

Rev. Canon David Genge, Grand Chaplain and the rector, Rev. Canon Lyman Harding, with music under the direction of Bro. Eric Leighton, Grand Organist.

**DEVOTIONAL ADDRESS
MASONIC SERVICE**

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

This evening, as we gather for our service, I wish to express my gratitude to the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, the Reverend Kenneth Legassick, and the members of this Grand Lodge for the opportunity of having served as Grand Chaplain for the past two years.

My topic for this evening is the need in this world for the continual shining of the Masonic light. The Scriptures have been seen and used in many different ways. I remember hearing the story of the Reverend Ken Legassick when he was the Rector of Trinity. While making one of his visits he noticed that when he rang the doorbell and no one answered, he nevertheless heard sounds inside so he knew there was someone home. He waited and then rang the bell again. Still no answer. Taking one of his calling cards, he wrote on the back of it Revelations 3:20, which reads, "Here I am. I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door I will come in and eat with him, and he with me." Next Sunday, as people were leaving church, a young man greeted him and gave him a slip of paper on which was written Genesis 3:10. Ken put the piece of paper in his pocket and when he got the chance, he drew it out but he didn't exactly recall what Genesis 3:10 was, so he looked it up and it said, "I heard the sound of thee in the garden and I was afraid because I was naked, and I hid myself."

For the church, and for Freemasonry, however, the scriptures are looked upon as a source of light. The Psalmist says, "The Lord is my light." John, the beloved disciple of Jesus, wrote, "In Him was life, and the life was the light of men." In Revelation, John of Patmos declares of the Heavenly City, "The city has no need of sun or moon to shine upon it, for the glory of the Lord is its light, and its lamp is the Lamb. By its light shall the nations walk; and the kings of the earth shall bring their glory into it, and its gate shall never be shut by day — and there shall be no night there."

When a person joins the Masonic Order, he comes seeking for light, and the most brilliant of the three great lights that he sees is that which comes from the Scriptures. I would like to examine two

questions. Are people looking for the light and if not, why not? and Is there a need in the world today for the light? If you look at statistics you would get the impression that in many parts of the world people are turning away from the light of the church and the light of Freemasonry. In the Anglican Church to which I belong, statistics tell us that the church is growing in many parts of the world. In the Third World, and specifically in Africa, the Anglican Church is one of the fastest growing churches and multitudes are coming to it. But in the industrialized world the picture is different. In the United States, the Episcopal Church during the past fifteen or twenty years has lost nearly one third of its members. A report came out from England that in the country there are over twenty million baptized Anglicans. Only one and one half million are active members of the church. Here in Canada the picture is much the same. And this is true not just for the Anglican Church. The Methodist Church in the United States too has lost just as many members, if not more than the Episcopal Church, and a short time ago I heard that in Detroit City nearly forty Roman Catholic churches are to be closed. The statistics for the Masonic Order indicate a declining active membership. What is the reason for this? I don't think the problem lies with the church, although the church certainly has some things which must change. Nor is it with the Masonic Order. I believe it's largely with the society in which we live. Dr. Theodore Rubin, the President of the American Institute for Psychoanalysis, has written in his book *Reconciliations*, "Our culture with its values and pressures kills them, energy, spontaneity, pleasure, sensibilities, creativity, vitality, aliveness, feelings humanity, and life itself. Our society is a glory-seeking, pride-oriented dynamic system, which influences each family to influence each newborn child to predicate his or her self-acceptance on where he or she lands in the self-glorification hierarchy. Simply put, this means that we accept ourselves almost exclusively in terms of achievement and "success", as it is measured by money, prestige, power, sexual attractiveness, or youth." Gabriel Marcel, a noted French writer, has said, "Throughout history, man has always raised questions about his own nature and destiny. Only in modern times, however, has he become unsure of his own essence and a stranger to himself. No longer able to define himself as a rational creature or a child of God, he has lost his way in the universe." Man, he says, is no longer seen as a person. He is viewed from the point of view of the function that he serves in the community. By a process of abstraction he becomes what he does — a workman — a postman, a doctor, a teacher, a lawyer, a clergyman. The thought of a man as a person disappears. "The results of such a way of thinking," he writes, "are disastrous for human dignity. As the capacity to love, to admire, and to hope dries up, the functional man loses the ability, and even the desire, to transcend his situation of alienation and captivity. His world loses its mysterious character, it becomes "purely natural". Martin Heidegger, one of the foremost philosophical minds of the twentieth century, claims that man has lost the meaning of the

