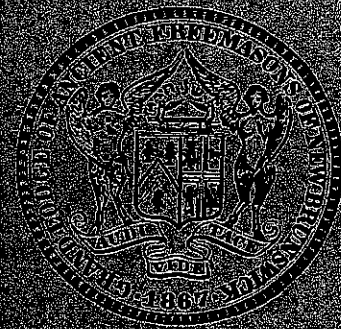
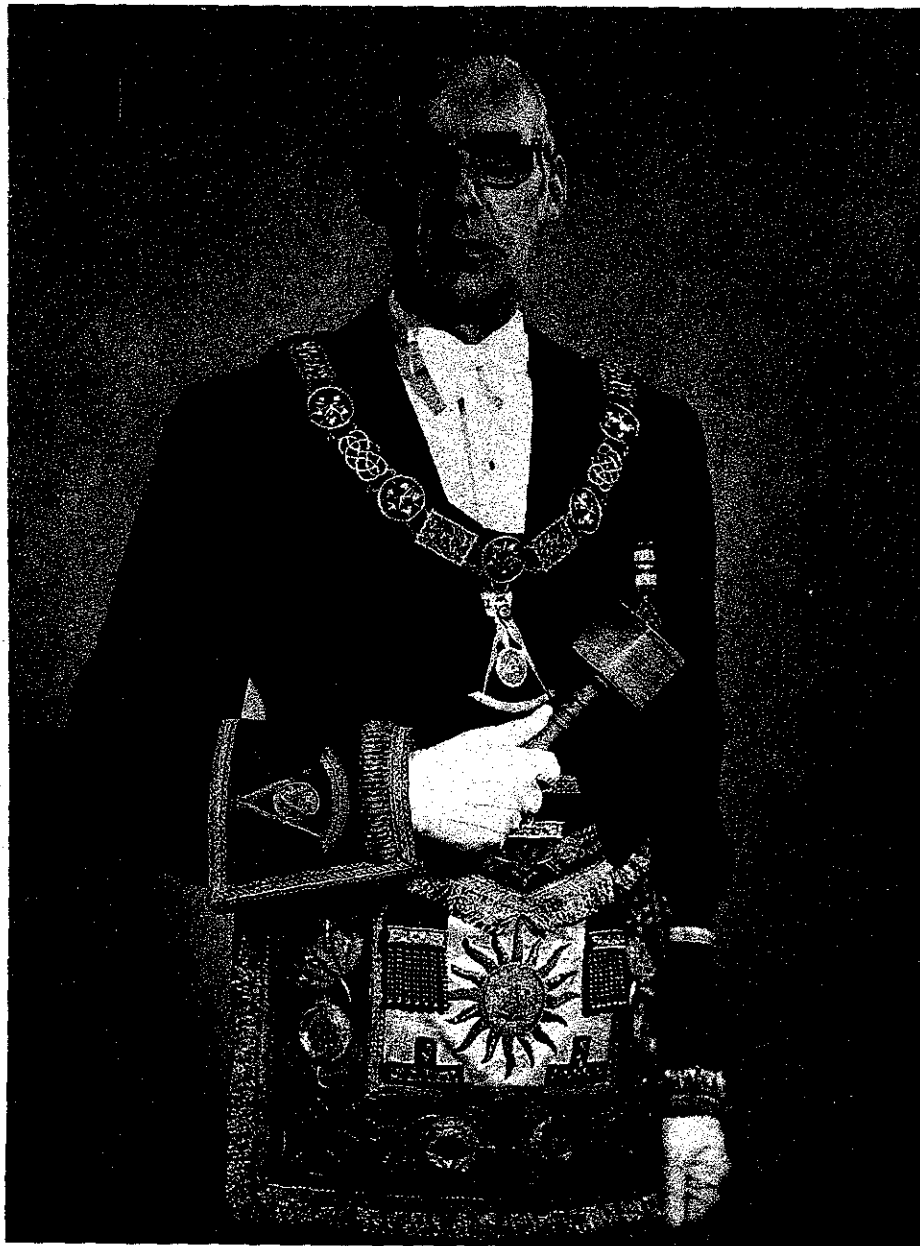

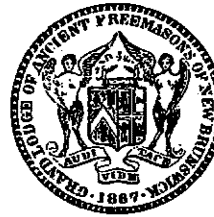

The Annual Meeting of the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation was held May 9, 1975 in the Masonic Temple in the City of Saint John.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M., Earle B. Ross, President of the Board and R:W: Deputy Grand Master presiding.

