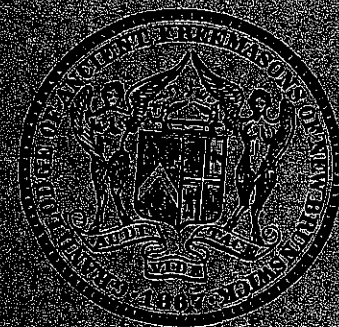

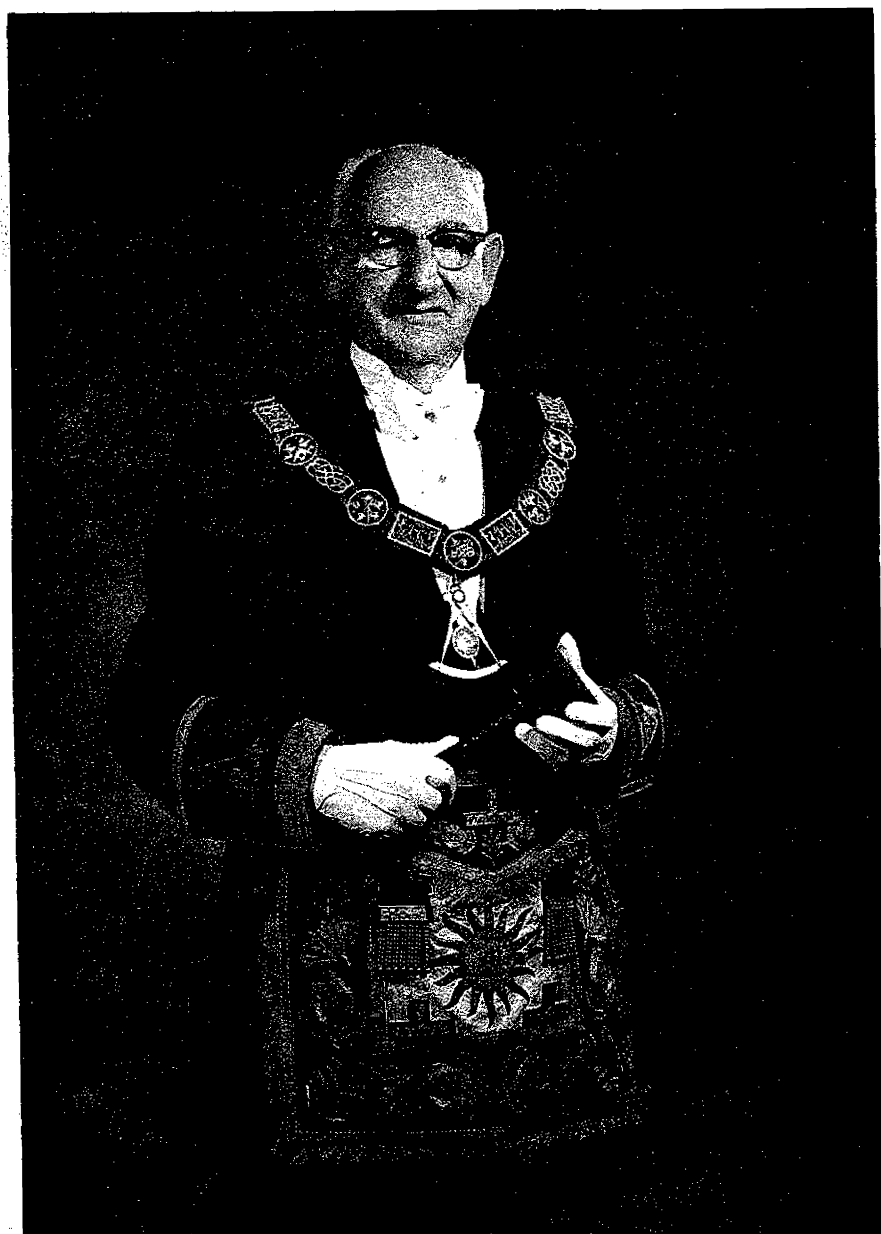

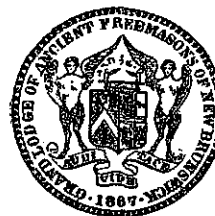
Moved by I. Dale Steeves, seconded by J. S. Humphrey and adopted that the report of the Grand Treasurer be received and laid on the table.