concept of being. When he discusses "being" as related to man, he points out that human existence, which he calls *Dasein*, is distinct from the existence of any other being. *Dasein* not only is, but has some understanding of and some responsibility for who he is. But within human existence he distinguishes between authentic existence and inauthentic existence. He claims, like Gabriel Marcel and the psychologist Rubin, that most men are accepting for themselves inauthentic existence, in which they are being carried along by the current of values presented by the world to them, and not as they themselves determine. Saint Paul distinguished between inauthentic existence and authentic existence in the strongest of terms. He said to merely exist and not to be really alive or experience authentic existence was to be really dead while you still live. Jesus declared that authentic existence is called *Eternal Life*. It is the kind of life God Himself has, the kind of life Jesus had; and the kind of God has is described as the life of pure love. God is love. He who abides in God abides in love. He who does not abide in God does not abide in love. And from Jesus' point of view the person is not really alive. When I was in Florida, a friend of mine and I had a discussion on the parable of the Prodigal Son. He couldn't see the justice in that parable. Remember that is the story of the father who had two sons. The younger son came to the father and wanted his goods, in order to go off into the world and seek his happiness. After he had searched and tried all the things that would bring him happiness, and spent all the goods his father had given him, he discovered he didn't find what he was seeking... and he came to himself and decided that the place where it existed was back in his own home. So he returned, and on the way the father sees him, and he runs towards his son, and he tells one of the servants to kill the fatted calf, to bring a robe and put it upon him, and to prepare for a party. While the party is going on, the elder son, who has been out in the field and who has stayed with his father all this time, returns and he asks one of the servants what is going on. The servant tells him that his brother has returned. And the elder son is bitter, he's angry. All this time he has been faithful to his father, so he says, and his father has never given him any such party; but for this son who spent all his goods and has now returned, the father is celebrating. And this friend of mine was of the opinion of the elder brother and thought it was quite unjust what had happened. But really what the parable is all about is **Life**. The only person in that story who is truly alive is the father. The words by which the father described the prodigal son are, "He was dead, but now he is alive. He was lost, but now he is found." In other words, the son had experienced inauthentic life in his struggle to find happiness, and now as he returns home, his face, his mind, is turned toward real life. The elder son reveals that he himself has not experienced authentic life. The bitterness, the anger, are not real life. He could have, like the father, gone and welcomed the son. He could have felt the love in his heart, that his brother had

returned, but he didn't — because authentic life was not there. He too, in a sense, was dead, like the younger brother. Only the father had real life. Real life, eternal life, authentic life, is the life of love.

The light which the new members of the Masonic Order is the light of real life, the life of love itself. The rungs of the ladder they climb are Faith, Hope and Charity (better translated Love). And Love is the topmost rung. When one climbs it, he comprehends all. The Mason who is a real Mason is declared to be such that he can show to the world the happy and beneficial aspects of this ancient institution. He becomes a man both to whom "the burdened heart may pour forth its sorrow, the distressed may prefer their suit, his hand is guided by justice and his heart is expanded by benevolence." The light of Freemasonry may at times be dim but the need for it to shine forth and reveal to the world the way of authentic living has never been greater.

Following the Service the brethren returned in procession and resumed labor.

The Grand Master thanked the V:W: Grand Chaplain for the inspiring service and message.

It was moved by R:W: Simon MacDonald, seconded and carried that the Devotional address, given by the Grand Chaplain, be printed in full in the Proceedings.

The Grand Master reminded all present that the annual meeting of the Grand Lodge Corporation would be held at 8:30 a.m. May 13 and that all members of Grand Lodge should be in attendance. He also called attention to the location of the ballot box which would be available to receive ballots from 9:00 a.m. May 13 until the time set for closing.

It was moved by M:W: Bro. Scribner and seconded by R:W: J. MaKenna that Grand Lodge take recess until 9:00 a.m. May 13 1989 and that the first order of business be the reading of nominations for the elected Grand Lodge Officers. Carried.

MORNING SESSION, SATURDAY MAY 13 1989

The Grand Lodge resumed labour at 9:00 a.m. with the Most Worshipful The Grand Master presiding. He announced that nominations for elective offices were duly closed.

The Grand Secretary R:W: B. A. Prescott presented the nominations for the elective offices for the ensuing year.