Those present and eligible are listed in the attendance at Grand Lodge.

The Grand Treasurer, F. S. P. Haycox presented and read a statement of the Corporation's accounts for the past year, copies of which were distributed to the members present. This statement set forth the receipts and expenditures of General Account, Fund of Benevolence, Regalia and Liability Insurance Accounts which had been previously considered and adopted by the Board of Directors of the Grand Lodge Corporation.

"Surely you know that you are
God's temple . . . For God's temple
is holy, and you yourself are
his temple."

1 Corinthians 3: 16 & 17
Today's English Version

My subject on this occasion is contained in a question. What shape is your Temple in? It is a question that I put to each of you my brothers as we share in this annual service of Thanksgiving and Re-dedication. Let us all consider with interest and expectation this question realizing as we do that each of us must answer it for himself. It is a personal question and it requires a personal answer.

The word TEMPLE is filled with great meaning for every Mason. It reminds us that our meeting rooms are in buildings that we call Temples and that the narrow confines of our meeting rooms represent to us some of the features of one of the greatest Temples ever built by men.

When a Mason thinks of a Temple he has in mind not only his Lodge building for that Temple, as important as it is, stands in the shadow of that great Temple which Solomon built. That Temple, as we all know, was built of great stones, pillars and beams. It took 30,000 Israelites and 150,000 Canaanites 7 years to do the job. They did their work well and Solomon's Temple stood for 400 years. It was destroyed by the Babylonians, the men of Nebuchadnezzar, who after they had stripped it of everything of value that could be carried away, burned what remained. What shape is King Solomon's Temple In? No shape at all for it is long gone!

Earlier in this service our Deputy Grand Master read a portion of Scripture that brought all of our attention to another Temple. It was the Temple that Jesus came to and caused such a fuss in on the Monday of the Week we now refer to as Holy Week . . . the last week of His life before the Crucifixion. It was Herod's Temple. It had been built out of marble and gold and it stood for 90 years before it was destroyed by the Romans. It was magnificent beyond imagination. But Jesus did not like the shape that He found this Temple in. He caused quite a disturbance when He drove out the money changers and those who bought and sold because they were making such a profit and the whole service of worship had been commercialized.

Jesus' actions brought immediate reactions from His disciples and from the people who were there. The disciples realized from His actions that Jesus was indeed the Messiah . . . but the people involved questioned Him as to by what authority He did these things. In other words they were saying; "Show us your credentials . . . let us see some kind of sign which will prove to us that you are who you say you are."

Jesus reply to their request brings me to a third Temple. It is also referred to in the Scripture that we are now thinking about. Jesus said, in answer to the questioning of the people:

"Tear down this house of God and in
three days I will build it again."

Now that got quite a laugh!! The people laughed and said in a mocking way;

"It has taken forty-six years to build
this temple! . . . You are going to build it
in three days?"

Now we know today that the Temple that Jesus was talking about was not Herod's Temple but His own body . . . His death was its tearing down . . . and His resurrection three days later was its building up again.

Knowledge is a wonderful thing. It has been described by one man as "a strong stream of water turned on us through a hose." It disturbs our very roots. In Paul's words to the early followers he reminds us of something that we have long forgotten today. He said:

"Surely you know that you are God's
temple . . ."

How is that for a blunt reminder Masons and friends!! Surely with all our knowledge we could not have forgotten this important fact!! Each one of us is God's Temple!!

