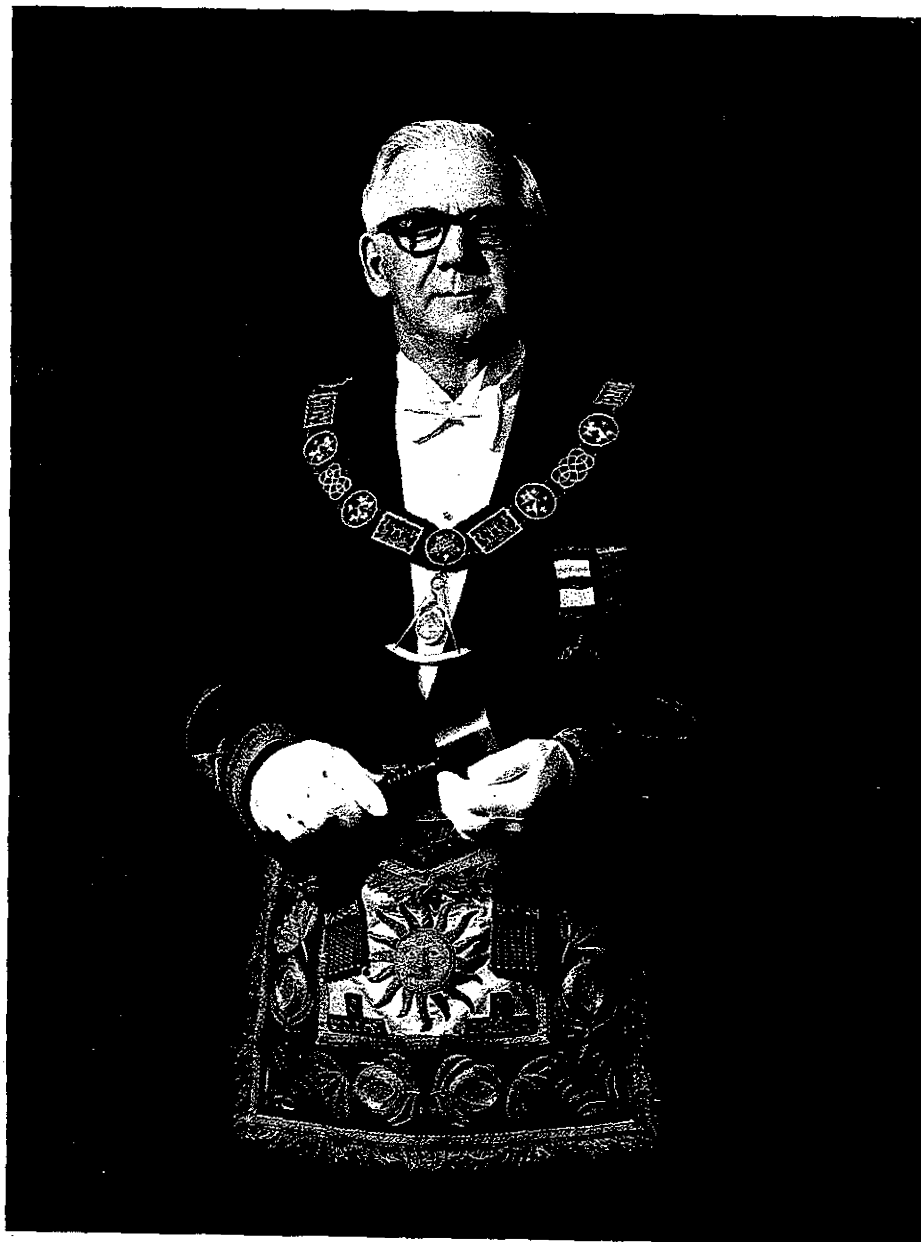

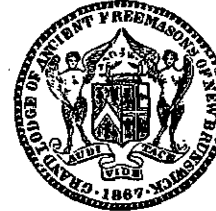

It was also recorded by M:W: M. W. Dalton, seconded by R:W: Haycox and adopted that the subject of a donation be referred to the Board of General Purposes for consideration and action.

OUR REWARDS

*"... and your Father, who
 sees what you do in private,
 will reward you."*

St. Matthew 6:4, 6, & 18

Steward W. Pogue was once a toll collector on the New Jersey Turnpike near Newark in the United States. In five years of taking tolls, he made 25¢ loans to about 100 drivers who were embarrassed to find themselves short of money. One loan made to a driver who had left home without his wallet paid off handsomely. The motorist turned out to be vice-president of a bank in Elizabeth, New Jersey. With his letter of thanks to the toll collector went an offer of training for a bookkeeping job in the bank. Pogue took the offer. Unknowingly, the generous toll collector exchanged a quarter for a rewarding lifetime job.