HIRAM'S POTS AND PANS

I sincerely hope that the Theme of my address has pulled you up with a jolt, and made you think! 'Hiram's Pots and Pans! Hiram the Tinker. That is a far cry from the Hiram we honour masonically. You all know the story of Hiram Abiff — it is an essential part of our Masonic religiosity.

Now I hope to interest you Biblically, spiritually, and masonically as we pay attention, for a short time, to the study of this great man. I hope we will all find him to be a better man than ever we thought him to be; and I sincerely hope that we will be better men, and better masons as we learn his story.

This age in which we live is a restless age; an age of rebellion and protest; an age of speed and space travel; an age of short cuts and instant this and that; and it seems that we haven't the time to concentrate on things we consider mundane! We are inclined to sweep aside the small, and concentrate on the large; to neglect the so called "trivials" and exploit to the fullest potential the so called "essentials." and Brethren — we wonder what is wrong with our age, our youth, our society, yes and our order! The whole point is this — we are accentuating the wrong things; we are disrupting the sense of values — or at least, we are sitting calmly on our dignity and allowing it to be done! Life is not really made up of big decisions, but small ones. It is the small intricate stitch that brings out the total beauty of the tapestry; It is the small dot or daub of the correct colour that really makes the masterpiece; It is the small nipping notes of the score that makes the harmonious and beautiful sonata. Yes. It is the small things that make the great. Remember the Children's Hymn. "Little drops of water, little grains of sand make the mighty ocean and the pleasant land"? Maybe in the passing years we have forgotten the great truth, but is it still binding. You see, I believe, that not only the Bible, but life itself — shout to us — if we have "ears to hear, and eyes to see" — that we have good reason for doing, even the most insignificant task, to the very best of our ability.

The volume of the Sacred Law Adorns Our Altar open at the appropriate place to correspond to the teaching of the various degrees. But really Brethren the volume of the Sacred Law is a Closed Book. It is a forgotten book today.

"Mother I've found a dusty old thing
high up on the shelf, just look
'Oh' The Mother looked up surprised
"Be careful, that's God's own Book."
"God's Book The child said much surprised
"Then Mother, before we lose it
We'd better send it back to God
for you know, we never use it."

Now, of course, we Masons use it. Yes, we do the "Big" thing; the "important" thing — we open it very reverently at the appropriate time, and at the appropriate place — But the "little" thing, — the reading, study, the implantation of the morals concepts and truths contained in it, we seldom if ever, incorporate in our lives, our actions or our speech! My text is taken from 1st Kings Chapter 7 verse 40. I wonder how many Brethren have read the Bible Story of King Solomon's planning, building and erection of the King's Palace and God's Temple? This story, like all Bible stories, is most refreshing, and puts life in a wholesome perspective. Solomon, fulfilling a promise made to David his Father, that he would build a house and Temple in Jerusalem, started planning for a building that would take 13 years to complete. Only the best materials would be used; and only the best architect would be employed. Solomon sent to the city of Tyre for Hiram Abiff, who was a worker in bronze "par excellence." Our Bible says he was full of "wisdom and understanding, and cunning to work all works in brass."

The master artisan from Tyre set to his task. He made 2 majestic pillars about 6 ft. in diameter, and about 30 ft. high. They were adomed with nets, chains, wreaths and lily work; among the adornments were 200 pomegranates on each pillar! Another item was a round metal sea — or tank about 15 ft. in diameter, 7½ ft. high, and 45 ft. around. This was decorated with a double row of gourds. Now, All the decorations and frills were to be cast in the same mould! Wow!! This work called for an expert craftsman, a master artist — not for any old handyman! Hiram was the man for the job, and he did it well. Our Bible gives us a Catalogue of all the intricacies and adornments — wheels, axles, cherubim, lions and palm trees" according to the proportion of every one" i.e. in their proper perspective!

Maybe I have hammered too long on this aspect; but I want you to understand, and get a very clear picture of what King Solomon employed Hiram to do. He wasn't called to make a hovel, or even a cottage by a lonely lake shore — No — He was called to do something no other craftsman could do! What he did was for the King's Place and God's Temple. The glory and splendour of that building must have been a wonderful sight. We can visualize it as we read the whole story. We must however, be awfully shocked as we read, when the narrative goes calmly on from the story of exquisite, elaborate fancy work to say "Hiram made the lavers and the shovels and the basins."