Up to now we have been thinking of Temples in the sense of buildings. We are God's building . . . What kind of shape are we in? ? ?

Now let's quickly get rid of the idea that I am thinking about our physical appearance. That is far from the case, although the Masonry of the outward appearance of at least some of us could stand some shaping up in a few places. Jesus was talking about our Inner-selves and that is what I really want to talk about tonight. My question about the condition of our personal temple is of our inner-selves and we all need to stop and take an inside look at ourselves. We need to turn ourselves inside out, to see what shape we are in.

We are as individuals God's Temples! When we are together in worship either here or in our annual Church parades we need to remember that we are an earthly expression of the God we serve. We are God's Temple . . . each one of us . . . What kind of shape are we in? ? ? That question requires that we make an inspection of our motives . . . that we examine our priorities, . . . that we look at the way we talk and the words we use . . . are we honest, reliable, dependable . . . do we show love and concern and understanding to our families and friends, are we interested in others . . . are our characters molded in the likeness of Jesus of Nazareth?

Do you see the importance of these questions? If you can answer them all in a positive way then your Temple is secure . . . built on a firm foundation . . . its roof and walls are strong . . . its carrying beams are free from rot and our examples speak for itself. If, on the other hand, we can only answer a few of these questions in a positive way, then we will have to do some rebuilding for Jesus has made it plain that the only Temple that will bring anyone to Him is the Christ like example that we His followers show.

Jesus shattered the religious leaders of His day by telling them that all the magnificence and all the splendor and all the skill and money they had used to build their great Temple was to no avail . . . for He had come to show men a way to God without any Temple such as that . . . We have here a great truth . . . the truth that our contact with God, our entry into His presence . . . our approach to Him is not dependent on anything that we build with our hands or devise with our minds. Rather, it all depends upon the condition of our inner temple.

There is an old story that King Solomon, upon the occasion of the dedication of his great Temple said that the workman who had contributed most to the building of that noble structure should reign for a day. When the workers were led into the throne room, the king was surprised to see a blacksmith in the seat of honor. When he asked about this the blacksmith's reply was: "I made the tools with which the others worked."

My fellow Masons . . . We are tools that God uses to build His Temple. In our labours in the Lodge He uses us . . . in our labours in the Churches we attend and serve He uses us . . . in our daily occupations He uses us . . . Each one of us is a Temple, erected to the serving of our Master . . . What kind of shape are we in?

I have put the question to you? Each one of us must make our own answer. Look at your innerself with the light that comes to each of us from the rays of the Life of Jesus Christ . . . with the light that comes to us as we Labour in the Lodge . . . and in all of your labours recall to mind the words of Paul which were my text:

"Surely you know that you are
God's temple . . ."

What kind of shape is your temple in?

MORNING SESSION SATURDAY, MAY 10, 1975

The Grand Lodge resumed at 10:00 A.M. The M:W: The Grand Master Presiding.

The Acting Grand Secretary, M:W: Bro. M. W. Dalton presented the nominations for the elective offices for the ensuing year and on motion adopted the hour of 2:00 P.M. was set apart for the recording of votes.

SPECIAL PRESENTATION

On instructions, the Grand Director of Ceremonies conducted Right Worshipful Francis L. Nickson to the Grand East. The M:W: The Grand Master remarked that the worthy Right Worshipful Brother had been selected to be awarded the John Beardsley Medallion in recognition of outstanding service to the fraternity over a period of years and his sincere attachment to the Craft.

At nine of these visitations in December and January, with the assistance of the Grand Lodge Officers I presided over the installation of the new slate of officers.

On May 16th, I attended a communication of Lebanon Lodge, Sackville, on the occasion of honouring the veteran members of their lodge. I had the pleasure of presenting several long service certificates and pins to the honoured brethren.

On June 3rd, with members of the Grand Lodge, I attended a dedication service of the Coverdale Lodge in Riverview. The brethren of this area are to be commended for their efforts in providing spacious quarters.