What is the place of the reward motive in the Masonic and the Christian Life? Should we expect to receive something as a reward for living the kind of life that Masonry and Christianity set before us?

In the work of our wonderful 3rd Degree we have those marvelous characters the "Roughens". They were Craftsmen who had done a job and who were now looking for the reward for their labours. Because of what they had done they were entitled to certain rewards. Of the three I find the third the most fascinating. In his encounter with Master Hiram he first makes sure he has his undivided attention ... then he lays out the facts ... and then he makes his request ...

In the Scripture Passage that was read a few minutes ago by our Most Worshipful The Grand Master you heard Jesus speak three times about the fact that God, the Great Architect, would

reward those who have given to Him the kind of service which he desires.

Verse 4 — "But when you help a needy person, do it in such a way that even your closest friend will not know about it, but it will be a private matter. And your Father, who sees what you do in private, will reward you!"

Again in

Verse 6 — "But when you pray, go to your room and close the door, and pray to your Father, who is unseen. And your Father, who sees what you do in private, will reward you."

And once
 more in

Verse 18 — "When you go without food, wash your face and comb your hair, so that others cannot know that you are fasting — only your Father, who is unseen, will know. And your Father, who sees what you do in private, will reward you."

It is very often stated, and there are many who believe, that the reward motive has no place whatever in the Masonic Order or in the Christian Life. As far as the Christian Life is concerned believers say that Christians must be good for the sake of being good, that virtue is its own reward, and that the whole concept of reward must be banished from the Christian Life!

That is not the point of view that THE MASTER held! In the Matthew passage before us he has said that ... for the right kind of help to the poor ... for the right kind of prayer ... for the right kind of fasting ... there will be a reward.

Now these are not just isolated cases of the reward idea from THE MASTER'S teaching. In other instances he says of those who loyally bear persecution ... who suffer insult without bitterness, that their reward will be great in heaven. (Matthew 5:12) He says that whoever gives a cup of cold water in the name of a disciple will not lose his rewards (Matthew 10:41) At least part of the teaching of the parable of the Talents is that faithful service will receive reward. (Matthew 25:14-30) In the parable of the last judgement the plain teaching is that there is reward and punishment in accordance with our reaction to the needs of our fellowmen. (Matthew 25:31-46)

It is very clear that THE MASTER did not hesitate to speak in terms of rewards and punishments. We should be careful that we do not try to be more spiritual than THE MASTER was in our thinking about this matter of reward.

Any action which achieves nothing is futile and meaningless. A goodness which achieves no end would be a meaningless goodness. It has been truly said: "Unless a thing is good for something, it is good for nothing." Unless the Christian Life has a goal . . . unless the Masonic Life has a goal, unless there is in both an aim which it is a joy to obtain, then both become largely without meaning. We who believe in the Christian Way and the Christian promise cannot believe that goodness can have no result beyond itself.

To banish all rewards and punishments from the idea of religion is in effect to say that injustice has the last word. It cannot reasonably be held that the end of the good man and the end of bad man are one in the same. That would simply mean that God does not care whether we are good or not. It would mean that there is no point in being good, and no special reason why we should live one kind of a life instead of another. To take away all rewards and punishments is really to say that in God there is neither justice or love. Rewards and punishments are necessary in order to make sense out of life.

A. E. Housman has written:

*"Yonder, on the morning blink,
The sun is up, and so must I,
To wash and dress and eat and drink
And look at things and talk and think
and work, and God knows why.*

*And often have I washed and dressed,
And what's to show for all my pain?
Let me lie abed and rest;
Ten thousand times I've done my best,
And alls to do again."*

If there are no rewards and no punishments, then that poem's view of life is true . . . and I for one can't buy that! !

Well having come down on the side that we will have rewards in the Christian Life it would be a good idea to say something about what kind of rewards we ought to expect and look for.

When THE MASTER spoke of reward, He was very definitely not thinking in terms of material reward. He did not promise his disciples material prosperity. He promised us trial and tribulation, suffering, persecution and death. He would not go along with the Old Testament idea that goodness and prosperity are closely related. He would not say that if a man prospered, if his fields were fertile and his harvests great, if his children were many and his fortunes large, we could take that as proof that this was a good man.

Further, THE MASTER points out that the highest reward never comes to the person who is looking for it. If we are seeking reward, if we are always adding up what we believe we are earning, then we will in fact miss the reward for which we seek. We will miss it because we are looking at life in the wrong way. If we come with this approach then we are thinking of God in terms of being a judge . . . an accountant . . . and above all we are thinking of life in terms of law. We are thinking of doing so much and earning so much . . . we are thinking of presenting an account to God and of saying, "I have done so much . . . now I claim my reward."