It was moved by M:W: Bro. Oulton and seconded by R:W: Bro. Mayes that the ballot close at 2:00 p.m. and that the election of officers be at approximately 2:30 p.m. following the report of the Credentials Committee.

The M:W: The Grand Master requested the Deputy Grand Master to assume the Grand East and delivered;

THE GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS, MAY 13th, 1989

Brethren:

It gives me great pleasure to extend greetings, and a warm welcome to this the 122nd. Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick. This will be my final message to you as your Grand Master. First, I must offer my sincere thanks and gratitude to the Masons of New Brunswick, and all other areas of our far-flung brotherhood, for the warmth and co-operation I have received in my travels and visitations among you. It has been a very busy two years but very rewarding ones. My knowledge of masonry has increased tremendously; my circle of friends has been greatly enlarged, and I hope that you have received as much joy in me as your Grand Master as I have received from you brethren in my term of office. If you have, then my term as Grand Master has been a successful one.

Once again, I welcome to the East the distinguished visitors from our neighbouring Provinces of Canada, and our very good friends and brothers from the United States. This mutual brotherly love between us is a joy to all of us, and to think that we have a border between our two countries of 3,000 miles or more, that is the only undefended border in the world, is an example to the whole world. The influence of our Masonic Brotherhood, coupled with ties of a common language has nurtured this ideal situation. Long may it continue to our mutual advantage.

It would be indiscreet on my part to point out any of the officers of Grand Lodge during the past two years for any special mention, but I thank all of you for the time and effort you have put into Masonry in the past two years. It has made my task possible. Without your support the task of Grand Master would be impossible. I shall remember with gratitude the support, encouragement, hospitality, and not in the least the many times several officers helped me beyond the call of duty in driving me to many of the official visits I made throughout the jurisdiction. It was unfortunate that there were three Lodges which I was unable to visit: those on Grand Manan, Deer Island and Woodstock, although I did visit Hartland Lodge in the Woodstock Temple. My apologies brethren, and I assure you that I will suggest strongly to my successor in office that he make amends as soon as possible after his election.

DISTRICT DEPUTIES

A special mention must be made of the work of the District Deputy Grand Masters who have been faithful in their performance of their duties. They have conducted their visitations in a dedicated manner and in addition have had many district and educational

meetings; this with the Mentor Program has been of great value in enhancing the knowledge of Masonry throughout New Brunswick. I thank all who have participated in the educational programs in the various districts.

THE STATE OF THE CRAFT

I will now make some observations about the state of the Craft. I was very impressed by the real estate. There has been a great deal of work and improvement during the past few years, and all buildings are a credit to the Craft, well maintained and furnished. However, attendance seems to be quite another matter. On many visits the Grand Lodge out-numbered the other members; there were exceptions, however, which were much appreciated. The chief complaint of many Masters was the lack of attendance. I gathered in my visits that if there was something to do as far as physical nature of the Lodge was concerned there was no trouble to get the brethren out to work at various tasks, or to raise money in order to meet some necessary repairs, but to get them out to a meeting was very difficult. This says something to us brethren. We must use the brethren to a greater extent, make them feel needed with a job to do and a purpose to fulfil. Another cause for alarm in some areas is the lack of candidates applying for initiation into Masonry. There seems to be a general decline. This is serious and the future of Masonry depends upon a steady flow of new members plus a re-animation of existing brethren. Let us give these matters our attention. Some progress has been made along these lines and I hope will receive your attention in the future.

Most of the Lodges, no doubt out of kindness to the Grand Master, arranged it so that he was not burdened with listening to or seeing degree work, but rather to have a more informal meeting with much speech making and question periods. These were very beneficial and enlightening, but it was interesting to see the degree work performed in various areas of the jurisdiction. In some Lodges it was done in a very creditable manner. Many outstanding performances were displayed by the officers, but there were other times when the degree work left much to be desired, and the use of code books far too evident. Brethren, I would ask you all to stop this trend, and put some greater effort into the ritual work of Masonry. It must be very disappointing to a candidate, who is hoping to become a good brother, especially when he is blindfolded, to hear his conductor stammering along as if he doesn't know where he is going. If I was blindfolded I would want to be assured that my conductor knew what he was doing and where he was going.

During the past year I have made 62 visits pertaining to the office of Grand Master. They will be printed in the Proceedings of Grand Lodge.

Brethren, let us keep a moment of silence to our departed brethren and at the conclusion of which the Grand Chaplain will offer a prayer of remembrance.