On October 4th, members of the Grand Lodge assembled in the new lodge building of Sussex Lodge #7, St. Stephen, where a dedication service was held. The new lodge room addition provides ample quarters and will be a great addition to the facilities for that area. I know many brethren worked faithfully for a long period of time before accomplishing their goal and a lot of credit is due them.

During the past year, I had the pleasure of accompanying the brethren at three divine services.

June 16th, a divine service was attended by our brethren in the United Church at Norton.

June 16th, a joint parade and service was attended in the United Baptist Church in Moncton by the brethren from Districts 2 and 7.

June 23rd, Corinthian Lodge #13, Hampton, held their annual divine service in their lodge room with an excellent attendance. Several musical selections were rendered by our brethren, accompanied by our talented Grand Organist, Brother Robb.

During the past year, I again attended the Grand Lodge Communication at Charlottetown, P. E. I., and had the pleasure to preside at the installation ceremonies of the new slate of officers.

In June of last year, I visited the Grand Lodge meeting of Nova Scotia at Lunenburg and in July, I attended the annual communication of the Grand Lodge of Canada in Toronto, Ontario. There were over 1900 brethren attending this meeting.

I had the pleasure, when visiting St. John's Lodge #2 at St. John, of presenting a 50-year certificate and pin to R. W. Brother E. E. Spencer, P.D.D.G.M., a member of Morden Lodge #13, Brandon, Manitoba. As I have been Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba for some time, it was a pleasure to present this on behalf of their Grand Master.

At a special meeting of Benjamin Lodge #31, honouring their older members, I had the happy task of presenting a special certificate to P.M. Brother Harry Hopkins, who has been a member of Benjamin Lodge for 73 years in February of this year. I believe this is perhaps, in terms of membership, the oldest living member at the present time.

In the last year, the committee on Culture and Information completed their Officer's Manual and five copies have been delivered to each Lodge.

This Manual is a consolidation of all directives and instructions that have been sent to secretaries of subordinate lodges over a long period of time. It is an excellent Manual and should be of great assistance to the line officers. The committee that had the responsibility of the preparation of this Manual is to be commended for a job well done.

The Scholarship Committee held their meeting in the summer of 1974 and awarded scholarships of \$750.00 each to eight deserving students. A notice of the recipients appeared in the daily papers at that time.

During the year, District meetings were held in the various districts by the D.D.G.M.'s. Although I was unable to attend most of them, members of the Ritual Committee were on hand. These meetings have proved very beneficial, and the comments made on the work exemplified has been of valuable assistance to the officers and members of each district.

On February 14th and 15th, accompanied by the Grand Secretary and the Deputy Grand Master, I attended the all Canada Conference of Grand Masters at Winnipeg, Manitoba.

This was a most interesting conference. Papers were presented on a variety of subjects by different provinces. The Deputy Grand Master of Ontario presented a paper on Lodge Administration, to which I had to reply, and I chaired the discussion in regard to this subject.

This was my first contact with the Canadian Conference, and due to the limited attendance, it was possible to carry out a much better discussion on the papers presented than would have been possible with a larger group such as the North American Conference.

After the Winnipeg Conference, the Grand Secretary and I flew to Washington, D.C., to attend the North American Conference on February 16th, 17th and 18th.

This was a well-attended conference, with representatives from many countries of the world. Due to the size of this conference, it was impossible to have the same kind of dialogue on the papers presented as would be possible in smaller groups.

However, I do feel that attendance is necessary. All Grand Jurisdictions seem to have common problems and the personal contacts with other Grand Lodge officers is of some benefit. The reports from other countries, such as France, Belgium, Japan and Germany, were most encouraging. Masonry certainly seems to be on the upswing, according to all reports submitted at the conference.

I believe we can no longer live in isolation and I strongly recommend that this Grand Lodge be represented at this conference each year.

On April 7th, I attended a special dedication service of Cherry Mountain Lodge in Harvey Station. The occasion was open to the public and was to dedicate a new rug to the Lodge in memory of Ersel Corey, a Past Master of Cherry Mountain Lodge.