Our basic mistake in this way of thinking is the idea that life is law, instead of love . . . If we have a loving view of life, the idea of reward will never enter our mind. The great paradox of Christian Reward is that the person who looks for reward, and calculates what is due him does not receive it; the person whose only motive is love, and who never thinks that he has deserved any reward, will, in fact, receive it.

Well we shall have a reward and it will not be a material reward. What then are the rewards that we might expect for living the Christian Life? I want to suggest three . . . I will do it quickly . . . and I am sure that the materially minded person will not think that these are rewards. The rewards of the Christian Life are rewards which are rewards only to a spiritually minded person.

The *First* of our Christian Rewards is *SATISFACTION!!!* The doing of the right thing, obedience to Jesus Christ, the taking of His way, whatever else it may or may not bring, always brings satisfaction.

The poet, George Herbert, was a member of a little group of friends who used to meet to play their musical instruments together. One evening he was on his way to a meeting of this group, when he passed a man whose cart was stuck in the mud in a ditch. George put his musical instrument down and went to help the man. It was a hard job to get the cart out of the ditch and it took a long time and when finished he was covered with mud. When he arrived at his friends house it was too late for music. He told them why he was so late. One said "You have missed all the music." George Herbert smiled and said, "Yes, but I will have songs at midnight." He had the satisfaction of having done the Christ-like thing. The *FIRST* Christian Reward is the *SATISFACTION* which no money on earth can buy.

The *Second* reward of the Christian Life is *STILL MORE WORK TO DO!!* The task well done does not bring rest and comfort and ease; it brings still greater demands and more strenuous endeavours. In the parable of the Talents the reward given to the faithful servants was still greater responsibility. The brilliant

young musician is given, not easier music to play, but harder music to master . . . The Jews had a curious saying. They said that a wise teacher will treat the pupil "like a young heifer whose burden is increased daily." The Christian reward is the reverse of the world's reward. The world's reward would be an easier time!!! the reward of the Christian is that God lays still more and more upon us to do for Him and our fellows. The harder the work we are given to do, the greater the reward.

The *Third* reward is what has been called through the ages the *VISION OF GOD!!* For those who never give a thought to God, to be confronted by Him will bring terror and not joy. If we go from God . . . if we take our own way . . . if we drift further and further from Him . . . the gulf between us and God will become very wide, until in the end God will become for us a grim stranger, who we only wish to avoid. But, if we walk all this life with God . . . if we seek to obey His will for us . . . if goodness has been our quest through all our days, then all through this life we have been growing closer and closer to God, until in the end we pass into God's nearer presence . . . without fear but with radiant joy . . . and that my fellow Christians and my brother Masons is the greatest reward of all!

Go back to the 3rd Roughen . . . he has asked for his reward and he is still waiting for an answer . . . it comes to him from the words of the Senior Deacon:

Cm w b y r a u c y s h m s g a r y
w u r t . U t y c h t .

And Jesus says to us that when we have lived the Christian Life we shall have our Reward!

To: The Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick.

Of these visitations, six were for the installation of Worshipful Master and Officers of their lodge. Although I presided over the installations, I was assisted in a most able way by members of Grand Lodge.

However, one of these installations was outstanding as in my Mother Lodge I had the pleasure of installing my nephew as Master. Also at a special dinner ceremony following the installation, I was presented an "Illuminated Scroll" of my services to my community, to the Province of New Brunswick and to the Masonic Fraternity. This gesture by my Lodge was another highlight of my life, which I will always remember and value very highly.

At many of the visitations I had the pleasure of presenting 50-year pins and certificates to members of our fraternity. A list of those reaching this milestone in their masonic career will be included in the report.

During the past year, I had the pleasure of accompanying the brethren at four divine services:

May 27/73: Benjamin Lodge #31 attended in a body at the Anglican Church Lecford with an excellent attendance.

June 17/73: A joint service was attended in Moncton by the brethren from Districts 2 and 7. Rev. Mr. Jackson, Grand Chaplain, gave an inspiring address to the brethren in attendance.

June 24/73: A Sunday evening service by Corinthian Lodge #13 was held in their lodge room. Guest speaker was Rev. A. Lloyd Carver, S.W. St John's Lodge. This was an excellent service, with several musical selections rendered by our brethren accompanied by our Worthy Grand Organist Brother Robb.

March 24/73: Tobique Lodge #48 held a divine service at the United Baptist Church in Plaster Rock. Other fraternal organizations also were in attendance. This also was a well attended service.

During the past year I attended the Grand Lodge of Prince Edward Island meeting at Malpeque and presided at the installation of the newly elected slate of officers. I enjoyed my visitation very much.

On May 18th and 19th, accompanied by Mrs. Brooks, I attended the regular Communication of the Grand Lodge of New Hampshire.

