The Grand Treasurer, F. S. P. Haycox presented and read a statement of the Corporation's accounts for the past year, copies of which were distributed to the members present. On completion of the service, the Most Worshipful The Grand Master expressed the appreciation of the Brethren for the courtesy extended to them by V:W: The Grand Chaplain. It was regularly recorded and adopted that the address be recorded in full in the proceedings.

It is indeed fitting that we begin the 110th. Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick with a Service of Worship at which we express our Thanksgiving and gratitude to the Great Artificer of the Universe and re-dedicate our selves to the continued building of His Kingdom in the years that lie ahead.

An unknown author, in a poem titled "An Evening Prayer" had this to say:

Dear God, another day is done
And I have seen the golden sun
Swing in the arch from east to west
and sink behind the pines to rest.

I thank Thee that thou gavest me
The power of sight that I may see
The tinted glory of Thy skies,
An earthly glimpse of Paradise;

The power to hear the evening breeze
Swelling in organ harmonies;
The power to feel the tender grasp
Of a brother's hands in friendship clasp;

I thank Thee for these gifts to me,
But one thing more I ask of Thee;
From out of thy gracious, bounteous hand
Give me the power to understand,

To understand - to sympathize -
To note the pain in another's eyes;
To have the power rightly to read
The kindly motive of each deed.

And this I humbly ask of Thee
Because I know Thou lovest me.

As we pause and ponder at all the rich blessings showered daily upon us then, indeed, should we raise our souls and voices in shouts of thanksgiving. "Thanks be to Thee, O Lord Our God!

This is also a Service of Re-Dedication. Re-Dedication to what? The obvious answer is guiding principles of Free Masonry. This is indeed a fine sounding phrase but just what does it mean?

I wonder how many of those assembled here have shared with me the experience of standing in front of a Candidate that you have been selected to instruct and tried to explain to him just what Free Masonry is. Or have you wanted to attract a particular individual into our fraternity and searched for wonders to explain our order.

All of us are familiar with the challenges:
"Then you are a Mason. I presume?
"What makes you a Mason?
"How should I know you to be a Mason?"

There are various answers to these questions - one answer is found in the Title of a booklet put out by the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick "Free Masonry - A WAY OF LIFE." That is what Free Masonry should be - A way of life.

We sit in Lodge and listen to many interesting lectures, lectures that are couched in beautiful English, filled with high-sounding phrases that roll eloquently from the tongue and we bow our heads in pious agreement (perhaps our heads are nodding as we catch forty winks.) But do we really listen? After Lodge is over we all congratulate the Master and his officers on the excellent job they have done but how often do we hear discussions on the material contained in the lectures? And what effect do those pious injunctions have on our conduct outside our Lodges?

Many times it is necessary to look back to the past in order to properly assess whether we have advanced or retreated. What was Masonry like in previous days? I would like to read you a portion of the account of the opening of the present Saint John Provincial Hospital in 1847 - 130 year ago -

On the 24th June, 1847, His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief of New Brunswick, Sir W. M. G. Colebrooke, K. H., assisted by the Hon. Alex. Keith, Provincial Grand Master of Free Masons of Nova Scotia, in the presence of a large concourse of people, laid the corner stone with the usual formalities. The Rev. Dr. Gray, Rector of Trinity Church, Saint John, Grand Chaplain, then offered up the Dedicatory Prayer. Dr. Alley, Rector of Saint Andrews, Grand Orator, then delivered an eloquent and interesting Oration appropriate to the occasion, which ended the principal proceedings of the day.

Here is Masonry in action - in public affairs. Here is Masonry *visible* and *active*. Here is Masonry that commences in the Lodge Rooms - yes - but then transcends the walls of the Lodge Room and continues to erect its spiritual buildings in the world outside.

At one time the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick distributed a book called "More Light On Freemasonry." I wonder how many of you have read it? It speaks of the Square as representing "Dependability, faithfulness to obligations, loyalty to others." The Plumb represents "truthfulness, honesty and honor." The level represents "a conduct that encourages fellowship, friendship, co-operation and goodwill." These are attributes that should mark the individual Mason. Do they mark you?

"Free Masonry ? a Way of Life." That is what it should be. But *too often* it is a way of life *in the Lodge Rooms alone*. Too often we take off our Masonry with our Lodge Apron, fold it up and put it away and do not take it out until next Lodge meeting - that is if we attend the next one - two or four meetings.

A story is told of St. Francis of Assisi. According to the legend the good Father was living in a monastery situated at the top of a hill. It was his custom to go down to the village at the foot of the hill every day and preach. One day he asked a young monk if he would like to go with him. The young monk was very flattered to be asked and said yes. The two monks started out on the path which wound down the side of the mountain. The good Father spoke to everyone they met, exchanging the times of day etc. with them. Down the mountain they went - into the village - around the square - back up the path. As they approached the monastery the young monk could restrain himself no longer "But Father," he said "I thought that we were going down to the village to preach." "We preached as we walked" St. Francis replied "And if you cannot preach as you walk there is no sense in walking at all."

To this I would like to add another thought. Many of you dismiss this legend as not applying to you because you are not a minister and do not preach. Many times we are admonished - "Practice what you preach." I would like to turn this around and say "What you practice - preaches."

Each one of us every day - as he walks the streets of the place in which he lives - preaches. We may not know it - but we do it just the same. We do not have a choice - we preach whether we like it or not. The choice of *what* we preach - that we do have. AND JUST WHAT DO YOU PREACH? Are men attracted to the Masonic fraternity because of what they see in you? Or do they say "if he is a Mason I want not part of it".

As men look at you do they see - dependability - loyalty - faithfulness - truthfulness - honor - honesty - fellowship - friendship - co-operation and goodwill - do these and other characteristics mark you out from your fellow men as a Mason? In the words of Holy Writ I admonish you "Think on these things."

FREEMASONRY - A WAY OF LIFE - is it YOUR WAY OF LIFE? In closing I would like to share with you a poem I found in the Masonic Library in Saint John.

THE WORK OF A TRUE AND LOYAL MASON

To wear the SQUARE and act upon it in his daily needs;
To meet all men on the LEVEL and judge them in
accordance with the COMPASS of TRUTH and CHARITY:
To be loyal to his ORDER and ever MASTER of Himself.
To travel ever EASTWARD from the feeble LIGHT of an
ENTERED APPRENTICE towards the glorious LIGHT of WISDOM;
And finally to be prepared for the final PASSWORD giving
entrance to the presence of THE GRAND MASTER OF THE
SUPREME ORDER OF THE UNIVERSE.