The rug was presented to the Lodge by Brother Harry Corey and Mrs. Corey as a memorial to their son.

The Lodge room had only recently been refurbished by the lodge for the occasion and with the addition of the rug, they have a most pleasant and attractive lodge room.

This gift was a generous gesture by Brother Corey, however, the family has long been active in Masonic circles, as well as playing an important role in all community endeavors and in the economic affairs of this Province.

STATE OF THE ORDER

After having visited all Lodges within this jurisdiction in the last two years, one cannot help but have mixed feelings in regard to the part Grand Lodge plays in the success of our subordinate lodges.

Many questions are sometimes brought to mind. Grand Lodge owes a very great obligation of leadership to the craft lodges. Are we fulfilling that obligation as we should? Are we transferring to our lodges those principles of which we so often talk about so that they can be implemented to the greatest effect on the Lodge? There is no question as to the fact we are having problems. The discussions and talks we have indicate very clearly that Masonry has work to do.

Today, free men and free countries are being challenged as never before, on a broad and almost complete scale.

The challenge is ours and no big wave, no grand emergence, no surfacing of anything that we can have any concept of today, is going to change our position, unless and until we get our coats off and start to work.

The leadership which we give the lodges must be tangible, real, adaptable, easily understood and hopefully easily applied.

During my term of office, I have been impressed by the leadership in our craft lodges, not only within the walls of our lodge rooms, but also the part being played in the community life in their respective areas.

The common problem, as so many times stated in the past, is lodge attendance. We should first try to find out why members are not coming to lodge and what is in their minds that keeps them from attending. Somehow we must reach out to those members and bring them back.

Masonry, in a sense, is a business — big business. We may not be operating for a monetary profit, however, our reward for a successful operation is far greater than any that can be measured in dollars and cents. We should establish our goals, the same as any successful enterprise does. At the beginning of every new year, we should establish our goals and make every effort throughout the year to attain them. Only by so doing will we prove ourselves worthy of the trust reposed in us.

I want to again express my appreciation for all the kindnesses extended to me on my visitations during this past year.

A great many members have been most faithful by attending night after night in all kinds of weather and, in some cases, driving extreme distances to attend our communications.

I also wish to thank our Grand Secretary for his assistance during the past year. It has not always been convenient to have the Grand Master living so far from the Secretary's office. However, he has been most helpful on all occasions.

To my Deputy Grand Master, I also want to express my appreciation for his help and assistance. I found he was most willing whenever requested to act on my behalf. It is not often, under our system, that the Grand Master has the same deputy during his two years in office. That fact, no doubt, made my position somewhat easier.

I am sure that my successor, whoever he shall be, will receive the same support and encouragement from all past and present Grand Lodge officers as I have received in my term of office.

The challenge to Masons is whether they are too busy with other things, or whether times are so different that they don't have time or can't make Freemasonry's light shine to be visible. What we need is to keep the light burning. If that light is kept burning, others will be attracted to our craft, seeking the light, because they have seen it in us. So, in other words, it is up to us to increase our

**REPORT OF THE BOARD OF
GENERAL PURPOSES****TO THE GRAND LODGE OF FREE AND
ACCEPTED MASONS OF NEW BRUNSWICK**

During the past year there were three meetings of the Board. These were held June 13, January 9 and March 8. At the June meeting R.W. Gerald G. O'Donnell Sr. Grand Warden was elected Vice-president. R.W. Earle B. Ross, Deputy Grand Master presided at all meetings.

At the June meeting a committee was named to review the Grand Lodge Installation Ceremonies. A revision of the ceremonies presently used was to be submitted, and this committee was composed of M.W. W. J. Summerville, M.W. Ralph T. Pearson and R.W. I. Dale Steeves.

A Committee was appointed to make representations to the Provincial Government concerning possible tax relief for Masonic Temples throughout New Brunswick. This committee was to present a brief to the Minister of Municipal Affairs, but after discussions with the Minister, and being informed of the proposed phasing out of the Property Taxes by the Government, it was decided that this matter would be held in abeyance for the time being.

