.

A most successful Conclave of the Order of DeMolay was held in Moncton, August 23-25. During the sessions the Degree of Legion of Honour (Honorary) was conferred upon R. W. Bro. Edward S. Sherrard. Bro. Stanley B. Cassidy headed delegates from

3 New Brunswick Chapters, while Bro. Harvey MacDonald led the delegation from 7 Chapters in Nova Scotia. In these days of academic unrest and youthful defiance toward recognized authority, it was a refreshing experience to see close to 100 young men earnestly discussing worthwhile projects and at the same time enjoying themselves in a manner which reflected credit upon all concerned. 1969 marks the Golden Jubilee of the Order of DeMolay. Wor. Bro. George Trentowsky is the Coordinator of such Jubilee activities for the Atlantic Provinces.

The 600th regular Communication of Tweedie Lodge No. 41, Moncton, was held on September 10th, 1968, with Grand Lodge in attendance. The guest speaker was the M. W. the Grand Master.

It is not inappropriate to mention that the Valley of Saint John, Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite observed the Centennial of its Institution on October 5th, with a visit from the Sovereign Grand Commander of the Rite, Ill. Bro. Charles H. Cunningham. A Banquet, social evening and Church Service were features of the occasion.

Several hundred Masons and friends gathered in First Baptist Church on Sunday October 6th on the occasion of the Annual Church Parade and Service for Districts 2 and 7. The Grand Chaplain, V. Wor. Bro. David Gray delivered the address and a highlight of the Service was the rendition of Handel's "Largo" by the Handbell Choir of this Church.

Six Masonic scholarships each worth \$500.00 were presented to three young ladies and three young gentlemen, all students at various universities. It is noted with pleasure that one District and several Lodges also grant scholarships or bursaries.

Acacia Lodge No. 49, Moncton, on October 21 conferred the Second Degree by having a team of presiding Masters from Districts 2 and 7 in the various offices. The M. W. the Grand Master complimented the Worshipful Master, W. Leslie Caddell, for his initiative in making such a presentation possible.

Hibernia Lodge No. 3, Saint John, held an Emergent Communication on October 19 for the purpose of honouring three of her senior brethren and to witness the conferring of the Third Degree by a team composed largely of officers in stations held by them in 1925, at which time the presiding Master of this team, R. W. Bro. A. C. (Bert) Lemmon, was in the East. It is almost unnecessary to mention that the Degree was conferred in an excellent manner. R. W. Bro. Lemmon and Bro. Wendell Slipp received their 50 year Jewels. It had been planned to present Bro. Alfred O. Richards with his 75 year bar to the jewel, he having been raised in July, 1893, but his age (97) prevented his attendance at this communication.

An event of great importance in our Masonic year occurred on October 28, when the M. W. the Grand Master together with Grand Lodge and more than 150 brethren from many jurisdictions gathered in the auditorium of the Oromocto Senior High School for the Consecration and Warranting of Centennial Lodge No. 53 in Oromocto. 64 installed Masters saw Wor. Bro. Stanley Winslow Brown become the first Worshipful Master of Centennial Lodge. The new Warrant was beautifully executed by R. W. Bro. Dr. C. A. McVey, Honorary Past Grand Warden, who observed his 90th birthday in March of this year.

Lodge St. Andrew No. 16, Rexton, burned the mortgage on its new Temple on November 2nd. During the same Communication the Grand Master and Grand Chaplain dedicated the new Regalia. A history of the Lodge was prepared and read by the Grand Historian. The Grand Master spoke to the brethren of Lodge St. Andrew and visitors on the significance of the occasion and stressed the efforts put forth by the individual Masons. The Worshipful Master, Earl Morton paid tribute to the Ladies of the Eastern Star. M. W. P. G. M. Dickison recalled that he had laid the cornerstone on November 3rd, 1962. An unusual coincidence was that R. W. Bro. Chesley R. Bateman was then Senior Grand Warden, the office which he held as well in 1968, on this particular visitation.

Wor. Bro. John Mundle of Lodge St. Andrew had the great satisfaction of seeing two sons installed as Masters of their respective Lodges for the 1969 Masonic year. Wor. Bro. Arnold Mundle is the Master of Lodge St. Andrew, like his father before him; his brother in fact as well as in the fraternal sense. Wor. Bro. Ronald Mundle is the Master of Lodge St John No. 27, Bathurst. A joint Installation took place in Fredericton on December 27, when the District Deputy Grand Master, R. W. Bro. I. Dale Steeves, assisted by R. W. Bro. Edward G. Perkins, J. G. W., R. W. Bro. Jack Akerly, P.J.G.W. along with Wor. Bro. Congratulations are extended to V. Wor. Bro. Nicola Franchetti, Past Grand Chaplain and a "stalwart" of Bethel Lodge No. 40. Canon Franchetti observed his 90th birthday on December 18. Brother Peter Davidson of Albion Lodge No. 1, Saint John, but residing in Moncton, reached the century mark on February 26. Northumberland Lodge No. 17, Newcastle honoured Bro. George Ife in March on the occasion of his 95th birthday.