From the sublime to the ridiculous; from ornamentation to Pots and Pans; from artisan to tinker — Well, we didn't expect that! Anyone, even the newest entered apprentice could make those things, they were the insignificants. But, No. The Bible goes on "and the pots & the shovels & the basins, & all these vessels

which Hiram made to King Solomon for the House of the Lord were of **BRIGHT BRASS**". What a very refreshing and redeeming touch! The same craftsman who built the 30 ft. high ornate pillars, and the enormous fish bowl, and all the other objects of rare beauty & skill, turned right round and made pots & pans & shovels. I can't help wondering, if this story was to be written today would we have included these little details? I wonder, if we had done all this beautiful work — catching the eyes of all photographers and artists, news media and T. V. cameras, would we not have been infuriated — to put it mildly — if the pots and the basins and the shovels appeared in the Press, or adorned the T. V. screen as we were being complimented on our artistic achievement? However, you see, Hiram was not like us. In the Bible story the narrative moves from the pillars to the pots and pans in one breath. The reverence for the seemingly insignificant is revealed in the term "Bright Brass." — burnished bronze.

Hiram, in other words, made pots and pans, with as much care, tenderness & love, as he did, the moulten sea, and the rest of his work. He didn't see any great difference between an enormous pillar and a small pot! He made both of them so that they could bear the stamp of approval of a master artist. His sense of values, went deeper than externals, they shone through his artistry. Everything he made, big or small, was made with **all** his art, **all** his skill. He couldn't have lived with himself, if he hadn't done his very best at **all** times; nor would he have been the complete master, if he had not always applied his craft to the best of his ability. You see, what made Hiram the great man he was; was not the ornate pillars, or the enormous fish tank, but the pots & the shovels and the basins of bright brass. His job was a complete job — no half-measures; No lessening of the highest standards; no falling away from the best — even in the most mundane jobs. Everything he made was A. 1. — First-Class!

Now our lives in the main are lived, not among the 30 ft. pillars of ornate artistry, but among the pots and the pans of the every day, the commonplace, and it is there we are called upon to work out our lofty ideals, precepts and tenets to the Glory of God and for the good of our order.

It is in our everyday living that we are called to measure up. Masonically and spiritually, to the high standards of an order we were not forced to join, or forced to subscribe to its demands, but to an order which we joined of our own freewill and accord. I said we must measure up masonically and spiritually. Now don't be afraid of that word spiritually. There isn't very much difference really between living spiritually and living masonically — despite what some prune-faced clergy will tell you! — Masonry is **not** a religion, it was never meant to be, but it is largely bound up with religion and Brethren — I'm sure of this — if we lose our religion, if we lose our capacity for seeing

another's point of view, if we lose our capacity for doing, being, and giving our very best in the small tasks of life, as well as in the so called important tasks, then we lose the basic precepts of Masonry, and are no better than the Cowans or eaves droppers we despise. You see. Masonry, like religion, is not so much to be talked about, as to be lived. This is where Hiram shone. Everything he did even to the little things that would scarcely be noticed bore his best work, and his "shinniest" brass.

This is where we fall down isn't it? We boast that we are men of the highest calibre, worthy, well qualified, free men of good report who exercise Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth; and who exemplify and practise Temperance, Fortitude, Prudence and Justice. Yes. We Boast of our high ideals — but do we live to them? Do we carry them out in practise? If we don't we would be as well without them!

The world cares little for profession — unless it is put into practise; and worse still — if we do not incorporate these precepts into our basic living, as well as when we are in Grand Lodge, or in our Mother Lodge, then the prayers we asked of God, as we knelt at the Sacred Alter, the prayers for light, more light and further light will be but a mockery to God, to our order & to ourselves. Remember Brethren, Our Grand Master Hiram? — You represented him once in Lodge, you still bear his character. — "Your honour and reputation as a master mason are concerned in supporting with dignity the respectable character you now bear. Let no motive, therefore, make you swerve from your duty, violate your vows or betray your trust, but be true and faithful . . ."

That's it!