July 17th, 18th and 19th we also attended the Grand Lodge of Canada in Ontario. While in Toronto, accompanied by the Grand Secretary, Brother Lemmon, I had the pleasure of visiting Brother H. F. S. Paisley, who is 89 years old. He was raised in Lebanon Lodge, Sackville, in 1909. While visiting Brother Paisley we pre-

sented him with a 60 year pin. Brother Paisley was a journalist, and worked in many parts of New Brunswick in early life, and was a most interesting person to talk to. We enjoyed our visit with him very much.

Many times in the last year I was asked to attend special dinners and meetings by different lodges as their guest speaker.

On February 22nd Benjamin Lodge #31 held a special meeting honouring the senior members of their lodge. I had the pleasure of officiating at the presentation of honorary membership certificates as well as presenting a 50 year pin to Past District Deputy Grand Master Brother Carpenter. Brother Carpenter has been an outstanding member of Benjamin Lodge both in interest and attendance.

Benjamin Lodge has one brother who has, in February last, been a member 72 years, having been made a Master Mason in February, 1902.

On September 22nd last, accompanied by members of Grand Lodge, I attended the ceremony of the laying of the cornerstone for the new building being constructed by Sussex Lodge #7 at St. Stephen. This was a public ceremony, very well attended, and the members of Sussex Lodge are to be congratulated on their new Lodge Hall. The dedication ceremonies are to be held in the near future. Also a dedication ceremony for the new Lodge Building at Coverdale is to be held on Monday, June 3rd at 7.30 p.m.

On January 20th I was asked to be guest speaker at a Knights of Columbus meeting in Andover. The wives of members were also in attendance. I was accompanied by the Presiding Master and immediate Past Master of Benjamin Lodge #31. I was asked to speak on Masonry and although I did not have a prepared script, I addressed the gathering for a short time, outlining general information which is available in the booklet "Masonry, a Way of Life".

I then invited questions from those attending. The meeting was one of the most interesting I have ever attended. I received a good number of questions from the members, and also from the wives. They were good questions and showed a genuine interest and a very considerable knowledge of the work that all Masonic bodies are involved in.

Two members of the Knights of Columbus spoke briefly and had nothing but praises for our whole Masonic Fraternity. Before the meeting closed I was presented with a small gift as a token of their appreciation.

This kind of friendly relationship with other associations, I feel, is essential. It means much more perhaps in our rural areas than in the more populated areas. However we must remember that the greater part of our Province is made up of rural communities and a friendly atmosphere can mean much to a better community life.

I had the opportunity to attend the Grand Masters' Conference in Washington, D.C. from February 17th to 20th, accompanied by the Most Worshipful Brother Lemmon and also Most Worshipful Past Grand Master Pearson. As this was my first attendance at such a meeting, I enjoyed it very much. Papers were presented by different jurisdictions on a variety of subjects, and most were well prepared and most interesting. We had an opportunity to visit the George Washington Memorial Building and also were invited to luncheon at the Scottish Rite Building.

It is an education in itself to go through these memorial buildings, constructed so many years ago, but with such magnificent architecture. Every member, if ever in that area, should make a special effort to visit these memorial buildings.

I certainly want to express my appreciation to the D.D. Grand Masters for their work in the past year. I believe a good many have held district meetings, and these are so important to our subordinate lodges.

Our Ritual Committee is continuously spending time and effort to eliminate errors, which seem to always have a way of developing. The committee has been most willing to attend the district meetings, and also to assist any Worshipful Master and other Lodge Officers who are interested in seeing that they are carrying out the correct ritual work in each Lodge.

Every D.D. Grand Master should make the effort to have at least one district meeting during his term of office. Only in this way can we hope to have uniform work within our New Brunswick Lodges.

Shortly after I assumed office last year, a meeting of the District Deputies was held in Fredericton. I believe all were in attendance except one, who was out of the Province. I sincerely believe these meetings are extremely important. A great amount of ground is covered at these meetings and they are of greater importance of course to the newly appointed D. Deputy, as it does give him a chance to familiarize himself with his duties and what is expected from him during his term of office.

I also wish to commend the Grand Lodge Committee on Culture and Information for the excellent work they are doing. Information is being supplied to our subordinate lodges and, of course, it is up to each Lodge to take full advantage of the information supplied.

STATE OF THE ORDER

In my visitations to our subordinate lodges, I have been most pleased with the reception accorded the Grand Lodge Party. The response from Worshipful Masters, Past Masters and other officers has been very good, and indicates a genuine desire on their part to promote the principles of Masonry in every way possible. The attendance by members generally has been fairly good, while in some cases it will certainly stand improvement. It seems that in some districts or areas the attendance will be very good while in other sections of the Province you may find the opposite is true. This indicates to me that the officers in some cases are creating more interest among the members. This can be accomplished by special meetings and visitations with adjacent Lodges. Inspired leadership in any phase of our society has a tendency to spread to others around such a leader. This same philosophy certainly applies to our fraternity.

