

"A TIME FOR REMEMBRANCE"

As Grand Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, it is my privilege to lead you in this service of remembrance and thanksgiving. We meet this evening in this beautiful cathedral. On behalf of Grand Lodge, I thank Dean Cooper and the authorities of Christ Church Cathedral for the privilege of conducting our memorial service in their sanctuary.

In this service we remember and give thanks for the life and witness of fellow members who have completed their pilgrimage on earth. Through their sojourn with us, our lives have been enriched and our fellowship deepened. We give thanks to God for the blessings we have received through them.

For a few moments I would like to turn to the book of Ecclesiastes. Here, in the twelfth chapter, we find the Preacher imparts some good advice when he states, "Remember your Creator in the days of your youth, before the time of trouble comes and the

years draw near when you will say, 'I see no purpose in them.' "
The Preacher continues, in this familiar passage of scripture, to
give us a beautiful description of old age. His advise can be summed up with the thought that we must remember our Creator
today, for time passes more rapidly than we think.

There is great wisdom in this advise for the only time we really possess is today. Pearl Yeadon McInnis once wrote:

"I have no yesterdays Time took them away Tomorrow may not be But I have today."

Dr. H. E. Fosdick, in one of his books, brings to our attention that in Europe we have cathedrals that took as long as six centuries to build. Those who planned and started the buildings didn't live to complete their task. Each generation added to the work of those who hade gone before. At every stage along the way, each new generation could complete or add to the building or through neglect or indifference bring to naught the plans and dreams of their forefathers. So it is within the lodge or within the community. Others have built and sacrificed themselves for the welfare of those who follow in their footsteps. Their aims and dreams can be carried forward by this generation or we, through our indifference, can bring their dreams to naught.

A traveller stood outside a beautiful village church near Dublin, Ireland and asked the minister, "How old is your building?" "This building," the minister answered, "is 250 year old. It is built on the foundation of the previous building which in turn was built on the foundation of an earlier building." In all, he estimated the building went back at least 900 years. So it is with all our lives. The Foundations upon which we build our lives were provided by many past generations who worked and sacrificed for the benefit of the generations which were to follow.

F. W. Wilkinson points out the value of remembrance in the words, "By our remembrance of the great achievements of former generations we are helped to live worthily. By our remembrance of the lessons of heroic and sacrificial lives of men and women of every generation we are inspired to live nobly, for what is the mind without memory and what is life without remembrance."

No person can ever measure their debt to the generations who have gone before. This is something we all need to remember. In countless ways, beyond our knowing, life has been enriched, inspired, deepened and strengthened by influences which have come

from former generations. It is truly said that the present generation is living on spiritual capital bequeathed to it by previous generations.

Robert Cunningham writes in one of his sermons, "Many races have mingled their blood to give us that which flows warm and rich and red through our veins and makes us the people we are. The love of liberty and peace, the blessing of good sense and the warmth of common sympathy, all these have been our heritage. Yet how often do we call to remembrance the blood that has been spilt and the lives that have been given to maintain these for us. We are living in debt to past generations who have laid the foundations for our society."

The author of the last chapters of the book of Isaiah writes: "Look to the rock from which you were hewn, to the quarry from which you were dug"

Great strength and inspiration can come to us today if we pause to remember the past generations who have contributed to the great heritage which is ours. The past is never dead as some people would lead us to believe. We are the product of all the living and learning that has gone on before us.

By looking back to the past we are enabled to live fully in the present and to walk confidently and hopefully into the future Especially is this true for those who put their trust in God. Throughout history, God, in his goodness and love, has provided for all his children, strength in times of weakness, comfort in times of mourning, healing in times of sickness and guidance in times of confusion. Whatever comes our way, we can be confident that the love and goodness of God will surround us, and that God will give us the necessary resources to do his will. The Good Shepherd, who has taken care of his sheep in the past and has provided places of refreshment and quiet rest, will continue to love and guide his sheep in the future.

The writer of the book of Isaiah gives us this assurance, when he writes, "When you pass through the waters I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. For I am the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior." Our knowledge of God's dealings with his people in the past, enables us to live confidently in the present and to look hopefully to the future.