RECESS

Motion adopted that Grand Lodge take recess until 10:00 A.M. Saturday, May 7 and the first order of business to be the closing and announcement of nominations for Grand Lodge officers.

MORNING SESSION SATURDAY, MAY 7, 1977

The Grand Lodge resumed at 10:00 A.M. The M: W: The Grand Master presiding.

The Acting Grand Secretary M: W: A. C. Lemmon presented the nominations for the elective officers for the ensuing year and on motion adopted the hour of 2:00 P.M. was set apart for the recording of votes.

The Deputy Grand Master was requested to assume the Grand East and the Most Worshipful The Grand Master presented the following address.

THE GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

To: The Officers and Members of The Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of the Ancient and Honorable Fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick.

Brethren All:

It is with mixed emotions that on the seventh day of May of 1977 that I bring to you my final address as your Grand Master. I appear before you today, after having been, in the words of the late Dr. Martin Luther King "to the mountain top".

Just a little over 26 years ago I was admitted entry into Tweedie Lodge Number 41, in Moncton, along with Frank Tuck, Alex Pincombe and Charles Jordan to begin a career as a "just and upright" Mason. Little did I dream at that time that in due course the members of this jurisdiction, would see fit to bestow on me the highest honor that is within the power of this august body to confer, being that of Grand Master.

I mention here the three brothers in whose company I received my degrees, because three of the four went on to serve as Master of their Mother Lodge and eventually became officers of this Grand Body. The Masonic education we were given those 26 years ago, was in a very large measure responsible for the continued interest as we moved through the officer's line. Those educators included the late Worshipful Brother Warnock Price, Right Worshipful Brother Harold Nichol and Wor.. Bro. Vernon Steeves to name but a few. They devoted so much of their time to us during the progress of the Degrees and after, and today I am only giving credit where credit is due. For were is not for the dedication displayed by these Brethren and their continued interest, I would not have gone into the officer's line of my own Lodge. In later years it was the interest of Most Worshipful Brothers Charles Daniel Dickison, Maurice William Dalton, William John Summerville, and Right Worshipful Brother Lloyd Vincent that prompted me to seek office within this Grand Lodge. And then lastly, to you the members of this Grand Lodge, I say thank you for your patience, your understanding, and your excellent support for the past twenty four months.

My two years of stewardship is about at an end, and while they have been the two most rewarding years of my life, they have brought with them many problems. I will deal with some of these under the heading: "State of the Order", but right now I should like to mention something which has been on my mind for some time, and which I feel affects every person within this room today.

Who among us in days gone by, were not obliged to learn in school, the immortal words of Sir Walter Scott: "Breathes there a man with soul so dead, who never to himself hath said, this is my own, my native land". Today, this great land of ours, extending as it does, from sea to sea, is in danger. Danger, not from without, but from within. The future of our confederation of one hundred and ten years ago, is on the line right now. While we, as Free and Accepted Masons are admonished not to discuss either religion or politics within the confines of our temples, it is my belief that not enough members of this fraternity take an active part in the political destinies of our municipalities, provinces, and our Dominion.

Freemasons preach the right to think, the right to speak, the right to worship in freedom, and as conscience alone shall dictate, but how many Freemasons know what these things mean, and how many really believe in them. The activities of the Masonic Lodge of today are lopsided. They take too little account of civic duty, to which we are pledged in our obligations, and concerning which our charges have much to say. The world at large already credits us with a far greater influence than we really possess. The real need is within our fraternity. The real challenge to us is that we prove our worth and show cause why our order should continue to exist. The cry of the hour in Freemasonry is for leadership. Leaders who will do things. Leaders who are so filled with inspiration and consecration to the development of true citizenship, for the sake of a strong and united Canada, that they will forget self and self interest and work for the attainment of the ideal. The real Freemasonry has a contribution to make to the unification of Canada. He is a poor patriot and no Freemason at all, who has not asked himself what plan, what purpose, what prophecy, the "Great Architect" is trying to work out in our national history. For true citizenship consists in discerning the way the "Eternal Will" is moving, and getting things out of "His" way.

Surely Canada exists in this generation to rebuild a beloved community . . . united, just and free . . . where men of every race and every creed may live and live well, because they live in moral fellowship under a sense of common interest and obligation: and loyalty to that ideal is true patriotism. For the same reason, race, class, party, sect, everything must be subordinated to the service of that ideal, that we may fulfill our national destiny and be of real service to all humanity. Wherever there is a constitutional government which respects the rights of men and of the people and the public opinion of the world, Freemasonry is the loyal supporter of that government. Loyalty to country is a Masonic principle. The rights we enjoy as citizens carry with them corresponding duties. Among

these duties is the proper exercise of the franchise, the careful and intelligent consideration of the men and measures coming before the people for approval. No good Freemason will fail to become a good citizen, and to be found on the side of decency, civic righteousness and public order.

In his address to this Grand Lodge in 1964, Past Grand Master Hopkins stated: and I quote: "Masonry must create a new public image of itself, and let the world know that Masonry is a living force in the battle for the right to live as free men in a free world".

Brethren, that was thirteen years ago. We were cautioned at that time that in our own country there were elements of friction and disturbance, and these are now coming to light with a greater brilliance than ever. Let there be no mistake about it . . . as a fraternity we have an obligation to see that these elements of friction wither and die, and we can only do this by getting involved.

I welcome all of you to this Communication of the Grand Lodge, which is being held in Campbellton for the first time, and I take this opportunity to congratulate Campbellton Number 32 on this celebration of the one hundredth anniversary. To the Worshipful Master, Worshipful Brother Davis and the members of Campbellton Lodge I am most grateful for the reception here and the efficiency displayed by your Grand Lodge committee under the general chairmanship of Worshipful Brother Gordon Prichard.

I trust that all of you have found your accommodations to be satisfactory. Our thanks to the minister and the congregation of the First United Church for their co-operation and the use of their facilities. You will note that the province of New Brunswick has provided the use of the Sugarloaf Ski Lodge for the luncheon today and for our reception last evening, through the co-operation of the Minister of Tourism, the Honorable Fernand Dube. Last fall, at the time of my official visit to Campbellton Lodge #32 I was accompanied by Most Worshipful Past Grand Masters Summerville and Dalton, Right Worshipful Brother Allan, Grand Secretary, and Past Senior Grand Warden Right Worshipful Brother Gaskin, at which time we held meetings with the committee and inspected facilities. A subsequent meeting was held with the committee on April fifth, and we trust all arrangements meet with your approval.