Finally, my brethren, it has been a great privilege to be your Grand Master for the last two years, and I thank you for affording me this great honour. You place me in this position which has been a very enjoyable, if arduous task. Life for me will never be the same. I have made new friends, enjoyed new experiences, and if I have been able to bring something good into the Craft and have left a beneficial mark upon our beloved Institution, I am happy and content. You have exerted a powerful influence upon me during my term of office. I thank you. I hope that you continue to pour out your brotherly love, support and affection upon my successor in office so that the Craft may grow from strength to strength.

The D.G. Master was absent and R.W. Bro. Mayes chaired the first meeting of this Board.

Summer hours were approved for the operation of the Grand Secretary's office.

The Grand Master appointed the various Committees of the Grand Lodge.

Three up-dated rituals were sent to all Lodges for educational purposes.

The Masonic Housing and Charities reported that they have received their Charitable tax #0788 226 - 1 and all donations would be back dated for income tax purposes.





REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FRATERNAL RELATIONS

To: The Most Worshipful The Grand Master,
Officers and Members of The Grand Lodge
of New Brunswick, F. & A.M.

Your Committee is pleased to note that appointments and **recommendations** of Grand Representatives have taken place to fill the several vacancies that existed at the time of our 121st. Annual Communication, and also those vacancies recently created through the passing of incumbents.

At the Conference of the Grand Masters of North America, held at Arlington, Virginia, February 21, 1989, the Annual Report provided by the Commission on Information for Recognition noted that in the case of Italy, the concerns of the Commission, which led in 1986 to the recommendation that recognition of the Grand Orient of Italy be withdrawn, had been under continuous re-evaluation with the result that the Commission is now of the unanimous opinion that the Grand Orient of Italy meet the Commission's standards required for recognition.

Although not withdrawing our recognition of the Grand Orient of Italy, this Grand Jurisdiction has not had a Grand Representative named since 1982. Accordingly, in light of the favourable report, this Committee recommends the designation of a Grand Representative.

The Grand Lodge of Ceara, one of the 26 State Grand Lodges in Brazil, has made representation for recognition by our Grand Lodge. The Commission for Recognition advised that all state Grand Lodges in Brazil are regular. It is therefore recommended that the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick extend recognition to the Grand Lodge of Ceara and exchange representatives.

The Commission takes note that on February 19, 1989 the Grand Lodge Nationale Francaise (GLNF) constituted a new Grand Lodge in Africa - the Grand Lodge de Cote D'Ivoire (the Grand Lodge of the Ivory Coast). The new Grand Lodge will begin with eight constituent lodges chartered originally by the (GLNF).

In this respect correspondence has been received from the Grand Secretary of this new Grand Lodge requesting recognition and exchange of Grand Representatives. It is recommended that recognition be deferred until an examination of an extract from their Constitution determines that the Basic Principles for Grand Lodge Recognition are met.

The amalgamation of the several "trust" accounts into two (2) accounts — The Grand Lodge Investment Account and The Fund of Benevolence. This should result in the streamlining of the bookkeeping of the Grand Treasurer and easily understood financial reporting.

The investments of Grand Lodge are to become self administered. This action is presently taking place and should result in a saving of approximately \$2,500.00 per year.

It is proposed that the Scholarships be increased to twenty (20) One Thousand Dollar (\$1,000.00) scholarships for the year 1989.

It is also proposed that the unconditional grant of \$550.00 per lodge again be granted.

FUND OF BENEVOLENCE

During the past several years the income from this fund has not been used, but has been reinvested, consequently, this fund has grown considerably.

It is the recommendation of this committee that further growth of this fund be restricted and that the members of Grand Lodge endeavour to use the income from this fund in the benevolent manner in which it was intended.

If the income is not used during the year that it be used by Grand Lodge, as necessary, as laid down by the Constitution.

REPORT OF THE GRAND HISTORIAN

The light of Freemasonry in the southwest corner of this jurisdiction glows more brightly in the aftermath of the opening of Quinn House, St. Andrews, an eight-unit residential complex for lower-income senior citizens. It is a light that reflects the love and generosity of more than seven hundred brethren throughout the province whose contributions have made possible the construction of this, the first of many similar projects in our cities, towns and villages. It is a light that will grow brighter with the completion of each future undertaking of the recently formed New Brunswick Masonic Charities and Housing Company.