We are living today in a period of international tensions which again endanger the peace of the world. There are religious conflicts, territorial disputes, and many other disputes which all seem to be leading countries toward conflict. Even here in our own country, people are deeply disturbed by wide-spread erosion of ethical and moral values and standards of integrity and honesty heretofore taken for granted, and also by evidence of growing disrespect for law and for the rights of others.

Thirty-five years ago, 1939, was also a time of grave crisis, world-wide and domestic. There were powerful nations in which the leaders were demanding the worship of State instead of God; selfishness; intolerance and brute force were in the ascendancy; individual rights had ceased to exist; and in some countries visible Masonry had been exterminated. At that time, the leaders of Freemasonry sought and found light for the dark road ahead of them by restating and affirming their faith in the Fraternity's basic tenets. It characterized Freemasonry as a charitable, benevolent educational and religious society, whose principles are proclaimed as widely as men will hear, and whose only secrets are in its methods of recognition and of symbolic instruction.

Freemasonry is charitable in that all of its income is devoted to the promotion of welfare and happiness of Mankind; is benevolent in that it teaches and exemplifies altruism - "good will toward men" as a duty; is educational in that it teaches a system of morality and brotherhood based on the sacred law; is religious but not sectarian or theological, requiring belief in God and giving lessons in morality.

The ideals and principles which Masonry represents are ageless though ancient. It was found necessary to restate and af-

firm those principles in 1939. However they are needed in every age; at least as much in the world today as in the context of the world of that time. In our social structure, much of which is urban and rural in nature, it is through public expression of Masonic principles that we can best reach our young men and let them know of the Fraternity. Masonry's future may to some extent rest upon the wide understanding of Masonic philosophy. The Worshipful Master of a Subordinate Lodge should be a strong force in the community in which he lives. He should be an active participant in all things that are for the betterment of the social and moral life of those with whom he may be in daily contact.

The wardens should be preparing now for the time when they may be the Worshipful Master of their respective lodges. It is not necessary that we should all follow the same path as our predecessors, but be original thinkers. If there are problems, and we all have them, no matter what we may be doing, one should analyze those problems and be able to accept and solve those problems when the opportunity presents itself. We can talk as much as we like, can perhaps make some very nice sounding speeches for those who have to listen; however, the success of our whole Fraternal institution rests with the success of the individual Lodges which make up this vast fabric. Let us all in the next year do our part in the manner expected of us, and thus we will be worthy of the great heritage handed to us.

We all joined Freemasonry because of favourable impressions created by friends or family members who were in the Craft. Surely if they could create that impression on us, we can create that same favourable impression on our friends. We do not have to reveal any of our "secrets", but let us make sure that we do not allow the word secret to smother us. How can we make its impact felt? We can build the image of Masonry by our own example, re-dedicate our lives to the practical application of the principles by which we live.

Become Masons in fact, as well as in name. Set such an example that others will want to be one of us, not for what we have been as individuals but for what the Great Architect made us. Let's not be afraid to say we are better men now because of Freemasonry and be better men than we were.

Conduct ourselves among others as we do among our brethren
Greet every man in the spirit that we would a brother Mason
Consider their needs and give assistance
Respect their confidence
Support their good name in their absence as we would in their presence

Do all these things to such an extent that all men will have such a favourable opinion
Preconceived, of our Institution, that they will want to be more serviceable to their fellow men

This is no easy chore, but if we are genuinely concerned about the state of Freemasonry, we must be genuinely concerned about the state of our fellow men.

Let us motivate by example

Let us ask each other, every month if necessary,

What have we done to be more extensively servicable to our fellow man?

Let it be asked in every Lodge every month

Then if we have put out a sustained effort and continued to develop ourselves as true Masons, we will necessarily improve the image of Freemasonry, and the impact of Freemasonry will be felt.

In closing I only want to again express my thanks to all those who have been of such assistance in the last year.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Secretary, I am most appreciative of his assistance. I have had a busy year. Without his help, it would have been much more difficult.

Again I want to thank the Most Worshipful Past Grand Masters who were so faithful in their attendance at my visitations. Their advice and counsel were a great help in keeping me on the right road and in the right direction. They have exemplified the true meaning of "Masonry - a way of life".

"In ages past, by act of God
A world for man was made.
Great treasures he bestowed on us,
And a Master Plan he laid.

He gave us brothers, one and all,
Our blessing for to share.
He thought of you, he thought of me,
He asked us but to care.