While it has not been the habit for Grand Lodge to hold its Annual Communication outside the city of Saint John, I firmly believe that occasions such as this, when appropriate, should be given every consideration.. There's an old saying

that being different usually costs more, but it is usually worth it.

OUR DISTINGUISHED VISITORS

During my term as Grand Master, it has been my privilege and pleasure on your behalf, to visit many of our sister jurisdictions, and I cannot express too strongly my deep appreciation for the warmth and the hospitality extended me and Mrs. Ross wherever it was our lot to travel and visit. The reception given everywhere was in the truest Masonic tradition, and we treasure many fond memories of newer friendships established, and older ones renewed and refreshed.

To our distinguished visitors from other jurisdictions, I extend a most sincere welcome here today, and trust your stay among us will be most enjoyable, and that you will take with you fond memories of Canada's picture province.

I am most grateful to Most Worshipful Brother W. Everett Moseley, Past Grand Master of Nova Scotia and Honorary Past Grand Master of New Brunswick for his gracious acceptance of the invitation to be our guest speaker at the annual luncheon.

Right Worshipful Brother Harold F. Sipprell, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia, and Honorary Past Deputy Grand Master of Grand Lodge of New Brunswick whose service to Masonry, not only in the Craft Lodge, but in the many concordant bodies, will rarely be equalled and just as rarely surpassed.

Right Worshipful Brother Byron E. Duffy, Past Grand Historian and Past Junior Grand Warden, who gave us many years of Devoted Service, and who indicated to your Grand Master in his letter of resignation as Grand Historian, that he would not be with us for this annual communication.

The names of these brethren, along with those other members of Grand Lodge who have passed to the Celestial Lodge Above, whose memory we cherish, and whose loss we all deplore, will be suitably recorded in the pages of the Proceedings of this Communication.

VISITATIONS

During the twelve months which have passed since our Communication last year it was my pleasure to visit thirty nine Lodges in an official capacity, nine of these visitations for the purpose of installations. In addition your Grand Master accompanied Most Worshipful Brother Summerville for two installations and Most Worshipful Brother Speight on two installation occasions. Thirty two other Lodge visitations were made during the year, and these include casual visits to some Lodges, and others for special functions in connection with the duties pertaining to the office of Grand Master.

A list of visitations is included with this address. Here are some of the highlights.

I considered it a rare privilege to be able to present a fifty year jewel to Past Grand Master, Most Worshipful Brother Donald A. Somerville at his Mother Lodge, Carleton # 35 last October. There was an excellent turnout for this event, and my thanks to Most Worshipful Brothers Summerville and Speight for accompanying me on this occasion as well as many other Grand Lodge officers.

I was asked on behalf of The Corinthian Lodge # 13 at Hampton to make presentations of Honorary Life Membership Certificates to Most Worshipful Brother Maurice Dalton and

Most Worshipful Brother J. William Summerville, I was honored to be asked to make these presentations on behalf of the members.

An outstanding highlight of my term was a visitation to Steven Lodge # 37 at Petitcodiac last fall during a special night honoring the Macpherson brothers. Six members of one family, all Past Masters of Steven Lodge, were gathered together for this very fine evening, which was all the more memorable by the fact that one of the brothers so honored, Bronson Macpherson served this Grand Lodge as a District Deputy Grand Master, in 1964 and 1965.

Included in my activities for the year was a visitation to King Edward Lodge in Matpeque, Prince Edward Island in company with members of the Carleton Union Lodge of Saint John, at which time the Master Mason's degree was presented in a most excellent manner. Later in the summer I had an occasion to return to Prince Edward Island and accompanied by the officers of our Grand Lodge had the pleasure of installing Most Worshipful Brother Hazen McClure in his high office. This has been an honor extended to the Grand Master of New Brunswick for the past One Hundred and Two Years, and I would at this time like to acknowledge gratefully, the hospitality extended by Past Grand Master Fred Hickey and his Wife Florence to Mrs. Ross and myself.

I also had the occasion last summer to travel with members of St. John's Lodge #2 to Bangor Maine for a visitation and the exemplification of the 3rd degree at Saint Andrew's Lodge in that City. It was a real pleasure to accompany members of the New Brunswick Lodge on a visitation to Alexandria Lodge in Fredericton.

In July, Mrs. Ross and I travelled to Toronto for the annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Ontario. It was a thrilling sight to see some 3800 members of this Grand Lodge in annual session, and we are indebted to Most Worshipful Brother Eric Nancekivell, Most Worshipful Brother John Irvine, and Right Worshipful Brother Robert Davies for the warm and friendly reception which we were accorded during our stay. It will be noted here that during the Annual Communication, that Rev. Brother Guy Scovil was installed as Grand Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of Ontario exactly 70 years to the day from the time his Father, the Rev. G. Fred Scovil was installed as Grand Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.

I had the pleasure of visiting Hibernia Lodge # 3 in Saint John for a Past Master's Night, during which Past Grand Master, Most Worshipful Brother Henry D. Hopkins presided with the same slate of officers which he had when he was

Master of Hibernia Lodge, and it was most gratifying to me to note the dignity and finesse with which our distinguished Past Grand Master conferred the degree.

I feel quite fortunate indeed that it was during my term of office that St. John's Lodge #2 in Saint John, had the occasion to carry out a two-fold celebration. First, last December 7th the 2000th regular Communication was held and taking the Lodge from Labour to Refreshment resumed labor on Saturday, December 11th at which time Wor. Bro. Leon Higgins and his degree team from St. Andrews Lodge in Bangor exemplified a degree, followed by a service of Re-Dedication of the Lodge and a consecration of the New Regalia of the Lodge. A Banquet and Dance was held in the evening. The Grand Master of Nova Scotia was present for the event as well as the Deputy Grand Master of Prince Edward Island. I am happy to report that all sitting members of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick were in their Stations for this Historic Event.

On April 30th, St. John's Lodge celebrated it's 175th Anniversary, and this milestone was marked by a special Communication. The Worshipful Master of St. John's Lodge #2, honored me with an invitation to be guest speaker at the Special Banquet held on this occasion.

Acacia Lodge of Amherst, on the registry of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia held a special meeting on April 23rd, and again I was privileged to be invited as Guest Speaker on a most memorable occasion.

The Eastern Conclave of the Order of DeMolay was held in Saint John in August and was hosted by the two Saint John Chapters, Ulster and Marco Polo, with the activities at Carleton Union Lodge. I congratulate Gary Caines of Marco Polo Chapter on the fine manner in which this conclave was conducted.