The fifth edition of the Ritual for use in this Jurisdiction was received and distributed to the Lodge Secretaries. Copies of the Ritual are available to members with the price per copy being \$3.00. A letter concerning the construction of the Ritual was received from Keith Lodge No. 23, and this matter has been given consideration by the Board. 500 copies of the Manual for Officers have been printed and have been distributed to the Lodges through the District Deputy Grand Masters.

The status of the Immediate Past Master was referred to a committee chaired by M.W. Murray S. Speight, and reports as follows:

Your Committee has met and recognizes the need for an Installation Ceremony for the Immediate Past Master, even though he is not officially recognized as an Officer of the Lodge. It is the prerogative of the retiring Master to install his successor in Office. The New Master-Elect then should install, or cause to be installed, his slate of officers for the year, including the Immediate Past Master.

Your Committee also recognizes the need for, and strongly recommends a complete review of all Officers of a Lodge and recommends that consideration be given to the presentation of a White Paper to the Grand Lodge Assembly in May 1975.

The Board of General Purposes appointed a committee to this end, and a White Paper will be presented during our proceedings. Discussion of the White Paper will be led by MW. PGM. Speight.

Your Board also discussed at length the generous bequest to the Grand Lodge of the Late Brother William G. Quinn of Hiram Lodge in Fredericton. A committee comprising members of the Jurisprudence Committee was appointed to look after the interests of the New Brunswick Grand Lodge.

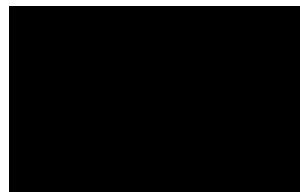

The Secretary, Wor. Bro. Chester A. Dorcas of Alexandria Lodge No. 33 has provided the details of the following:—

On Monday evening, May 6, 1974 at 6:15 the members of Alexandria Lodge No. 33, F. & A.M. hosted a testimonial dinner at the Gibson Memorial United Church Hall, Gibson St., Fredericton to honor Rt. Wor. Brother Arthur A. Wheaton, a Fifty Year Past Master of Alexandria Lodge.

R. W. Bro. Wheaton was raised in Alexandria Lodge on Sept. 30th 1920, was installed M.W. in 1924 and was D.D.G.M. of District No. 6 in 1927. He was made an Honorary Life member in 1970 and has been Lodge Treasurer since 1965 and is the oldest living past master of the lodge.

E. Vincent Allan, Raised 1942, Wor. Master 1955

Outstanding events such as this are few and far between and
we are indeed pleased to record this re-union of the four worship-
ful brothers who assembled in this historic old Lodge.

It is with pleasure we learn from Past Grand Historian, C. A.
Pincombe, that he has been successful in placing the name of our
distinguished pioneer brother, The Reverend John Beardsley on
the biographical list for inclusion in Volumn V of the Dictionary
of Canadian Biography.

It is understood Wor. Bro. Pincombe is now preparing a
biography not to exceed 600 words, the tentative date for publica-
tion is 1977 and it is gratifying to hear this Loyalist Clergyman
is eventually being recognized as the "Father of Freemasonry in
New Brunswick".

I am indeed indebted to Rt. Wor. P. L. W. Drader of Keith
Lodge No. 23 F. & A.M. Moncton for the following contribution.
It is considered to be so newsworthy and of historical significance
that it is being submitted herewith for publication:—

FORMER DEMOLAY INSTALLED WORSHIPFUL MASTER OF LODGE

On December 27, 1974 at the Installation of Civil Service
Masonic Lodge No. 148, Ottawa, Ontario on the Register of the
Grand Lodge of Canada in the Province of Ontario, Bro. Stanley
S. Alward, Jr. was installed Worshipful Master of the Lodge.