Freemasonry throughout the centuries has distinguished itself for its love and caring for both its brethren and fellow man. In modern times we would like to think that Freemasonry has embarrassed our governments to provide those services for which we had become renowned - assistance for widows and orphans, for the unemployed, for the sick and dying, and for those that needed to find work.

When senior government initiated nearly two decades ago the concept of assisted housing for the elderly, it was through the vehicle of organizations such as our own that the government visualized injecting the necessary funding into the community to fulfill this objective, and it was people such as ourselves that they visualized would have the concern to carry out the management of these facilities.

We have responded to this challenge, but it was necessary for us first to examine our progress in our Blue Lodges, to establish our objectives and priorities, and to identify the direction that we should follow into the twenty-first century. We have done this over the past decade through a variety of educational workshops, some of which reviewed our past history and philosophy, and some of which were free-wielding sessions into which ideas were dropped to generate a response from the participants.

Over a period of time it became apparent that there was a perceived need for Freemasonry to become involved in the establishment of a Masonic Home and senior housing. As may be recalled, this Grand Lodge had several discussions on the feasibility of embarking into a housing project.

A committee of interested Masons under the chairmanship of R:W: Bro. D. Gruchy was formed during the term when M:W: Bro. J. William Murray was Grand Master, and a report was prepared recommending the establishment of a corporation to undertake the construction of a senior citizen housing complex.

The choice of the first site came about in an unusual manner. Local committees had been investigating different sites such as Oromocto, Woodstock and Riverview. The involvement of the government meant that they also had to approve the site depending upon their perception of the need for the establishment of a facility in any particular community, as well as the availability, cost and choice of land. The perception of need was translated by the government into the term "designated area" and as a facility had just been established in Oromocto, so the immediate need no longer existed there. Woodstock was not "designated" for senior citizen housing in 1988, and although our committee working in Woodstock knew that the need existed, they had to prove it.

The government had determined that there might be a need in St. Andrews, but had no organization in that community willing to undertake the project. When offered to the New Brunswick Masonic Charities and Housing Company, the company jumped at the opportunity. A local committee was formed in June 1988 under the chairmanship of W. Bro. Peter Williamson, a list of eligible persons was prepared, the project was approved, the land secured, and the building designed and constructed, all in less than twelve months. Indeed within a month of receiving the key to the front door, the local committee had all the units occupied, and held a waiting list of those wishing admission.

The official opening occurred on Saturday, April 22, 1989, a raw, cold, wet spring day that produced a combination of snow, rain and little sunshine, except of course in the hearts of the more than three hundred Masons in attendance and their guests. The carefully planned opening programme was rearranged to accommodate the weather. This ceremony was historic for several reasons. It was our first senior citizen complex for those with lower incomes. It was also the first occasion in which our Grand Lodge had ceremoniously unveiled a commemorative stone tablet and this entailed writing a new ritual for the occasion. Because of the weather, the assembled Masons did not hear all of the guests speakers - but their guests did. While the Masons stood outside of the building trying to keep warm, the visiting dignitaries from various levels of government said many nice things

about our fraternity to upwards of fifty persons crammed into the common room inside. It was not until that group moved outside for the ribbon-cutting ceremony and the unveiling of the stone tablet that the assembled Masons became involved.

At the conclusion of the ceremony, a reception was held in the Casino at the Algonquin Hotel, catered by the Algonquin Chapter, Order of the Easter Star.

You took my invitation to visit this District quite literally and despite adverse weather, succeeded in visiting every Lodge in District No. 2 between September and April. I was happy to attend with you in every case, except on January 19th for the Installation in Lebanon Lodge when I was ill with influenza. I also attended several of your visitations in District No. 7.

PRESENTATIONS

All the Lodges in the District have been visited at least twice. The Beardsley Medal was presented to V. Wor. Bro. David C. Jackson by M.W. Bro. J. W. Murray P.G.M. on June 13th in Lodge St. Andrew.

It was a very great pleasure for me to present, on your behalf, three 50 year Pins and Certificates to Brothers Harold M. Brown, William J. Quartermain and Milton A. Palmer on May 20th in Keith

Lodge. Earlier in May I was present in Steven Lodge when the Deputy Grand Master presented a 50 Year Pin and Certificate and several 25 year Pins.

District Meeting and Workshop

The District Meeting was held in Moncton on April 30th, with 38 in attendance and every lodge in the two Districts was represented. Attention was paid to proper methods of handling motions, what constitutes an amendment, etc., in order that our business meetings not be prolonged unnecessarily, especially when degree work is on the Trestle Board.