W. Austin Squires, in his book, "History of Fredericton, The Last 200 Years", writes, "Cicero once wrote that 'he who is without knowledge of what happened before his birth remains a child'. To this might be added that he who cares not about his community's past and erects no memorials remains a barbarian." Our ability to solve the problems of the present depends, to a large extent, on our knowledge and appreciation of past generations. As we rejoice in our past and give thanks for our heritage, we need to instruct our children in the foundations of their faith.

During the next two years we will be celebrating two greats events: in 1983 the bicentennial of the coming of the United Empire Loyalists to British North America and in 1984 the formation of the Province of New Brunswick which their coming created. It is a time for quiet remembrance of the sacrifices and loyalty of the founders of our community. It is a time of thanksgiving when we praise God for the many blessings they have passed on to us through their sacrifices. It is a time of dedication and commitment to build up on the foundations which they have provided.

We are a privileged people. A great heritage has been given to us. The Preacher in the book of Ecclesiastes gives us good advise when he writes, "Remember your Creator in the days of your youth, before the time of trouble comes and the years draw near when you will say, "I see no purpose in them."

At the conclusion of the Divine Service, Grand Lodge Officers and Brethren in Regalia, led by the Burtts Corner Brass Band and a colour party, paraded from the Cathedral to enter the Lord Beaverbrook Hotel and prepare for the opening ceremonies of Grand Lodge.

THE GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

To: The Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick.

It is only a matter of hours from now and I will be relinquishing the coveted office of your Grand Master. The two years since I was first elected has passed very rapidly and as I reflect on that two years I believe they have been productive in many ways. Although there has been some disappointments there is still much to be accomplished as our Fraternity continues to teach those fundamental tenets of brotherly love, relief, and truth.

I wish to welcome all members of Grand Lodge to this our 116th Annual Communication. It is a particular pleasure to welcome you to the capital city of Fredericton and inform you that this is the first time since 1914 that the Fraternity has held its Annual Communication in this city. The city fathers are particularly pleased to have us meeting here as was indicated in the brochures made available at registration and the audible welcome we received last evening.

During the year under review our country has continued to be in the most severe economic depression since the 1930's. Many of our members are suffering extreme hardships in loss of employment and financial income. To our members who have suffered such loss we extend our regrets and offer encouragement, remembering that our Fraternity is charitable and will assist whenever possible.

I want to express my sincere thanks to all members of the Fraternity who expressed concern and sent encouragement to me during my hospital confinement and subsequent convalescence which was necessitated due to a skiing accident while I was practicing "Participaction". A very special thanks is extended to Deput

ty Grand Master, Right Worshipful Brother George Robinson and Rt. Worshipful Brother J. William Murray, who so capably represented this Grand Lodge at the All Canada Grand Masters Conference during my convalescence.

To the Board of General Purposes I also express my appreciation for the encouragement and guidance which was received during the past year.

Our staff at Grand Lodge Headquarters in Saint John continues to conduct the business efficiently and deserves our sincere appreciation.

Our Distinguished Guests

I am particularly pleased to have representation from all our neighbouring Sister Jurisdictions. I take particular pleasure in welcoming Most Worshipful Brother Douglas Sheldrick P.G.M. of the Grand Jurisdiction of Quebec, not only for the fact that he is a native New Brunswicker but also for the fact that he is our guest speaker at todays Grand Masters Luncheon. It is our hope that each of our visitors will enjoy their stay in our midst and that each will take our fraternal greetings back home to his Jurisdiction.

It is also very pleasing to have had so many visitors representing our Concordant Bodies at last evenings roll-call. A particular welcome and recognition is extended the the Grand Master of Canadian DeMolay; our own current Master of Hiram Lodge #6, Worshipful Brother Stanley B. Cassidy. I am sure that last nights portrayal of the Flower and Candlelite Ceremonies were most impressive and will be long remembered.

District Deputy Grand Masters

We are fortunate in this jurisdiction to have so many devoted and well qualified Masons who will assume those duties which are designated to the District Deputy. He is the sole resident representative of the Grand Master in his district and no other officer has precendent to his Masonic authority. Sometimes over zealous Past Masters assume such prerogatives and cause concern within districts. Encouragement and discussion is suggested at all times, but final decisions are the prerogative of the District Deputy. Each of the District Deputies have worked diligently and I appreciate their efforts on behalf of this Grand Lodge.