Wor. Bro. Ife joined Northumberland Lodge in 1919, becoming Inner Guard in 1923 when M.W.P.G.M. G. Percy Burchill was Master. He became Worshipful Grand Master in 1929, and, the brethren will be interested to learn, he chose as his Inner Guard, Bro. Dickison, none other than our beloved M.W.P.G.M. During the evening Wor. Bro. Ife occupied his favourite office, that of Chaplain; M. W. Bro. Dickison presented the distinguished brother with his 50 year pin and certificate. During the refreshment period a birthday cake was cut by the recipient and other gifts were presented to him. Our revered Honourary Grand Historian, M. W. P.G.M. Arthur S. District Meetings have been held and a Masonic Workshop is scheduled for Saint John on April 19, by R. W. Bro. T. L. Banks, D.D.G.M.

The recent increase in postal rates has affected the number of Notices being received. The problem is recognized, but if there is anything of importance, *please* let me know. I acknowledge the faithful work of our Lodge Secretaries. I must also thank the District Deputies, the Grand Secretary and Miss Roberts of his staff. This year I record my appreciation of the work done by my father Bro. J. W. Pincombe, in keeping my mail, etc. up-to-date during my absences from Moncton.

In closing I should wish to mention the outstanding service rendered during the past two years by M. W. Bro. William John Summerville, whilst in the Grand East. His dedication to the rigorous duties of high office coupled with the warmth of his personality have made his term of office truly memorable and we tender our gratitude for his labours with the wish that he be spared for many years to enjoy the fruits of such labours.

May we all find some comfort and inspiration in these lines:

The breath of life and manhood fine,
And that I have used them now and then

In submitting my second and final report as District Deputy Grand Master for District No. 1, I again wish to express my deep appreciation of the privilege accorded to me of serving you and the Brethren of the Craft under the outstanding leadership you have given to us all.

During the year it has been noticeable in some of the Lodges which have been handicapped by poor attendance and a lack of a sufficiently strong group of Past Masters to maintain the active and enthusiastic leadership which is so vitally needed, that a new and encouraging development is coming into being. This is being brought about by a small but interesting influx of younger officers whose personal interest and enthusiasm has led them to visit quite frequently in various lodges and to encourage others to follow their example. This has been a most rewarding and active term, in which I am happy to report Official Visits completed to all Lodges in the District, as well as numerous unofficial visits carried out on all occasions possible. The continuing and consistent warmth of welcome and courteous co-operation extended by the various Lodges has been deeply appreciated by me and by those in attendance with me.

It has been a year of numerous happy Masonic highlights for me, among which I might mention the deeply appreciated tribute so graciously extended by Worshipful Master Cyril J. Williams and the Officers and Brethren of Carleton Union Lodge No. 8 in inviting me to be the guest speaker at their traditional Salmon Dinner in observance of Saint John's Day.

Early in September I had the thrilling experience of attending the Centenary session of the Supreme Council of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite for Canada, in the City of Hamilton, Ontario. This occasion brought together hundreds of distinguished Masons from coast to coast, including a goodly number from the ranks of our own Grand Lodge. Sharing prominently in the various ceremonies were Right Worshipful Brothers Kenneth R. Nelson, George B. Ingraham and Albert C. Lemmon. The kindly special courtesy extended to me personally by our Right Worshipful

Grand Secretary very appropriately set the stage for still another happy occasion on October 19, when, during your unavoidable absence on other Masonic duties, you requested that I deputize for you at an Emergent Communication and Past Master's Afternoon, of Hibernia Lodge No. 3. This event was capably presided over by Hibernia's senior Past Master, none other than Right Worshipful Brother A. C. Lemmon, and the pleasant duty you had assigned gave me a welcome opportunity to partially repay the great courtesies extended to me by Brother Lemmon in September, by now having the very great honor of presenting to him, on your behalf, his Fifty Year Jewel. The degree work exemplified by our distinguished brother and his staff of Past Master officers, was deeply impressive and indeed, practically letter perfect. It was, however, a matter of deep regret to all that the uncertainties and frailties of advancing years made it impossible for two other well beloved veterans of the Lodge to be present and also receive well-deserved Grand Lodge recognition for their many years of service to the Fraternity.