This conclave was self-supporting, and although Financial support of the Grand Lodge was offered if needed, it was with a great deal of Satisfaction that your Grand Master received a letter of thanks from Master Councillor Caines to the effect that they were happy to announce that they had accomplished the conclave on their own.

I do not believe enough Master Masons in the Jurisdiction offer their services in regard to the Order of DeMolay and have nothing but the highest of praise for those brethren who do make the effort to assist our youth.

I was also pleased to represent this Jurisdiction last fall for the visit to Luxor Temple of Imperial Sir Peter ValPreda, the Imperial Potentate of the Shrine in North America. I was

privileged to renew my acquaintance with him in Washington this year at the Annual Frank S. Land Memorial Breakfast hosted annually at the North American Conference of Grand Masters by the Imperial Council of the Shrine.

Your Grand Master travelled extensively within and without the Jurisdiction in 1976-77 and included in this travel plan was the All-Canada Conference of Grand Masters held this year in Calgary. Right Worshipful Brother I. Dale Steeves, Chairman of the Grand Lodge Culture and Information Committee, and Deputy Grand Master Ivan Webb accompanied me to Calgary. It was a highly participatory conference, and this year we have ordered enough copies of the proceedings of that conference to have one distributed to every Lodge, all of the District Deputy Grand Masters, and members of the Board of General Purposes. It may come somewhat as a shock to him to learn that the brother you name as my successor in Office has already been selected as President of the All Canada Conference in 1979, and that the Conference will be held in February of 1979 in Saint John, New Brunswick. Please don't ask how that came about, but I do eke out my meagre living as a "salesman". Also, Right worshipful brother Steeves will be Program Chairman for the 1979 Conference, and this in itself assures an interesting and informative program when the Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries from across Canada come to our Province.

It was my extreme pleasure again to attend the Conference of Grand Masters of North America, and a very informative conference it was this year. The papers presented this year were most interesting. Some very worthwhile topics were discussed this year, including the Taxation problem, the Idea of Life Membership Funds within the Lodges, the use of Alcoholic Beverages in conjunction with Masonic Functions, suggestions for stemming the tide of "Loss of Memberships" being experienced in many Jurisdictions to name a few. I hope to make a full report of this conference for distribution at an early date in the fall of 1977. Canadian participation was welcomed at the conference this year, and Most Worshipful Brother Eric W. Nancekivell of the Grand Lodge of Ontario was Conference Chairman.

The District meetings held this year will be covered in full by the reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters, and I wish to thank the District Deputies at this time for the efficient manner in which they fulfilled their respective duties, in making their official visits to the Lodges, and the excellent reports we received from them concerning the manner in which the affairs of Masonry have been conducted within the individual Lodges.

I was saddened last fall to receive a letter of resignation as Grand Historian from The Late Right Worshipful Brother Byron E. Duffy. Brother Duffy was dedicated to the office which he held within the Grand Lodge as his report from last year will testify. Ill Health overtook Brother Duffy last year and reluctantly relinquished his office. At that time, I was able to appoint Very Worshipful Brother James D. McKenna, of Albion Lodge #1 in Saint John. I am certain that Brother McKenna will carry on in the true tradition of his predecessors in this Grand Lodge, and am extremely grateful to him for accepting the appointment.

There were many occasions during the year which could be called highlights, and not all of them have been mentioned. I do want to say though that it was quite a thrill to sit in the Corinthian Lodge at Hampton to see Right Worshipful Brother James Humphrey raise his Son and Brother Guy. There's something that brings a Masonic Lump to the throat to see the Son of a Past Grand Master raise the Grandson of a Past Grand Master to the Sublime Degree. Also to have the assistance of my Friend and Brother, Worshipful Brother Austin Oulton of Port Elgin in the installation of his Son Donald as Worshipful Master of that Same Lodge.

On September 4th of last year, in company with Most Worshipful Brother Dalton, Most Worshipful Brother Summerville, Right Worshipful Brother Humphrey, Right Worshipful Brother Lee, it was my pleasure to travel to Grand Manan and on behalf of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts present a fifty year veteran's Medal to Brother Dr. Carl A. Oberg. During this visit, we met with the Worshipful Master, Brother Sherman Brown and the Secretary of the Lodge, Brother Cronk. The membership of Mananook Lodge stands at 44. They seldom, if ever hold meetings, have not had a candidate in years, and it is my opinion that this Grand Lodge will have to find some method of reviving the interest of the membership, or in the not too distant future it will be the lot of those in authority to revoke the Charter.

It is my pledge to assist my successor in any way I can to find a catalyst to set off the revival of this interest.

As the members of this Grand Lodge are aware, Brother William Gibson Quinn of Fredericton was called to the Grand Lodge above, in December of 1975. During his lifetime, the Late Brother Quinn had amassed a considerable fortune. In his will the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick was named as one of the many beneficiaries. I will not enumerate the many bequests in the will of Brother Quinn, but wish to explain the provisions of the will as it concerned this Grand Lodge.

Brother Quinn bequeathed his home at 147 Westmorland Street in Fredericton to the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, to be used as a home for elderly Masons and their wives, as well as two sums of \$25,000 each. Twenty five thousand to be used for renovations of the Building, and a further twenty five thousand to be used for maintenance. He stipulated that if within five years the Grand Lodge decided not to proceed with the Home concept, that the Proceeds from the sale of the house and its contents, together with the sum of \$50,000 would go to the Grand Lodge to be used in any manner this body saw fit. The will further stated that the residue from the estate after the various bequests were fulfilled, would be shared by the religious and educational institutions named in the will.

Mr. Justice Dickson of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick was petitioned for permission to sell the home, and to release the fifty thousand dollars prior to the expiration of the 5 year period. This permission was granted, and it was also decided in the Judgement that the Grand Lodge would indeed participate in the residue on a share basis according to that amount of money which was set out in the original bequest.

The Board of General Purposes appointed a Committee comprising the Grand Master, Most Worshipful Past Grand Master Brooks and Right Worshipful Ralph Limerick to dispose of the House and Contents. Right Worshipful Brother Limerick found a buyer for the Property in Fredericton and Negotiated a Sale which was closed in December in the amount of Just over \$47,000, somewhat in excess of the assessed value.. The Grand Master engaged the services of an Auctioneer, and a sale was held over the three day period in Fredericton, from which was realized a further amount of \$23,000. From the residue of the estate, Grand Lodge received a further \$93,000, for a grand total of \$213,000. This money has been invested by the Board of General Purposes as outlined in the report of the Grand Treasurer.