Necrology

Each year the Great Architect of the Universe calls His roll and on June 6, 1982, our Senior Past Grand Master Rev. Dr. Arthur E. Coleman was called to lay down his "working tools." Dr. Coleman was Grand Master of this Jurisdiction during the years 1955 and 1956. Although Dr. Coleman had been removed from residency of this Jurisdiction for some years, the loss is great. The Jurisdiction in general and District 6 in particular was saddened in September when Worshipful Brother John MacLean, Incumbent Master of Cherry Mountain Lodge #50 was killed, together with his wife, in a motor accident. This was the first death in the Masonic family of a father and seven sons. The memorial service which was held in honor of Worshipful Brother MacLean was the largest that your Grand Master ever attended. Several other members of this Jurisdiction have been called by the Great Architect and their names are suitably inscribed elsewhere in the proceedings. To the relatives and families of our departed Brethren, I express our sincere condolences. The Grand Chaplain will now lead us in a memorial prayer as we observe a moments meditation.

Jurisdictional Visitations

You were informed last year that your Grand Master had completed one half of the Craft Lodge Visitations and the remaining Lodges were officially visited during the year of this report. On three occasions this Grand Lodge was officially represented by our Deputy Grand Master Rt. Worshipful Brother George Robinson due to illness for two occasions, and absence from the Jurisdiction for the third, by your Grand Master. The two Lodges working under dispensation have not been officially visited by your Grand Master, but each has been unofficially visited by their respective District Deputies on several occasions and once each by The Grand Master. I reiterate my comment of one year ago and state that I believe one official visit every two years by a Grand Master and an annual Inspection and Report by the District Deputy is sufficient to maintain continuity of Lodges within the Jurisdiction.

Visitation Outside Jurisdiction

Your Grand Master accompanied by his wife "Gladys" have officially represented this Grand Jurisdiction on five occasions during the past year. These were the Grand Lodges of Nova Scotia, Canada in the province of Ontario, Vermont, Massachusetts, and Pennsylvania. On each occasion fraternal greetings on your behalf were extended and reciprocal greetings were accepted from each of those Grand Jurisdictions.

As previously stated this jurisdiction was capably represented at the All Canada Conference of Grand Masters by Rt. Worshipful Bro. George Robinson and Rt. Worshipful Br. J. William Murray. The paper titled "The Future of the Craft" and prepared by your Grand Master was presented at that meeting by Rt. Wor. Bro. J. Wm. Murray. The next meeting of that body is scheduled to be held in Winnipeg on March 30 and 31, 1984. Sixty copies of the proceedings of that conference will be received by this Grand Jurisdiction. One copy will be delivered to each Craft Lodge through its secretary. I suggest that these reports should form the basis for several educational programs within each Lodge and for District Workshops.

Rt. Worshipful Brother William Sherrard, Past Senior Grand Warden ably represented this Jurisdiction and exchanged fraternal greetings at the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Prince Edward Island in June 1982. Your Grand Master was invited to prepare and present a Masonic paper entitled "Proper vs. Improper Solicitation" to the All American Grand Masters Conference in Dallas, Texas during the month of February, 1983. The paper was prepared and authorization from the Board of General Purpose was granted to your Grand Master to present the paper in Dallas; however, illness prevented my travel to the U.S. and the paper was read into that conference by the Most Worshipful Grand Master of Canada in the Province of Ontario, Howard O. Polk. On behalf of myself in particular to this Grand Jurisdiction in general I want to express our sincere thanks to Most Worshiful G. M. Polk for assisting on that occasion. Three copies of the proceedings of that conference will be sent to the Grand Secretary's office. Again I recommend this material to be used by Craft Lodges for programs when no degree work is scheduled.

Workshops

At the conclusion of the first Board of General Purpose in June 1982 a workshop was held to aid the newly appointed District Deputies in the responsibilities of their office. The latest printing (May 82) of the Cypher Ritual was distributed to each District Deputy and these were compared verbatim with the Jewel. Each D.D. found this to be of invaluable assistance in maintaining prefect ritual and this practice is recommended as an annual procedure of instruction.