I am happy to report during this, my second year in office as your Grand Master, that I have been able to visit 48 of the 49 Lodges in the Jurisdiction. Therefore every Lodge, except the one that still remains inactive, has had an official visitation during the year. Much time and effort, particularly on the part of the D.D.G.M: R.W. Brother H. M. Richardson, has been spent in trying to encourage this Lodge to resume its labors and it had been my earnest hope to the very last that I would be permitted to visit with them and welcome them back again as active members of the Craft. A summary of my activities is included at the conclusion of this report.

It is customary for the Grand Master of N.B., if present, to install their newly elected Grand Master and other elected Grand Officers and for the second year in a row this was my pleasant duty.

During the week of October 26-31 our Province was honored with a visit from the Virginia Craftsmen, a Masonic Traveling Degree Team composed of Masons from various Lodges in the State of Virginia who are dedicated to perpetuating the remembrance of Freemasons during the American Civil War and promoting Masonic fellowship through travel and the exemplification of degree work as done in Virginia. Their work is done in uniform which is a replica of that worn by the Confederate Cavalry and all who attended were well rewarded. Their founder and president, Wor. Bro. Allen E. Roberts, is a noted Masonic writer and the author of several Masonic books, two of which were per-

sonally presented to me at the time by Bro. Roberts. I was deeply honored, as was R.W. Bro. I. Dale Steeves, the Grand Representative of the State of Virginia and the organizer for this visitation, by being presented with the "Virginia Craftsmen Distinguished Service Medal" along with an accompanying Certificate. As well, several of our Brethren were presented with the Craftsmen's Medallion.

It was my privilege to attend the twelfth Biennial Conference of Grand and District Grand Lodges, F. & A.M. of Canada, held in Montreal on February 18th and 19th. I was accompanied by M.W. Bro. D. A. Somerville, P.G.M., R.W. Bro. A. C. Lemmon, Grand Secretary, and R.W. Bro. I. D. Steeves P.D.G.M. Included among other items on the agenda and presented for discussion were papers on the following subjects:

- (1) Craft Masonry, 1970, Retrospect and Prospect.
- (2) Craft Masonry, Its Challenge.
- (3) Craft Masonry, What Masonic Information can Properly be Disseminated to the Public?
- (4) Craft Masonry in the Community.

This last paper was very ably presented, on behalf of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, by R.W. Bro. I. D. Steeves. I believe a very warm fraternal feeling prevailed at the Conference where, for the first time in many years, each Province of Canada was represented. I considered it a signal honor, as the Grand Master of New Brunswick, to have been chosen to act as President for the Conference.

From Montreal the Grand Secretary and I continued on to Washington for the Annual Conference of Grand Masters in North America being held there from February 21st to 24th. Papers for discussion there included among others:

- (1) Should our Fraternity Try to Keep Pace With the Modern Changing World?
- (2) Is Leadership Training the Most Imperative Need in Masonry Today?
- (3) Would it be Advisable to Open Our Temples for Youth and Community Activities?

Also, among other speakers of note, we listened to Bro. the Hon. R. P. Emmet, Circuit Judge, 15th Judicial Circuit of Alabama; Rev. Bro. Dr. Norman Vincent Peale, and M.W. Bro. Dwight L. Smith, P.G.M. and Grand Secretary of Indiana, the author of "Whither Are We Travelling?" and "Why This Confusion in the Temple?" whose address, "Put On Thy Strength" was

indeed most inspiring. I was happy to extend fraternal greetings on behalf of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.

In these modern times of greater emphasis on youth, the Order of DeMolay plays a vital role in offering young men a healthy outlook for developing their leadership skills and abilities. Theodore Roosevelt once said, "If you are going to do anything permanent for the average man, you have got to begin before he is a man. The chances of success lie in working with the boy and not the man". The Order of DeMolay is one of the finest character building youth organizations in the world today and I would again strongly urge that more time and attention be given to DeMolay by all Master Masons. Arrange to visit DeMolay Chapters, invite them to give programs at your Masonic education meetings, consider the possibilities of establishing and sponsoring Chapters where none exist and volunteer your services as Advisors. Somewhere in their program, I believe, is a statement that goes something like this: "A DeMolay shall never fail: As a Leader, As a Citizen, and as a Man." Brethren let us not fail to assist our youth of today in preparing for the Manhood of tomorrow.