This was a unique occasion as Wor. Brother Alward before
his entry in Masonry had been a member and Past Master Coun-
cillor of Coronation Chapter of the Order of Demolay in Moncton,
N. B., before it became inactive. His interest and devotion in pro-
moting Demolay was so outstanding that he was elected and in-
stalled Jurisdictional Master Councillor for the Maritime Pro-
vinces.

Wor. Brother Alward is the second Past Master Councillor of
Coronation Chapter to have occupied the offices of Demolay and
offices of the Blue Lodge finally to be elected and installed Wor-
shipful Master of his lodge.

Brother Alward's first entry into Masonry was on August 27,
1965 when he received his E.A. degree in Keith Lodge No. 23,
Moncton, N. B. on the Register of the Grand Lodge of Free and
Accepted Masons of New Brunswick. He moved to Ottawa and re-
ceived his F.C. and M.M. degrees in Civil Service Lodge after
which he affiliated with Civil Service Lodge. Brother Alward still
retains his membership in Keith Lodge No. 23, Moncton, his
mother lodge.

Since the Order of Demolay has recently been organized in
the Province of Ontario by the Canadian Supreme Council of De-
molay in New Westminster, B.C., Wor. Bro. Alward would have
the distinction of being the first Demolay in Ontario to have been
installed Master of his Lodge. A second highlight of the occasion
was the presence of his father Wor. Bro. Stanley P. Alward Sr. of
Keith Lodge No. 23, Moncton to witness and assist in the instal-
lation of his son.

On Monday evening, March 24, 1975, history was made
when for the first time in this area, a degree team wearing the
traditional dress of kilts, conferred the E.A. degree upon a can-
didate in Acacia Lodge No. 49, Moncton.

The idea was first borne one January evening of this year
in the living room of Rt. Wor. Frederick H. Forbes who with a

group of dedicated brethren assembled to prepare and lay the groundwork for the formation of what is now known as the Moncton Keltic Degree Team consisting of twenty members representing five lodges as follows:—

Acacia No. 49 nine
Keith No. 23, five
Steven No. 37, one
Tweedie No. 41, four
Corinthian No. 96, Barrie Ont., one

A total of 151 registered brothers representing twenty-two lodges witnessed an impressive parada as they marched into the lodge room led by Piper Brother James A. Bailey playing the old familiar Scottish airs. The Moncton Keltic Degree Team demonstrated a near perfect ritual of the E. A. degree and it is understood eight brother members of the team had previously never held any office in masonry. Further plans indicate repeat appearances in some local lodges with an invitation to appear at a Montreal lodge in October 1975.

Grand Lodge salutes the Moncton Keltic Degree Team who are to be commended for taking the initiative by adding both color and character in helping to keep alive the precepts of Masonry in an otherwise traditional and sombre ceremony.

During the past year a considerable number of brethren were presented with bars, jewels or certificates marking their long service career. This list of members is given in the Report of the Grand Master.

Moved by Rt. Wor: Bro. F. S. P. Haycox and seconded by Rt. Wor: Bro: E. B. Ross and recorded that the Grand Tyler remuneration be \$20.00 for Tyling Grand Lodge.

NEW BUSINESS

The following "White Paper" on the subject of Lodge Officers was submitted and on motion of R.W. Bro. Ross, seconded by M.W. Bro. Speight it was adopted that a copy be forwarded to all constituent lodges for study and report at next annual session of Grand Lodge in May 1976.

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER, OFFICERS AND MEHBERS OF THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK, F. & A.M.

At ameeting of the Board of General Purposes held on March 8th a recommendation was received that a committee be appointed to make a review on the subject of Lodge Officers and that consideration be given to the presentation of a white paper to this Grand Lodge meeting.