This upward look, and will to give,
With no thought of reward,

So give us strength and will to do,

During the past year meetings of the Board were held in June, January, and March —

At the June meeting, R.W. Malcolm F. Eagles, Sr. Grand Warden, was elected Vice President of the Board, R.W. Earle B. Ross, Deputy Grand Master presided at all their meetings.

The Board of General Purposes adopted the recommendation of the Jurisprudence Committee that the title of Very Worshipful Grand Chaplain is permanent from the date of election as such by Grand Lodge.

A resolution was passed by the Board of General Purposes under the authority of the Constitution and Regulations of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick, as amended by Section 19, relating to the Powers of the Board of General Purposes on the 12th day of May, 1973.

Be it resolved, in accord with the duties of the Junior Warden of all lodges that they be ever watchful to see that none of the craft be suffered to convert the purposes of refreshment to intemperance and excess, that no member of the craft shall attend at a meeting of a lodge while under the influence of alcohol nor shall any member of the craft serve or consume any alcoholic beverage subsequent to the opening of the lodge and prior to the lodge being duly closed.

Be it further resolved that on the occasion of a banquet, dinner or of a reception in honour of any member of the craft in lodge premises alcoholic beverages may be served with the written permission of the Worshipful Master to be filed with the secretary of the lodge, and in conformity with the provisions of the New Brunswick Liquor Act prior to the opening of the lodge or subsequent to the lodge being closed or at such time as the Worshipful Master shall designate in the event of the lodge not meeting at labour.

And further, this resolution is forwarded to the secretary of each subordinate lodge in the jurisdiction to be read in full at the next regular meeting following receipt thereof and noted in the minutes for record.

The Board also dealt with such routine matters as the purchase of rituals which will be taken care of by the Ritual Committee; the purchase of the Beardsley Medals; Masonic scholarships, etc.

ANNUAL REPORT OF GRAND HISTORIAN

To The Most Worshipful The Grand Master
Officers and Members of
The Grand Lodge of New Brunswick
Free and Accepted Masons

The Fraternity and their immediate families have been stricken during the last year by death. To all who have sustained such a loss, we extend sympathy and understanding.

Following the submission of my last Annual Report to Grand Lodge of April 1973, the ceremonies in respect to Consecration and Dedication of the new temple of Westmorland Lodge No. 44 was observed in accordance with ancient form and usage on Friday, April 27, at 7:30 P.M., following the dinner when over 75 members were present from lodges throughout the Maritime Provinces. One of the final duties of the Most Worshipful Maurice Wm. Dalton The Grand Master who presided over these ceremonies on that date was to conduct these duties in his usual capable and efficient manner. One of the highlights on this occasion was the presentation and dedication to Westmorland No. 44 of an illuminated letter "G" from the family of Scotts across Canada in loving memory of the late Wor. Bro. Jas. G. Scott in recognition of his loyal and devoted service to the Craft in his home Town of Port Elgin, N. B.

The Very Worshipful Grand Chaplain, Rev. D. C. Jackson spoke his sentiments and affection for Port Elgin. "Man's greatest building is his own life. God makes himself as real today as he did in the days of the Temple. Masons are God's people."

Westmorland Lodge No. 44 is to be congratulated for the rapid progress in the erection of their new quarters which saw the traditional sod turning ceremony on June 11, 1972; the Laying of the Cornerstone on October 15, 1972 and finally the Consecration and Dedication on April 27, 1973.

On June 14, 1973 Grand Lodge was pleased to receive a History of Howard Lodge No. 15, F. & A. M. Hillsboro, N. B., written by Wor. Bro. Ernest W. N. Bradley. This is indeed a very fine piece of work capably written covering 117 years dating from 1855 to May 1972. Operating under Warrant from the Grand Lodge of England, it is noted the membership dues were 2 shillings, 6 pence to be paid every six months. During the first year Howard Lodge received 14 members. In ten years, the lodge had 40 members. This was a time of prominent growth in Masonry. The following year, Howard Lodge paid 15 shillings for passage of each of the brethren who attended the consecration of the new lodge hall in Saint John, N. B. and to travel via the Steamer Westmorland.

On March 1, 1860, the Grand Lodge of N. B. and the Grand Lodge of England were sending Howard Lodge communications from their secretaries. The same year, dollars and cents came into use in Howard Lodge.

On Dec. 27, 1867, Howard Lodge sent a delegate to Saint John for instruction, again the mode of travel was via boat. The following year, Howard Lodge No. 15 received its charter.

In the year 1880 the word "inflation" was seldom heard, yet this lodge found it necessary to increase their annual dues from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per annum.