The Committee on Masonic Scholarships (M.W. Bro. H. D. Hopkins, M.W. Bro. P. E. Roy and Wor. Bro. R. V. Limerick) this year received approval for six awards of \$500.00 each. These are given to the children of Masons. A large number of most deserving requests are received each year making the selection a most difficult one for the Committee. Their very careful study and consideration of the merits of each applicant is most commendable. Evidence is increasing that, with the recipients of past years now beginning to graduate from University, the results generally are most encouraging.

District meetings have been held during the year for five of our seven districts. On each occasion members of the Ritual Committee of Grand Lodge have been in attendance and have cheerfully assisted in every way possible. It should be stressed that meetings of this nature are held for the benefit of the Craft generally and it should be the duty of each D.D.G.M. to organize and hold at least one each year in their respective Districts. To the D.D.G.M.'s who have held meetings this year a sincere word of appreciation.

I would like to make brief mention here of my appointment this year of a new Grand Lodge Committee to be known as the Committee on Masonic Culture and Information. While the results of their efforts have not yet been too apparent I can assure you that they have been busily engaged in gathering and preparing information for our benefit and have a wealth of material now at hand with more arriving constantly and they are now in a position to accept invitations to assist at District and Subordinate Lodge meetings. I hope that my successor in office may see fit to

continue this Committee so that the Craft might reap the benefit of their labors.

Once more we note a decrease in our membership. When men seem to lose interest in the finer things, when our churches and all associations of noble purpose suffer losses in membership and seek in vain for devoted members, can we in Freemasonry expect to escape a like portion? In spite of the concern among some that our Fraternity may be falling apart it is my belief that any problems we may have are created by men, not by Masonry. I have observed that in each Lodge we have a faithful group of Masons who are dedicated and devoted to the service of Masonry and their fellow men. Our job then is to generate that same interest among all Masons to reawaken in them that pride of the mystic tie that should burn in the breast of every Brother. I would therefore challenge each Mason in this Grand Jurisdiction to apply the teachings of our ancient and honorable Craft to their lives that they may be of true service to their God, their neighbor and themselves. If we will, with renewed vigor, apply these teachings diligently we can be confident that Masonry will continue to flourish and be a vital force for good among all men.

In the report of the Ritual Committee to Grand Lodge last year it was suggested that this year the Grand Master might consider having a conference the day before Grand Lodge, having in mind that all D.D.G.M.'s, Masters and Wardens of Lodges be in attendance, with Lodges selected to work the three degrees in full and that the Ritual wording and floor work be shown as near possible as expected in standard form. It was felt by your Grand Master that this suggestion was a good one and considerable thought was given as to how best to arrange for this. During this time I became aware of the desire of my younger son to be made a Mason while I still held the office of Grand Master. Since he would not attain his 21st birthday until the 2nd day of May of this year this would not have been possible under normal requirements of time for the degrees. There remained only one other possible way of doing this, that of exercising my prerogative as Grand Master for the making of a "Mason at Sight." In keeping with my determination to try to act in the best interests of the Craft I sought counsel and advice from my Past Grand Masters, the Board of General Purposes, Ritual and Jurisprudence Committees, and was very pleased with their response so that I can report that my every action in this respect was carried out with their full support and endorsement. After due consideration as to a proper course to follow, an application for membership was submitted to Sunbury Lodge No. 42 of Fredericton Jct. and after investigation and ballot he was declared elected for membership. An occasional Lodge was then called to precede the opening of Grand Lodge where the three degrees were conferred making him a "Mason at Sight." At the same time my older boy received his Master Mason degree by courtesy.

Since the primary purpose for degree work at this time was the instruction and education of all, much thought was given to choosing degree teams who would exemplify the work in an efficient manner while at the same time having as many Districts, Lodges and Brethren involved as possible. The E.A. degree was conferred by Lodge St. John No. 27 of Bathurst from District No. 3; the F.C. degree by Keith Lodge No. 23, Moncton of District No. 2 and the M.M. degree by a team selected from among members of Grand Lodge, representing for the most part District No. 1. The third degree lectures were given by Wor. Bro. T. E. Nason, who is the oldest living Past Master of Sunbury Lodge No. 42 of District No. 6. It was a very happy and proud occasion for me to be able to occupy the East for the raising of my two sons to the Sublime degree. I am sincerely grateful to all who took part in this unique event and who have exemplified the work so magnificently; it will always remain a cherished memory with me and I truly hope that you have enjoyed and benefitted from it and that you will have shared some of the joy and happiness with me.