Accordingly a committee was appointed; it has met and has given serious thought to the subject matter and the following ideas are now presented for consideration of this Grand Body. It is intended that these ideas are simply suggestions that may possibly be discussed at our meetings here, but more importantly, we would hope that they might be taken back to each subordinate Lodge for serious consideration of the merits of the suggestions put forward, and that where they are deemed to have merit that they might be acted upon by the individual Lodge. We would wish it to be clearly understood that in no way do we wish to suggest that these thoughts must be incorporated, but rather that they are being put forward in the earnest hope that some or all of the suggestions might prove to be beneficial in helping provide competent and ardent leadership for each and every Lodge, thus giving real stimulation to the Craft in general.

In the beginning it should be recognized that no member has an inherent right to office, but rather that this may come about as

an appointment for anticipated merit, and that promotion should certainly come about as a result of proficiency and dedication.

In order to make Lodge members more aware of their Lodge Committees and the actions and duties of same, it might be suggested that each Lodge could circulate a letter and questionnaire once each year, preferably early in the year so that suitable consideration can be given for successive years, this letter to be enclosed with one of the regular notices of meeting sent to each member and to include along with the duties etc. that are listed, a short questionnaire asking the member to signify if he would be available to serve and what form of endeavour his service might take. It is felt that many members would welcome this opportunity to make known their desire and willingness to actively serve their Lodge is some way, if not as a Lodge Officer then perhaps as a committee member or by giving lectures etc. It is of particular importance that every encouragement should be given to our so called junior officers to prepare themselves for further service, but very important too is the member who sits on the sideline and may not take office for one reason or another, but who has demonstrated ability. This member should be afforded the opportunity to contribute of his talents and abilities and the Lodge will be the richer for it.

It is felt that in some instances members would be willing to serve in junior offices but might not wish to follow through to the more demanding senior level; at the same time the reverse may be true where members of outstanding ability might find the junior offices lacking in challenge for them, and might feel that the three or four years taken here could be more suitably spent where they could assume a greater degree of responsibility. Accordingly, some thought might be given to considering that the start of the so called "in line" offices might be at the Junior Deacon's level.

The challenge should be ever present to the Senior and Junior Wardens, once they attain those offices, to start planning for their year in the East, giving serious thought and paying particular attention to the appointment of officers for their year as Worshipful Master of the Lodge. They should especially bear in mind that each appointment made by them could result in that member eventually becoming Master of the Lodge and that his potential for leadership therefore, should receive serious consideration. Much thought and attention should be given for the planning of Lodge activities during their term of office. Surely each new Master would wish his year in office to be outstanding and the one to be remembered as the best the Lodge has had, and it should be abundantly apparent that no such success can or will happen without proper planning.

The duties of Tyler and Director of Ceremonies are considered to be of much importance in the efficient operation of the

Lodge; a very considerable degree of skill is required of the incumbents of these offices if they are to be performed successfully, and often times it may impose an unfair task, particularly on newer members, and it is felt that some justification may be found for filling these offices with senior members of the Lodge.

In our Jurisdiction the Wardens of a Lodge may either be appointed or elected. Where the offices are filled by appointment the choice must be that of the new Master-elect, often times this must be done without even the benefit of consultation with senior Lodge members. It would seem that a much fairer way might be to have the Wardens elected by the Lodge membership who would thus have the opportunity to pass on the merits of past performance, and at the same time to assist in a very real way in placing the most suitable candidate "in line" for the highest gift they can eventually give, that of electing one of their own choice to rule and govern the Lodge as their Worshipful Master.

Considerable thought has been given to the importance of an appropriate installation ceremony for the Immediate Past Master, and it is suggested that prudent attention and action be given to the report of the Board of General Purposes presented to this Grand Lodge in this regard.

In preparing this report for presentation it was recognized that some of the suggestions could be considered contravercial in some instances, but as mentioned in the beginning it is not the intention of the Committee to suggest that any or all of the suggestions will work in any or all cases, but rather that where merit can be found to exist for a particular idea that serious consideration may be given to that idea in at least trying to see if it will work. Let us repeat again in closing that the one and only purpose for this report is a sincere attempt to put forward some ideas that may assist in bringing about a common goal of all, competent and ardent leadership, with a resulting revival of interest and dedication of Craft members.