It is evident from a review of this history, Howard Lodge had its problems of making ends meet considering their expenditures were covering many charitable donations to brethren who were ill; contributions to widows; supplies for lodge use such as coal stoves, scuttles, cuspidors, lamps and oil. Nevertheless, their history is one of enviable success as they continued to grow and prosper financially as well as membership. Throughout the many years, Howard Lodge was fortunate to have loyal and efficient secretaries who recorded for posterity the many and varied social function enjoyed by the Fraternity.

The concluding pages of their history reveals a total of 51 deceased past masters; 29 living past masters with a total living membership of 90 member.

Grand Lodge salutes Howard Lodge commemorating 119 years of active and continuous masonry in Hillsboro, N. B.

On Saturday, Sept. 22, 1973 The Most Worshipful Grand Master John Stewart Brooks, The Grand Master assisted by officers of Grand Lodge officiated at the "Laying of the Cornerstone" of the new addition to the Masonic Temple at Saint Stephen, N. B. on the premises of Sussex Lodge No. 7 F. & A. M. The ceremonies were open to members of the fraternity, their families and the public generally. The Worshipful Master W. B. Clifton R. Doran, welcomed the Grand Master and 25 members of grand lodge. The Grand Master then took over and proceeded with the ceremony of laying the corner-stone which he did in a very impressive manner. The Mayor of Saint Stephen, His Worship Douglas Hanson was introduced and extended a warm welcome to Grand Lodge, masons and visiting guests, in total about 100 in number.

R. W. Brother Richardson was Chairman of the building committee assisted by the chairman of the Finance Committee, Bros. Linton B. Mitchell and the building contractor, Bro. Armin Langley.

Bro. David D. Dalzell, Senior Deacon of Sussex Lodge No. 7 read a brief history of Sussex Lodge since its formation over a hundred years ago and presented it to the Grand Director of Ceremonies who deposited it with the cornerstone.

I am indebted to the Secretary of Sussex Lodge No. 7 Bro. Walter S. Allen who has forwarded to me a copy of the history researched and prepared by Bro. Dalzell, excerpts are briefly as follows:—

"Masons have probably been present in this area from the time the first few settlers arrived. However, it was not until 26 October 1809 that these men who found themselves linked together by an indissoluble chain of sincere affection were successful in obtaining a charter from the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia under the name of the Orphan's Friend Lodge No. 34. Its original members consisted of both Canadian and American citizens who, even during the war of 1812, continued to meet together on this side of the river. This lodge was relatively short lived because of the removal of many of its most dynamic members. It finally closed its doors shortly after the formation of St. Croix Lodge in Calais in 1824.

A masonic lodge reappeared in St. Stephen when a charter was granted to Sussex Lodge No. 327 on the Registry of the Grand Lodge of Ireland. On the 29th of April 1846 Dugald Blair M.D. was installed as the first Worshipful Master of this lodge which had derived its name from the Earl of Sussex who was then Grand Master.

In the early 1860's membership dwindled and on 12 April, 1861 the lodge barely survived a motion to surrender its charter. A second lodge in the area, Union Lodge No. 866 of Milltown operating under a charter granted by the Grand Lodge of England, also suffered from a lack of members. The two lodges conferred and knowing that in the day of adversity the strength of both would be needed to preserve the warrant of one and the members of Union Lodge united with Sussex Lodge. The first meeting after union took place on 24th July, 1861.

After the formation earlier in the month of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, Sussex Lodge No. 327 met on the 30th of October 1867 and voted to surrender its Irish Charter and to continue to operate as Sussex Lodge under a dispensation granted by this newly formed grand lodge. Sussex Lodge No. 7 received its charter from the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick on the 31st of August, 1868 and since that time the lodge has flourished. During its existence Sussex Lodge has produced many men renowned both for their civic as well as for their masonic honours. Three members of the

sex Lodge have had the high honour of being elected to the office of Grand Master. They were:

Julius Thompson Whitlock in 1895 & 1896
John Starr DeWolfe Chipman in 1907 & 1908, and
James Vroom in 1926 & 1927.

Most Worshipful Brother Vroom was a member of St Mark's Lodge in St Andrews as well as being a member of Sussex Lodge.

The members of Sussex Lodge took part in what has been the largest assembly of masons in the border area when on St. John's Day, the 24th of June 1881, the Most Worshipful Benjamin Robert Stevenson, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, accompanied by approximately 700 masons from New Brunswick and Maine laid the cornerstone of the St. Croix Cotton Mills.

The erection of this new hall will, therefore, mark the first time in its history that Sussex Lodge will own a building that was erected primarily as a lodge hall."

Again Grand Lodge salutes Sussex Lodge No. 7 for their long years of masonic endeavours in the Town of Saint Stephen, N. B. Their records disclose masonry has existed since 1809 or a total of 165 years within that area or a total of 128 years under Charter granted to Sussex Lodge No. 327 on the registry of Ireland in the year 1846.