I wish to express my deep appreciation for the assistance and loyal support which I have received from the Grand Lodge Officers, the Board of General Purposes, members of Boards and Committees, the Grand Director of Ceremonies, Grand Treasurer, the Grand Secretary and his assistant Miss Florence Roberts, and the hundreds of the Brethren who have assisted and encouraged me during my term of office. In spite of my shortcomings all have been most generous and understanding and I shall ever remain truly grateful.

To my family for their forbearance during the many years of my Masonic career and particularly to my wife for her patient understanding and tolerance, mere words cannot adequately convey my heartfelt thanks. I trust they will always know, that as Masonry is important in my life, so also are they.

And now with the deepest sense of humility, gratitude and sincere thanks, I approach the close of my term as your Grand Master. The records of my stewardship in promoting Freemasonry in this Grand Jurisdiction I leave with you. I sincerely hope that my efforts to serve have met with your approval and have justified the trust you placed in me.

As Grand Master, one must remember that he was elevated to this high office to serve — not to be served. With that thought always before me I have endeavored to discharge the duties of this office in a manner that would benefit the cause of Freemasonry not just for today but for all of the tomorrows. I can assure you that every mile travelled, every hour spent on our highways, in meetings with my Brethren, and every hour of sleep lost have been worthwhile and most pleasant. If I have been able to aid,

assist or further the cause of Freemasonry in any way then this is my reward!

When in a few hours I relinquish this title and pass the gavel to my successor I wish to pledge to him and this Grand Lodge my fullest support. I shall stand ready at all times to help in any way that I can.

And now, my Brethren, may the Great Architect of the Universe guide our deliberations during this Communication so that we may return to our respective homes replenished by His spirit and the Brotherly Love present among us.

This committee has still under consideration the thought of possibly adding something to the Entered apprentices degree to make it more impressive both to the candidate and the brethren attending, but nothing has been suggested by any of the brethren and we would welcome any thought that might be considered of value to this wonderful degree.

**CULTURE & INFORMATION COMMITTEE
REPORT TO GRAND LODGE**

Your Committee appointed one year ago beg leave to report the following: Subsequent to appointment each and every Grand Lodge in Canada and United States was contacted through its Secretary, requesting information on Masonic Education and Culture in their jurisdiction. Practically every Secretary complied with our request and considerable information was obtained through this means of communication. Reviewing this literature from the various jurisdictions occupied many weeks by individual Committee members. Several Committee meetings have occurred during the period since our appointment. It is believed that most effective results may be accomplished through District Meetings and Masonic Education to Initiates.

Four District Meetings have been attended by either a full or partial Committee depending upon location and availability of the members. An instructional period of two and one-half hours was undertaken in District #6 at Fredericton. This period of instruction was directed exclusively to the first five line officers of each lodge in the District. Topics discussed included "Leaders and Leadership and How to Conduct a Successful Business Meeting". Other District meetings attended include St. Stephen, Moncton and Campbellton. The proposed program was outlined at each of these meetings by Committee members.

Consideration is being given to the printing of instructional pamphlets to be handed initiates after acceptance by a lodge and after each degree is conferred. We believe that by so doing, a deeper interest in Masonry will be instilled into the candidate, and fewer demits and N. P. D.'s together with a greater interest and participation in the Fraternity will be the result. Costs of same at time of writing must be determined and if deemed within our means will be recommended to Grand Lodge for consideration.

**REPORT OF GRAND HISTORIAN
TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER,
OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND LODGE
OF NEW BRUNSWICK, FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONS.**

This is my fourth annual report and in accordance with notice given one year ago and confirmed on April 20 1971 — my last.

The year 1970 marked the Sesquicentennial of the State of Maine and its Masonic Grand Lodge. Many Masons in New Brunswick secured First Day Covers of the stamp issued July 9th to commemorate the double anniversary.

Lodge St. John of Bathurst is very proud of its Masonic Choir which makes frequent appearances in the local churches and fraternal events. Such choirs were once commonplace in our jurisdiction, but are now rare.