In each of the Districts except #1 workshops either for Ritual Training or Masonic education were held during the year under review. Such workshops are effective and beneficial to those who

participate and attend. However the attendance leaves something to be desired and becomes disappointing to those leaders who have made an extreme effort to provide the proper instructions. My thanks is extended to the Masonic Education and Ritual Committees for continuing this important phase of our Masonic Instructions.

Awards

This Grand Jurisdiction makes two types of awards available to its members. Each award is strictly controlled by the Grand Master and the Board of General Purpose. To commemorate the Centennial of our Grand Lodge in 1967, the Beardslev Medallion was struck, to be presented at a rate of not more than three per year to members of Grand Lodge who had through the years made a valuable contribution to Masonry. Each year one of these medallions is to be awarded at the sole discretion of the Grand Master, and the two others are awarded by the Board of General Purposes through the Awards Committee. During my two years as your Grand Master I have been favored with having many exceptional officers, capable of meeting any Masonic requirement, leaders in their District, as well as at the jurisdictional level. While there has been several individuals who have given outstanding service and each would be a worthy recipient of this coveted award, I have selected the one member of Grand Lodge who has served his Lodge through many years of difficult times, currently is the Lodge Secretary, a Past Junior Grand Warden of this Grand Lodge and I now ask our Deputy Grand Master if he would direct our Grand Director of Ceremonies to conduct Rt. Worshipful Brother Scovil Baldwin to the East to be awarded the Beardsley Medallion. The Board of General Purposes through the recommendation of the Awards Committee have nominated Most Worshipful R. V. Limerick and our Grand Tyler Brother Ralph Spragg to be the 1983 recipients of the Beardsley Medallion. I would now ask the Deputy Grand Master if he direct the Grand D. of C. to conduct these Brethren to the East to receive this award.

The conferring of Honorary Grand rank is a privilege that is given to the Grand Master to honor those members who in his opinion have merited so great a distinction. There is one outstanding individual in this category who has served his Lodge long and well, received a fifty year certificate and jewel in 1982, served this Grand Lodge as a Deputy Grand Master in 1966, served as a member of the Board of General Purpose for seventeen years and I refer to none other than Right Worshipful Brother Alexander Buchanan a member of Carleton Union Lodge #8. I would now ask the Deputy

Grand Master if he would direct the Worshipful Brother Grand Director of Ceremonies to conduct our named Worthy Brother to the East to receive the honorary rank of Past Grand Master.

While the Quinn Medallion was been on the awards list for only three years, it is none the less becoming the individual coveted award for outstanding service to a Lodge or District. This is the third and final year that a Quinn-Medallion will be made available at the District level. Henceforth, like the Beardsley Medallion, only three Quinn Medallions will be presented and recipient selection shall be on a jurisdictional basis. However the criterion for selection of the awardees will remain the same except that it shall be done on a jurisdictional rather than district basis. Again these awards are presented by the Board of General Purposes on the recommendations of the Awards Committee and the District Deputies. The recipients for the various districts for 1983 are as follows.

District No. 2 W. B. John McDonald, Lodge St. Andrew #16 District No. 3 W. B. Cleveland Jagoe, Lodge St. John #27 District No. 4 W. B. Lewis Finnemore, Benjamin Lodge #31 District No. 5. Rt. Wor. Brother Frank Langlay, St. Marks Lodge #5 District No. 6 Wor. Bro. Douglas Larlee, Alexandria Lodge #33 District No. 7..... Wor. Bro. Charles Long, Albert Lodge #34 I would request the Deputy Grand Master to direct the Grand Director of Ceremonies and the Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies to conduct these Brethren to the East and the respective District Deputies will present the medallions.

Grand Representatives

It has been my privilege this year to make several recommendations for appointments as Grand Representatives of this Grand Jurisdiction near Sister Grand Jurisdictions with whom we are in amnity. These include the following:

Rt. Wor. Bro. Scovil Baldwin near the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia Rt. Wor. Bro. Gordon Coffey near the Grand Lodge of Minnesota

Rt. Wor. Bro. Charles Webber near the Grand Lodge of Texas

Wor. Bro. Douglas Larlee near the Grand Lodge of Queensland, Australia

Rt. Wor. Bro. Frank Langley near the Grand Lodge of Phillipine Islands

The certificates of appointment have in some cases been received, the others should be forthcoming shortly.