It was the decision of the Board that for the time being at least, these funds should be invested at the highest rate of interest possible, and the revenue from these investments would accrue to the general fund of the Grand Lodge. As you are well aware, there will probably be as many recommendations as to how these funds can best be utilized as there are Lodges, indeed as many suggestions as there are Masons within the Jurisdiction.

It is my recommendation to this Grand Lodge, that regardless of how this body ultimately spends or invests these dollars, and I recommend that before we act too hastily, we

take a long look down the road, that there should be suitable memorials erected to memory of the Late Brother William Gibson Quinn, so that the Memory of such a highly respected Mason and Benefactor of this August Body shall in no way be dimmed by time. The Grand Lodge last year passed a report from the Cultural and Information Committee that a circulating Masonic Library be established, and Right Worshipful Brother Steeves is currently investigating this area. I also ask that a Page be set aside in the Printed Proceedings of this Grand Lodge to the Memory of the Late Brother William Gibson Quinn.

THE STATE OF THE ORDER

Lodges all over North America seem to have a common problem of "Loss of Membership": This is the case in all but eight jurisdictions on this continent. The number of deaths in the jurisdiction is not the principle reason for this loss. There are more than enough "raisings" each year to overcome the losses by attrition. The reason for the continuing loss of membership lies with Suspensions for NPD, demits, and withdrawals. In attempting to correct this situation and set the pendulum swinging on an upward curve, we must be very careful that we do not "throw out the baby with the bathwater".

I firmly believe that we must be more careful in the investigation of petitioners. In my travels throughout the jurisdiction I have found that many lodges have no idea of what is required of the investigating committee, or that the committee members do not know what it is exactly that the Lodge requires of them. There are many Lodges where the investigation of an applicant for the degrees is never visited in his home or elsewhere, and has no knowledge that he is being investigated by the Lodge. The culture and information committee will present a report today, which, if adopted by the Grand Lodge will clarify this.

In the matter of suspensions for NPD, no brother should be suspended without a personal visit from the Master and at least one other member of the Lodge to attempt to discover the reason why he has failed to honor his dues commitment.

In the matter of Demits, I believe that no brother who takes a demit, should be allowed to sit in another Lodge, even once, after he has decided no longer to be a contributing member of his lodge.. As far as I am concerned, a man who takes a demit from his Lodge, before he has made a decision regarding with which other Lodge he wishes to affiliate, is no longer a Master Mason.

When a brother ceases to be a member of a lodge, whatever the reason, all concordant bodies of Masonry, and not just the Lodges within a certain district should be notified immediately.

All too often we are concerned with numbers. . . . quantity as opposed to quality. On third degree night, in the Majority of Lodges, the newly raised master mason is presented with his Apron.. If the Lodge's presentation of the Master Mason's apron were withheld until after he has passed that satisfactory examination in open lodge, we should be assured of having him back at least once.

Many a new petitioner is there only because he has been more impressed with that which he has seen in the Shriner's Parade, and all he knows about Masonry is that in order to go on to the Chapter or the Rite that he has to join a Craft Lodge First.

During my visitations around the province I have on many occasions seen the stewards bringing in extra chairs to accommodate the turnout of the Brethren. On other visitations I have found the membership hard-pressed to find enough officers to fill the stations and open Lodge. This is reflected in some of the Lodge Notices. Many of them come to my attention, completely blank, in so far as the work of the evening, or the program for the Lodge is concerned. Certainly if a member opens his notice and sees nothing there, there will be no inducement to leave the Curling Club, the TV set or what have you to come to Lodge. I certainly compliment those Master's and secretaries who do get together to prepare the proper notice. Some notices are extremely interesting to read, and the attendance at the Lodge meetings is reflected as a result.

The activities of our Lodges, the attendance at our meetings, are just what you and I as Masters, Past Masters and Wardens of Lodges make them.

When I was discussing visitations, I purposely did not mention the trip which I took to Caribou, Maine, only one month ago. It was by the Keltic Degree Team, which had its origin in Moncton three years ago as the brain-child of Right Worshipful Brother Fred Forbes. The Keltic team has accomplished something that could provide a lesson for all of us. It's involvement. While it started out in Moncton, the Keltic team now involves Brethren from all across the jurisdiction. No less than thirty seven Brethren were involved with the team activities at Caribou, and last fall an overseas tour of Scotland was arranged. And that didn't include the Pipes and Drums which accompanied the visitors.

It all adds up to getting involved.. The friendships made by the members of the Keltic team are lasting friendships, and it might interest you to know that twenty one of the team members I have just mentioned are brothers from the sidelines.

Getting involved does not only mean, getting involved with the activities within the lodge. . . . but let's get involved with activities within our respective communities. Some Lodges have been doing this for some time. One Lodge I know of supports the ambulance of their town. . . . others give scholarships. . . . others support local service projects, and these Lodges are healthy. The successful Lodges are those which project a Public Image that is respected. We must continue working to project an image of Masonry that will induce worthy petitioners to ask to join our ranks. We require that our Petitioners for the degrees state that they have conceived a favorable image of our ancient institution, so let's help them discover that favorable image by our thoughts, words and deeds.

The meeting of the Scholarship Committee was held in Fredericton and the amount of six thousand dollars was awarded to deserving students throughout the jurisdiction. A full report on the activities of this committee will be presented by the chairman, Most Worshoipful Brother Murray S. Speight.

During my term of office I have been the recipient of a number of presentations. I would like to acknowledge some of these. I was presented with an Honorary Life Membership in Albion Lodge Number 1, an Honorary Life Membership in The Corinthian Lodge Number 13. The New Brunswick Lodge #22 most graciously presented me with a Square and Compass, the handiwork of Worshipful Brother Boutilier. Hibernia Lodge # 3, through the handiwork of Brother Mel Mofford presented me with a beautiful Grand Master's Compasses done in white string art on a blue background. Alexandria Lodge Number 33 presented me with a book and long playing record. . . . a treasury of Masonic Thought and an evening of Masonic Music. And most outstanding among my treasures is the Life Membership in my Mother Lodge, Tweedie Number Forty One together with a Past Grand Master's Jewel on the night of April 12th. . . . an evening which will always be cherished in my book of memories.

In conclusion I wish to thank the District Deputy Grand Masters in the 7 Masonic Districts of New Brunswick for their valuable assistance during the past year. All of the District Deputies have completed their official visitations to the lodges under their care, and have turned in some excellent reports.

There is a notice of Motion before this Grand Communication to include the District Deputies as members of the Board of General Purposes during their term of office, and this move has my unqualified support.