The Installation of Officers for Howard Lodge, Hillsborough in 1970 was very much a family affair with no less than six officers being installed by close relatives. It is interesting to note that the present Senior Deacon, Bro. William Balser, Jr. is a former DeMolay as well as a former student of your Grand Historian. Another former student is the Secretary of Coverdale Lodge, Bro. Ronald L. Steeves. We wish these young Masons well.

R. W. Bro. Fred H. Forbes, P.D.D.G.M., visited Lodge St. Andrew in Rexton on May 11 1970 to present three 40 year certificates to Edwin, Harrison and James Graham, brothers both fraternally and factually.

St. John's Lodge of Saint John held a PEACH FESTIVAL on August 15 1970, 122 Masons from 18 Lodges were present and heard a fine address from the Grand Master of Maine, M.W. Bro. Roger I. White.

R. W. Bro. Philip L. W. Drader was presented with the Cross of Honour of the Order of DeMolay on August 29 1970 during the annual Conclave held in Saint John West. "Dad" Drader has been a great supporter of DeMolay for many years. Emeritus rank was conferred on two former Executive Officers of New Brunswick, Dr.

Arthur S. Robinson and Stanley B. Cassidy. R. W. Bro. I. Dale Steeves is the present Executive Officer. DeMolay now has a Canadian Grand Council which is autonomous, with Headquarters in New Westminster, B.C.

R. W. Bro. Drader presented a copy of a paper entitled, "Medieval Masonry" and other related items to our Archives in September. The Library Committee Board in Moncton accepted two Certificates dated 1852 and 1858 belonging to Ezekiel Taylor, a prominent merchant of Moncton in the 19th Century. Mr. F. R. Sayer donated these interesting documents to the Masonic Library.

A highlight of the year was a study in contrasts, on Saturday September 26 the Cornerstone of our newest Temple was laid in Fredericton, while the ceremonies marking the Centennial of the Freemasons Hall in Saint John West commenced on Sunday September 27 when Carleton Union Lodge held a Church Parade. Hiram Lodge lost its Lodge room and Regalia by fire in January 1968. A very great effort was made by the brethren under the chairmanship of Wor. Bro. J. Willard MacNutt and a building which is a credit to all concerned has been erected on Prospect Street. The Cornerstone was laid by Mrs. John Brawn representing Celestial Chapter #3, Eastern Star, R. W. Bro. Dr. C. A. McVey (aged 92) and Wor. Bro. William G. Quinn representing Hiram Lodge #6, Wor. Bro. Luke S. Morrison representing Fredericton Royal Arch Chapter #2 and Wor. Bro. Ralph Gunter representing York Council Cryptic Rite #11 and Fredericton Preceptory #50. These four elderly brethren represented 247 years of service in the Craft. My thanks is extended to R. W. Bro. J. E. Akerley, Secretary of Hiram Lodge, for keeping me informed of this event.

Situated at 270 Charlotte Street West, the Freemasons Hall has been "Home" to Carleton Union Lodge for over 100 years. Our first Grand Master M. W. Bro. B. Lester Peters laid the Cornerstone on July 30 1869 and on September 28 1870 he, assisted by Grand Lodge, formally dedicated the Temple. In addition to the Church Service, a Conversazione with the Ladies and a Past Masters Night were features of this observance. A splendid brochure was prepared and an article by Bro. Donald A. G. MacRae entitled, IF THESE WALLS COULD TALK was most descriptive and thoroughly interesting to all those who may be interested in Masonic history and activities of another day.

Another highlight of the year was the visit of the Virginia Craftsmen in late October. This team conferred the Third Degree according to the Virginia ritual upon their own candidate in Mon-

ton, Saint John and Fredericton. Wor. Bro. Allen E. Roberts, a Past Master of Babcock Lodge #322, Highland Springs, Virginia, was the leader of this Masonic group, while R. W. Bros. Dale Steeves, Maxwell Richardson and Leslie Caddell all assisted in making the necessary arrangements.

Few Masons realize that YOUNG CANADA MUSIC WEEK held in the third week of November each year was brought about in 1959 through the efforts of a New Brunswick musical Mason. Wor. Bro. Ernest W. Freeborn of Keith Lodge was then President of the Canadian Bandmasters Association and felt a week should be set aside for this promotion. He has been the Musical Director for the Moncton High School for the past 25 years, a violoncellist with the former New Brunswick Symphony Orchestra and Organist for the Central United Church for over forty years. We salute a distinguished musician and Past Master of Keith Lodge. Recently the Mayor of Sussex announced he would not stand for another term of office. M. W. Bro. Ralph T. Pearson, P.G.M. has served the Town of Sussex for 37 consecutive years, a record of which anyone might well be proud.