New Lodges

Each of the two Lodges which were granted "Under Dispensation" status last year have progressed during the year. Each Lodge has received several applications for membership and are busily engaged in committing the ritual and Lodge practices to perfection. A request for charter from Granite Lodge was received and approved by the Board of General Purpose in January and is to be recommended by the Board at this session of Grand Lodge. A favorable report has been received from the mentor of Abnaki Lodge Rt. Wor. Brother Frank Langley and the District Deputy Rt. Wor. Brother Eben MacMillan and I would hope that this Grand Body would grant the prayer of their petitions. Similar situations where two Lodges make application for charter at an annual Communication of this Grand Lodge has only accurred twice in the past century, and it is the first time we have been requested to grant a charter since 1967.

State of the Order

It is most gratifying to observe and share the principles of Our Masonic teachings within the various Lodges. With few individual exceptions the spirit of brotherly love, relief and truth is practiced in every Lodge. However in a very limited number of cases personal vindictiveness appears to be exemplified at the ballot box. The "Officers Manual" has been revised by the Masonic Education Committee and is in the process of being printed at the present time.

Members of District 6 under the chairmanship of Wor. Brother Donald Gruchy are in the process of preparing a Masonic Float for the Canada Day celebrations in Fredericton. This float is being designed and constructed to facilitate ease of transportation in order that it may be used for parades in other areas to depict Masonic visibility.

Several Lodges are in the process of building new quarters or renovating present quarters. These include Landmark, Woodstock and Coverdale, while Hartland is considering a change of quarters. Colebrook Lodge recently leased a portion of their quarters for a library and a museum.

Several Lodges have made interlodge visitations during the year both within and outside jurisdictional boundaries. This is strongly encouraged by your Grand Master, but here I should remind all Lodges that if degrees are to be exemplified outside this Jurisdiction, by our Lodges or a Degree Team then dispensations

from each Jurisdiction is a requirement. Degree teams should also perform under the sponsorship or authority of an individual Lodge.

Your Grand Lodge was pleased and privileged to confer the Third Degree in Northumberland Lodge last May to commemorate that Lodges 125th anniversary.

Recently I received and accepted with regret the immediate resignation of our Grand Secretary Maurice W. Dalton P.G.M. Henceforth I appointed Rt. Wor. Bro. James D. McKenna to the office of Grand Secretary and I express my appreciation to our newly appointed Grand Secretary for assuming this responsibility on such short notice.

It was a distinct pleasure for me in particular and Districts 2 & 7 in general to share the spotlight of my last official Lodge Visitation to Salisbury Lodge #20 with Most Worshipful James Irvine Mackay the Grand Master of Prince Edward Island. Original plans were to have M.W. Cyril Collins the Grand Master of Nova Scotia there as well, but last minute circumstances prevented him from attending. It was a delightful evening and I hope that future Grand Masters of the Maritime provinces will attempt to maintain similar meetings on a jursidictional rotating basis.

Conclusion

There is an old 17th century prayer which is very apropos to some of the apparent thinking at a few of our meetings and I conclude with selections from that prayer. "Lord, keep me from the fatal habit of thinking that I must say something on every subject and on every occasion. Make me thoughtful but not moody; helpful but not bossy.

Keep my mind free from the recital of endless details; give me wings to get to the point. I dare not ask for improved memory, but for a growing humility and a lessening cocksureness when my memory seems to clash with the memories of others. Teach me the glorious lesson that occasionally I may be mistaken. Give me the ability to see good things in unexpected places, and talent in unexpected people. And give me, O Lord, the grace to tell them so."

Through the Deputy Grand Master he then presented Grand Lodge with a Holy Bible which was passed to the temporary custody of the V: W: Grand Chaplain.

On motion duly seconded and carried, a vote of thanks was extended the Most Worshipful The Grand Master.

Brethren; It would appear to me that in reading the past proceedings that our District Ritual meetings are not as successful as they have been in the past and that the District Deputies are not doing their duties in setting up these most important meetings which are part of their duties and should put more effort into setting up these meetings, and to encourage all members of Lodges in their District to attend, especially the officers of the Lodge.

Early in the past year your Ritual Committee held a meeting

and found some discrepencies in the Jewel as printed in the Ritual At the next Board of General Purposes meeting a committee was appointed to check the latest edition of the Ritual with the Jewel. I was approved to leave the Ritual as it is printed now and to make the necessary changes in the Jewel.