My heartfelt appreciation to the Officers and Members of this Grand Lodge who so unselfishly accompanied me on my various visitations throughout the Jurisdiction, and elsewhere.

There is no way that I could have kept the commitments of the Grand Master unless I had the full support and understanding of my wife Elsie. She spent many a lonely moment accompanying me on some of the visitations, and many a night waiting at home. Her patience when my own was wearing thin, the occasions on which she went with me when she would rather have been at home, the right words at the right time have all reminded me of a dedication service of this Grand Lodge a few years ago — "A word fitly spoken is like apples of gold in pictures of silver."

And finally my Brethren, these words from the Pen of George Free:

What makes you a Mason, O brother of mine?
It isn't the dueguard, nor is it the sign,
Is isn't the jewel that hangs on your breast,
It isn't the apron in which you are dressed,
It isn't the step, nor the token, nor grip,
Nor lectures that fluently flow from the lip,
Nor yet the possession of that mystic word,
On five points of fellowship duly conferred,
Though these are essential, desirable, fine,
They don't make a Mason, O brother of mine.

That you to your sworn obligation are true—
This that, brother mine makes a Mason of you.
Secure in your heart you must safeguard your trust,
With lodge and with brother be honest and just,
Assist the deserving who cry in their need,
Be chaste in your thought, in your word and your deed,
Support him who falters, with hope banish fear,
And Whisper advice in the erring one's ear.
Then will the Great Lights on your path brightly shine,
And you'll be a Mason, O brother of Mine.

Your use of Lifes hours by the gauge you must try,
The gavel to vices with courage apply,
Your walk must be upright as shown by the plumb,
On the level, to bourn whence no travellers come;

The Book of your faith be the rule and the guide,
The compass your passions shut safely inside;
The Stone which the Architect placed in your care,
Must pass the strict test of His unerring square,
And then you will meet with approval divine,
And you'll be a Mason, O brother of Mine.

And now abideth Faith, Hope, Charity. . . . These three.
But the Great of these is Charity. May the Great Architect of the Universe grant further light and aid, to keep us from standing in our own way.

REPORT OF THE RITUAL COMMITTEE

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER,
OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF
THE GRAND LODGE OF NEW BRUNSWICK, F. & A.M.

The Ritual Committee in presenting their report for the year 1976-1977 beg leave to report as follows:

1. That only one particular subject has been presented for consideration of the Board, that of the burial of the body in the third degree. In some Lodges in the Province it has apparently become the custom to bury the body with feet toward the East, and while some discussion may arise concerning this, it has always been the judgement of the Ritual Committees of this Grand Lodge over the years that the body should be buried with feet toward the West. Until such time, then, as Grand Lodge would approve a proper amendment to the Ritual in this regard the decision of this Committee must be that they would consider the burial of the body with feet toward the West to be proper and desirable.
2. In our report of last year we related that some consideration had been given to the Entered Apprentice degree for the purpose of endeavoring to make it more impressive and interesting for candidates and members alike, and an appeal was made to any and all who might have suggestions in this regard. There has been no response to this request and, considering the beauty of this degree as it is now being exemplified, it is felt that possibly it may be better to lay over on the table any further consideration in this regard at the present time.
3. Also in our last report we presented a recommendation from the Board of General Purposes that "Craft Lodges be permitted Semi-Public or Public Installations provided they be conducted by the Grand Master or a Past Grand Master delegated by the Grand Master on a one year trial basis." This was recommended by your Ritual Committee and its adoption approved by Grand Lodge. During the Installation of Officers for the year 1977 six Semi-Public Installation Ceremonies were carried out, we believe, with considerable dignity and decorum, and met with favourable acceptance by members and visitors attending, as well as by members of Grand Lodge taking part. Accordingly, the Board of General Purposes meeting on February 26, 1977 have again, by motion, recommended that Semi-Public Installations of Craft Lodge Officers be permitted for a further period of one year on the same

basis as originally approved. Your Committee again concurs with this resolution and would recommend that it receive the approval of this Grand Lodge.

During the year District meetings were held in only three of the Districts:

October 23rd	District No. 5	St. Stephen
November 30th	District No. 3	Chatham
November 23rd	District No. 1	Saint John

We cannot stress too strongly the importance of each District holding a meeting each year on Ritualistic work. We believe that it helps to keep the Ritual standard, that it creates much added interest in having the Officers and Brethren meet and work together, and that it encourages more efficient work in the Lodges. A further recommendation might be for Lodges, who may not have work on a meeting night, to discuss with their D.D.G.M. the possibility of having a workshop or discussion period with him on these nights on proper subjects for discussion. This could well be a means of creating more interest generally and possibly of increasing attendance as well.

We note with some concern that during the Installation Ceremonies of Craft Lodges in this Jurisdiction, in many instances Ritual seems to be forgotten or at least largely replaced with remarks of a purely personal nature by the Installing Officer. While remarks of this kind are acceptable, and indeed desirable to a degree in many cases, we should at all times give due attention to the Ritual wording as well. For many of the Lodge members this may be the only time that they have an opportunity to hear and enjoy this fine Ritualistic work. No matter how many times the Officer being installed has heard it or how familiar he may be with his duties we should not deprive the members of the opportunity to enjoy Ritual as it is written for the enrichment and edification of all.

Suggestions from any member of the Craft for the improvement of Masonry in New Brunswick are always welcome and the members of your Committee are at all times willing and anxious to help in any way possible when given the opportunity to do so.

**MASONIC CULTURE & INFORMATION COMMITTEE
REPORT TO GRAND LODGE MAY 7, 1977**

It is a pleasure for me to present this report on behalf of your Culture and Information Committee.

As suggested by this Committee last year the Senior Wardens were invited to the District Deputies Conference in August 1976. The meeting was held in Boistown with many lodges represented by their Senior Wardens. The workshop type of meeting was, in the opinion of your committee, successful and we heartily endorse the continuance of this type of annual meeting with the Wardens and District Deputies. Instructions were given at this meeting relative to: (1) Lodge programming (2) How to properly conduct a meeting (3) Instructions to an Investigating Committee (4) The Lodge By Laws, Constitution and Directives.

During the year several members of this Committee attended the District meetings with the Deputies and gave instructions wherever required. We would strongly urge that dates for District meetings be scheduled at the District Deputies Conference in order to alleviate uncertain scheduling which again occurred during the past year.