The District Meeting for 1989 is slated for Coverdale Lodge on April 29th and will take the form of a Workshop with Wor. Bro. Ronald Caines, District Education Officer, District No. 7 as Chairman. Members of the Ritual and Education Committees have been invited to participate.

Church Service

The Annual Service for Districts 2 and 7 was held in St. Mary's Anglican Church in Hillsborough with Howard Lodge as hosts on September 25th. Approximately 65 brothers with their families attended the regular Service of Morning Prayer, which was conducted by the Rector, Bro. William Forgrave. Our 1989 service is slated for Dorchester on June 18th with you as guest speaker.

Masonic Education

Our District Education Officer, Wor. Bro. Neil A. Grass, has reported the Mentor Programme is functioning in all seven lodges and it is the means of our new Masons retaining an interest in the Craft. Educational nights have been held in several of our lodges and in some cases the discussion period has been most productive.

Some lodges which rarely have degree work could use such an evening to advantage. It is very clear that the lodges are aware of the need to promote, by all proper means, the Masonic Fraternity. The visit of the Colonial Craftsman from Massachusetts was both educational and enjoyable.

Installations

Five of the seven lodges held semi-public installations this year. I was honoured to act as Installing Officer for my mother lodge, Tweedie, on Saturday, January 7th. A serious attack of influenza prevented me from installing the Master of Lebanon Lodge, at which time, you were present. Wor. Bro. Michael G. Swetnam, Immediate Past Master of Acacia Lodge, conducted this service on 30 hours notice. (Despite the influenza I participated in five installations).

Those taking part in a semi-public Installation must have committed their work to memory as lack of preparation is easily noticed and causes embarrassment to all the brothers.

Quinn House

Actions speak louder than words. Our seven lodges have supported this corporation from the start. It will be a milestone and we all look forward to Saturday, April 22nd when Quinn House will be formally opened and dedicated; St. Mark's Lodge deserves warm commendation.

- Oct. 21 Keith Lodge - Past Masters Night. Presentation and Dedication of Plaques bearing names and dates of the Masters from 1853 to date. The plaques are an example of the craftsmanship of Bro. Earl Johnston.
- Oct. 24 Acacia Lodge - Past Masters Night. R.W. Bro. Ralph Laltoo gave us a word picture of Trinidad, its past and its Masonic traditions.

Last year I commented on the net-loss in membership in our District of 12, this year the loss is 15. The problems still exist but we also have the situation of the concordant bodies literally "raiding" the Craft Lodges, of new Master Masons, which is contrary to their own regulations. Some of our lodges are trying to bring their families into their social and recreational programs. Others recognize the need for involvement in their respective communities. Several of the lodges have classes for candidates for the first time in years. All such information is positive and augurs well for the future.

Finally, I see the District Deputy Grand Master as the man-of-all-work and it is becoming almost a full time vocation. Some years ago the Grand Master had an annual meeting with his deputies to go over their reports and develop plans for the future. I suggest such a meeting as planning is a definite necessity, otherwise the only members who may have the time for such tasks are those who are retired or self-employed. I feel the Board of General Purposes is still not fulfilling its function as the executive of our Grand Lodge.

A Word of Appreciation

I would be most remiss if I did not thank you for the splendid messages given on your seven visitations to this District during the second year of our respective terms. I also wish to thank our faithful Grand Secretary and his staff, the Masters, Secretaries and Grand Lodge Officers past and present for the practical assistance and encouragement extended to me whilst in this office. A special word is in order to Wor. Bro. Neil A. Grass, our District Education Officer and my Director of Ceremonies and the many brothers who drove or accompanied me throughout Districts 2 and 7 and to and from Saint John. Such cooperation is a hallmark of fidelity to our Fraternity and all for which it stands.

I have learned much in this office and only regret that health and time prevented additional activity. I am most grateful to one and all.

3. I will move or cause to be moved that the Constitutions and General Regulations of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of New Brunswick, Page 58, Section 34 be deleted and the following substituted therefor:

(a) "A member who has been suspended for non payment of dues for a period of less than one (1) year, will be restored to membership immediately without a fresh ballot and upon application and payment of all arrears owing at the time of his suspension together with his regular lodge dues for the period he was suspended."

(b) "A member suspended for non payment of dues and whose suspension has been in effect for 1 year or more must make application and remit all arrears owing to the lodge at the time of suspension before it may be considered.