There have been many other impressive occasions throughout the year, including your large agenda of Official Visits, which large representations of the Grand Lodge were constantly happy to share, myself among them, whenever opportunity offered. Your heavy schedule of Installations must have come pretty close to setting a record, and I was highly honored during its early stages to have the privilege, at your request, of conducting the Installation ceremonies for the Worshipful Master and Officers of Albion Lodge No. 1, while you were carrying out similar ceremonies elsewhere. I am deeply grateful for the splendid support and encouragement given to me by such a fine group of Grand Lodge Officers and members on that occasion. Your kindly courtesy was again extended to me as the installation series was coming to an end, when, at the request of the Worshipful Master elect, you graciously called upon me to assume the East and to install my good friend George Raymond Wilson as Worshipful Master of St. Martin's Lodge No. 30.

Another unique and outstanding event was your later Official Visit to Albion Lodge No. 1 for the purpose of presenting several of the brethren with their Fifty Year Pins. A large number of Fifty Year veterans from this and other Lodges were delighted to have your invitation to accompany and assist you, and were graciously pleased to allow a lowly Forty-niner, in the person of Most Worshipful Past Grand Master Henry D. Hopkins; and a youthful representative of the class of Forty-eight, in the person of Most Worshipful Past Grand Master James Stanley Hoyt, to also have a small share in their gala evening. Master George Wilson and his officers of St. Martin's Lodge No. 30 for their courtesy in opening an Emergent Communication of the Lodge to act as official hosts for the Workshop program, for the very capable and dignified manner in which they carried out their duties. My sincere gratitude is also extended to Right Worshipful Brothers Kenneth R. Nelson, Perley C. Wright and Roy W. Merryweather for the very interesting and instructive highlights they so kindly gave us concerning the Scottish Rite, York Rite, and the Shrine, respectively. Also to Wor. Bro. George E. Trentowsky for his particularly informative and timely address in support of the Order of DeMolay for Boys. Similar gratitude is also expressed on behalf of all those present, to the ladies of the Fundy Chapter of the Eastern Star, who, by arrangements made under the kindly and persuasive auspices of St. Martin's Lodge, and at considerable inconvenience to themselves, provided us with a very fine dinner and thus set the stage for our, by that time well fed and contented, Grand Master, to provide a very fine finale with some more of his always welcome and instructive "Off the Cuff" remarks which he refuses to designate as a speech.

In closing, let me again repeat my most sincere thanks for all the kindly courtesies and friendship throughout the Craft; to all the brethren of the Craft Lodges, and the Grand Lodge; Bert Lemmon and Miss Roberts in the Grand Secretaries Office, and to all those who have been so willing at all times to lend a hand in what, through the medium of this ever dependable cooperation, has been a very pleasant term of office.

The Masonic highlight of the year in this District was on the occasion of the especial communication of Grand Lodge at Oromocto on October 28, 1968. Centennial Lodge No. 53 received their Charter and the Lodge officers were installed by the M. W. G. M. William J. Summerville. Approximately 225 Masons from the jurisdiction attended this communication and 85 members witnessed the installation of Wor. Bro. Stanley Brown into the Oriental chair of King Solomon.

The two lodges in Fredericton joined together on December 27, 1968 for the joint installation of officers. This successful event was carried out by officers from each lodge. This was the first occasion where a joint installation had occurred within the District. Other changes or Lodge conditions worthy of note in this report are as follows.

Hiram Lodge has acquired land for the erection of a new temple in Fredericton.

Increased dues have been necessary in Sunbury and Grand Lake Lodges.

The Master of Sunbury Lodge, Wor. Bro. Lloyd Jones raised his father during the year.

Landmark and Alexandria Lodges exchanged fraternal visitations with each lodge assisting in conferring degrees.

The quarters of Centennial Lodge in Oromocto were changed from the United Church Basement to the Oddfellows Hall.

The Bye-Laws of Cherry Mountain Lodge were re-written during the course of the year under review.

The Annual Banquet in October continues to be a highlight at Ashlar Lodge; also this is the only lodge within the District which has an educational scholarship for students within the McAdam area.

A District Masonic Workshop was conducted in Fredericton on March 1, 1969 with approximately 75 Masons from the District together with the Most Wor. Grand Master and Rt. Wor. Grand Secretary in attendance. This type of meeting has a great educational potential for masonic students and should be attempted on a jurisdictional basis in the near future.

This is an exceptionally good District to work in as D.D.G.-M. as harmony prevails within every Lodge. Excellent cooperation has been experienced on all occasions where District participation was required. These factors make the duties of a D.D.G.M. much easier and much more enjoyable.

My appreciation is expressed to all those members and officers who assisted me during my term of office.