The Secretary of Miramichi Lodge, Wor. Bro. Gordon L. Widbur wrote to me in March enclosing a slightly yellowed letter dated May 11 1870 which he had found among some old records. This letter written by Irvine W. Binney was in reality an application to join the new (Botsford) Royal Arch Chapter in Moncton, which he did and later became a prominent Mason. I was very happy to turn this letter over to the Scribe of Botsford Chapter and you can well imagine the joy with which it was received. There may well be some valuable letters, etc. in your old records, has anyone checked them in recent years?

A highlight of the 1971 Grand Lodge Session will be the making a Mason "at sight". It was last done in Nova Scotia in 1966, when the Lieutenant Governor of the Province was so honoured. I cannot find any record of a Grand Master using such an occasion to initiate a member of his own family.

The Fraternity and their immediate families have been severely stricken during the last year by death. To all who have sustained such a loss, we extend sympathy and understanding. A list of Grand Lodge members is given in the Report of the Grand Master.

Due to the fact that I am attending a Convocation of the Canadian College of Teachers in Moncton; I am therefore unable to be present with you. Since it is very likely that I shall not be in New Brunswick after August, this absence is all the more regrettable.

During the past four years I have been encouraged by the efforts of a "few" and somewhat discouraged by the apathy of "many". Many prominent Masonic leaders are urging the Craft to improve our public relations and participate as such in our community activities. It is clear the Craft is out of step with the times in which we live. Two thirds of our New Brunswick Lodges are in serious financial difficulties. Certainly this is not due to the cost of maintaining the Grand Historian. I have never rendered an account and only the charge for stationery which may be used by my successor could be listed against this office as no grant, etc. has ever been made. My regret is not financial — it is the growing lack of interest in our lodges. To all who have assisted me, for example the various Lodge secretaries, my sincere thanks. The lack of cooperation at the top however is very serious. As I leave you, may I give you a word of warning from Voltaire: IT IS LATER THAN YOU THINK. Brethren, FAREWELL.

REPORTS OF THE DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTERS DISTRICT NUMBER 1

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER,
FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONS OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

In submitting this, my second and final report as District Deputy Grand Master, District Number One, I wish to express to you, Sir, my gratitude for the privilege of having served under you and for the wonderful experience it has been working with and meeting the Brethren of the different Lodges. Like all endeavours, there are things I would have liked to have done but did not accomplish but the happy associations I have made will live always in my memory.

During the past year I have made several visits to all the Lodges in District Number One and have completed my Official Visits. All are functioning well and I have noted an improvement due to the greater support and employment of the Past Masters in the life of the Lodge. This is, I believe, an answer to many problems.

Following is a resume of the activities in the District during the year:

On June 9th, Hibernia Lodge No. 3, conferred the Master Mason Degree, in Ancient Costume, on one candidate. The work was well performed. There were 65 Brethren present. On June 20th Carleton Union Lodge No. 8 celebrated the Festival of St. John the Baptist. The Master Mason Degree was exemplified on four Candidates by the Worshipful Master and Officers of Tweedie Lodge, Moncton. Fifty Year Honorary Membership was conferred on R.W.B. Curtis P. Wills by Carleton Union Lodge and Zion Lodge of Sussex conferred Fifty Year Honorary Membership on W. B. George Coggon, their oldest living Past Master. The event was well attended and the work well performed. On August 8th it was my privilege to attend with you at the D.D.G.M.'s Meeting at Hiram Lodge, Fredericton, N.B. The discussions and direction given to us at that meeting have been very helpful and I have endeavored to carry out these directions on my visits to the Lodges. On August 15th St. John's Lodge No. 2 held a "Peach" Festival at which the Master Mason Degree was conferred on one candidate, Richard Carson of St. Marks Lodge No. 5, St. Andrews, N.B. M.W.B. Roger I. White, Grand Master of Maine was the guest Speaker. On September 9th I made an Official Visit to Corinthian Lodge Number 13, Hampton. The Master Mason Degree was conferred on one Candidate. The work was well performed. There were 32 Brethren present. During the month of September