We would urge all officers to purchase the latest edition of the Ritual or have their older Rituals compared with the latest edition and changes made accordingly, so they may have the proper wording and instructions, so that all Lodges may become uniform is our Jurisdiction.

REPORT OF THE MASONIC EDUCATION COMMITTEE

MOST WORSHIPFUL THE GRAND MASTER, MEMBERS OF NEW BRUNSWICK GRAND LODGE, DISTINGUISHED VISITORS AND BRETHREN

It is with pleasure that I report to you on behalf of the Grand Lodge Education Committee. Across the jurisdiction, I can see continued progress. I am pleased to see, many of the Craft Lodges now have a standing committee on Masonic Education. I hope this number will grow, as more Lodges adopt the idea of including Educational material in their monthly meetings.

We have received a few requests from Lodges for program material and for speakers to address meetings. This is to be encouraged, and where possible, your request will be answered. I would ask any Lodges interested in this, to mail requests to the Grand Lodge Secretary.

Two District Workshops were conducted by your Grand Lodge Education Committee, at the request of the District Deputies in Districts Two, Three and Seven. Both Workshops were quite well attended, but in each, many of the Officers who would benefit from such a gathering, were missing. I realize it is sometimes difficult to take in all events, but, these workshops are set up many weeks in advance, sometimes months in advance, and I feel an effort should be made to be there. It could well be the best three hours you could invest in Freemasonry.

At the request of the Board of General Purposes, this Committee was asked to review the Officers Manual, and correct errors made in First Printing, and add some additional instruction for situations that arise from time to time in the Lodge. With assistance from the Grand Lodge Secretary Maurice Dalton, this request was attended to, and the Revised Edition of the Officers Manual is now in the hands of the Printer.

Another request form the Board that is currently being studied is the merit of printing a Grand Lodge Newsletter from time to time. Findings of this study will be presented to the next Board Meeting in June.

I had the good fortune to attend this years First Annual All Canada Grand Masters Conference in Vancouver, accompanied by Deputy Grand Master George Robinson. Our Grand Master I. Dale Steeves was forced to cancel, due to a skiing accident, and we car-

ried his regrets to this meeting. A variety of Masonic subject matter was presented at this meeting, and I was most pleased to present a Paper on behalf of the our Grand Master on "The Future of the Craft." The tone of the whole meeting was most positive, and we came away with a feeling of pride, as Masons. We again heard reference to the Banff Conference, when Western Lodges get together for a Week-end of Workshops. Masters and Wardens attend, and subject matter includes both Ritual and Education. I feel there is merit in such a meeting, and would hope that this matter can be studied by our Board of General Purposes. One meeting such as this, held in a Central location, would take the place of seven or more meetings now held each year in each District.

Just a few comments on Workshops I have attended over the past few years. Attendance at times was small. In many cases, those who should have been there, Masters and Wardens were absent.

I don't have all the answers, but, the one conference a year does have appeal, and I would suggest a serious look should be taken on it.

N.P.D. is an area of concern, that appears all too frequently in Grand Lodge reports. I feel we have talked around this subject too long, and the time has come when we must come to grips with it, and do something positive. In some manner we must change these declining statistics.

It has to start when we accept a candidate. To impress on him, the importance of his committment. He must be educated and informed, after he has taken his degrees, of what he has joined and the importance of maintaining that membership.

The option of the demit should also be explained to each candidate. Many are completely unaware of it. I know that Masonry is not for everyone and some join only to become disenchanted and they let their membership slip. The question that bothers me, when I hear a list of NPD names read in open Lodge is this: Are these men still Masons? How have we failed in keeping them? They have been initiated, passed and raised and made Masons, armed with all the Grips and pass words of the Order. Does this act of black listing them make them any less Masons. The thing they did not do was pay their dues.

I would like to see something positive done to correct this situation. I'm sure with study, a solution could be found to turn the

outward flow and cut down on the number of NPD losses.

In the same study, we should look into the possibility of contacting those former members, who I would term Masons in Limbo. Who knows how many of these men might on study, be re-instated to full membership again.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the members of this committee who so willingly assisted at the Workshops in Fredericton and Moncton, and attended other meetings on Grand Lodge's behalf to present talks on Masonic Education.

A special thank you to Wor Brother Don Gruchy for his splendid, concise contribution to the Moncton Workshop, on conducting a meeting.

A special thanks to Grand Master I. Dale Steeves for his encouragement and support of this committee. It has made my task as Chairman much easier.

REPORT OF THE GRAND HISTORIAN

To the Most Worshipful The Grand Master, Officers and members of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick F. & A. M.

This year may or may not be a landmark anniversary year for the Order of DeMolay in New Brunswick, and immediately you ma think that this is an unorthodox way for a Historian to begin report. My reason for it is that the first Chapter, Coronatio Chapter in Moncton, suspended meetings in the early 70's, and have not located their records. I shall complete that task imminent ly, I hope. But they were supposed to have commenced their wor in the early 50's, the late Wor. Bro. Philip Drader was the drivin force behind the commencement of DeMolay in Moncton, and fc that matter in the Province of New Brunswick. Some thirty year later we find Wor. Bro. Stanley Cassidy holding the office of Cana dian Grand Master, the first time that office has been vested in brother east of Manitoba since the Canadian Supreme Council wa incorporated. Needless to say Wor. Bro. Cassidy has been tireless promoter of DeMolay through North America since he firs became involved. As their Grand Master he has visited every activ Chapter in Canada during his term of office and has been in man American Chapters, where no Grand Master has previously at peared. Popular among Masons and young teenage DeMolay Wor, Bro, Cassidy has set a high standard to follow, for sincere in terest, activity and dedication. In the same year, Bro. Haze Dykeman, another Past Potentate of Luxor Temple, and a member of Hibernia Lodge No 3, has held the office of International Pres dent of the Cabiri which is the International Association of Pas Potentates, The connection - The Cabiri recognizing the possibl stimulus for senior DeMolay, that is the term applied to DeMola who have come of age, to seek admission into Craft Lodges an have agreed to actively support the Order of DeMolay. But there i an enigma in this situation, where there were four active Chapter operating in New Brunswick and another dozen or so in Nov Scotia, there is today but one Chapter still meeting on a regula basis in Atlantic Canada, and without an influx of new members the days for the continuation of that Chapter may be numbered That group is the Ulster Chapter in Saint John which is sponsore by Hibernia Lodge No 3 and if applicants for membership do no present themselves then that Chapter will also cease to exist.

This then concerns me as an Historian. My report is devoted to DeMolay because there may not be another occasion to reflect of this body of young men should their ranks cease to grow. But I als express my concern in my capacity as Executive Officer for the

Maritime Provinces. Why do I concern you with our problems?. Because I believe that from within this room today we shall find the assistance to continue this program, to make it grow and to make boys in DeMolay proud of their Masonic sponsors and in time interested in continuing the aims and objectives of DeMolay, not just in the capacity of senior DeMolay, but as active Masonic advisors. Our active support is once again needed.

Younger Masons are needed to help with activity programs, athletics, out of door activities, camping, hiking and social activities and recruitment. More senior Masons can help with ritual, treasury functions, record keeping and property management. Working together the load is borne equally and the demands on time are not excessive. Working together we can have fun watching and participating with young men who are having fun.

There is indeed a great need for young men between the ages of thirteen and twenty-one, and should any of you know or have any of your own sons or know of any young men who are close to you that you can recommend for membership in a DeMolay Chapter, please help us out.

Last night you observed the "Ceremony of Lights". In it you were briefed on the Symbolic aspect of the Order of DeMolay. In review these principles include the stress of the interaction of the love shared between parent and son, the reverence for God and sacred things, courtesy toward all men both friend and strangers and the warmth that courtesy elicits. The comradeship that exists and grows from the mutual acceptance of the pledges made by the new initiates at their Altar. The fidelity of a DeMolay to his vows, his promises, his friends and his God, that strengthens him against failure as a leader or failure as a man. The cleaness of thought, word and deed and finding the patriotism that affords him to be a good and upright citizen. These bring to mind Kipling's immortal lines "If you can keep your head when all about you are losing theirs"

If young men can follow their principles we can look forward to an era of developing leadership of which we as Masons can be very proud. We need only follow the example of brethren like Wor. Bro. Stanley Cassidy; our own Grand Master, Most Worshipful Brother Steeves who was one of the early Executive Officers of DeMolay in the Maritimes. The late Worshipful Brother Drader from Moncton, and the late Most Worshipful Brother Hopkins, who was associated with Ulster Chapter. The late Brothers Swan and Holman who were associated with Marco Polo Chapter Com-

mittee as their advisors. Under their influence DeMolay flourished and grew, our youth enjoyed participation in the Order and they were active, they travelled to visit their Chapters and they hosted in their turn Eastern Canadian Conclaves. In large we can look upon these youth and their accomplishments with pride and admiration.

Moved by M: W: Bro. F. S. P. Haycox, and seconded by M: W: Bro D. A. Somerville, that the sum of two thousand, five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) be granted to the Most Worshipful The Grand Master for his travelling expenses for the ensuing year and that the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) be granted to each

District Deputy Grand Master for travelling expenses. Motion carried.

Wor. Bro. Linkletter addressed Grand Lodge on the financial needs of the Hillsborough School Youth Choir, recent winners of the Leslie Bell Memorial trophy, symbolic of the best children's choir in Canada. As a result of this award they had been invited to represent Canada at an International Choir Competition in Wales the first week in July. Accordingly in seeking financial assistance from Grand Lodge, Wor. Bro. Linkletter moved "That \$1,500.00 from the Benevolent Fund be donated toward the Hillsborough School Youth Choir to help assist them in attaining their goal and representing us in Wales"., seconded by Wor. Bro. Trent.

The Most Worshipful The Grand Master called upon the Grand Treasurer, M: W: Bro. Haycox who expressed his doubts that such funding could come from either the Benevolent Account or the Quinn Trust Account. He suggested reference to the Board of General Purposes.

Rt. Wor. Bro. McKenna moved "That the motion be tabled and referred to the Board of General Purposes for their investigation and action, hopefully that they will find some means of helping this choir", seconded by Rt. Wor. Bro. J. W. Murray. Motion carried.

Proposed by Wor. Bro. Michael A. Saunders that a collection be taken at this session of Grand Lodge and he would match the total up to an amount of \$500.00.

Moved and seconded that a collection be taken up at this Grand Lodge. Carried.

Wor. Bro. Linkletter indicated he would donate 10% of what was taken up in the collection.

Of interest, the amount collected from the brethren was \$1,175.00, plus \$117.50 from Wor. Bro. Linkletter and \$500.00 from Wor. Bro. Saunders. Total \$1,792.50.

 - 3. Satisfactory parking accommodations are also available. This Section under Meetings on Page 40 of the Constitution would then read as follows:-

"The place of holding the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge will be in the city of Saint John at a time fixed by the Board of General Purposes of Grand Lodge."

4. I will move or cause to be moved at the next regular Communication of Grand Lodge, whereas the Ceremonies of Craft Masonry authorized by the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick does not include an explanation of the Grand Lodge Certificate when being presented to a newly raised Brother. Therefore, on the presentation of this Grand Lodge Certificate the following explanation is suggested — Brother — having been regularly initiated, passed and raised as a Master Mason,

you are now entitled to receive the Master Mason Certificate issued by the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick. This Certificate is known as the Pillar's Certificate and I now take pleasure in presenting one completed in your name.

On examination you will notice the Three Pillars - the one in the centre like the W.M.'s is of the lonic Order, an Emblem of Wisdom - the one on the left like the Sr. W.'s is of the Doric Order, an Emblem of Strength - the one on the right. Jr. W.'s is of the Corinthian Order, an Emblem of Beauty.

The base of these three Pillars rests on the Mosaic Pavement which signifies the Joys and Sorrows of Man's checkered existence. On the Pavement are depicted the Three Emblematical Laws of Masonry. The volume of the S.Law the Square and Compasses.

The left portion of the Certificate is in English - on the right is the Latin translation, stating that you have received the E.A.-F.C. & MM Degrees on the dates thereon and testified as being correct by the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick.

This Certificate is a means of identification but is incomplete until such time as you place your signature on the right hand side of same in front of all your Brothers present.

I wish to congratulate you, my Brother, and now the Director of Ceremonies will conduct you to the Secretary's desk for the purpose of signing your Certificate.