The formation of the "Quinn Masonic Library" be located in the quarters of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick has been undertaken during the year. The indexing of the Masonic literature which is currently in the possession of the Grand Lodge should be completed at an early date. Your committee suggests that the Board of General Purpose appoint a standing Library Committee and an annual budget be allocated to that committee. Such funds should be used in providing literature appropriate to a Masonic Library. We believe that our Grand Lodge should be a member of the Correspondence Circle of Quatuor Coronati Research Lodge in London, England. This is the first Masonic Research Lodge and annual publications are made available to all members of the Correspondence Circle. Incidentally, individual Masons may apply for membership and receive all the benefits of published literature and attendance at any of the quarterly meetings of Quatuor Coronati.

During the year your committee prepared (1) instructions for proposing a candidate to reemasonry (2) Instructions for an Investigating Committee. We believe "of all the committees appointed by a Worshipful Master of a Lodge, the most important to the lodge in particular and to Freemasonry in general is the Investigating Committee. It is, in reality, the Masonic Sentry. It must make sure that no man not fitted for the teachings and blessings of Freemasonry pass through the West

Gate to initiation. Recommending a man for the Degrees of Freemasonry shares an equal responsibility. Recommenders are staking their own Masonic reputation on the character of the petitioner. Hence, it isn't wise, nor can a Mason afford, to be so careless as to sign a petition just to accommodate a friend or another member. It is hoped that approval for printing and distribution of this material will be accomplished at an early date.

In February it was a privilege for the Chairman of this committee to accompany the Grand Master to the "All Canada Conference of Grand Master". Appreciation is hereby expressed for this privilege. It is appropriate to note that the next meeting of this Biennial Conference will be hosted in Saint John by the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick. The Grand Master for New Brunswick in 1979 will be General Chairman of that Conference.

It is observed that several Masonic jurisdictions have specific criterion for the Admission and Recognition of other Grand Lodges. There is a great variation of Recognitions by Canadian Grand Lodges and uniformity appears to be non-existent. It is hereby suggested that some semblance of uniformity in Recognition be initiated. This committee would suggest that such be undertaken at the 1979 Grand Masters Conference.

In conclusion the members of your Culture and Information Committee express our appreciation for the honor of working on behalf of this Grand Lodge and we would suggest that future membership of the committee be geographically representative of the jurisdiction and secondly that no individual have the dual responsibility of acting on this committee as well as membership on any other major committee of this Grand Lodge.

ANNUAL REPORT OF GRAND HISTORIAN

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL, THE GRAND MASTER,
OFFICERS AND BRETHREN OF THE GRAND LODGE
FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONS OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

As your recently appointed Grand Historian, it is my duty and privilege to give you my first report.

Firstly, I wish to thank you, Most Worshipful Brother Ross, for the honour of the appointment and for your confidence in asking me to fulfill the duties of this post, for so many years discharged with the expertise and great depth of Masonic knowledge of my predecessors. We are all deeply saddened by the untimely death of the late V. Wor. Bro. Duffy, who for the past six years had so capably carried on the high quality of work of the previous Grand Historians.

Further, I extend my deep gratitude to the secretaries of the lodges throughout the jurisdiction who have helped make the transfer of those duties to me occur in such a smooth manner. Your cooperation has been most encouraging.

There is a rich store of historical information in our records and I am gradually digesting this information as quickly as I can. I hope that in the not too distant future, I shall be able to begin calling upon our Lodges to help me further the collection of data that will enable us to keep current the store of Free Masonry in New Brunswick. In the meantime, I urge you to take note of the interesting artifacts that you possess and to begin to develop your own archives if you have not already done so. I can assure you that you will find the experience a rewarding one.

The story of any society develops color and interest from the people who compose that society. It is the interrelation of those people that ultimately determines its success. Masonry in New Brunswick thrives or wanes because of the men who are incorporated in its body, and because of the deeds, good works and conduct of its members. Its interrelationship with the larger community and the expression of the high ideals of the fraternity in the acts of its members in meeting the needs of that community will inevitably determine our future.

It is then to our individual members that we should look occasionally and take the time to record their achievements. Our lodges happily do this on occasions such as milestones in length of membership and length of distinguished service. We are always pleased to observe 50 and 60 year anniversaries, but noteworthy also are the honours bestowed on officers and members who serve their lodges with unsparing sacrifice. Not too long ago, Hibernia Lodge No. 3 so honoured its organist, Bro. George P. Lanyon, who for more than fifty years served that lodge in that capacity. But this dedication was not only offered to Hibernia Lodge, but to other lodges in the district as well.

Over the years, families of Masons have served their lodges with great distinction. It is always encouraging to watch sons walk in their father's Masonic footsteps, particularly when these men also answer the challenge to serve in the East. It is particularly deserving of note when six brothers all seek out the mysteries of Masonry and each in his turn serves his lodge as Worshipful Master. Such a family is the MacPherson family and it was timely that during this past year, their Mother Lodge in Petitcodiac, Steven Lodge No. 37, gathered together Masons from throughout the jurisdiction to honor these men for their distinguished careers.

The Keltic Degree team from Moncton has again had an active year, highlighted by a visit to Scotland in the autumn of 1976. While in Edinburgh, they demonstrated the Entered Apprentice and Master Mason degrees. After their return to Canada, they next visited Charlottetown and finally in the spring of 1977, travelled to Caribou, Maine, where they were met by an enthusiastic gathering of more than 300.

Lodge Anniversaries are always of great interest, but St. John's Lodge No. 2 has celebrated a unique and unusual event; its two thousandth regular communication. On December 7, 1976, lodge was opened to exemplify the Entered Apprentice degree on Brother Arthur Loughery, then recessed for the evening and reconvened the following Saturday when a special ceremony of rededication was performed. In attend-

ance were Most Worshipful, the Grand Master, Earle Bedford Ross accompanied by Officers of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, Most Worshipful Brother J. G. Veniot, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia, representatives of the Grand Lodges of Prince Edward Island and State of Maine, and the officers and brethren of St. Andrews Lodge No. 83, Bangor Maine, who also exemplified the Entered Apprentice degree. A most enjoyable reception, banquet and dance followed at the Holiday Inn.

At a later date, St. John's Lodge celebrated its 175th Anniversary at which occasion our Grand Master was the guest speaker, which was again followed by a relaxing and enjoyable banquet and social evening.

Innovation has marked the program of this past year, and to Sunbury Lodge No. 42 belonged the distinction of conducting the first semi-public installation of lodge officers in the jurisdiction. Presided over by Most Wor. Bro. Murray Speight, P. G. M., and assisted by Most Worshipful the Grand Master, E. B. Ross; M. Wor. Bro. Wm. J. Summerville, P. G. M.; and M. Wor. Bro. M. Dalton, P. G. M.; the Worshipful Master, Edwin R. Saunders and his officers for the ensuing year were installed into their respective offices before a gathering of upwards of sixty friends and brethren. Shortly after, semi-public installations were conducted at Albion Lodge No. 1 in Saint John, Tweedie Lodge No. 41 and Acacia Lodge No. 49 in Moncton, Ashlar Lodge No. 36 in McAdam, and Benjamin Lodge No. 31 in Perth-Andover.

Although the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick is not directly affected, I regret reporting that is has been necessary for the Canadian Masonic Research Association to discontinue its operations this past year. With membership dwindling and their executive scattered at too great distances, it became difficult for them to be effective in their work, and so after publishing 116 papers over a period of 27 years, a most worthwhile organization has ceased to function. It should be noted though that the material that was assembled and accumulated during this period is to be stored in the Miramichi Masonic Museum, in Newcastle under Bro. J. D. S. Ullock who will act as custodian. We are fortunate to have on file most of the published papers of that association but any brother who may have papers numbered 1, 12, 16, 49, 50, 55, 67, 71, 74, 75, 77, 108, 113, and 114, and who no longer wishes to keep them in his possession, if he were to forward them to me, I would see that the collection is properly bound for safe-keeping.

The Masonic Library in Saint John is in need of indexing and review. This task hopefully may be carried out and com-

pleted in the coming year. It may be most useful to compile similar listings of books and materials available throughout the jurisdiction and to consolidate such lists into a reference paper that may be made available to interested brethren.

NOTICES OF MOTION

The following amendments to the Constitutions and General Regulations (1972 edition) were presented to Grand Lodge as hereinafter outlined and the disposition of same by the votes of members as noted:

1. It was moved by V: W: Bro. J. D. McKenna, seconded by W: Bro. F. K. Klohn and defeated that page 56, section 22 of 1972 edition be amended to read: "No Lodge in the City of Saint John shall make a Mason for a less consideration than one hundred dollars". (replacing seventy-five dollars).
2. It was moved by R: W: Bro. I. H. Webb, seconded by R: W: J. A. Gaudet and defeated that page 76, section 2 (1972 edition) be amended to read as follows: "For every member, each Lodge shall pay towards the fund for Grand Lodge purposes, three dollars (\$3.00) per annum". (replacing \$2.00)
3. New addition to page 61, to be section 56: Moved by R: W: Bro. I. Dale Steeves, seconded by V: W: A. L. Carver and adopted that "No degree shall be conferred in any Craft Lodge in this jurisdiction on Sunday."
4. New addition to page 37, section 6: Moved by M: W: Bro. W. J. Summerville, seconded by W: Bro. E. B. Campbell and adopted that "No member of Grand Lodge shall be eligible for the office of Grand Master unless he has served at least one term as District Deputy Grand Master or Junior Grand Warden or Senior Grand Warden or Deputy Grand Master".
5. New addition page 50, section 1: Moved by M: W: Bro. W. J. Summerville, seconded by R: W: Bro. C. H. Jarvis and adopted that District Deputy Grand Masters during their term of office shall be members of the board.
6. Addition page 52, section 1. Moved in amendment by R: W: Bro. I. Dale Steeves, seconded by W: Bro. B. G. Boutilier and adopted that this subject be tabled for one year — "That the station of Immediate Past Master in the Craft Lodges be made an official office of the Lodge to be occupied by the I. P. Master or a Past Master". Amendment adopted.

7. It was moved by M: W: Bro. H. D. Hopkins, seconded by R: W: Bro. F. P. Haycox and adopted to delete from present section 6, page 37 (1972 edition) the words "oral - in open Lodge - A. "Written nominations for the several elective offices of Grand Lodge shall be made at a time to be announced in the proclamation calling Grand Lodge. Written nominations for such elective officers shall be deposited with the Grand Secretary as soon after the opening of Grand Lodge as may be. Such written nomination shall bear thereon the consent of the person nominated for that particular office".

8. To amend section 3, page 40 (1972 edition) as follows: In case it is proposed to change the place of meeting from Saint John, the Grand Lodge shall fix a time for the consideration of the proposed change. Formal notice of motion must be given of a proposition to change the place of meeting, and of the place to which the meeting is to be changed at least sixty (60) days prior to the first day of the annual session. Reference - advance notice of 60 days for a change of location.

Moved in amendment by R: W: Bro. R. V. Limerick, seconded by V: W: Bro. J. D. McKenna that the following words be deleted from the proposal "Should no proposition be given, the annual session will be held in Saint John" (note section 1). With this correction the amendment was adopted.

9. It was moved by M: W: Bro. H. D. Hopkins, seconded by R: W: Bro. George M. Smith and adopted that page 45, section 2 (1972 edition) to read in part "The Grand Treasurer shall give bonds, with two sureties, to the Grand Master, himself for five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) and the sureties in two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) each". Reference - to increase bond of \$2,000.00 and \$1,000.00 as at present

10. It was moved by M: W: Bro. H. D. Hopkins, seconded by M: W: Bro. W. J. Summerville and defeated that page 46, section 1 (1972 edition) the Grand Secretary shall be appointed by the Board of General Purposes, subject to the confirmation by the Grand Master and if present, invested and installed at the Annual Communication". Reference - Replacing present section - "The Grand Secretary shall be appointed and, if present, at the Annual Communication".

11. It was moved by M: W: Bro. H. D. Hopkins, seconded by M: W: Bro. M. W. Dalton and adopted that page 47, section 12 (1972 edition) to amend to read "The Grand Secretary shall be paid a salary for his services out of the Fund of General Purposes. He shall open, and keep open, an office in

the city of Saint John, to be styled "The office of the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick" and shall inform all the Lodges in the province where the said office is located; and in case of its removal, to where it has been removed".

The Grand Secretary shall give bonds, with two sureties, to the Grand Master, himself for five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) and the sureties in two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) each

12. It was moved by M: W: Bro. H. D. Hopkins, seconded by W: Bro. F. K. Klohn and adopted that section 4, page 72 (1972 edition) to amend by deleting the complete section as non essential "No Brother not affiliated with some Lodge shall be entitled to the benefit of the Benevolent Fund for himself or family; nor to take part in any Masonic Ceremony, public or private; nor to be entitled to any Masonic privilege what-ever; nor can he be permitted to visit any Lodge more than once during his secession from the Craft. The Secretary of the Lodge visited shall endorse the date upon the demit and sign same.