On Oct. 6, 1973, Fownes Lodge No. 45, F. & A. M. at Havelock, N. B. observed their 50th anniversary, the Most Worshipful, the Grand Master John Stewart Brooks was the guest speaker on this historic occasion who spoke very impressively and held the attention of his listeners.

Space does not permit the writing of all events of importance covering this half-century of lodge activity, but it is worthy to note that Fownes Lodge is named after Captain Wm. H. Fownes who was a sea captain, sailing out of St. Martins, N. B. and who travelled all over the world. He was an ardent mason joining Leinster Lodge No. 19 Saint John, N. B. (now extinct) receiving his E. A. degree May 18, 1876; F.C. on June 9, 1876 and M.M. on June 19, 1876. He left the sea in 1896 and passed to the Celestial Lodge in 1902. His widow owned and provided lodge quarters from 1923 until 1947.

The first masonic meeting held in the village of Havelock was on Dec. 15, 1922 under the direction of Rt. Wor. Bro. Albert E. Pearson, D.D.G.M., of Dist. No. 1 who took the chair and organized the lodge assisted by visiting brethren from Moncton, Salis-

bury, Petitcodiac and Sussex. At this meeting the petition and dispensation was read.

The building of the new temple was one of volunteer labor, sacrifice, donations and hard work. From the donation of standing lumber in the forest to the final completion of the building, the story of perseverance is one to be remembered.

On June 22, 1948 the temple was dedicated by the most Worshipful the Grand Master D. C. Malcolm accompanied by officers of Grand Lodge. The Most Wor. Past Master Arthur S. Robinson (now deceased) was the guest speaker.

From a review of their history, from the beginning, Fownes Lodge moved forward at a rapid pace. The lodge prospered and has been active in both the social and masonic life of the Community.

Fownes Lodge is to be congratulated for their efforts in furthering the course of masonry in that area of the Province and Grand Lodge extends best wishes for their continued prosperity.

I am indebted to Rt. Wor. P. L. W. Drader of Keith Lodge No. 23 F. & A. M. Moncton for the following contribution. It is considered to be so newsworthy and of historical significance that it is being submitted herewith for publication:—

DEMOLAY INSTALLED WOR. MASTER OF LODGE

"On Jan. 3, 1974 a unique event took place in the history of masonry in N. B. at the Installation of Howard Lodge No. 15 Hillsborough, N. B. on the Register of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of N. B. when Bro. Wm. Henry Balser Jr. was installed Wor. Master of the Lodge by his father Wm. Henry Balser Sr.

Wor. Master Balser Jr. was a former member and a Past Master Councillor of Coronation Chapter Order of DeMolay in Moncton, N. B., his record of devotion and achievement in DeMolay was so outstanding that the Supreme Council Order of DeMolay in Kansas City, Missouri at their annual meeting in 1969 was pleased to confer on him, in absentia the degree of Chevalier, the highest degree obtainable by a member of the Order seventeen years of age or over.

In August the same year at the Maritime Conclave of DeMolays in Sydney he was invested with the Cordon and Jewel of the degree by Rt. Bro. P. L. Drader at the request and on behalf of the Executive Officer for N. B. at the time Dad Stan Cassidy. Wor. Bro. Balser has the distinction of having been the first DeMolay to have come up through the offices of DeMolay and the offices of the Blue Lodge of Ma-

sonry, finally to be elected and installed Wor. Master of his lodge — a very commendable achievement.

The Order of DeMolay has grown in popularity since it was organized and founded as a character building organization for boys 14 - 21 years of age by the late Frank S. Land, Kansas City, Missouri and is now world wide.

This is a most worthy project for the Masonic Fraternity to sponsor for further development of boys as they enter manhood and take their places as good and upright citizens of Canada."

During the past year a considerable number of brethren were presented with bars, jewels or certificates marking their long service careers. This list of members is given in the Report of the Grand Master.

Jarvis and adopted that the subject be referred to the Board of General Purposes for action in approaching the proper authorities of the Provincial Government in due form and endeavor.

RECESS

Motion to recess until the hour of 2:00 P.M. was adopted and the brethren repaired to the Banquet Hall for lunch. The speaker for this occasion was M:W: Brother Gordon L. Bennett, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Prince Edward Island who encouraged the brethren to be more conscious of the changes in everyday social and economic affairs and to participate in community and social activities.

A standing ovation was accorded the speaker and the M:W: The Grand Master, on behalf of the Grand Lodge invested M:W: Brother Bennett with the John Beardsley Medallion, a token of appreciation and fraternal relations which has characterized our border jurisdictions of Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Grand Lodge resumed labor at 2:00 P.M. and the final report of the Credential Committee being submitted, Grand Lodge proceeded to the election of Grand Lodge officers as follows:
